

Guest Speakers

Sara Paretsky, author of numerous detective/mystery books featuring V.I. Warshawski, said to be "the most engaging woman in detective fiction since Dorothy Sayers' Harriet Vane," (Newsweek) will be the featured speaker at the General Session on Wednesday.

For Paretsky the path to publication and fame was circuitous, strewn with impediments and fueled by anger. She grew up in Lawrence, Kansas, in a house where books were important and a woman's role was defined by tradition. Her mother is a children's librarian; her father, now retired, was a college professor. She was the only girl among four boys, and when her mother became ill for a long period, it was the daughter of the house who was expected to assume domestic and maternal duties. This could be the reason, Paretsky notes, why Warshawski is often so conflicted about accepting responsibility for other members of her family.

After graduating from the University of Kansas, Paretsky went on to the University of Chicago. There, aiming for a teaching career, she got a doctorate in history, though she had no compelling drive to study the subject. "I went to graduate school because I was trying to prove to my family that I was as smart as my brothers," she says now.

A mystery novel addict, Paretsky found herself dreaming of writing detective fiction and fantasizing about taking revenge on Raymond Chandler, whose books regularly featured your basic bad, sexually available woman—the female creature who deserved any punishment that fell her way. . . . Paretsky realized that what she really wanted to do was write about a character

'who was like my friends and me, someone doing a job that historically had not been open to us.'

Paretsky's books will be available for purchase and signing courtesy of Watermark Books, immediately following her presentation.

McNeil has traveled from Kenya to New Zealand to Scotland to share and collect stories. She will discuss why storytelling is important for all ages, as well as share some of her unusual experiences that are the story behind the story. You'll hear about Samburu warriors, a castle that holds family secrets, and the serendipity of dreams coming true.

The FOLUSA Luncheon, also on Thursday, will feature authors Robert O. Greer, author of The Devil's Hatband published by Mysterious Press, Swain Wolfe, author of The Woman Who Lives In The Earth, publisher—HarperCollins, and a Random House author, to be announced.



Professional Development Grants Activity for 1995

MPLA provides its memb ers with professional development grant opportunities which encourage coursework, institutes and workshops, and independent study.

Twelve grants were approved in 1995 and eight of those projects were completed by the end of the year. For 1995 actual and encumbered grant awards came to \$4608. In addition seven grants totalling \$3567 were awarded from funds encumbered from the 1994 budget.

Applicants in 1995 represented six states: AZ-1, CO-1, KS-4, NE-2, SD-2, WY-2. There were no applicants from MT, ND, OK, UT. Seven applicants worked for public or county libraries and five worked in academic libraries.

Three grants were awarded for individuals attending the MPLA/SDLA/NDLA Tri-Conference in Sioux Falls. Three grants were for course work towards advanced degrees. Two grants were for international projects. The rest were for various conferences around the country. Two grant recipients were presenters at conferences.
