Library Service in Spain

Jim Heckel Director, Great Falls Public Library Great Falls. MT

I recently visited the Biblioteca Joan Triadu, the public library in Vic, Spain. Vic is located about 65 miles northeast of Barcelona and is a bustling town of 60,000 with roots reaching back to pre-Roman times. The library itself is in a recently renovated convent constructed in 1708. The interior retains the beautiful columns of the convent cloister walk.

The library, which adheres to the Spanish tradition of closure between 1:30 and 4:30 p.m., is computerized with the VTLS system from Virginia Tech and administered through a central library system centered in Barcelona. Internet access is available to staff and public access is planned for the future. Of special interest is a collection of incunabula dating from 1498 and rare books dating from the sixteenth century. Otherwise it looks much like a typical city library in this country, with collections of CDs and videos, an active children's program and a staff of competent and helpful professional librarians.

I was particularly interested in their new "bibliobus," since we had also recently purchased a new bookmobile. Coincidentally, the bibliobus happened to visit the small village of Olost, 20 miles north of Vic, where we were staying. The bibliobus features computer linkage into the central catalog and the Internet. In fact, we dialed into our own Great Falls Public Library home page while in the shadow of the village's 11th century cathedral.

While the public library was not as aggressive as our libraries in public service, we need only recall that it has been only 60 years since a devastating civil war and a subsequent 40 years of dictatorship under Franco. I returned with a greater appreciation of how closely computers and the Internet have linked libraries around the world.

foods of special folk memory.

Share the festivities of making fresh churned butter, an authentic wedding with folk customs and dress, husking corn, and serving custard and fruit Kuchen at the Schmeckfest at Eureka, SD, and the 74th Annual Sauerkraut Day at Wishek, ND. Preparation of wedding Kuchen at Aberdeen, SD, the Schachlika Crimean foods in Richardton, ND, making of the famous Knoepfla Soup at Kroll's Kitchen in Fargo, and an old-fashioned Harvest Fest at Richfield, MN, are additional vignettes of culinary memories which feed the soul and warm the heart. Despite the diverse variety of foodways, German-Russians still insist to heartily "eat foods", not merely to "dine" with foods.

The videotape will contain special footage not seen in the 60-minute documentary including wonderful segments of sharing memories about growing up German-Russian.

In August, two big boxes of books arrived, and twenty-six children and their mothers were there to help unpack them. The donation has increased interest in the library and in reading.

University of Kansas Libraries were recently awarded two grants which will strengthen inhouse collections while helping to expand the range of materials available to students, teachers, researchers and others statewide. The grants were awarded by the Interlibrary Loan Development Program, a collection development grant program available to all types of libraries in Kansas. A \$5,000 grant will be used to purchase English language books on the religious aspects of bio-ethics. A \$4,000 grant will build a collection of multi-media materials on Latin America especially suited to students in K-12.



On November 17 the U.S. Department of Education announced in the availability of seven million dollars for English Literacy and Civics Education Demonstration Grants. The deadline for the receipt of proposals is January 18, 2000.

The purpose of the program is to support projects that demonstrate effective practices in providing, and increasing access to, English literacy programs linked to civics education. Eligible applicants are postsecondary educational institutions, public or private organizations and agencies and consortia.

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

The Salt Lake County Library System was rated as number seven of seventy-two rated



libraries that serve a population of more than 500,000 in the most recent Hennen's American Public Library Rating Index as just published in *American Libraries*. The index is based on information gleaned through the Federal-State Cooperative System, or FSCS, and includes information from 1996. FSCS collects statistical data from 9,000 libraries nationwide each year.

Twelve winners in the third and final round of the Library of Congress/Ameritech National Digital Library Competition have been announced. This year's winners include Brigham Young University, the University of Utah, Utah State University and the Utah State Historical Society for "Pioneer Trails: Overland to Utah and the Pacific." The digital program, funded by a \$2 million donation from Ameritech, has enabled U. S. Libraries, museums and historical societies to digitize their collections of American historical materials for inclusion in the American Memory electronic collections of the Library of Congress.

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
