A consumer is a shopper who is sore about something. – **Harold Coffin** 

The history of consumer issues in the United States is an interesting mix of legislation, investigation, commerce, regulation, court cases, public interest (often sparked by a good scandal!), and pressure from industry. Two excellent sources on this topic are:

By the late 1800s mass production of goods, coupled with the expansion of the rail system allowed cheap products to be sold throughout the country, and railroad companies took advantage of their position to help themselves. Pushed by farmers and businesses, Congress enacted the Interstate Commerce Act of 1887 setting the stage for future regulatory actions by targeting a specific industry and setting up an independent commission to oversee compliance.

Society was industrializing and urbanizing, and workers had cash to buy ready-made products rather than making them at home. People

also began buying national "brands" that appeared more attractive through advertising and packaging, rather than local goods. Health and safety issues began to arise as food products were "processed" to stave off or hide spoilage, and addictive "medicines" were marketed to the public.

Public outrage showed itself to be a force for change. Muckraking journalists sold copy by investigating and sensationalizing issues of concern. The fictionalized account of the meat packing industry, *The Jungle* by Upton Sinclair, spurred independent investigations confirming the abhorrent conditions in which food was prepared for sale to the public. The Pure Food and Drug Act of 1906 was the first *major* federal legislation in this area, although there had been earlier measures dealing with over imported drugs and cattle (sound familiar?).

By the early 1930s, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) was using graphic posters depicting a "Chamber of Horrors" created by unregulated drugs and cosmetics. Pressure was also mounting on legislators to do something about advertising, which was often more creative than informative. In 1938, the Federal Trade Act gave advertising oversight to the Federal Trade Commission, and the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act gave government new powers to enforce labeling, and not allow drugs to be marketed until proven safe.

Industry exerted its own pressure, often leading to "voluntary" compliance provisions, and government agencies often didn't have the power or resources to take industry on. Social movements stifled during 1950s McCarthyism were rejuvenated in the 1960s with Rachel Carson's *Silent Spring* and Ralph Nader's *Unsafe at Any Speed*. The public became more aware and demanding of government to take a more active role in protecting consumers. Resulting legislation includes the National Traffic Safety Act, Truth in Lending Act, and Consumer Product Safety Act.

Large gaps still exist between adults with disabilities and other adults with regard to employment, education, income, frequency of socializing and other basic measures of ten major indicator areas of life. Furthermore, most of these gaps show little evidence of narrowing. In some cases, the gaps have even widened over time. 

Dr. Jane Holwerda of the Dodge City Community College is Resident Scholar for the Let's Talk About It program. LaShaina Lee Flax and Alba Ortiz worked on the We the People grant.

The Topeka and Shawnee County Public Library (TSCPL) is one of five libraries nationwide to receive a new Public Library Association (PLA) grant called *Grow Your Own @ Your Library*® program. The primary goal of the program is to increase the number of public librarians by offering funding for continuing education in the fields of Information Management, specifically the Masters of Library Science degree. The PLA awarded an \$8,000 tuition reimbursement grant to each of the five winning libraries. Five TSC-PL employees currently seeking the MLS degree,



Robin Brooks, Stephanie Hall, Jill Pfuetze, Shari Schawo, and Jeffrey Tate worked on the grant proposal, and will receive grant funding. The Library will also create a mentoring program with current library employees who will work with the grant recipients as they progress through their schooling.

The Johnson County Library will receive the *Excellence in Community Service Award* from the United Community Services of Johnson County. The award recognizes an organization hat has significantly improved the lives of residents.

**The Johnson County Library** is one of 80 libraries, chosen from among hundreds of nominations, to be featured in *Heart of the Community: the Libraries We Love*. The book is to be published in October 2006 by the Berkshire Publishing Group.



## Montana

Montana "Women of the Year" include several library people: Alice Meister, Director of the Bozeman Public Library, was named Woman of the Year by the Bozeman Business and Professional Women. Livingston Library Expansion Campaign Co-Chairs Janet Bernthal and Nancy Danaher were named Women of the Year by the Livingston Business and Professional Women.

The Montana State Library's "What's Your Story?" campaign was recognized with a gold Addy at this year's Addy Awards sponsored by the Great Falls Advertising Federation. The award recognized a series of posters that were created for the campaign by Q Communications Group of Helena. The Addy Awards competition is an annual event to recognize and reward creative excellence in advertising.



# North Dakota

Bismarck State College hosted its "Classics Redux" book talk discussion series this past winter. Participants read three contemporary works inspired by classic works: Ahab's Wife, or, The Star-Gazer by Sena Jeter Naslund (inspired by Moby Dick by Herman Melville); The Hours by Michael Cunningham (inspired by Mrs. Dalloway by Virginia Woolf); and Life of Pi by Yann Martel (inspired by Robinson Crusoe by Daniel Defoe).

North Dakota State University Libraries have a new exhibit, "Prairie Churches," a look at North Dakota's rich legacy of ethnically and architecturally diverse historic churches. The National Trust for Historic Preservation named the Prairie Churches of North Dakota to its 2001 list of America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places.

Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library held its first community book discussion blog. Christine Kujawa, the creator and moderator, offers discussion questions and book information, reviews and author biographies. Also at Bismarck Public, teen librarian Kathy Vander Vorst coordinated a bookfair at the local Barnes and Noble. Teen volunteers handed out book coupons to library patrons and customers. Barnes and Noble donated 10% of customer purchases to support the Teen Summer Reading Program.

Chester Fritz Library at University of North Dakota opened a Digital Scanning Center in the Periodicals Department and Special Collections area. It contains equipment and software to scan practically anything and convert it into a usable electronic file. Special Collections expects to release some materials from archives as fully indexed digital collections after scanning at high resolution and creation of appropriate metadata for keyword searching.

# Nebraska

Baright Public Library in Ralston was visited by *Harry and the Potters* at the opening of the library's new teen space. Three years ago two brothers, now 26 and 18, combined their love of music, the Harry Potter books and libraries by forming a band and writing songs as they imagined Harry Potter and his friends might. *Harry and the Potters* were on a three-week tour of the Midwest, playing at libraries, colleges, clubs and

high schools when they stopped in Ralston. The teen space was the brain-child of the library's teen advisory board and was funded by a grant of \$3,500 from the Nebraska Library Association. The concert was provided by a memorial gift from a Ralston resident.

The Charles B. Washington Library branch of the Omaha Public Library celebrated its remodeling by presenting rapper-turned TV star Ice-T as the main attraction at its reopening. Over 500 people attended the ribbon cutting and listened as Ice-T spoke, answered questions from the audience, and signed tapes, CDs, T-shirts and copies of his book "The Ice Opinion." The Washington branch is widely used by teens, computer users and community groups. The city spent \$3.2 million on the makeover, which included a 5,000 square foot addition.

The Nebraska Library Commission request for supplemental funding for statewide access to online information services through the NebraskAccess program, went to the legislature during the latest session. Though included in the legislature's proposed budget, the governor vetoed funding for statewide library access to an online encyclopedia database. Nebraska libraries will try again during the next session.

# New Mexico

The University of New Mexico's Zimmerman Library sustained damage when a fire started in the basement at 10:30 pm on April 30. About 70 patrons and workers were evacuated from the library. The fire closed the library during finals week, one of the library's busiest weeks of the year. Librarians are working to get students materials they need through other campus libraries and interlibrary loan. The fire is under investigation and

damage to the library and collection is currently being assessed.

The New Mexico Library Association Annual Conference, held in Farmington, was a success, with over 300 registered attendees, nearly 60

individual sessions, and keynote speaker John Y. Cole, Director of the Center for the Book. NMLA partnered with the Farmington Public Library and San Juan College Library for the conference. During the conference, Anne Lefkofsky became

President. NMLA was proud to have MPLA Vice-President, Wayne Hanway, and MPLA President, Sharon Osenga, as conference attendees.

New Mexico GO Bond was approved for libraries by Governor Bill Richardson. House Bill 301 provided \$9 million to be divided between academic, school, and public libraries. The bond will be on the ballot in New Mexico's November election.

New Mexico State Library's \$529,500 application for a Hardware Upgrade Grant (HUG) was approved by the Gates Foundation. Public and Pueblo libraries that have been eligible for Gates Hardware grants will be eligible for the upgrade.

**San Juan College** in Farmington opened a new library in April. The library has wireless capabilities. Students may check-out laptop computers for use in the library. The new technology in the library also allows students to self-checkout materials.

The Socorro High School Library had books, including 3x3 Eyes, removed from the collection in March after school administrators and a parent issued complaints about the books' contents. Library Media Specialist, Marian Royal, threatened to take the issue to the American Library Association and American Civil Liberties Union. The school's administration reversed its decision and returned the books to the library, deciding to follow the school district's formal challenged materials policy. Marian Royal was quoted in School Library Journal as saying, "I would willingly have sacrificed my job if necessary; however, since I was only defending board-approved policy, I hope that wouldn't have been the final outcome."

# Nevada

Washoe County Library System's Northwest branch has been chosen as one of just 80 libraries around the country to appear in the book *Heart of the Community: the Libraries we Love.* 

Nevada State Library and

Archives has a new Library Planning and Development calendar that does everything but take the class for you! Check on what classes are offered, get a detailed description, sort by date or alphabetically and register. It's reported to be very user friendly.

**Nevada Library Association** conference is coming up August 15- 9 at the Texas Station in North Las Vegas. The theme is *Tools for the Future*.

Las Vegas Clark County Library District is having a busy time. April is *Reading Las Vegas* month with programs and book club meetings everyday of the month.

The Altus Public Library recently welcomed historical "Alfalfa Bill." John Hinkle, actor, storyteller and puppeteer, performed the many sides of Oklahoma's ninth controversial and colorful governor through a "living history" presentation of his life and times. William H. Murray, "Alfalfa Bill", was known as an agronomist; lawyer for the Chickasaw Nation fending off false claims for land grabs; secretary to the Indian Territorial Sequoyah constitutional convention; president and legal mind in formatting the Oklahoma consti-

tution; Speaker of the 1st elected house of Representatives of Oklahoma; U.S. Senator during World War I; leader of a utopian society in Bolivia; and governor during the depression and the dust bowl.

Sponsored by the South Dakota Library Association, the contests encourage students in grades K – 6 to read and vote for their favorite book of the year.

Frances Kann, Former Britton, South Dakota Librarian, celebrated her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday February 11 with family and friends at Wheatcrest Hills Center in Britton. She worked at the Britton Library and was honored by the City of Britton with "Frances Kann Day" when she retired after 24 years.

The Watertown Regional Library, located in

northeastern South Dakota, was closed for a few days in April to move the library to an temporary location for one year during the transformation of the current building into a new expanded and renovated library.

**South Dakota Libraries** will receive funding from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation "Staying Connected Grant Program," the grants offer funding to replace or up-grade equipment received from previous Gates Awards.

Utah Library Association recently presented it annual awards. The Hyrum Library/Museum Fundraising Committee received the Special Services to Libraries Award; Kimberly Rollins, Assistant Library Director at Utah Valley State College, is Librarian of the Year. Julene Butler, Associate University Librarian at Brigham Young University, received a Special Recognition Award.

# Wyoming

Teton County Library is hosting the literary arts specialist for the Wyoming Arts Council, Mike Shay, in the Writer's Showcase series in May. Shay read from his newly published collection of short stories, *The Weight of a Body*. The free event, sponsored by the Teton County Library Foundation, followed with a book signing. Shay's collection of stories is set mainly in Wyoming and along the Colorado Front Range and spans several decades and generations. Themes include displacement and dislocation, well-known predicaments for westerners from these regions.

Natrona County Public Library's "One Book, One Community" program concluded

with Harper Lee's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel *To Kill a Mockingbird*. The library kicked off the month-long program by distributing over 200 free copies of the book to interested com-

munity members. A variety of events were offered in conjunction with "One Book," including a concert featuring music from the film, a free showing of *To Kill a Mockingbird* at a local movie theatre and several book discussions for teens and adults. The program wrapped up with a presentation by guest lecturer Claudia Durst Johnson. An estimated 900 participants attended.

Campbell County Public Library continues its remodeling with the goal of completion by September, 2006 in time for Wyoming Library Association conference in Gillette. Over the winter an RFID system was installed with library staff tagging 150,000 items. Security gates and

self-checkout was part of the Checkpoint system inaugurated. This year the main floor is being remodeled with new carpet, wall coverings and new data wiring and lighting.

The Wyoming State Legislature, in its recent budget session, approved an amendment appropriating \$2.9 million for the state's 23 county library systems. The one-time appropriation will boost collections beyond what local library budgets ordinarily provide. The funds are to be used exclusively for library materials, including electronic materials and subscriptions. The \$2.9 million appropriation will be distributed through each county's Board of Commissioners.
