# MPLA Awards Committee Seeks New Directions

While considering possibilities for an Outstanding Service Award, this year the Ad Hoc Committee on Awards is exploring several new, meaningful award ideas. The Committee's main emphasis in trying to broaden the awards program is to focus some of the awards on public efforts that have an important bearing on region libraries. The Committee is also considering a regional literary award, and, within the library community, an award to an exceptional beginning career librarian.

Five specific awards have been underlined as important and fitting for MPLA to present this year

The MPLA Legislative Support Award is to be given to an individual or group (state legislature, city council, board of education, etc.) in recognition of exemplary legislative support for growth and development of a library or libraries in the MPLA area within the past two years.

The MPLA Intellectual Freedom Award will be given to a person, or persons, in the MPLA region demonstrating, within the last two years, a notable defense against censorship and commitment to intellectual freedom, including the public's right of choice, right to read, and right to information. Examples might be found in relation to current censorship (obscenity) laws or governmental "sunshine laws" in the region.

The MPLA News Media Support Award recognizes the news media organization in the MPLA region making the strongest effort, either in a single presentation, or in ongoing coverage, within the past two years, to promote libraries and library activities to the

community. Criteria will include amount and effectiveness of coverage and manifestation of a positive commitment to generate public interest in libraries.

The MPLA Literary Contribution Award will be given to that author whose published writings are most successful in furthering an understanding and appreciation of the Mountain Plains region. The author need not reside in the region, and the selection may be based on either a single work or a body of works. Nominees will be evaluated on the basis of literary worth, readability, and evidence of responsible research, as applicable.

The MPLA Beginning Professional Award recognizes a librarian/media specialist who has made, within the first five years after receiving a library degree, the greatest positive impact on the quality and role of library services. Factors such as innovative programming and planning, use of resources, and special projects will be considered.

All MPLA members are urged to help the Committee's efforts by suggesting names of persons worthy of consideration for any of the above category awards. Special award ideas are also invited. Please send nominations and supporting information to Jon Ingersoll, Gordon's Books Inc., 4280 Columbine Street, Denver, CO 80216.

Because we are asking for inputs on several awards, the deadline for nominations is extended to June 15. Final determination, concerning which nominee—if any—shall receive a particular award, will be made by the Awards Committee.

# **Mountain Plains Library Association Minutes**

Minutes of the Meeting of the Mountain Plains Library Association Executive Board Cosmopolitan Hotel 9:30 - 1:30 January 15, 1977

#### **PRESENT**

The meeting was called to order by the President, Vern West. Dorothy Middleton, Secretary, called the roll. Those present were: Vern West, President; Bob Malinowsky, Vice President; Dorothy Middleton, Secretary; Larry Webber, Colorado Representative; Donald Schmidt, Utah Representative; Kay Lundgren, Children's and School Chair; Peg Woods, Trustee Chair; Carol Connor, Public Libraries Chair; Elizabeth Runyon-Lancaster, MPLA Newsletter Editor; and Kelly Patterson, Constitution and Bylaws Chair.

This was not a quorum of the Board so it was decided to go ahead and conduct business and ratify what was done after more members arrived. Joseph Edelen, Executive Secretary, and Bob Carmack, College and University Chair, arrived after the reading of the minutes.

#### MINUTES

Carol Connor moved and Kay Lundgren seconded that the minutes be approved as printed and mailed to the Board prior to this meeting. Passed.

# COMMITTEE REPORTS: CONTINUING EDUCATION

Joe Edelen reported he has had about 20 inquiries on the slide/tape presentation "Affirmative Action for Libraries." The show is not yet ready for distribution.

#### **CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS**

Kelly Patterson asked for the Board's opinion on three items in the Constitution: (1) The size of the Board makes it difficult to get a quorum together for meetings. The problem could be solved by eliminating the State Representatives as members of the Board and keeping them as a type of membership committee to promote MPLA. Or the State Representatives could remain voting members of the Board when they attend Board meetings, but they would not be counted in the size of the Board necessary for a quorum. Discussion followed with the State Representatives questioning what their roles were. The consensus of the Board was to lower the number needed to make a quorum of the Board. (2) The second items was whether it would be feasible to have mail ballots to elect section officers prior to the annual conference as is done with the Board officers. A discussion followed concerning balloting, section meetings, and justification by sections for their existance. Kelly will work on including the section balloting in the Constitution revisions. (3) The third question concerned whether State Representatives should be elected by the entire membership of the state association or only by those state association members who are also members of MPLA. An informal show of hands by those Board members present was in favor of State Representatives being elected by the entire State Association.

#### **AWARDS**

Vern West reported that MPLA will be considering for awards people from outside the library field who have performed outstanding services to libraries. Authors, exhibitors, newspapers, etc. will be considered for awards as well as outstanding librarians. Anyone is free to make suggestions for recipients of awards, and all suggestions should be sent to Jon Ingersoll.

#### **NOMINATING**

The committee is just getting started. Suggestions should be sent to B. J. Mauseth.

#### **PUBLIC RELATIONS**

Larry Webber is the Chair. The rest of the Committee has not yet been appointed. He is considering having either one person from each state, or having people who are close geographically to facilitate meeting. The consensus of the Board was that the Public Relations Committee should publicize library programs generally as well as just MPLA. They should try to get MPLA material in national media outside of the MPLA region. Vern West suggested the committee write press releases to be put in regional media, and Joe Edelen suggested they form a master list of outside the region media to whom all newsworthy items can be sent as they occur.

#### SCHOLARSHIP

Joe Edelen reported that two or three scholarship applications have been received. Vern West announced that in the past the Scholarship Committee has been appointed for two years and so he has adjusted the Committee to accommodate this.

#### FINANCIAL REPORT

Joe Edelen handed out printed financial statements (attached to these minutes). He estimated MPLA's income from the Albuquerque Conference will be \$8,000 to \$10,000. This is greater than any Conference in the past. Vern outlined the past financial position of MPLA for the information of new Board members. Carol Connor offered congratulations to whoever is responsible for the improved financial situation. Joe stated that he is keeping \$2,000 in an open savings account and putting a \$1,000 one year certificate of deposit in the bank each month to get a higher interest rate. Joe explained that the higher than estimated printing expenses were for brochures and conference printing. Vern suggested the Board use the new conference stationery when writing to non-Board members

#### **OLD BUSINESS: 1976 CONFERENCE**

Vern West asked for comments. They were that there were too many meetings and not enough time to visit the exhibits. Peg Woods said it was her first conference and she loved it. Elizabeth Runyon-Lancaster said there would be a Conference Commentary in the next two Newsletters.

#### 1977 CONFERENCE

A suggested theme is "Forward to Fundamentals." Possible activities are a bus to a chuck wagon dinner followed by a special showing at Mt. Rushmore, a square dance, and a Sioux Indian dinner.

#### LOCAL ARRANGEMENTS

Vern West reported there is a problem with the contract with the Convention Center. It requires MPLA to provide its own insurance policy to cover willful neglect by anyone connected with the organization or contracted by the organization. Bob Carmack moved and Carol Connor seconded that the local arrangements committee be instructed to select the appropriate insurance carrier and conclude the arrangements with the Convention Center. Passed.

#### **PROGRAM**

Bob Malinowsky reported the Children's and School Section has requested a breakfast meeting with the South Dakota School Section. The State Section is considering a two day pre-conference. Kay Lundgren moved and Donald Schmidt seconded that MPLA support the Western State pre-conference. Passed. Each section has \$200 to cover conference expenses. Bob Malinowsky will let section chairmen know who their South Dakota counterparts are. It is then the responsibility of the section Chairmen to arrange any joint programs. Bob should be notified as soon as possible of any requests for meals. Vern West suggested ideas for themes for section programs. He suggested concentrating on the patron and skill training of personnel. Section Chairmen may request from Joe Edelen a printout of membership to help in estimating numbers for programs. Vern West said the JMRT is considering chartering a bus from Denver to Rapid City for the conference.

#### **1978 CONFERENCE**

Nancy Cummings is working on a possible joint conference with Nevada.

#### **OTHER OLD BUSINESS**

Joe Edelen asked if the Board wants an audit of the books. Vern West ruled that was up to the Finance Committee to decide.

#### **NEWSLETTER**

Elizabeth Runyon-Lancaster explained that the *Newsletter* which should have come out after the Conference was lost on the way to the printers but would be coming soon. There was discussion of what should be included in the *Newsletter*. Elizabeth said that she has tapes of the Gus Hanniball Memorial Service.

#### **CONFERENCE SITE COMMITTEE**

Vern West will appoint a committee to select sites for future conferences. Bob Carmack suggested the committee consist of present and past presidents.

#### **TRAVEL EXPENSES**

Vern West explained that no travel expenses have been paid for the Board for several years because of the poor financial situation of MPLA. Joe Edelen said Board members may submit for approval some travel expenses after they have attended one Board meeting at their own expense. Carol Connor moved and Peg Woods seconded that a telephone credit card be authorized for the use of the program chairman and local arrangements chairman for each year's conference. Passed.

#### **OTHER BUSINESS**

Board members may request in writing from Joe Edelen a Manual of Procedure. Elizabeth Runyon-Lancaster asked who the MPLA archivist was. Vern West said it is Daniel Seager and instructed Board members to send any historical material to Dan. Elizabeth suggested MPLA support the Colorado Jobline. The Board consensus was that MPLA not try to have their own jobline.

#### STATE REPRESENTATIVE REPORT

Larry Webber reported for Colorado that they are planning a joint meeting with MPLA at the Executive Towers in 1979. Colorado is going to computerize their membership list and update it quarterly. Joe Edelen reminded state representatives to get information from him about the joint conference in South Dakota to put in state conference packets.

#### **NEXT MEETING**

The next meeting is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, April 23 in Rapid City.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the meeting be adjourned.

## **Conference Commentary**

Personal reporting of meetings and programs is being presented in this section of the Newsletter. The intention is to share the experience with those who could not attend. MPLA Technical Services Section Annual Business Meeting Albuquerque Convention Center November 13, 1976

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by Mr. Charles Bolles, vice-chairman. Harriett Rebuldela, chairman, had other obligations and was unable to attend the meeting. Nineteen people attended. Nominations were opened to the floor with Elizabeth Morrissett, Auroria Library, Denver, Colorado, nominated and elected unanimously as vice-chairman, chairman-elect. Del Guidinger, Liberal Memorial Library, Liberal, Kansas, was nominated and unanimously elected secretary.

Discussion of whether or not a section is needed was held. The possibility of an interest group for members was considered. Program suggestions were made by Charles Bolles. He asked if the section wished to do things in addition to sponsor a speaker session at the next convention. It was decided the section wanted a program. Suggestions for programs included: "international standards and how they hit us, state union catalog in Wyoming, small discussion groups where members may select meetings of special interest, automated acquisitions, or preserving the past by restoration of books." It was suggested that the speaker be shared with another section and that small discussion groups be utilized. Those interested in serving on a program committee were asked to let one of the officers know.

Charles Bolles announced that next year there will be a Nominations Committee who will mail ballots. He further stated that there may be a Committee on Directions appointed. He encouraged participation by the membership. It was suggested that if a program were attached to the business meeting attendance might increase. A longer block of time with a short business meeting and then a program was suggested. The importance of exhibitors from technical processing was emphasized. The possibility of encouraging vendors to help with programs or the use of a slide presentation of new equipment in the technical processing area were possible programs discussed.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:50 a.m. by Charles Bolles.

# The Development of Information and Referral Services in Kansas' Public Libraries.

Notes from a report delivered by James C. Marvin, Librarian, Topeka Public Library, at the MPLA/SWLA public library section meeting, Nov. 11, 1976.

A cursory survey of the public libraries of Kansas reveals four with I and R services, all operational since Jan. 1, 1976. They are in Manhattan, Topeka, Ottawa and Dodge City. A system-wide social service index was noted by the director of the Central Kansas Library System, in Great Bend.

One system administrator mentioned a small member library which had already abandoned its I & R service, finding index update time out of proportion to the use being made of it.

Several libraries told of plans in progress for 1977 I & R beginnings, others are at least interested, with no specific start-up date in mind.

Many library staff members said, with some validity, that they have "always done I & R work in the name of good library service." This is undoubtedly true, in many cases, although only those libraries with intensive, purposeful I & R operations are reported here, by name.

All reporting libraries use an index of community services as the data base. The Manhattan Public Library, facing the universally tough problem of up-dating, has arranged to use a computer at the Kansas State Library to assist in keeping files current, and to facilitate the distribution of print-outs to the participating service agencies. In Ottawa, volunteers will be utilized for index up-date.

Unique was Manhattan's success in getting a good spot on the verso of page one of the telephone directory for the community information number and Topeka's development of an information coalition of member information-providing agencies, meeting monthly at the library.

A combination of evidence and hunch suggests that most of Kansas' major public libraries will have developed I & R services within the next two or three years, with appropriate system-sparked counterparts for the smallest libraries.

# A Trustee Viewpoint of the Albuquerque Convention

#### Children's and School Program Meeting, MPLA/SWLA

The Children's and School Section sponsored a workshop on "Creative Ways of Introducing Children and Youth to Books." Carolyn Feller Bauer, Assoc. Prof. School of Librarianship, University of Oregon, using many props, inspired the more than 250 people by her novel approaches to presenting stories to children. Dian Wolkstein, author and storyteller, sang and told stories to the group, accompanied by the guitar. #### Colorado

#### Colorado Is In the \$\$

The Leslie J. Savage Library at Western State College in Gunnison, Colorado was awarded \$25,000 by Mrs. Helen A. Jensen of the Meeker region. The donation is to go toward creation of a Western Colorado Room in the library, the room to be decorated in Western style and accessing materials on the Western Slope of Colorado.

And the Pueblo Regional Library recently picked up \$42,433 in grant funds under the County Equalization program for public libraries in counties with low per capita income

and low assessed valuation.

But the Colorado School of Mines garnered the largest grant-\$1,000,000 awarded by the Boettcher Foundation for major additions to the school's Library in the areas of energy. environment and public policy, including special reading and reference facilities. The Colorado School of Mines is currently working toward a \$63 million goal of private gift support to its Resource Fund.

#### Support for Oral History Clearinghouse

A one-year LSCA Title III Grant is underwriting the Oral History Clearinghouse centered in the Denver Public Library through the Colorado State Library. The clearinghouse will start with a statewide locator file to be published in Fall, 1977. The project Director, Nancy Whistler, will travel throughout Colorado to gather directory information.

#### **CCLS Gets It Together**

Hardly had the 1977 Board of Directors for the Central Colorado Library System come into being with Bill Murray of the Aurara Public School Media Services as its new Chairman, when it created a set of four new committees: networking committee, legislative committee, personnel committee and an ad hoc cataloging standards committee.

CCLS also welcomed two new library directors of member libraries. Douglas County Public Library is now directed by Kaki Lehman who was promoted from Assistant to the Director. A former library volunteer, Edra Weathers now directs the John Tomay Library in Georgetown.

#### **CLA Retains Advocate**

The Colorado Library Association recently demonstrated its serious support of library legislation by retaining Kay Johnson as legislative advocate during the 1976-77 session. Ms. Johnson has worked extensively for legislative offices and as advocate for other Colorado agencies. She will report directly to the CLA President, Harriet Lute. (Note: portions of the foregoing were lifted directly from Nexus, Vol. 3, No. 6, December 1976.)

#### Kansas

#### **Union Catalog for Kansas**

The Kansas State Library expects to complete a union catalog of Kansas library holdings by July 1, 1977, using input of original cataloging from the Central, North Central, and South Central Kansas Library Systems in addition to tapes of holdings at the Kansas City Public Library Processing Center, University of Kansas, and University of Witchita represented on OCLC. The catalog will be accessible on computer output microfilm.

#### Nebraska

#### \$711,595 for the Bennett Martin Library

The flagship of the Lincoln City Library System will mushroom two stories taller with an additional 10,800 square feet using funds provided by a federal Public Works Employment Act, Title I.

#### **Revenue Sharing Funds to Omaha Library**

The largest public library in Nebraska, the W. Dale Clark Library in Omaha included \$68,000 of Revenue Sharing funds in addition to almost a million dollars in private donations. February marks completion of the \$7 million, five-story facility.

#### Four New Coordinators for Nebraska

February saw the initiation and installation of four new network coordinators, into the Nebraska library system: Richard H. Allen from the Beatrice Public Library for the Northern Network; Marla K. Bouton from the Calvin T. Ryan Library at Kearney State College to the Central Network; Leslie A. Rock from the Billings, Montana Public Library to the Mari Sandoz Network; and Martin A. Manahan of the San Bernardino, California Public Library to the Panhandle Network. The Nebraska Library Commission coordinates six library networks in all.

#### North Dakota

#### From Nebraska, With Love

March 1 marks the transference of Jerry Kaup from the Public Library System in Holdrege to a new position as Library Director of the Minot Public Library in North Dakota. During the last four years in Holdrege, Mr. Kaup used \$75,000 special grants funding to help develop Large Print and Talking Book Service to Nursing home residents and the physically handicapped, to locate federal funding for Mail-A-Book service to eight counties from 1975-77, to expand the library's audio-visual section and provide major emphasis on community involvement of the library.

#### South Dakota

#### **Homemade History Tapes**

People in the Black Hills are being encouraged by Phil McCauley of the Minnilusa Historical Society to record the memories of their older family members for placement in the collections of four cooperating libraries: the Devereaux Library at the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology in Rapid City, the E. Y. Berry Library at Black Hills State College in Spearfish, the Sturgis Public Library and the Rapid City Public Library.

#### Utah

#### Put a Panther in Your Library

Promotion of the family movie, "Joe Panther" has become a major fund-raising event in Utah. Proposed at the spring 1976 Utah Library Association convention, the project also raised a few hackles on librarians who felt the decision-making process had been unclear, had doubts about the propriety of library associations sponsoring movies, or simply disliked the movie. During December, 1976 a general membership vote was taken and the project adopted. The movie was shown in the Salt Lake area January 26 through February 15 before moving to other parts of the state. Librarians were provided promotion kits to publicize ULA's sponsorship of the film but did not sell tickets or give discounts.

#### Day of the Computer

In the February, 1977 issue of the State Library Commission's publication, Horsefeathers, Russell L. Davis reports that the day of the computer is here for Utah. OCLC shared online cataloging and title location service is now available in four Utah libraries, with three others investigating and negotiating. Automated circulation systems are installed and operating in two major libraries, with another one now being installed. Automated bibliographical retrieval terminals are located in five Utah libraries. And automated acquisitions systems organize purchasing in four libraries, including the State Library's centralized processing center which services 300 more libraries.

#### Tom Challis to Head up UCLC

The thirteen-member Utah College Library Council will be chaired during 1977 by A. Tom Challis, Library Director at Southern Utah State College, Cedar City.

#### **Wyoming**

#### More Library for Your Money at the U of W

\$5,170,000 has been allocated for an addition to the Coe Library at the University of Wyoming. With five storeys and over 60,000 square feet space, the building supplement promises to overshadow the original. Building and annexing the addition will take a projected two years.

#### Al Whitelock Accepts Challenge in Cody

Al Whitelock, Director of the Laramie County Library System in Cheyenne will take on the job of Director for the Park County Library in Cody beginning July 1, 1977. He is quoted in the January-February issue of the Outrider as saying "I like my present job but I just couldn't resist the challenge."


