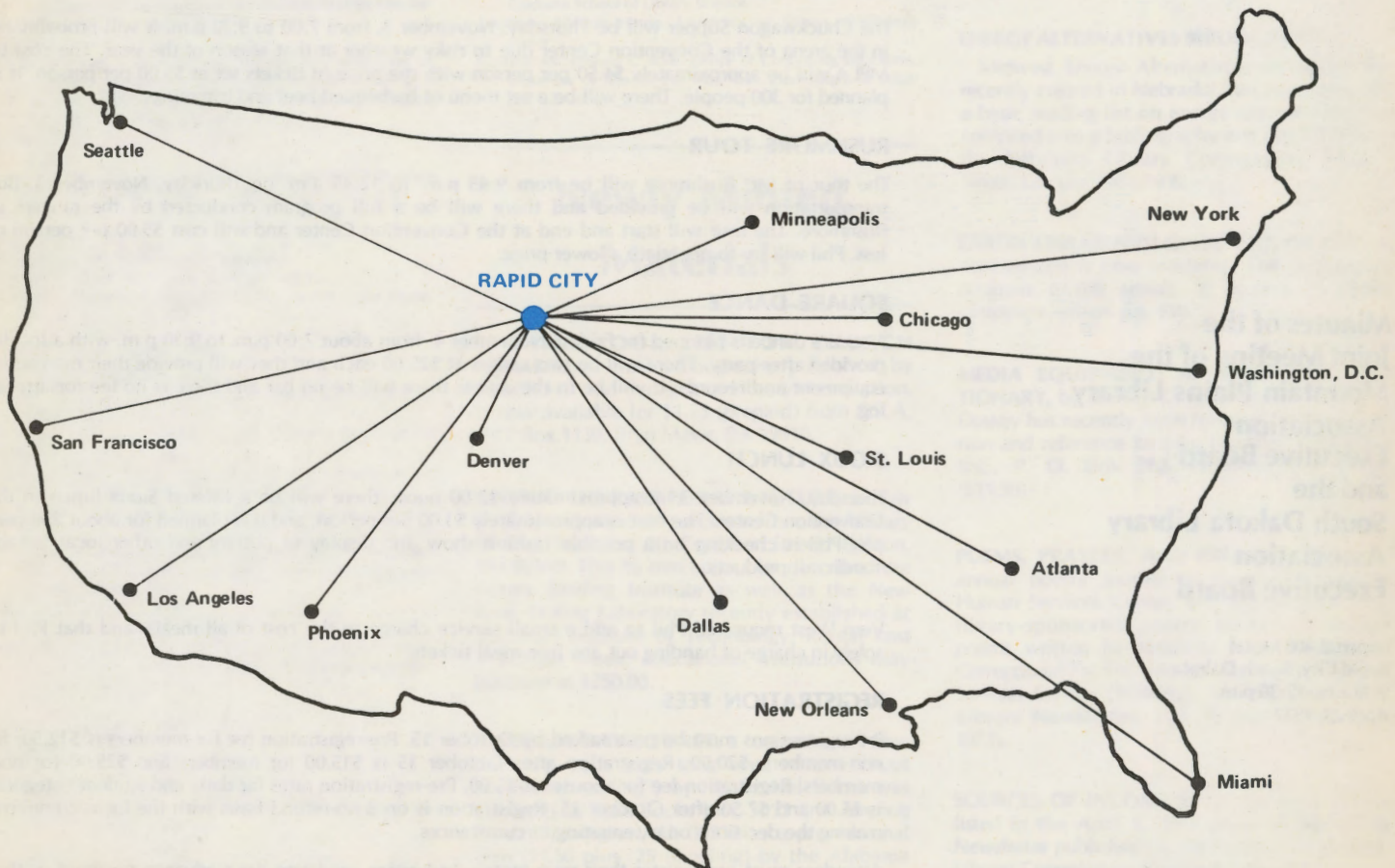

Plan Now for November 2-5 the MPLA/SDLA Joint Convention



in Rapid City, the Heart of America!

PRESENT

The meeting was called to order by MPLA President, Vern West. CONVENTION CENTER PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION

Philip McCauley introduced Jack Beckman, manager of the Rapid City Convention Center, who described the Convention facilities and answered questions. Phil reported he has secured an insurance package for \$75.00 covering our liability during the Conference. The Convention Center does not have a permanent concessionaire that will conflict with our exhibitors. Our exhibitors may sell their products. Exhibits will be in the smaller hall near the meeting rooms. The Convention Center would prefer that all requests and changes go through Phil.

LOCAL ARRANGEMENTS COMMITTEE REPORT

Phil reported that publicity pictures for MPLA and the Convention Center will be taken in May because MPLA has contract number 001. These pictures will go into the archives. At this time, the probable cost of renting the Convention Center for the entire Conference should be less than \$3,000. The prices are roughly: the arena, \$300.00 per day; the exhibits area, \$250.00 per day; the theater, \$200.00 per day; and 16 meeting rooms, \$244.00 per day. Our contract covers from 8:00 a.m. November 2 through 11:59 p.m. November 5 with right of access to the area 48 hours prior to the starting time and 24 hours after the last hour stated. Preconferences will be Wednesday, November 2.

CHUCKWAGON SUPPER

The Chuckwagon Supper will be Thursday, November 3, from 7:00 to 9:30 p.m. It will probably be in the arena of the Convention Center due to risky weather at that season of the year. The cost to MPLA will be approximately \$4.50 per person with the price of tickets set at \$5.00 per person. It is planned for 300 people. There will be a set menu of barbequed beef and trimmings.

RUSHMORE TOUR

The tour of Mt. Rushmore will be from 9:45 p.m. to 12:45 a.m. on Thursday, November 3. Bus transportation will be provided and there will be a full program conducted by the rangers at Rushmore. The tour will start and end at the Convention Center and will cost \$5.00 per person or less. Phil will try to negotiate a lower price.

SQUARE DANCE

A square dance is planned for Friday, November 4, from about 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. with a locally provided after-party. There will be two callers at \$25.00 each and they will provide their own audio equipment and records. It will be in the arena; there will be no bar and there is no fee for attending.

SIoux LUNCH

Thursday, November 3, at approximately 12:00 noon, there will be a catered Sioux lunch in the Convention Center. The cost is approximately \$3.00 per person, and it is planned for about 250 people. Phil is checking on a possible fashion show and display of pottery and other local suitable handicraft products.

Vern West requested Phil to add a small service charge to the cost of all meals, and that Phil be solely in charge of handing out any free meal tickets.

REGISTRATION FEES

Pre-registrations must be postmarked by October 15. Pre-registration fee for members is \$12.50; for non-members, \$20.00. Registration after October 15 is \$15.00 for members and \$25.00 for non-members. Registration fee for spouses is \$5.00. Pre-registration rates for daily and student categories is \$5.00 and \$7.50 after October 15. Registration is on a no-refund basis with the local committee making the decisions on extenuating circumstances.

Attendees must pre-register their own motels and either send one day's advance payment or their credit card number. In the advance conference packet, there will be a list of motels that are reasonably close to the Convention Center. There will be a card which attendees may send to their first choice motel. If that motel is filled, the motel will send the card to the attendee's second marked choice and so on until a reservation is made. There will also be a list of other motels in the city.

AWARDS LUNCHEON

The Awards Luncheon is planned for Friday, November 4. It will probably be catered into the Convention Center for \$8.00 per person for about 125 people.

SECURITY

Security will cost \$750.00 for the whole convention. This will include 24 hour patrol of the exhibit area and money delivery. Entrance to the Convention Center will be by badge only.

SHUTTLE BUS

There will be shuttle bus service from the major motels to the Convention Center on about 15 minute intervals during the regular Conference days. There will be one bus during the day with extra busses added during rush hours. The cost for the busses will be somewhere between \$500 and \$1,000.

EXHIBITORS

The second mailing will be going to the exhibitors soon. Six have registered from the first mailing. The charging range for exhibitors is \$125 to \$200 for a maximum of 83 8x10 areas. They get one table, one chair, drapes, and a sign. The designated shipper is Northwest Warehouse. Regular working hours are 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. with overtime pay after that. Therefore the exhibitors may close after 12:00 noon on Friday. Phil showed a brochure that will be sent to exhibitors for reserving space. The exhibitors' bash will be from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 2, with a possible dance from 9:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. These events are planned for the arena with security.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE REPORT

Bob Malinowsky reported there are two preconferences set up. One will be from the University of South Dakota business school on management, and one by Carl Gaumer on Micrographics. There is also a possible workshop on film utilization. The MPLA Executive Board will meet sometime in the afternoon on November 2. Thursday, November 3, will be for section meetings, an opening session with possibly a keynote speaker, and the afternoon will be for visiting exhibits. Ed Howard or Richard Peck were suggested as possible opening speakers.

Friday, November 4, will be a continuation of section meetings and possibly there will be some papers presented on subjects of general interest.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Joe Edelen reported there is no financial report yet on the 1977 Conference. Phil McCauley will pay bills as necessary and prepare a financial report at the end of the Conference. It is projected that MPLA may make \$2,500 or more on the Conference.

The joint meeting was adjourned.

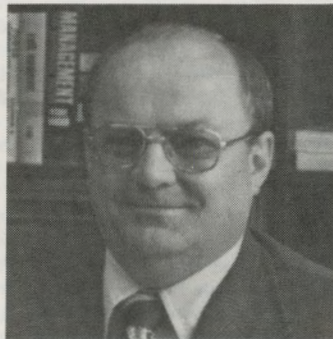

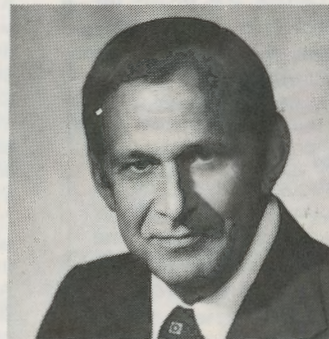
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MPLA expresses its sadness at the death on April 17, 1977 of Betty Jean Edmundson Withers, Chief of Technical Services of the Pueblo (Colorado) Regional Library District. A 1943 graduate of the University of Denver School of Librarianship and a member of the Pueblo staff since 1946, she held her position since 1961.

MPLA also regrets the death on April 27, 1977 of Don Insko, assistant acquisitions librarian at the University of Wyoming. He was 33 when he died from complications of diabetes.

A native of California and a graduate of Humboldt State College and the University of Hawaii Library School, Don Insko joined the University of Wyoming staff in 1970.

He served as chairman of the Technical Services Section of the Mountain Plains Library Association in 1974, and was a member of the Legislative and Membership Committees of the Wyoming Library Association.

Regional

WOMEN'S RESOURCE MATERIALS IN MPLA REGION

The Women's History Research Center reports that holdings of their collections of documents is still quite sparse in the mountain-plains states. HERSTORY (women's serials collected between 1956 and 1974) is held by the University of Utah, University of South Dakota in Vermillion, University of North Dakota in Grand Forks and Missoula County High School, though ND only has one reel. WOMEN AND HEALTH/MENTAL HEALTH is held by the Montana State Library, and the Rape Crisis Alliance in Boise, Idaho has the rape section only of WOMEN AND LAW. DEAN GOGGIN BECOMES PRESIDENT OF AALS

Margaret Knox Goggin, dean of the University of Denver's Graduate School of Librarianship, assumed the presidency of the Association of American Library Schools (AALS) during ALA Midwinter. NETWORKING AND AUTOMATION IN COLORADO LIBRARIES

The latest issue of the Colorado State Library Newsletter (Vol. 9 Nos. 3-4, March/April 1977) is a special issue devoted to "Networking and Automation in Colorado Libraries." In addition to the overall conceptual plan (COLONET) being developed by Virginia Boucher under the aegis of the Colorado State Library, the state of the art in various types of libraries is described. Academic libraries boast machine-readable serials lists on which the Task Force for Interlibrary Cooperation (TILC) based a union list of serials in 1974. With the advent of the OCLC data base in Colorado, a number of academic and special libraries have access to computerized processing facilities. Public libraries seem to be automating their circulation systems and moving toward increased use of book catalogs, with computerized reference service provided by some libraries. Schools are benefiting from statewide utilization of the Project ACCESS program. The Colorado State Library is serving as central coordination agent for many of these changes, and BCR is acting as "broker" for bibliographic services in Colorado and throughout the mountain-plains region. The State Library also boasts "a success story" in its computer based reference service for state employees and officials. Finally, Colorado now maintains a Continuing Education Master Calendar at the State Library (Contact Gene Stortz, Colorado State Library, 1362 Lincoln, Denver, CO 80203, 303-892-2174) and continues to provide the only job hotline in the mountain-plains states. COLORADO SPRINGS LIBRARY DISTRICT PURCHASES DEC PDP 11/70 COMPUTER

The Pikes Peak Regional Library District in Colorado Springs, Colorado, recently bought its very own in-house computer. Claiming to have one of the most sophisticated computer operations in the region, the library already operates an on-line circulation system, an on-line materials inventory system, an on-line patron inventory system, an on-line order system and other administrative systems. In addition, the computer is used to produce a personnel directory, personnel log, large-print book catalog, community events calendar and a batch accounting system.

To be delivered in early May, the DEC PDP 11/70 allows growth beyond present capabilities. Data Management Associates of Colorado Springs will program conversion of existing systems to the new computer and add several new systems, including an index to consumer information, an interlibrary loan system, a catalog card production system, a Learning Resources Directory, a Human Resources Directory, an on-line budgeting and accounting system, completion of the on-line statistics system and a terminal communications system. Ken Dowlin, Director, developed the over-all design and anticipates all services, including the card catalog, to be on-line within five years. NEBRASKA ANTICIPATES WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE

A year ago the Nebraskan Governor's Conference on Libraries was held, making this the first state to complete its conference prior to the White House Conference on Libraries. RED CROSS TO USE LIBRARY TWX

The Nebraska Library Commission recently approved use of TWX telecommunication facilities by the American Red Cross during emergencies. LIBRARY OUTREACH: SERVICE TO PRISONERS

Doris Mayfield of the Omaha Public Library, Omaha, Nebraska, has been conducting a one-person inperson circulation system in the Douglas County Courthouse Jail since 1974. Her weekly visits to exchange books and take special requests drew the attention of the local media recently, giving her an opportunity to express her growing feeling that "there just has to be a better way of punishing people." NLW YOUNG PEOPLE'S PAINT-IN IN LAS VEGAS

The Clark County Library in Las Vegas opened its National Library Week activities with its annual Young People's "Paint-In". 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UNIVERSITY LIBRARY OUTREACH: HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT INTRODUCTORY COURSE

In order to encourage the academically talented student to use the university library, and to acquaint all high school students with new sources of information, a pilot program of library instruction has been begun this spring at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. The pilot course, offered in March to ten selected high school students, taught information access to local and national library collections, including bibliographic searching by computer. PRIVATE WESTERN AMERICANA COLLECTION GOES TO UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH DAKOTA

Herman Chilson, owner of the Elevator Store Company in Webster, recently gave his personal collection of materials on Western Americana to the I. D. Weeks Library at U.S.D. Begun about 60 years ago, Chilson visited bookstores and auctions nationwide while assembling his collection, but he also received donations from old settlers. He made a special point of collecting books in Norwegian and claims that one of the strongest parts of the collection is "captivity documents" by whites once held prisoner by Indians. Parts of other private collections were bought by Chilson, including the Leonard Jennewein Collection, the S. S. Visher Collection, the W. O. Wemette Collection, the Alfred Peterson Collection, and first editions of the Neilhardt Collection, all inscribed. (SOURCE: Newspaper clipping sent in by Dorothy Liegl).

GRANT \$\$ UNDERWRITE OCLC INSTALLATION

Utah

UNIVERSITY OF UTAH LIBRARIANS LOSE FACULTY STATUS; RETAIN ACADEMIC STATUS

On May 2, 1977, the Academic Senate of the University of Utah voted to approve an academic committee's recommendation changing the status of the university librarians from faculty rank to a newly-created "librarian" rank. Arguments justifying this change stressed that benefits and privileges previously enjoyed by librarians will continue to be available—only the rank title will be changed. Criterion for promotion, retention and tenure in a Librarian I, II, III, IV sequence will be based on standards set by the library staff. This change in librarian status awaits final approval by the university's Institutional Council.

COUNTY LIBRARY CONDUCTS PRODUCTIVITY ANALYSIS

"Better Management Procedures" is the title of a study contracted by the Salt Lake County Library with the analyst team of Booz, Allen and Hamilton over the next several months. DESERT LIBRARY OPENS

A DESERT LIBRARY has been set up in Thompson, Utah, population about 35. The new library began in February with surplus Air Force furniture and shelves provided by the State Library, 2500 books donated as a result of book drives by Girl Scouts in nearby communities, public support demonstrated by a successful potluck supper in the school house, and one volunteer librarian, Cathy Frame of Thompson. PUBLIC LIBRARIANS EXPRESS WORKSHOP PREFERENCES

David E. Wilson, Interlibrary Loan Librarian at the Salt Lake County Library System, recently conducted a survey to determine felt needs of public librarians in Utah for continuing education, and whether institution size or level of education in librarianship affect these preferences. The outstanding conclusion of this study was that neither institutional size nor educational level affect the primary statement of need — for workshops dealing with basic skills or current issues relating to basic skills. David Wilson suggested that the results indicate the common "information bazaar" approach of workshops should be replaced with accurate publicity of workshop content and information on basic subjects in librarianship. \$19,500 TO McKAY-DEE HOSPITAL LIBRARY

The National Library of Medicine granted \$19,500 to the Health Sciences Library at the McKay-Dee Hospital in Ogden, Utah for extensive remodeling and expansion, the first such award for an institution of the Intermountain Health Care Corporation. Wyoming

FORMER MPLA PRESIDENT APPOINTED TO STATE BOARD

Governor Ed Herschler of Wyoming recently announced the appointment of Mrs. Wilmot McFadden to the Archives and Historical Board of the Wyoming State Library. She served on the Board previously from 1959 to 1965, and from 1967 to 1971. Director of the Rock Springs Carnegie Public Library, Mrs. McFadden has been President both of MPLA and of the Wyoming Library Association. MAE URBANEK APPOINTED TO GOVERNOR'S BOARD

Newly-appointed for a six-year term on the Archives and Historical Board of the Wyoming State Library, Mrs. Mae Urbanek is a long-time Wyoming resident and well-known as an author of books about Wyoming. Born in Denver, she endured homesteading in North Dakota and was sent off to academics in South Dakota, graduating from Northwestern University at Evanston, Illinois with a major in journalism. Since 1931 she's lived on a farm near Lusk, Wyoming, where she wrote several books. She is past president of Wyoming Press Women and of the State Federation of Garden Clubs. U OF WYOMING DEFICIENCIES REVEALED IN SURVEYS

The ACRL **Standards for College Libraries 1975** was used as a benchmark for evaluating both the basic collection and staff size at the University of Wyoming Libraries in a study prepared in 1976 by Susan Kany and revised in February 1977 by Marth Whittaker. The UW Libraries collection was found to be only 40% of the ACRL standard; the professional staff size only 47% of standard. The library budget also showed deficiencies, coming in at half of the recommended 6% of the total educational and general expenditures for the institution.

Acquisitions Librarian, Paul Cors, conducted a simultaneous study comparing the UW Libraries both with ACRL standards and with the minimum collection size required to join the Association of Research Libraries (ARL). The University of Wyoming Libraries fail to meet both standards. Moreover, UW "growth rate" falls short of ARL requirements, achieving 86% for monographs, 59% in periodical subscriptions.

Commenting on implications of the Kany and Cors reports, the Director, Robert K. Patterson, indicated that the weaknesses are critical and need to be known in order to be overcome. In addition to a collection which failed to keep pace with the university's growth from an undergraduate to a graduate institution, and a woefully small staff, he pointed to the "virtual absence of automation" which hampers the library in an age of technological revolution. He said the librarians are not happy with the **status quo**.

More detail on the UW Libraries story is promised in the future.
