MPLA Survey
Describes Members
Preferences And
New Directions

Who belongs to MPLA and what do you want? These are the questions asked in a survey distributed last spring to over 800 present and former MPLA members. Approximately 25% of those contacted responded. Some wanted feedback about results, so we will share some interesting findings in this Newsletter.

Demographic data profiled the average MPLA member as female, a member of her state association with less than five years in MPLA. She has ten to twenty years of library experience in either an academic or public library and earns between \$10,000 and \$15,000.

About a quarter of the members have never attended an annual convention. Of those who have, almost half found it good, though almost three-quarters felt the annual convention alone isn't enough and made numerous suggestions for improvement. Primarily, people wanted program content to be practical, substantive and professional with more scope for informal discussion and interaction rather than inner-directedness about MPLA itself. The upcoming Denver convention (October 19 - 23) should meet many of these needs!

Feelings were mixed concerning location of future conventions. Almost equal numbers voted for-and-against meetings in remote MPLA areas, but over two-thirds favored the 1976 convention in Albuquerque. 81% approved the proposal to alternate Denver conventions with joint MPLA/state association meetings elsewhere. In fact, this was one of the strongest findings of this survey and was a frequently made suggestion on open-ended questions.

Coordination of MPLA and state library associations could be made even closer by combining dues collection efforts, a plan supported by 60% of survey respondents. Most members supported the present personal dues structure and felt that lower dues wouldn't increase membership. However, some comments by former MPLA members do suggest that cost was a major factor in the decision to drop membership.

Though now abandoned because of its cost, the MPLA Quarterly clearly received significant support in this survey. Two-thirds of the readers rated it good or excellent, with over three-quarters indicating they liked its general structure, format and content. 89% considered it an important part of MPLA membership and 92% regarded it as an important communication link. Best-liked were feature articles and reports of news and events, with much support for the idea of expanding them.

In fact, this Newsletter will focus on precisely those areas. Two-thirds of the survey respondents supported the shift to this format to cut costs, but success will depend on finding informants in all MPLA states. **MPLA Strengthens Membership Rolls Financial Status** In 1975

MPLA has grown slowly during this past year, registering a net gain both in membership and in financial strength. The information printed below is part of the Fiscal Officer's financial report as of September 12, 1975, when it was accepted by the Executive Board pending final audit.

The largest gain in membership was in South Dakota, followed by Colorado and Utah. This may be interpreted to mean that even a relatively sparsely populated state can find benefits in MPLA.



Best-known for his "Buckskin Man Tales," particularly Lord Grizzly, Mr. Manfred is currently writer-in-residence at the University of South Dakota at Vermillion.

- Governor Richard Lamm (Colorado) will welcome the joint conference of CLA/MPLA at 9 a.m. on Monday, October 20 at the Opening Session.
- 3 Preconference sessions wil meet on Sunday, October 19, focusing on these topics: networking, media, documents. The Bib Center annual meeting will also be held on Sunday.
- ALA's JMRT President, Marilyn Hinshaw, will discuss how to start new chapters in MPLA states on Tuesday at 11 a.m.
- 117 choices face the conference attendee, counting repeat performances. 75 separate meetings will be held, including such diverse events as speeches, demonstrations by bookmen and videomen, workshops and business meetings. More than 70 speakers, group leaders and panelists will share their experiences.
- The Intellectual Freedom Committee of CLA and MPLA will present a film on national censorship, along with 4 state representatives to discuss local problems.

- Dan Lacy, senior Vice President of McGraw-Hill and a member of President Ford's Committee on Copyright, will head up a panel on copyright Monday afternoon. Also participating will be Robert Braude, Associate Librarian at University of Colorado Medical Library.
- Denver University Graduate School of Librarianship will have an alumni reception on Monday night. Also that evening, a London bus will shuttle librarians to the Gordon Books warehouse open house.
- 67 exhibitors and other sponsors will provide parties, refreshments, speaker support and convention gear including packets, name buttons and convention programs.
- Among systems demonstrated or discussed or even on-line during the conference are those with the acronyms: ACCESS packets from SALINET; WICHE packages on continuing education; DIALOG from Lockheed; ORBIT III from SDC; BALLOTS; and also the Information Bank of the New York Times. Open sessions will be held from 4 to 5 on Tuesday, but it is important to sign up early for structured sessions.

Instruction Of
Library Patrons
In Research
Materials

The world of reference questions seems basically to be divided into two categories: the directional and the informational questions. Graphics and printed guides are provided in all libraries to help solve the problem of patrons who are lost or unfamiliar with local library terrain. But only recently have there been well-supported library efforts to solve the problem posed by attempting to consistently answer the most common informational questions. The reference librarian will eventually have a genuine marketplace of approaches to aid in answering these questions.

Two thrusts in such reference orien-

tation efforts now seem evident. On the one hand, we have librarians turning to new technology formats to program standard responses to standard questions. Such self-instruction systems rely on mechanical tutors with the advantages of never tiring, never forgetting, never becoming bored. In the article below, the North Dakota State University system described here typifies this first approach.

Personal interaction characterizes the other major approach to library use instruction today. The facing article on the University of Utah's orientation effort describes this alternative ap-

proach.

North Dakota State University's Library Instruction Sound/Slide Programs have become widely used throughout the United States and on foreign shores during the past two years. Following its initial showing at the 1972 ALA Conference in Chicago and 1974 Canadian Library Conference in Winnipeg, there have been many inquiries for preview and purchase of these packages.

The Library Instruction Programs were initially developed in 1972 to fill a gap in the Library's orientation program and were produced by the Instructional Services Librarian, Michael Miller. Programs are sold as a complete package or as a partial package including only

the tape and script.

The programs have been designed specifically for use at the North Dakota State University Library, but are easily

adaptable.

Featuring popular background music and professional narration, the short programs are designed for individual viewing in carrels which are completely self-contained and virtually fully automatic.

To date 65 sound/slide programs have been sold with the program The Monthly Catalog—What's It All About? being the most popular. Other available programs include Periodicals and Their Use; The Card Catalog—What's In It?"; and You And Your University Library. For further information, write to Mr. Michael M. On May 10, 1975, the Marriott Library received a 5-year matching grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Council on Library Resources to conduct a program called "Creative Library Instruction for the University Community." The receipt of this award enables the Library to expand on existing instruction efforts and to launch a major new program in the Humanities.

The grant stipulated 4 target departments in the Humanities: History, English, Communication and Philosophy. Library instruction, integrated into the curriculum of selected classes, will be designed by the professor, librarians and a graduate student assigned library instruction duties in each department. The program is entirely flexible at the outset, with the objective that new approaches will result in programs that are of demonstrated benefit to undergraduates.

The Library also intends to expand on its present orientation and instruction programs, Library guides, tours and class presentations will continue with added emphasis on new ways of attracting students to the Library. One effort that has generated great enthusiasm is a series of short "spots" on the campus television network which feature many Library services and facilities.

#### Colorado

The METRO Information Retrieval Network was officially launched at the first meeting of the project's Advisory Committee in Denver on July 22, 1975. METRO, a service program of the Bibliographical Center for Research, is being initiated by a Library Service and Construction Act Title III grant from the

Colorado State Library.

The highlight of the meeting was the acceptance of the Network fee schedule that recovers the costs of actual use of the data files plus the costs of network administration. During Phase I of the project, each participant, except the central node, is absorbing the costs of the staff time to provide the service, while the project monies pay for the costs of equip-

while the project monies pay for the costs of equipment, maintenance and promotional activities.

Phase II of the project will expand the number of data bases that are available to Network libraries, and Phase III will cover the initial expansion of the Network to other areas in the Bibliographical Center's service region, which includes all or parts of 10 Western states. Rankin Memorial Neodesha Public Library, he was instrumental in arranging the memorial gift endowing the library. He also helped organize the Southeast Kansas Regional Library System and was president of its executive hoard for six tem and was president of its executive board for six years. He has also served as president of the KLA Trustees Section and as a Kansas delegate to the ALA convention.

Ford A. Rockwell is best known in MPLA as the long-time editor of the MPLA Quarterly. Beginning work as a librarian in 1937, he has served in various Western libraries and has been president both of KLA and MPLA. #### Nebraska

During the fiscal year 1976, Holdrege Public Library has been awarded \$18,000 as support for its experimental "Mail-A-Book" project. Eight counties in central Nebraska are involved: Casper, Franklin, Nuckalls, Webster, Hamilton, Merrick, Dawson, and Howard. Webster, Hamilton, Merrick, Dawson, and Howard. American Companies of Topeka, Kansas has agreed to supply special catalogs listing 800 selected paperback titles. 12,000 of these catalogs have been prepared to be send to rural box holders in counties and to post office box holders in towns without libraries.
