Professional Forum Call for Papers

MPLA's Academic Section is announcing a call for papers to be presented at the joint Nebraska/MPLA conference in Omaha, Nebraska on October 25-28, 2000. Authors whose papers are accepted will present them at the Professional Forum.



Previously called the Research Forum, the Professional Forum is for the purpose of presenting new ideas and innovations which have been discov-

ered and which would be for the benefit of the profession. Research methodology is encouraged, but not essential. School and public librarians, as well as those from academia, are encouraged to submit their papers before May 15, 2000. A first prize of \$300 will be awarded to the winning paper.

Guidelines for papers are as follows:

- Problems are clearly identified and solutions proposed
 - Description may be locally implemented experiences (successes or failures), theoretical models, or state of the art reviews.
 - Although papers do not require formal research methodology, they should develop clear positions or concepts.

Abstracts for the papers will be judged on:

- Significance of topics (15 points)
- Development of concept and quality of organization (20 points)
- Clarity of ideas and objectives (10 points)

Final presentations will be judged at the annual conference by the section officers or substitutes based on the following criteria:

- Evident objectives, with clear ideas and concepts (15 points)
- Quality of organization (15 points)
- Quality of presentation, use of visuals, etc. (15 points)




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Join the Library of Congress Bicentennial Celebration!

The Library of Congress invites all public libraries to take part of the na-

tional celebration of the Library of Congress Bicentennial.

On April 24, 2000, the first day of issue, the United States Postal Service will release a commemorative postage stamp at the Library of Congress in Washington. From April 25 through May 31, libraries around the country can hold their own ceremonies as "second-day" issue sites.

At present, 150 public libraries and approximately 30 state libraries are planning to hold events there is no limit to the number of libraries that can take part in this collaborative venture with the Library of Congress. Libraries have great flexibility

in planning a second-day issue event, and the potential is limitless!

On request, the Library of Congress Bicentennial Program Office will send an information kit which includes a timetable and checklist for planning your event, guidance for planning a ceremony, programming ideas and suggestions, information about envelope designs for your event, publicity guidelines, and many other documents to assist you with event logistics. Staff in the **Bicentennial Program Office** are also available to work

directly with you on planning an event.

This is an exceptional opportunity to invite your member of Congress and/or local dignitaries or celebrities to take part in the second-day issue event. Holding a second-day issue event is a great way to honor a high-profile community member or to partner with interested organizations to exemplify the American Library Association's year 2000 theme "Libraries Build Community." Consider using your second-day issue event to highlight an area celebration, to kick-off a programming series, to unveil new library equipment, to dedicate a new collection, or to feature an element of your library you would like to celebrate or call attention to. One fortunate library plans to hold the second-day issue event at the opening of a new library building!





colorado

The Denver Post for January 13, 2000, reported that an agreement between Gov. Bill Owens and the State's librarians on Internet filtering is in limbo

with Democrats in the Senate Education Committee. They are saying the agreement is "tantamount to censorship." Democrats had the opportunity to defeat the bill on January 12 but Senator Stan Matsunaka, D-Loveland, instead took the opportunity and delayed it. He allowed a day to "fix" the bill to resolve censorship concerns. SB 85 is the Bill sponsored by Senator Gigi Dennis R-Pueblo to grant \$2,000,000 for libraries to buy books. Colorado Library Association President Eloise May attended hearings on the bill on January 12.

kansas


As of January 7, 2000, the membership of the Kansas Library Association has reached an all-time high of 1,117. This is the centennial year of the organization, and lots of special events are planned during triconference April 12-14. Our goal is 1500 members-enough to sustain a full-time executive director and lobbyist. The bulk of our new members have come from the Kansas Library Trustee Association.

In addition to a "Boathouse Bash" at the Wichita Boathouse, a number of past presidents of KLA will be present and recognized. Marilyn Hinshaw, president of MPLA, will be an honored guest also, and present a program on intellectual freedom on Thursday afternoon. Portions of the Research Library at the Kansas State Historical Society and the Kansas Collection of the University of Kansas Libraries will soon be available 24 hours a day. Researchers will be able to look up about 1,000 original documents from the Territorial Kansas period on the Internet thanks to a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). The \$224,076 grant provides funds to scan the best Territorial Kansas information and artifacts from both institutions and put them on the Internet, as well as providing help to the libraries in developing teaching materials for instructors at middle schools, high schools, and colleges to be used with the Internet collection.

oklahoma

The Mildred Laughlin Festival of Books, held annually at the University of Oklahoma, gathers together authors and illustrators of books for young people, to discuss their work, their lives, and trends in the publishing world. Featured speakers this year were Rosemary Wells, Joann Rider, and Lawrence Yep. Held since 1980, the October 30th event had 275 attendees, who were given the opportunity to meet and share their enthusiasm for books with visiting authors.

The Oklahoma Library Association has had a marvelous increase in membership!! Up thirty-three since 1998, there are now 1,126 OLA members.



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nebraska

The Official *Nebraska Blue Book* is now online at www.unicam.state.ne.us/bluebook/index.htm. The *Blue Book* is Nebraska's official reference manual, with information about the state's government, geography, economy, history, and culture.

wyoming

US Bank of Cheyenne donated \$6,000 to the Laramie County Library Foundation for upgrades at the Burns Branch Library. Funds will be used to buy three new computers and a printer.

Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library received the Multiple Sclerosis Society's 1999 PAVE Award for its installation of automatic door openers at the library's entrance. Dan and Louise Griffith of Sheridan provided the funding.

Teton County will host the exhibit, "Whispered Silences: Japanese American Detention Camps, Fifty Years Later" in February. The Smithsonian Institution exhibit features photographs of the 10 World War II "relocation camps." A film and speaker series focuses on the history of Heart Mountain, a camp located in Northwest Wyoming between the towns of Cody and Powell.

The library is the last stop on the exhibit's tour, which has been organized and circulated by the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES). The exhibit's visit to Jackson has been made possible by the Teton County Library Foundation through a gift from Tat and Paul Maxwell.

north dakota

The ND State Library is offering up to five grants to public librarians and public library trustees to attend a two-week Library Training Institute in Aberdeen SD from June 12 - 23, 2000. In addition, two \$5,000 scholarships are available for eligible North Dakotans

Children's librarians all over the state cooperate to develop this annual program. The funding base will pay for printing of materials for the program, beginning Spring, 2000. Libraries purchase materials from the program and send payment to the Nevada Library Association, thus sustaining the memorial into the future.

montana

Little Big Horn College Library is the recipient of an \$87,222 IMLS grant to create public access to library materials at different locations on the Crow Reservation, to provide training for staff and patrons on using electronic resources, and to create Web access to Crow materials.

Bozeman Public Library has been designated as a Sister Library as part of the White House Millennium Council Project. The project is designed to pair US libraries with other libraries around the world. Programming at these libraries will focus on young adults and the opportunity to learn about other cultures. Bozeman Public Library has been paired with Bermuda National Library in Hamilton, Bermuda.

Harry Potter Series Tops List of Most Challenged Books of 1999

The best-selling Harry Potter series of children's books by J.K. Rowling tops the list of books most challenged in 1999, according to the American Library Association's (ALA) Office for Intellectual Freedom. The Potter series drew complaints from parents and others concerned about the books' focus on wizardry and magic.

The ALA Office for Intellectual Freedom received a total of 472 reports of challenged titles last year. A challenge is defined as a formal, written complaint filed with a library or school about a book's content or appropriateness. The majority of challenges are reported by pub-

lic libraries, schools and school libraries. According to Judith F. Krug, director of the Office for Intellectual Freedom, the number of challenges reflects only incidents reported. She says that for each challenge reported, as many as four or five remain unreported.

The "Ten Most Challenged Books of 1999" reflect a wide variety of themes. The books, in order of most frequently challenged are:

- Harry Potter series, by J.K. Rowling, for its focus on wizardry and magic.
- Alice series, by Phyllis Reynolds Naylor, for using offensive language and being unsuited to age group.
- "The Chocolate War" by Robert Cormier (the "Most Challenged" fiction book of 1998), for using offensive language and being unsuited to age group.
- "Blubber," by Judy Blume, for offensive language and unsuited to age group.
- "Fallen Angels," by Walter Dean Myers, for offensive language and unsuited to age group.
- "Of Mice and Men," by John Steinbeck, for using offensive language and being unsuited to age group.
- "I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings," by Maya Angelou, for being too explicit in the book's portrayal of rape and other sexual abuse.
- "The Handmaid's Tale," by Margaret Atwood, for its sexual content.
- "The Color Purple," by Alice Walker, for sexual content and offensive language.
- "Snow Falling on Cedars," by David Guterson, for sexual content and offensive language.

Off the list this year, but on the list for several years past, are The "Goosebumps" and "Fear Street" series, by R. L. Stine, which were challenged for being too frightening for young people and depicting occult or "Satanic" themes, and "It's Perfectly Normal," a sex education book by Robie Harris, for being too explicit, especially for children.



The goals of Thank You Day are to: 1) educate elected officials about the importance of libraries; 2) demonstrate how legislators are helping to make library programs and services possible for their constituents; 3) illustrate the use of technology in libraries and how the E-rate program has benefited library users; 4) encourage libraries to apply for more local, state and federal resources.
