Western States Caucus Before White House Conference

The White House Conference on Library and Information Services is over. and only time will tell how significant its impact will be on libraries and library services in the Western States. Recognizing the need for some kind of regional involvement, the MPLA executive board established a committee in December of 1978 to study how MPLA could best serve as a catalyst to bring together the various Western states, whose library needs and concerns differ materially from those of the more populous eastern states. Joe Anderson, the committee chairman, working through the Western Council of State Libraries sponsored a Western States Caucus August 24-29, 1979, at Boise, Idaho. Seventeen states were represented. Each state expressed its concerns and priorities on conference issues and eight discussion groups focused on the various Western State concerns relating to the eight program objectives of the proposed national program.

The Western State Caucus was formally established for the Washington conference to provide a communication network among the delegates, alternates, and delegations of the seventeen Western states; to provide for a forum for issues that may be of common interest to the delegates west of the Mississippi; to serve as liaison with other delegations and the WHCOLIS headquarters staff; to gather and disseminate information and arrange other logistical matters; and to create a mechanism to achieve maximum effectiveness in organization, strategy, and action at the conference.

The MPLA committee prepared and distributed to the seventeen state representatives to the Caucus "An Analysis of Western States' Pre-White House Conference Resolutions." The analysis revealed similar concerns among many of the states.

One thread common to all the state reports appeared to be the need for concentrated effort on national, regional, state, and local levels to coordinate public relations on behalf of libraries and information services both in general and in particular. Other common concerns generally noted were that cooperation among and between all types of libraries is essential to the quality of service and to the best use of available resources; that library and information services need to be considered in public policy formulation; and that providing and supporting library services is a function of government at all levels and that the responsibilities among the various levels need to be clearly sorted out.

Generally, the federal government was asked to provide direction and funding for a national library program with the Library of Congress as the national library and coordinating agency for the program, to create a national periodicals center, and to apply copyright, intellectual freedom, and access to information laws equally and fairly.

States were asked to support with state funds the state library agencies, to provide state grants in aid funds for statewide library development, and to provide statewide library cards and reciprocal services.

Locally, governments were asked to improve local library budgets, improve public relations, provide training for library staffs to improve services, and eliminate user fees for basic services.

Apparent priorities from the state reports included (1) Strong concern for continuing education programs for librarians and library workers; (2) State aid to public libraries, frequently in terms of guaranteeing a minimum per capita; (3) strong concern for school library services, including establishing standards. providing full-time trained librarians/media specialists, and no mandating of criteria, programs, and standards by any level of government unless they provide funding to achieve them; (4) Emphasis on outreach programs in libraries to the un- or under-served. notably the aged, blind, the non-English

the handicapped, speaking. stitutionalized, minorities and pre-school children: (5) Extensive cooperation between multitype libraries; (6) Strong support for the concept that libraries are educational institutions and should be involved in combatting illiteracy; (7) Federal and state funding for statewide communication, networks, and union lists: (8) Demand for full state funding of state library agencies without relying on LSCA funding: (9) Demand for a statewide library card and reciprocity of services between libraries; (10) Encouraging use of new technology and its standardization throughout the state and/or nation.

William Conklin's address to the Montana delegates perhaps best caught the spirit of the Western State concerns:

While you are at your task in Washington, make sure that the White House Conferees understand and appreciate the individualism and independent spirit of the people of the West. Do all you can to insure that any National Program addresses the special needs of the West, with our sparsely populated states and vast distances. Tell the story of our Montana federations of libraries, as a form of organization for sharing resources while fully respecting the needs of local communities for pride in and control over their local libraries.

Whatever the results of the White House Conference, each state Governor's Conference has produced a working document for improving library services; enlisted a group of committed, informed citizens to help implement recommendations; and through the efforts of the Western States Caucus and the MPLA, delegates have shared their ideas, hopes and concerns and laid the groundwork for regional efforts at mutual cooperation and support of improved library services.

MPLA JMRT Reports Accomplishments For Year

The MPLA JMRT led by Vee Friesner completed a successful year at the Denver conference. They assisted with registration, put up a job board listing area vacancies and notices from job hunters, and displayed menus from many Denver restaurants in the registration area. Their hospitality suite was scrapped just before the conference when plans for a free room fell through, and the roommate network received little response. But their conference program, a panel discussion "Springboard to Leadership: How to Work In and Through Your Association" co-sponsored with the Colorado JMRT, helped new librarians

learn how to volunteer, how to find ways to help, and how to become more personally involved.

Jan Beck, who has been active in state, regional, and national JMRTs, outlined activities and opportunities available for junior members at the national level. Joe Edelen, MPLA executive secretary, discussed the importance of involvement with such groups as JMRT and with association activities in general. Mike Tacha, former chairman of the Kansas JMRT and immediate past president of KLA, gave a brief history of the Kansas JMRT, its founding, its relationship to the whole association, and its activities that have been aimed at assistance to the whole profession as well as to its own members. He mentioned such activities as hosting hospitality suites, compiling a Directory of Kansas Libraries, serving as

greeters at conferences, and holding involvement meetings at the state's library schools.

Never ones to forget the play, the JMRT also sponsored a disco at Alexander Grahams that drew an enthusiastic crowd, filling the dance floor and keeping the staff working an hour and a half past their intended closing time.

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Spotlight On Kansas



Lillian Carter, Speaker at 1979 KLA Conference

The Kansas Library Association that we know today was organized in 1900, but it was not the first organization to bear the name. Nine years previously a Kansas Library Association had been formed in Topeka when it was learned that a group of prestigious librarians from the East would visit the city on their return from an American Library Association meeting in San Francisco. The newly formed association, which boasted four members, all officers, speedily arranged a reception and tour of the city's libraries. At the end of the day, the party, which included such library bigwigs as William Frederick Poole, R. R. Bowker, and Charles A. Cutter, boarded their special train and the first Kansas Library Association disbanded after a strenuous life of fortyeight hours.

The movement to form a second Kansas Library Association began in the spring of 1900 and culminated in the Association's first meeting on December 27, in the rooms of the State Librarian. The driving force behind the new organization was State Librarian and Traveling Libraries Commission Chairman Mrs. Annie Diggs, who was also a well known Kansas Populist politician and social reformer. The first meeting was attended by twenty-three librarians. Papers were presented, a constitution chosen, and officers elected. Dues were set at fifty cents per year and seven members present at a meeting made up a quorum.

Since then the Association has met annually with two exceptions. The flu epidemic of 1918 forced the post-ponement of that year's meeting. There was not a meeting in 1943 due to World War II and the restrictions placed on travel. In a short-lived reorganization plan, several district meetings replaced the single annual conference in 1963 and 1965.

While the files were incomplete, it seems that KLA conventions have taken its members out of the state eight, or possibly nine, times. Most of these were during the early life of the Association. One such meeting was in 1904 when KLA met in St. Louis at the same time as the ALA convention there. Kansas librarians travelled to St. Louis on the same train, not unlike later MPLA members going to Lake Tahoe. This was the year of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis, and between it and meetings, a grand time was had by all.

Joint conferences have

Joint conferences have been a part of KLA history. Such conferences have been held several times with the Missouri Library Association. In 1954 KLA entertained MPLA at their annual meeting in Topeka. Another joint conference with MPLA is presently planned for 1983. The 1979 meeting was a highly successful joint conference between KLA, the Kansas Association of School Librarians, and the Kansas Association for Educational Communications and Technology.

Featured speakers at conferences have not only included well-known librarians, but also those famous in other fields, such as the poet Langston Hughes, who was on the 1958 program. In 1975, Dr. Karl Menninger of the Menninger Clinic gave one of the major addresses. Political figures have also appeared at KLA conventions, Eleanor Roosevelt in 1958 and Lillian Carter in 1979.

From its infancy, KLA has sponsored proposals which would improve libraries and library service. The need for a free public county library system was first brought to the Association's attention during the 1915 meeting. The needs of the First World War prevented little further action until 1920 when a committee of librarians drafted a county library bill. The bill was passed in 1921.

Other early efforts were not so successful. During the 1906 convention it was decided to ask the state legislature to fund a "library organizer." The sum of \$2,000 a year was asked to support the organizer whose duty it would be to "assist in the organization of new libraries and in advancing the standard of those already organized." The measure fell on deaf ears in both the 1907 and 1908 legislatures. Eventually the Association appointed an "organizer," but since it was not state funded, libraries had to pay for his services. Over forty years later a belated success was achieved when the 1951 legislature appropriated money that could send library consultants into the field

The mid-1950's found KLA members deeply involved in preparing state legislation which would be favorable to the new Federal Library Services Act. The State Library was strengthened, and it was made possible for cities to receive LSCA funds. Legislative matters have continued to concern KLA, among the most recent was the legal re-definition of obscenity. Within the past decade the Association has found it beneficial to employ the services of a lobbyist or legal counsel.

The concerns of KLA have always mirrored those of forward-looking librarians. The 1908 sessions of the Association saw librarians advocating that public library patrons would be better served if the stacks were open and patrons could brouse freely among the books. Higher standards of librarianship have also been a concern. Certification of librarians was discussed both in the 'thirties and 'fifties. While no legislation was passed, KLA designed a system of voluntary certification in 1953. Another response to the then shortage of adequately trained librarians was the awarding of an annual scholarship, beginning in 1955, to a deserving library school student.

The issue of intellectual freedom has been of continuing interest since the late 'fifties. One of the Committee on Intellectual Freedom's earliest acts was to propose a resolution in 1958, later ap-

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proved by the membership, which provided that KLA would not hold association meetings in any place where discrimination was made against any person on the basis of race, creed, color, or national origin. One of the latest KLA activities dealing with intellectual freedom was the showing of the controversial ALA film "The Speaker."

The years from 1977 through 1979 have seen extensive activity in the planning and participation in two separate endeavors. In 1977 Governor Bennett established a Governor's Task Force on Library Resources to study inter-library cooperation and the role of state and local governments in libraries. The Task Force met in the Fall of 1977 and again in the Spring of 1978; recommendations were forwarded to the Governor later in the year.

The Kansas Conference on Library and Information Services, preparatory to the White House Conference on Library and Information Science, was held in Topeka March 14-16, 1979. The Conference was preceded by seven regional conferences where delegates to the March conference were chosen. Under the able direction of Mr. Mike Tacha, KLA 1978-79 President, the Kansas Conference on Library and Information Services discussed greater interlibrary cooperation and networking, better library funding, and library

education, public access to information, and the development of good library public relations. The achievement of the goals set by the Governor's Task Force and the Kansas Conference on Library and Information Services will require a tremendous amount of work and effort on the part of KLA and Kansas librarians.

Kansas has just started the Kansas Library Network to develop and support an organization of libraries of all types to provide efficient and effective sharing of resources and information for the benefit of the people of Kansas. Membership is open to any library willing to participate in the sharing of human and information resources. Members will receive copies of the state network newsletter, will be included in continuing education activities as desired, and will participate in committees and interest groups designated by the Network Authority Council, the governing body of the network.

The council will consist of twenty-one librarians, three representing each of seven types of libraries (Regents schools, private colleges, community colleges, regional library systems, public, public school, and special libraries) and executive coordinator. Each type of library is responsible for the method of selecting its council representatives, who will serve one-year terms.

The executive coordinator is appointed

by the state librarian from the State Library staff. This person will administer the network, distribute the newsletter, and perform other functions designated by the council. (Margaret Briggs, KLA Archivist, Kansas State Historical Society.)

Minutes

The minutes of the July 13 meeting were approved as printed in the Newsletter.

Committee Reports

Awards

Shirley Flack reported that she has sent a list of award recipients to board members. She then announced the names of those to receive awards at this conference. MPLA will pay expenses for the beginning professional award and for the legislator. She recommended changes in the Manual of Procedure to clarify what expenses will be paid by MPLA and also that the committee make the hotel reservations for the recipients. Mary Southwell explained the procedure for board involvement in selecting the recipient of the Carl Gaumer Exhibitors Award. Rating forms are to be filled out and returned by 9:00 a.m. Tuesday for the Committee to tally. The award plaques will be on display in the MPLA display.

Professional Development Grants

Doug Hindmarsh reported that Lisa Kinney has submitted her report. He suggested revisions in the **Manual of Procedure** and recommended that the 1980 committee increase publicity, make application information available to all states, assure that the 1978 scholarship recipient fulfills the requirements, and review the reports of all 1979 recipients.

Continuing Education

Rod Wagner reported the three One-to-One stipends went to Jane Kolbe, Head Librarian at Sioux Falls College, who visited Auraria Libraries in Denver; Ruth Ralph, Director of the Divide County Library in Crosby, North Dakota, who visited Jefferson County Public Library, Columbine Branch in Littleton, Colorado; and Bill Sowers, Adult Services Librarian in Dodge City Public Library, Kansas, who visited Holdrege Public Library in Nebraska. The committee met in July to discuss future sites. They will be published in the Newsletter. They suggested more learning sites, but without a stipend with previous recipients being hosts along with other libraries. This would be called the Experience Exchange Program. The committee will be hosting a Library Marketing Program on Monday, October 29, at 8:30 to 11:30. MPLA has applied for membership in CLENE.

Nominating

Joe Edelen reported that there was a problem with too late a deadline on return of the ballots and that telephone communication with candidates was difficult. He recommended an earlier ballot deadline and mail communication with candidates so winners will know they have won before they come to the conference. He also asked that the candidates be asked to provide their own biography to go on the ballot. He announced the results of the election.

Public Relations

Jim Swan reported that the new brochure is ready and will be at the conference. Joe Edelen will take the display board for mailing to state associations. Jim Dertien explained what is in the brochure and planned inserts. He requested a copy of the state association activities for inserts. He also wants the state representatives to advise the state associations that MPLA will be doing this advertising. Letters from the state representatives to prospective members will also be included.

Constitution and By-Laws

Jim Dertien said the committee was working on inconsistencies in section and association by-laws.

Finance

Tom Jones presented the proposed budget which is attached to the Secretary's official minutes. It will be acted upon at the next board meeting.

White House Conference

Joseph Anderson passed out an Analysis of the Western States' Pre-White House Conference Resolutions. It is attached to the Secretary's official minutes. He thanked Kelly Patterson and Frances Dufraine for special service on the committee and all of the committee for their work. The resolutions are a summary of those sent by the various states. The Western Council paid for preparing the document, and will also host a conference communications room at the White House Conference.

Financial Report

Joe Edelen passed out the printed report which is attached to the Secretary's official minutes. He announced that future reports will not contain expenditures by account as there will be only one checking account. It was moved, seconded, and passed that this would be the future way of reporting expenditures. The financial report was accepted.

Membership Report

Joe Edelen will ask the state representatives for lists of potential members. Jim Dertien reported he will be working on membership this year. He will announce the winners of the Membership Sweepstakes at the banquet.

State Representative Reports
Kansas

Donna Jones reported that Vee Friesner is setting up a Kansas Library Network with agreed upon governance structure. Donna announced a rap session with John Berry in the Far East Room at 9:30 p.m., Sunday.

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Nebraska Morel Fry reported that Nebraska will hold its association conference starting October 31 with a program of Plains Voices, Plains Vision.

Nevada

Joe Anderson announced that Nevada was pleased with the award to B.J. Mauseth. Nevada will study library services on a statewide basis with a view toward formulation of a state library policy. They were successful in getting an intellectual freedom law passed.

North Dakota Dennis Page reported on the state conference. The association will rewrite the state standards.

South Dakota

Jane Kolbe reported that their conference met with the state education association which provided their program emphasis. The association is working against a Proposition 13 type proposal which is on the fall ballot. Bob Carmack reported that the state is working on a tri-conference in 1981 with North Dakota and MPLA.

Don Schmidt reported that the Davis County Library Board fired a 20-year librarian over a notcompletely disclosed cause. The Utah Library Association Executive Board has censured the local board, and the Utah Library Association is working for the librarian.

Wyoming

Kelly Patterson reported that the state library has selected a vendor for a statewide automated library system. Debbie Iverson is the new state representative, and she reported the Wyoming Library Association is discussing the possibility of a joint conference with MPLA in 1984.

Jim Dertien recognized Past President Bob Malinowsky. Joe Anderson thanked the Colorado people who have done so much work to make this conference a success.

ALA Chapter Relations

Jim Dertien reported he has been getting communications from ALA asking for nominations to ALA committees. Joe Anderson will need future board action on whether we wish to appoint people to represent MPLA on ALA committees.

Andrew Gulliford has not yet advised MPLA of the status of the Country School study. Jim will contact him for further information.

Kelly Patterson asked when MPLA moves to spring conferences, will there be a six-month or an eighteen-month time lapse between conferences. In 1982 there will be a conference six months after the 1981 conference.

Joe Anderson proposed a year of activity based on what happens after the White House Conference.

Jim Dertien announced there is no MPLA suite so the executive board meeting on October 30 will be in the Florentine Room. He requested Joe Edelen and Joe Anderson to meet with the CLA people about conference business. Jim asked Bob Malinowsky, Joe Edelen, and Joe Anderson to stand with him in the reception line at the opening of the exhibits. Phil McCauley cannot be the parliamentarian and Jim asked for volunteers. None were forthcoming.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:00 noon.


News Media Support Award





Legislative Leadership Award

State Representative from the 48th District, Jamestown, North Dakota, the Honorable Michael Unhjem was recognized as the primary sponsor of the bill which, for the first time in North Dakota, provides an appropriation of state funds to the State Library for grants to public libraries. With strong grassroots support enlisted by hard working North Dakota librarians, Unhjem helped fight this bill through three House committee and two Senate committee hearings to passage. The appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the biennium will be distributed on a formula of \$1.00 per capita and \$5.00 per square mile.

Intellectual Freedom Award

Acknowledging the outstanding support of the librarians of South Dakota, H. Vince Anderson, South Dakota State Librarian and a former president of MPLA, accepted the MPLA Intellectual Freedom Award for his leadership in the defeat of an initiative measure in South Dakota to regulate obscenity. Passage of the bill would have resulted in serious breaches of intellectual freedom and freedom of expression. Vince took much of his own time to travel the state speaking against the measure, to work with organizations and groups opposing the measure, and to serve a leadership role in the political action committee, Citizens for Workable Law. He risked job and personal respect and integrity in his commitment to the cause, and his leadership gave other South Dakota librarians courage as they faced the challenge of alignment with hard core porno pushers. Always a gentleman, his calm, reasoned approach helped achieve the resounding 3 to 1 defeat of the measure at the polls.

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Special Service Award

MPLA's leadership during its relatively short history has been challenged by typical and usually predictable problems associated with organizational growth, the changing climate of libraries, and membership demands. Each of our presidents has responded to these challenges in ways as colorful as their character and as agressive as circumstances would allow. One past president, Vern West, emerged from his tenure with a record of achievement that is only now being fully appreciated.

Vern's remarkable understanding of association management and keen and analytical sense of direction, plus his ability to secure with ease the confidence of the membership, allowed him to give MPLA a fresh sense of commitment and enthusiasm. His careful financial planning and efforts to assure improved conditions for income development gave the association a sense of current security envied by many organizations. This award is but a small representation of the praise and thanks frequently heard from the members and officers for Vern's service to MPLA.

Distinguished Service Award

Barbara I. Mauseth, who left the Nevada State Library last April to direct the Homer Public Library in Alaska, was honored for nineteen years of dedicated service in all facets of Nevada's library development: continuing education for personnel, support to public libraries and librarians in all phases of enabling legislation for finance, grant writing, and interlibrary cooperation; the extension of library services to areas never before served; and the construction of all new public library buildings in the state. B. J.'s encouragement, practical capability, and strong interest in fostering multistate activities for library cooperation in the MPLA area will be missed.

Statistical Sources for Title: **Health Science Librarians**


