It didn't seem that way when I was young, but how short a year is! This is my final column as President of MPLA, and all the sayings about how time flies by are certainly true for me.

It has been a busy and eventful time. MPLA has been experiencing changes, and the path of change is usually bumpy. The electronic communities that we set up in the re-organization of MPLA in 2006 did not live up to their potential. The task force set up to work out a better plan recommended a new approach to make it easier for our members to make connections and share ideas and news. There is no question of its value. As I write, I have over half the members appointed to a task force that is charged with working out a strategy for the Institute's long-term success.

And that has been the most satisfying thing about the privilege of serving you as President: the way so many people have said "Yes!" when asked to do something, whether it has been serving on committees, task forces, the Program Council, or the Executive Board, volunteering to help staff the MPLA booth at conferences, sending articles and pictures for the Newsletter, or proving in so many other ways that our new slogan, "Big Horizons, Close Community" is truly descriptive of where, who, and how we are.

Please join me in thanking some very special MPLA people. Past President Sharon Osenga and President-Elect Rob Banks have had many responsibilities this year and have been great to work with. I salute Judy Zelenski, our Executive Secretary and Newsletter Editor, for her unfailing responsiveness, good cheer, and hard work, and Webmaster Dan Chaney, who is likewise quick to respond and whose redesign of the web site was proactive and well thought out.

Each of the committee chairs this year has demonstrated leadership and initiative in delivering on their charge: David Oberhelman, Communications; Michele Seikel, Membership; Beth Avery, Awards; JaNae Kinikin, Nominating; Sandy Barstow and Connie Lamb, Professional Development; Patti Butcher, Leadership Institute; Sharon Osenga, Administration; and Rob Banks, Program Council.

As we turn with anticipation to MPLA's 60th birthday celebration in Salt Lake City and the stimulating joint conference with the Utah Library Association it will be part of, I invite you to come and join in. Celebrate yourself and all your colleagues who continue to make MPLA a special place where the closeness and warmth of our library community is as great as our expansive horizons.

MPLA Leadership Institute – Important Notice

The MPLA Leadership Institute will not be offered in 2008. We were unable to obtain corporate funding to help underwrite the cost.

The Leadership Institute has influenced many lives during its six years of operation, and the alumni have demonstrated its success in many ways, particularly through their active professional involvement, and in a number of cases, by promotions and other moves up the career ladder. The Institute has been a bright jewel in the crown of MPLA.

Not finding a corporate donor for 2008 points to the need to give thoughtful study to the future of the Leadership Institute, for 2009 and beyond. MPLA does not have the funding to continue to operate it as it has been. Ghost Ranch is an expensive venue, potential attendees find the Institute fees and travel costs a heavy burden, even if they receive assistance, and MPLA needs to guard against future deficit budgets. Plus, there is concern that MPLA should be providing other continuing education opportunities, in order to serve more of our membership. Add to this a time of transition, because Mary Bushing, who has been the Leadership Institute's coordinator, is resigning that position this year.

A task force will soon be appointed and charged to study these questions, with the expectation that they will make their report and recommendations to the MPLA Executive Board's fall 2008 meeting. MPLA members who have not been LI mentors, fellows, or members of the LI Committee, who would be interested in serving on this task force are asked to contact me or President-Elect Rob Banks as soon as possible.

Information and services provided by the federal government of the United States permeates our lives. A good deal of time and energy is spent making sure citizens have access to these resources, which they have paid for. Many government agencies are embracing the spirit of Web 2.0 through technologies that allow users to collect, build, and share government resources in communities of their own design. Even the casual user can find information of interest, accessible through a variety of media (email newsletters, blogs, podcasts, RSS feeds, etc.) and able to be manipulated and shared through hosted services such as Del.icio.us, Tailrank, Twitter, etc.

Highlights include:

Email Newsletters - <u>http://apps.gsa.gov/</u> <u>CommonSubscriptionService.php</u> - An attempt at a 'one stop' subscription page; I suggest clicking on specific newsletter links you *might* be interested in, as the summaries can be a little vague. A wide range of topics from exports, to coral reef conservation, to Cyber Security.

Agency Press Releases - <u>http://www.pueblo.</u> gsa.gov/call/pressreleases.htm - The press release is a common means for the government to shape and share information with the public via the media. Press releases may be reported as is, but often are starting points for media stories developed by journalists looking into the facts and claims of the government. Most, if not all, government agencies provide links to their official releases.

Podcasting – Podcasting allows content creators to share digital media files online

<u>http://www.usa.gov/webcontent/technology/</u> <u>podcasting.shtml</u>. Government offerings range from Peace Corps Volunteer Voices <u>http://www.</u> <u>peacecorps.gov/wws/multimedia/podcasts/</u>, to recalls and product safety news from the Consumer Product Safety Commission <u>http://www.cpsc.gov/</u> <u>cpscpub/prerel/podcast.xml</u>, to podcasts en español <u>http://www.usa.gov/gobiernousa/MasNoti-</u> <u>cias/Podcasts.shtml</u>.

RSS Feeds – RSS allows the user to subscribe to feeds which deliver notification of changes and updates in user-selected, specific web content. A sample of agencies include the Federal Reserve <u>http://www.federalreserve.gov/feeds/</u>, State Energy News <u>http://www.eere.energy.gov/states/news</u> <u>via_rss.cfm</u>, and Current Weather Conditions <u>http://www.weather.gov/data/current_obs/</u>.

Blogs – We**blogs** allow the online 'publishing' of information which may be news and/or commentary, or more like an online diary. While official government bloggers use the medium to get information out, there are many personal bloggers who use the medium to comment on the government. Some blog examples include the Transportation Security Administration <u>http://www.tsa.gov/ blog/</u>, Global Learning and Observations to Benefit the Environment (GLOBE) <u>http://www.globe.</u> <u>gov/fsl/wordpress/</u>, and the National Agriculture Library <u>http://weblogs.nal.usda.gov/infofarm/</u>.

Holly Mercer, Coordinator of Digital Content Development, Kansas University, attended the *Open Repositories 2007: Achieving Interoperability in an Open World and DSpace User Group Meeting*, January 23-26, 2007 in San Antonio TX. The conference presentations focused primarily on the technologies that allow open access.

Holly's comments: This was an international conference that presented both very practical case studies and cutting edge research into repository design, interoperability, and usage. The technical information presented in the formal programs was complemented by informal conversations with other conference attendees during breaks and meals. This conference was more technical in nature than I had anticipated, but this allowed me to see new (technical) approaches to addressing scholarly communication issues. There are some very exciting advances in improving both access to and preservation of research in digital repositories. I would highly recommend this conference to any institution who has implemented or is considering an institutional repository.




Conference Highlight

Luncheon speaker Thursday, May I Newbery Award winner Susan Patron

Susan Patron specialized in Children's Services for 35 years at the Los Angeles Public Library before retiring in 2007, the same year her novel *The Higher Power of Lucky* was awarded the John Newbery Medal. As the library's Juvenile Materials Collection Development Manager, she trained and mentored children's librarians in 72 branches.

She launched an ongoing project, *Meet the Author*, in which local authors and illustrators met informally with children in community branches. Patron served on many book award committees, including the Caldecott and Laura Ingalls Wilder Committees of the American Library Association and the PEN Literary Award Committee. She also reviewed children's books for *Publisher's Weekly* and *School Library Journal*, and serves currently on the Advisory Board of the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators.





Put Las Vegas Glitz into your Library by Anna Vaillancourt, Las Vegas-Clark County Library District, and 2007 Leadership Institute fellow. View a district-wide circulation desk remodeling project in both urban and rural libraries.

Wheelchair Roundup: Interactive Exercises in Access by Jane Hatch, Kansas City KS Public Library. Through a group of interactive exercises participants will experience access challenges that can be alleviated with practical fixes.

Merchandising your Library by Marsha Leclair-Marzolf & Scott Russell, Salt Lake County Library Services. A practical discussion of the importance of merchandising and displays in the library, including display design basics and a slide show of ideas from bookstores and libraries around the country.

Extreme Library Makeover by Anne Marie Luthro of Envirosell. A fascinating look at her firms research on how customers shop, all tailored to libraries. She will include the look of your library from the outside in, shopping behavior, entrances, oases, checkout counters, and what we can do to become more service oriented in our library design. After almost 15 years of watching people shop, Anne Marie still professes a love of her job and of shopping.







The South Dakota Library Association's March Spring Forums were held in Rapid City and Brookings. The one day events were developed to offer continuing education opportunities in addition to the annual conference. Featured speaker at both forums was Michael Sauer, Technology Innovation Librarian for the Nebraska Library Commission. Other programs included SDLA 101, Anatomy of a Book, Have you seen my jumper cables? and Public Library Accreditation/Certification.

South Dakota school children have submitted entries for the Seventeenth Annual **South Dakota Student Media Fair**. Sponsored by the South Dakota Association for Communications and Technology (SDACT), a section of the **South Dakota Library Association** and the Northern Plains AECT, affiliated with the National Association for Educational Communications and Technology (AECT), this event's media categories are video, commercial authoring program, computer generated art, and photography. Winners will be selected in four grade categories in each media type. All entries will be on display at the Technology in Education (TIE) Conference in Sioux Falls in April 2008. The Sioux Falls City Council approved an additional \$1.5 million to the \$11.3 million for the expansion and renovation of the main branch of the **Siouxland Libraries**. The project will add about 18,000 square feet to the 45,000-squarefoot building and is scheduled to begin later this year.

Eight cities - Sioux Falls Rapid City, Madison, Martin, Ridgeview, Spearfish, Scotland and Pierre - have been selected as the South Dakota Big Read communities for 2008 and will host events celebrating Fahrenheit 451, science-fiction and Bradbury. To kick off the year's discussions, a two day event was held to allow librarians, teachers, and other interested persons to immerse themselves in the science fiction/fantasy genre and works of author Ray Bradbury. Some of the sessions included were Catch the Fire Fahrenheit 451 and the Fate of Reading, Lawless Behavior to Preserve the Freedom to Read, Banned Books and Libraries in Post 9/11 America, Beyond Fahrenheit 451, Sensing Censorship, Science Fiction Writing Today, and Let the Light Shine.
