Arizona

Arizona hosted the national White House Conference on Library Information Services Task Force in Phoenix, August 6-8, 1998. Arizona librarians, along with state

and local legislators, Arizona Museum personnel, Friends, and lay people attended a simultaneous ACTivate conference which featured breakout sessions dealing with the promotion of library and museum cooperation, especially in light of the collaborative opportunities available through the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA). Action items were submitted from each of the breakout sessions and grouped into five action plans. These were submitted to the State Library, which had sponsored the ACTivate conference, for consideration in the future planning of LSTA monies.

The 1998-1999 Arizona Authors and Illustrators Speakers Bureau, a listing of regional and local authors and illustrators, has been updated and is available. The Wichita Public Library has been awarded a \$500,000 challenge grant by the National Endowment for the Humanities. The grant must be matched with 1½ million dollars raised from the local community over a 3-year period. The grant will rebuild, strengthen, and expand existing humanities holdings, specifically addressing collection gaps in history, literature, literary criticism, geography, biography, religion, and language. to promote individual and group communication, leadership, and an understanding of

What's New at ALA

New survey shows 73 percent of public libraries offer Internet access

New figures released September 14, 1998, show 73 percent of public libraries, including branches, now offer public access to the Internet.

The 1998 National Survey of Public Library Outlet Internet Connectivity found that 84 percent of public libraries in urban areas, 77 percent of libraries in suburban communities and 68 percent in rural areas provide Internet connections for the public. The survey was conducted by the American Library Association, the National Commission on Libraries and Information Sciences and the Gates Library Foundation.

"The Internet is a powerful new tool for students, researchers and anyone looking for helpful information about jobs, health, travel and other needs," says Ann K. Symons, president of the 57,000-member American Library Association. "Our goal is to ensure that everyone has access to the Internet and knows how to use it."



National awards will be given in each of three divisions:

- 1)professional
- 2) amateur and
- 3) youth (ages 6-17).

Prizes include \$1,000 for first place; \$500 for second; \$250 for third; and \$150 for honorable mention. A Grand Prize of \$1,500 and a tour of Washington, D.C. and the Library of Congress will be presented for the best overall photograph. An ALA President's Prize of \$500 and a Librarian of Congress Prize of \$500 also will be awarded.

National winners will be announced in June 1999. Their photos will be displayed at a special Library of Congress exhibit. Winning photos will also be posted on the ALA Web site at www.ala.org/celebrating/photo.

Two MPLA Members Announced as Cybrarian of the Year Award Winners




Two MPLA members were recently announced as winners of the 1998 MCI Cybrarian of the YearSM award. Congratulations to Sally Payne of the Papillion Sump Memorial Library (NE) and Pam Boger of the Campbell County Public Library (WY)!

The MCI-sponsored Cybrarian of the YearSM awards program is intended to "recognize the nation's technical librarians, or 'Cybrarians,' for their increasingly important role serving the public through the use of information technology....a whole new generation of research professionals has come to prominence in our nation's libraries. We call these specialists Cybrarians - and while the service they provide is familiar, the medium in which they operate is not."

A panel of judges selects one winner from each state. Each Cybrarian is awarded a \$1000 grant for the purchase of library and educational materials, and MCI provides each winner with free dial-up Internet access for one year.



1998 North Dakota Flickertale Book Award Winners Announced



The 1998 North Dakota Flickertale Book Award winners have been announced. The winner of the juvenile book category is Ben Mikaelsen, author of **Rescue Josh McGuire** and Cynthia DeFelice, author of **Casey in the Bath**, is the winner of the picture book category.

The NDLA Children's Roundtable nominates five titles in each category, and children all over the state cast their vote. Over 15,000 children participate in the annual voting.



The award is partially funded by the North Dakota Humanities Council, which allows author visits and funding for libraries to purchase the nominated books.

Jefferson County Kids Benefit Jeffco Action Center

Jefferson County (CO) kids just kept on reading in the Jefferson County Public Library summer reading program. Young readers exceeded their goal for this year and more than doubled the number of hours spent reading over the 1997 summer program.

This year, the Jefferson County Library Foundation pledged a donation of \$1,000 to provide books for homeless children if summer readers logged at least 45,000 hours of reading.

Kids actually read for more than 73,000 hours, ensuring that a small mountain of books was donated to the Jeffco Action Center for less fortunate children.

organizations (ACLU, Montana State Library, Montana Education Association, Montana Office of Public Instruction) to create a statewide network to assist in lobbying the 1999 legislative session.



Nebraska

Nebraska is one of eight states awarded a Community-Library Advocacy Grant. This project is a joint initiative of Friends of the Library, USA and Libraries for the Future. The grant is to assist individuals and groups raise funds for libraries. Training and workshops will be held in various locations around the state. The project will focus on existing library trustees and friends' groups while reaching out to new types of library supporters.

\$400,000 of new state funding was approved by the Legislature for the Nebraska Library Commission's budget for the next fiscal year. Up to \$250,000 of this is being earmarked for unlimited access for all Nebraska libraries to OCLC's FirstSearch reference service. There will be no charge to Nebraska libraries or users for this service. Fifteen databases are included in the FirstSearch package.

Nevada

Thanks to appropriations from the 1997 Nevada Legislature, \$400,000 for installation of equipment and digital data

lines was disbursed to public libraries, which are steadily moving toward the goal of public Internet access in every library location. Additionally, \$385,000 was appropriated to deliver information through statewide database licenses. July marked the start of a statewide contract with OCLC's FirstSearch to deliver 19 bibliographic databases to every public and academic library in the state as well as 11 K-12 pilot school locations.



North Dakota

The North Dakota State Library received a technical assistance grant from the Libraries for the Future Foundation to develop a program to promote Friends of the Library and other grassroots support groups. North Dakota is another of the 8 states chosen by the Foundation to provide expert advocacy training in four communities across the state. The Foundation is a New York Citybased non-profit organization dedicated to enlarging the base of citizen support for public libraries.

The Minot Public Library hosts "From Trolls to Mrs. Pepperpot and Beyond: Celebrating Norwegian Children's Books," an exhibit in honor of the 200th anniversary of Norwegian children's books that is intended to captivate children and families across North Dakota and propel them into the scenery, geography, history and culture of Norway. The expansive exhibit is on display from September 26 through November 1, 1998. The exhibit is part of *Norwegian Visions*, a Norwegian-American Cultural Partnership program initiated by the Royal Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Already having spent the sum-

mer in Washington, D.C., the exhibit will continue on to Los Angeles, San Francisco, Denver, and Minneapolis.



Oklahoma

The Oklahoma State Department of Libraries has begun its fall courses for library staff interested in becoming certified. The Oklahoma Library Certification process was begun last year to provide training on "core" library work subjects. Locations for the training are scattered throughout the state and this year a correspondence course option was added to the offerings.




Association sponsored a booth at the South Dakota State Fair. Dorothy Liegl from the South Dakota State Library supervised the booth for the week with assistance from SDLA volunteers. Many people stopped to visit the booth and to sign up to win a stuffed Runaway Bunny and the book *The Runaway Bunny*.

245 students participated in the 7th Annual South Dakota Media Fair. Awards were presented April 6 during the TIE conference in Sioux Falls. Students submitted either group or individual projects in computer commercial authoring programs, computergenerated art, photography or videotape.

The competition is sponsored by the South Dakota Association for Communications and Technology, a section of the South Dakota Library Association. *St. Francis Indian School Technology* by the Gifted and Talented Students, St. Francis Indian School, won Best of Show.



ULAs Legislative Committee was able to maintain public library development funds this year! The funds have been cut each of the last two years. The Committee was also able to secure building funds for two libraries and \$100,000 for the University of Utah periodicals budget.



The Wyoming State Library has started efforts that support the wares of Wyoming's libraries. A Wyoming Library Community group has been established representing the different kinds of libraries in Wyoming. In an effort to have a presence and proactively promote the resources of libraries, this group will be an exhibitor at statewide meetings of groups such as the WY Association of Municipalities, the WY Heritage Foundation, the WY Extension Showcase on Technology, WY K-12 technology conferences, and the WY Association of County Officials.

Description of Awards

CARL GAUMER EXHIBITORS AWARD: To be given to the individual or company whose positive suport of the MPLA is demonstrated by constant conscientious endeavors towards libraries, library staff, trustees, and professional activities.

MPLA DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD: To be given to an MPLA member who has made notable contributions to the library profession or has furthered significant development of libraries in the Mountain Plains region, or has performed exemplary service for an extended period of time. In the case of retired individuals, the nominee may be a past member of MPLA.

MPLA LEGISLATIVE LEADERSHIP AWARD: To be given to an individual or group (state legislature, city council, board of education, etc.) in recognition of exemplary legislative leadership or support for growth and development of a library or libraries in the MPLA area within the last two years.

MPLA NEWS MEDIA SUPPORT AWARD: To recognize the news media organization in the MPLA region making the strongest effort, either in a single presentation, or in on-going coverage, within the last two years, to promote libraries and library activities to the community. Criteria will include amount and effectiveness of coverage and manifestation of a positive commitment to generate public interest in a library or libraries.

MPLA LITERARY CONTRIBUTION AWARD: To be given to an author whose published writings are most successfully furthering an understanding and appreciation of the Mountain Plains region. The author need not reside in the region, and the selection may be based on either a single work or a body of works. Nominees will be evaluated on the basis of literary worth, readability, and evidence of responsible research.

MPLA BEGINNING PROFESSIONAL AWARD: To recognize an MPLA member who, as a librarian/media specialist, has made a positive impact on the quality and role of library service within the last five years after receiving a library/media specialist degree. Factors such as innovative programming and planning, use of resources, and special projects will be considered.
