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
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
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## MPLA REGIONALS ...



Jamie LaRue, Director of the Douglas County Library District (Castle Rock) is the new President of the Colorado Library Association (CLA)!

Through the initiative of Nancy Bolt, State Librarian, CLA has formed a sister relationship with the Bulgarian Library Association. The Bulgarian Librarians need current library journals and other professional publications. Nancy is planning another trip to Bulgaria in 1999.



Campbell County Library has created a new young adult department. The department, headed by Sue Knesel, allows Campbell County to meet its goal of focusing on its teen-age patrons.

The library moved its young adult section to a new area of the library to provide space for more books and for the teenagers who read them. The library also wants to create a Young Adult Advisory Board to give these readers more say in the services provided by the new department.

In the last six months, teens accounted for 15 percent of Campbell County's total circulation in fiction and 8 percent in non-fiction.

Knesel is in the process of recruiting students in junior high and high school to serve on the advisory board. The board will have influence on programs and materials offered by the young adult department.



The Harmon Branch of the Phoenix Public Library unveiled "TecnoMundo," an island of six computers funded by a \$28,000 grant from the Gates Foundation. Half the computers have Spanish language software and half access English language software products to serve the multicultural community of the Harmon Branch area, which is almost half Hispanic or Latino.

## Did You Know?

A 1998 survey sponsored by the American Library Association (ALA) and the U.S. National Commissionn on Libraries and Information Science (NCLIS) found that 73 percent of the nation's public libraries, including branches, now offer basic Internet access to the public. Of those, 43 percent have only one multimedia computer available to the public. Only about a third have the technology (56kbps bandwidth or greater) needed to provide high quality access, including graphics, sound and video.

The survey also found that about 14 percent of public libraries use Internet filters to block access to pornographic material. Nearly 95 percent of public libraries have or are developing policies governing acceptable Internet use as advocated by the American Library Association.

The Topeka & Shawnee County Public Library is the recipient of a \$225,000 challenge grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

## 8 Ways to Celebrate National Library Week 11-17 April 1999

- 1 Post a National Library Week message on your Web site. A banner is available at <a href="http://www.ala.org/celebrate/">http://www.ala.org/celebrate/</a>. Instruct staff to answer the telephone: "Happy National Library Week!"
- 2 Invite local officials and legislators for a special-National Library Week tour or program to highlight the many ways your library serves their constituents. Invite the public to meet their elected representatives and share what the library means to them. Invite the media and publish photos in your library newsletter or annual report.
- 3 Hang posters in the library but also ask local businesses to display National Library Week posters and give away bookmarks. School, college and university libraries can distribute publicity materials around the building or campus any place where students and faculty gather.
- 4 Host a program "Celebrating the Freedom to Read! Learn! Connect! @ the Library" with the editor of the local news- paper, college president, legislator and representatives of civil liberties, religious and other groups discussing the First Amendment and the importance of the library's role in our democracy.
- 5 Showcase library resources that help people of all ages read, learn and connect with their special interests. Host a Beanie Baby swap meet, a community service fair for seniors or "Internet Drivers Ed." Create a festive atmosphere with posters, refreshments and door prizes. Think photo opportunity.
- 6 Remind new parents it's never too soon to start raising a reader. Provide a "Born to Read" t-shirt and you have a photo opportunity.
- 7 Connect low income and at-risk families to the library. Work with housing developments to offer National Library Week parties with door prizes, storytelling and refreshments in community rooms. Sign up residents for library cards. Provide books and a National Library Week bookmark stamped with a special message for each child. Offer a surprise, such as a gift certificate from a local business when they bring back the book with the bookmark.
- 8 Contact your Chamber of Commerce and offer to provide a speaker in connection with National Library Week. Use this as an opportunity to talk about the library's role in protecting freedom of choice. Encourage chamber members to post a special "Read! Learn! Connect! @ the Library" message on their Web sites or in advertising during the week and throughout the year.
