# MPLA Members & Professional Development Grants

**Karen Rupp-Serrano**, Social Sciences Librarian/Acting Head, Collection Development, University of Oklahoma Libraries

I like to think my educational experience needn't stop with me. I hope to use what I have learned to make work easier for the bibliographers I coordinate. And beyond my own library, I would be happy to share what I have learned with other MPLA members.

Karen Rupp-Serrano attended Virtual Collection Development, a Web CT-based course offered via the Internet from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. It was offered July-August, 2000. Karen was required to read articles from the literature on collection development topics, explore recommended web sites and resources for related information, and participate in a class bulletin board to share thoughts and learn from others in the course. Karen's comments:

"It is apparent from this course that while electronic resources are here to stay, just how we offer them is still a mixed bag. Some advocate separate web resource finding aids; others are moving aggressively to incorporate web resources into their OPACs. I learned about several web-based collection development tools that will be useful to me and my colleagues and now have a wealth of licensing and copyright information sites at my fingertips...

For me, personally, this course was a little oasis of leisurely thought in a rush-rush professional life. More librarians should be taking advantage of resources like this. I think it helps us to remember why we got into librarianship in the first place, something that we sometimes lose sight of in the myriad little tasks that confront us on a daily basis. But the course also

met my professional goals by offering information that I will use regularly as I coordinate collection development: collection development policies budgeting; selection; acquisition and evaluation tools on the internet; delivery options; copyright compliance; licensing; resource integration."

Robert Murdoch, Utah State University, was nominated by MPLA's State Representative from Utah, Jean Jensen.



The Computers in Libraries conference helped me to meet my goals as Special Collections Librarian. The Computers in School Libraries conference helped me to meet my goals in teaching library media courses. I can't wait to share the things I learned with my students. I would be happy to serve as a resource for other MPLA members.

Colleen Kirby attended the Computers in School Libraries Conference in Washington, D.C. in March 2001. During the computers in Libraries conference she attended sessions that dealt with improving your home page, cataloging with CORC, developing web editorial policies, digitizing library materials, and Dublin Core. The Computers in School Libraries Conference covered topics which included how to have students create electronic portfolios, staff development, incorporating technology into the classroom, providing access to educational resources, using electronic classrooms to provide library instruction, and library media standards. Of her experience, Colleen writes:

"I came away from the (Computers in Libraries) conference with ideas on how to improve the home page for Special Collection, and how to make more materials available through the home page. It also gave me ideas that I can incorporate into the library media courses that I teach. #### **American Library Association Honors Trejo**

The American Library Association has conferred its highest honor, honorary membership, upon Dr. Arnulfo D. Trejo, in recognition of his outstanding contributions and influence on Latino librarianship. During his career as a library science educator, Dr. Trejo was instrumental in creating a number of programs and opportunities for Hispanic/Latino librarians. He served as a role model and mentor to a

wide range of library leaders in the Southwest, nationally and internationally. He was recognized at the ALA annual conference in San Francisco for his long and distinguished career as a librarian, author, scholar and businessman.

Convocation of Arizona Libraries, Archives and Museums—The third annual convocation of library, archive and museum professionals was March 4-5 in

Prescott. Kathie Dengler and Richard Battle from the Strong Museum, Rochester, New York were the featured speakers discussing the paradigm shift in the museum that happened as a result of their guest service priority.

## colorado

**SWIFT ILL System**—The Colorado State Library recently launched its free statewide Interlibrary Loan and document-request management system called

SWIFT (StateWide Interlibrary Fast Track.) The system uses the Colorado Virtual Library (http://www.aclin.org) as a way to enable patrons to search libraries throughout Colorado and place requests for items electronically. SWIFT is the software that transmits requests between borrowing and lending libraries, keeps track of transactions, and provides reports on ILL use. Once a request goes to SWIFT, the patron's local library receives the request, where the software verifies bibliographic information. The system creates a routing list of owning libraries and

sends the authenticated request on its way. Once a library lends the item, system messages keep both parties up-to-date on the status—shipped, received, or returned. The system is free to Colorado libraries and their patrons.

**C'YAAL**—Colorado Young Adult Advocates in Libraries – is a newly formed statewide organization for the

purpose exchanging ideas about YA services in libraries. It also offers support and advice to others with a similar focus, drawing on shared energy and vision to create dynamic programming for young adults. 

It checks link vitality, provides statistics on use, and reports new terms by which users are attempting to access information. Marc Davis, manager of support services, Karen Hein, librarian in reference and electronic services, and Jared Davis, lead programmer, comprise the team who created "Research Wizard."

Gates Foundation Funding—Nebraska is one of sixteen states scheduled to benefit from funding through the U.S. Library Program of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Grants will be awarded and computers installed in libraries from summer 2002 through fall 2003. Public libraries that serve communities with more than ten percent poverty that were not previously eligible for a grant from the foundation will be invited to apply. Grants support expanding public access to computers, the Internet, and digital information in libraries that serve low-income

communities. Libraries use the funds to purchase computers, networking equipment, and telecommunications services for Internet access. The grants also provide training and technical support to the library staff, covering network administration, computer and Internet applications, and computer systems management. Microsoft Corporation donates software to libraries receiving foundation grants. ## nevada

Washoe County Library Looks to Future—Just what could the Washoe County library of the future look like? At a visioning session sponsored by the Washoe County Library System, about 50 people came to share their ideas of what the library of the future should look like. Washoe County voters in November approved bonds to build two new libraries

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in regional parks, one in Spanish Springs and one in the South Valleys that should be open by 2003. In addition, Washoe County will decide this spring whether to build a new library in Incline Village or expand the old one. Major renovations to the Sparks library should be completed by this summer and then the downtown Reno library would get a new look in the next year.

Return of the Mobile Library—Washoe County Library System recently brought back an old friend: the Mobile Library. The sleek, state-of the art \$220,000 vehicle, the first traveling library to operate in Washoe County since about 1990, made its debut at a Cinco de Mayo celebration and hit the road in June. The money for the vehicle came from private donors and grants. Even with Washoe County paying vehicle upkeep and the salaries for two full-time and two part-time employees, the mobile library is a bargain. Ten local donors contributed \$175,000 to the vehicle. Contributions and a library technology grant covered the cost of about \$220,000, including the library materials.

New Library—Pahrump Community Library opened with fanfare on March 24, 2001. The 20,000 square foot facility designed by Leo A. Daly features a welcoming circulation/information desk, reference and research area, small computer lab.

research area, small computer lab, reception area, youth services area with space for children's programming and meeting rooms.

Carson City Literacy Coordinator—New Literacy Coordinator Susan Graf, formerly Family Services Librarian at the North Las Vegas Library District, comes with a long list of ideas for literacy programs and projects throughout the state. She aims to expand and support literacy activities in public libraries, especially the rural areas of Nevada, expand prison literacy projects, and bring additional services to Nevada tribal organizations. She was the project director for an LSTA-funded Family Literacy demonstration project, LISTOS PARA LEER/ READY SET READ! The project successfully integrated corporate, federal, and private funding. Currently President of the Nevada Library Association, Graf holds an MLS from Texas Women's University and a bachelor's degree in

English from Utah State University with a teaching certification in secondary education.

Nevada Library Institute—The 2001 Nevada Library Institute will take place September 10-14, 2001 at the JFDI Executive Retreat in Alamo, Nevada. Thirty-six participants from libraries throughout Nevada will be invited to participate in the intensive week-long institute.

## oklahoma

Beta Phi Mu Award Winner—Lotsee Patterson, professor at the graduate school of library and information science at the University of Oklahoma, Norma, is the 2001 recipient of the American Library Association Beta Phi Mu Award. She was selected to receive the award for being the foremost proponent of Native American libraries through training programs, for securing funding through LSCA, for co-chairing the second Native American preconference to the White House Conference on Library and Information Services, and for consulting. She holds a bachelor's degree from Oklahoma College for Women and a master's in library science and doctorate from the University of Oklahoma.

## utah

Robert Murcoch at BYU—Robert Murdoch, Associate Director of Utah State University Libraries in Logan, accepted the position of Associate Director at Brigham Young University in Provo, to oversee the Technical Services Department, starting June 1. Robert received his MLS degree in 1981 from BYU, served in various positions at USU since that time.

Sterling Albrecht Receives Award—The Utah Library Association held its annual conference May 2-4 in Sandy, a suburb of Salt Lake City. Sterling Albrecht, University Librarian at Brigham Young University, received the ULA Distinguished Service Award. This is the Association's most prestigious award, presented to persons who have sustained achievements of the highest caliber for several years.

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Sterling earned his MLS in 1970, served as director of the BYU library since 1979. Under his leadership, the library added two major building additions totaling nearly 500,000 sq. ft; expanded its collections by over a million volumes, moved from the card catalog to a leader in library automation.

Peggy Erickson Honored—At the ULA conference, Peggy Erickson, Library Director at the Tooele City Public Library, received the ULA Librarian of the Year Award. Peggy has worked at the library in Tooele for 14 years.

# PROFESSIONAL FORUM Call for Papers

The Mountain Plains Library Association's Academic Section <u>and the College & University Libraries Division (CULD) of AzLA</u> are announcing a call for papers to be presented at the joint Arizona Library Association/MPLA conference in Phoenix, Arizona on December 5-7, 2001. Authors whose papers are accepted will present them at the Professional Forum.

#### Guidelines for papers are as follows:

- ✓ Although papers do not require formal research methodology, they should develop clear positions or concepts.

#### Abstracts for the papers will be judged on:

- Significance of topics (15 points)
- Development of concept and quality of organization (20 points)
- Clarity of ideas and objectives (10 points)

Final presentations will be judged at the annual conference by the section officers or substitutes based on the following criteria:

- Objectives are evident, with clear ideas and concepts (15 points)
- Quality of organization (15 points)
- Quality of presentation, use of visuals, etc. (15 points)

#### **Guidelines for submission:**

- ✓ Authors must be current members of MPLA *or AzLA*
- ✓ Papers must be original (not published or presented elsewhere)
- ✓ Selected authors will make 30 to 40 minute presentations at the conference
- ✓ Submission must include:
  - An extended abstract must be submitted of 1 ½ to 4 pages in length
  - <u>Name, institution/library affiliation, address, phone</u> number, e-mail, program title

Now the newsletter is headed for bed (and so am I).


