- be responsive to the needs and challenges of our members, our libraries, our region, and all the people we serve.


My charge to you is that each of you must be an advocate:

Winners of MPLA's 2008 Awards were recognized in April at the ULA/MPLA Conference Awards Banquet in Salt Lake City. They are:

The Carl Gaumer Library Champion Award was presented to **Mary Bushing** for the im-



pact she has had on the MPLA region through her many programs to train staff at all levels in libraries of all kinds; her many years of service to MPLA on the Executive Board, task forces and committees, and conference presentations; and especially for her continued efforts in making the MPLA

Leadership Institute one of the premier library leadership training institutes in the country.

MPLA Distinguished Service Award is presented to **Debbie Iverson.** As past president of MPLA, Debbie laid the ground work for a strong professional development emphasis in MPLA which continues today. She has given 32 years of outstanding service to the profession through her work in the Wyoming Library Association and MPLA. Debbie recently retired as Director of the Sheridan College in Wyoming. She was unable to attend the conference.

The MPLA Literary Contribution Award is given to **Kathleen O'Neal Gear** and **W. Michael Gear**, the authors of dozens of international best-

sellers, which have been translated into seventeen languages including The First North Americans series, Anasazi Series, Forbidden Borders Trilogy, Genetic Thriller Series, and Spider Trilogy. Michael has published



twelve novels under his own name and co-authored another seventeen with Kathleen.



The MPLA Beginning Professional Award is presented to **Bryan Tronstad**, University of Wyoming. He received his MLS in 2003 and has worked at the University of Wyoming since 2004. Bryan has embraced information literacy as an effective method for developing lifelong learning skills. He has had a

significant impact on library services and instruction at the University of Wyoming, which is influencing library instruction efforts in the region as well demonstrating a potential for continued influence on our profession for years to come.

















# More Conference Photos















If all the year were playing holidays,
To sport would be as tedious as to work.

--William Shakespeare

Americans celebrate a variety of religious, secular, ethnic, regional, local, and even international holidays; but there is no such thing as a 'National' holiday. The federal and state governments decide *legal* holidays which are marked by work closures and business transaction restrictions. Federal holidays (authorized by Congress ) pertain only to federal employees and those of the District of Columbia though most states celebrate the same days with a paid legal holiday for state employees. Private employers are not bound to these laws.

In June of 1870, Congress authorized four legal holidays (New Year's Day, Independence Day, Day of Thanksgiving, and Christmas Day) for federal employees within the District of Columbia. It wasn't until 1885 that holidays were extended to *some* government employees working outside DC, and 1919 until *all* federal employees were included. Of over 1,100 proposals to Congress since 1870, only eleven permanent federal holidays were authorized:

New Year's Day – 1870

Birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr. – 1983 – The most recent federal holiday, this date was proposed every year after Dr. King's assassination in 1968, and didn't take effect until 1986. This holiday was controversial in several states as well-taking years to pass in legislatures; given alternate names (Human Rights Day), or combined with

other holidays (Lee-Jackson Day). It was not celebrated on its own in all 50 states until 2000.

Inauguration Day (DC Metropolitan Area Only) - 1957 – A traditional local DC holiday made permanent.

Washington's Birthday – 1879 – Never changed to *Presidents Day* for the federal holiday.

Memorial Day – (*originally* Decoration Day) 1888 – Many federal employees were Union civil War veterans who wanted to honor their fallen comrades without losing wages to do so.

Independence Day – 1870

Labor Day – 1894 – Proposed to honor the 'nobility of labor' and to allow rest and recreation so that workmen can be 'more useful' as craftsmen.

Columbus Day – 1968 – Officially marked in 45 states prior to 1968, this holiday celebrates the courage and determination of Columbus and all immigrants who have found freedom and opportunity in America.

Veterans Day – (*originally* Armistice Day) 1938 – The truce ending World War I went into effect on the 'eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month', hence November 11. On June 1, 1954, US involvement in WWII and Korea prompted the name change and the broadening of the scope to include all veterans.

Thanksgiving Day – (*originally* 'a Day of Thanksgiving') 1870/1941 – In 1789, George Washington issued a proclamation calling for 'a day of public Thanksgiving and prayer' on November 26<sup>th</sup>. In 1795 he called for a second such day, but on February 19<sup>th</sup>. President Lincoln started the tradition of celebrating the last Thursday in November in 1863 and went legal in 1870. The date was changed to the *third* Thursday of November by FDR in 1939, hoping to stretch out the Christmas retail season. Within two years, tradi-

tion won out and in 1941 Roosevelt signed the law fixing Thanksgiving Day on the fourth Thursday in November.

Christmas Day – 1870

Monday Holidays – The 1968 legislation which created Columbus Day as the second Monday in October also changed the specific dates of Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, and Veterans Day to specific Mondays within the month, a move supported by both labor and businesses. In 1975, Veterans Day was changed back to November 11<sup>th</sup> because many states (and veterans groups) never changed to Mondays. The MLK holiday was later 'Monday' authorized.


### New Portal Administrator



# **Around the Region**

Arizona

Arizona readers are currently using *These is My Words* by Nancy E. Turner for the 2008 *OneBookAZ*. Kids are reading *Danger in the Desert* by Terri Fields. See <a href="http://onebookaz.org/">http://onebookaz.org/</a> for more information.

The Mesa School District proposed to eliminate all school librarians, nurses and speech pathologists in their school district. The Phoenix-area district has 87 schools and serves 74,000 students and has been one of the top school districts in the country. Librarians demonstrated at an April board meeting, carrying signs in support of the District's librarians.

Arizona is an active participant in TechSoup's *MaintainIT* project which produces *Cookbooks* that address common Library computer issues. The Cookbook Co-hort is a forum connecting librarians to discuss problems, projects and success stories. sen based on a survey which asked librarians from across the state for suggestions about new additional databases. The resource will be available to schools and libraries


throughout North Dakota after July 1.
