MPLA Board Meetings by Conference Call Proving Economical and Effective

Since 2006 the MPLA Executive Board has held many of its regular meetings by conference call, reducing the association's travel budget considerably. Board members have also found it an economical use of their time, with as many as 24 participating in a single meeting.

Board members submit written reports to the executive board e-list in advance of a meeting and Webmaster Dan Chaney posts them to the website in tandem with the meeting agenda. Most participants have access to a computer during the call and can view reports as relevant topics are discussed.

Committees also use conference calls in addition to e-mail to conduct business. The Professional Development Committee meets every other month by phone and in the past year the Nominating, Communications, Conference, and Administration

Committees have used conference calls.

MPLA uses PC-Conferencing, which provides on-demand calling and recording services.

Looking ahead, we are also excited that ALA Midwinter will be in an MPLA state – Colorado. ALA Councilors from


MPLA states are meeting with Shelly Walchak, the councilor from Colorado to see if we can assist her in any way.



The term 'sustainability' was brought to the world stage in 1987 with the publication of the United Nations' Report of the World Commission on Environment and Development. In its resolution to the General Assembly http://www.un.org/documents/ga/res/42/ares42-187.htm, the Commission defined sustainable development as "development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs." Sustainable Development brings together economic development and environmental protection to the benefit of both, at present and in the future. While the UN focuses on the global scale http://www.un.org/esa/sustdev/ index.html, the US federal government has taken steps to address this issue and provide information to citizens, businesses, and other constituents.

As you might imagine, the federal agency with a lot to offer in this area is the **Environmental Protection Agency** (**EPA**). The 'Sustainability' page http://www.epa.gov/sustainability/ has links to information and resources on the 'Built Environment'; Water, Ecosystems, and Agriculture;

Energy; and Materials and Toxics. There are also geographic links, subject links, and links for getting more involved.

FedCenter - the Federal Facilities Environmental Stewardship and Compliance Assistance
Center http://www.fedcenter.gov/ is a joint initiative of EPA's Office of Enforcement and Compliance Assurance (OECA), the Army Corps of Engineers' Construction Engineering Research Laboratory and the Office of the Federal Environmental Executive to create an all-services technical and compliance assistance center to help federal environmental officials better address their environmental needs.

The Green Suppliers Network http://www.greensuppliers.gov/gsn/home.gsn is a joint effort of the **EPA** and the **Department of Commerce** to help small and medium-sized manufacturers stay competitive and profitable while reducing their impact on the environment.

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

The full day workshop featured Christopher Harris, author of the *Infomancy* blog, who spoke on "Library 2.0: the Digital Reshift." Stevan Kalmon, Nance Nassar, and Sherry Crow provided an update to the AASL

Standards for the 21st Century Learner. Breakout sessions included "Web 2.0 Tools for the Librarian," "Blogs and Nings in the 21st Century School Library," and "Roaring Fork SD: Students take the Lead."

BCR's CDP has released the updated

Digital Imaging Best Practices, Version 2.0,
featuring new sections on digital cameras,
digital preservation and more. Sarah Goodwin Thiel, digital services librarian, University

Turner was recently chosen the new executive director of Jefferson County Public Library. He fills a vacancy created by the retirement of Bill Knott after 37 years at the Library's helm. Turner has been a



part of senior management since joining Jefferson County Public Library in 2002. For the last three years, he held dual roles as deputy county librarian and director of public services.

BCR recently completed a resource sharing study for the Texas State Library and Archives Commission. *Texas Resource Sharing: Examining the Present, Envisioning a Vibrant Future*, provides a review of current resource sharing literature and best practices as well as a workflow

and cost analysis of interlibrary loan centers currently providing services to Texas public libraries. In addition, an overview of alternative resource sharing solutions with a cost benefit analysis that considers financial, logistical and political costs is included.

Justine Shaffner has joined the staff at **BCR** as Public Library Market Coordinator. The new position reflects an organization-wide move by BCR to develop programs and add focus to specific library types.

The **Wilkinson Public Library** in Telluride is completing a space plan which includes new construction and rearranging space. The circulation department has been redesigned into two areas of expertise: customer service and "backroom stuff."

The Savage Library at Western State College is organizing its online resources, including both free and subscription databases, into an ELibrary for use by the College's various user communities. The online database is hosted on Google's App Engine.

The **Bud Werner Memorial Library** in Steamboat Springs is finishing construction on a new building and implementing E-commerce, Millennium graphical self-check, and the use of RFID tags. The library is also migrating the community information network to a new Open Source CMS platform called Drupal.

KANSAS

The **Dorothy Bramlage Public Library** recently received a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to host *The Big Read* in Junction City. The library is one of 208 libraries, municipalities, and arts, culture, higher education, and

science organizations to receive a grant to host The Big Read from September 2008-June 2009. The library will work with the Junction City High School, Cloud County Community College, the Friends of Animals, the Milford Nature Center, and others in the exploration of *The Call of the Wild*. MPLA member **Susan Moyer** is Library Director.

Turner Community Library, the newest library in Kansas City, Kansas, celebrated 100 days of service on July 3, 2008. TCL is a brand new, 1700 square foot library with a staff of six. Although small, it packs a big punch because it has available all of the Kansas City, Kansas Public Library services, including online databases and an online catalog, as well as an in-house twelve-station computer lab. The facility that houses Turner Community Library is a renovated high school which the Turner Recreation Commission operates as a Recreation Center. Special Big Read 2008 promotional coasters left in area coffeehouses by the Johnson County Library elicited comments from local bloggers. The coasters, along with multiple other promotional efforts, resulted in 160 million impressions for *The Big Read* from March-May of 2008.



The **Johnson County Library** updated and published its fold-out *Reading Around Kansas City Literary Map* especially for the Kansas City Literary Festival held in May. An estimated 15,000 people attended the Festival, which culminated JCL's *The Big Read 2008* programming featuring Dashiell Hammett's *The Maltese Falcon*. MPLA member **Julie Tomlianovich**, Youth Services Consultant for the South Central Kansas Library System, South Hutchinson, has been elected president of the national Collaborative Summer Library Program (CSLP). CSLP is a consortium of forty-seven states that provide

high-quality, summer reading program materials with a unified theme for children. Tomlianovich was recently elected at the consortium's annual conference in Little Rock, Arkansas.

MONTANA

The Hearst Free Library has announced September 13 as the date for the Third Annual "Reading the Greens" Golf Scramble at the Anaconda Country Club. The "Reader's Cup" will be awarded to a team with the lowest score and that includes at least one librarian. Last year's winners were Jeff Savage of the Great Falls Public Library and Tracy Cook of the Montana State Library.

MPLA member **Jim Connor** from the Trustee College Consulting Team spent a Two-week "Trustee Blitz" in May traveling to fifteen Montana public libraries to present training for trustees. The Blitz is funded by a Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant. The **Great Falls Public Library** holds its eighth annual Summer Music Series in the Library Park, behind the library. This year's line-up runs from July 10–August 28 and features an eclectic mix of music from the folk-rock sounds

of Sweet Potato Pie, jazz classics of Impromptu, country-western flavor of Stillhouse, to the standards of the Johnny Mack Dance Band, and more. It one of the library's most popular programs.

Pam Henley, Technology Assistant at the Bozeman Public Library is Montana's new representative to the MPLA Executive Board. Pam has been a member of MPLA since 1998.



The **Great Falls Public Library** is offering **Book Buzz**, an Adult Summer Reading Program. Patrons 19 years or older read as many books as they wish and may submit one entry form per book read. Prize winners will be drawn weekly and on August 15 a grand prize drawing will be held

from all the summer's entries. The drawings will be live on local radio stations. The library is also sponsoring a streamlined *Book Buzz* for staff. At the end of the program, in August, there will be one drawing from staff entries. The winner will be awarded four hours of comp time.



NEBRASKA

Carol J. Connor, Library Director, Lincoln City Libraries, will begin her retirement effective September 10, 2008, after 36 years with the library and an equal number of years as a member of MPLA. She began her MPLA membership as well as her career at Lincoln City Libraries in 1972 as a librarian in the Technical Processes Division. She has served as Library Director since 1978 and was MPLA's 1997-1998 President.

The Anderson Branch Library, Lincoln City Libraries, won the 2nd runner-up prize out of more than 200 entries from libraries nationwide in the 2008 *For Dummies Library Display Contest*. The library received twenty *For Dummies* books. The Anderson staff also received a trophy, a box of Dummies prizes and a pizza party.

The **Hooper Public Library** was the only Nebraska winner of the American Library Association's Dollar General sponsored literacy grant initiative, "The American Dream Starts @ your library." Thirty-four libraries in eighteen states received one-time grants of \$5,000 each. Each

library will promote adult English language literacy with the funding, in order to improve service to people who need to feel welcome as they assimilate into their communities.

A Nebraska Library Future Search Conference was held in early June. Fifty librarians and 30 non-librarians attended, including five teens. Becky Schreiber and John Shannon from Schreiber Shannon Associates led the two-day conference to bring a fresh perspective to Nebraska library service needs and to foster direction, partnerships and collaboration. Prior to the conference focus groups were held across the state to gain even more feedback. Information taken from the conference will be formatted so it is useable for all types of Nebraska libraries.

The **Nebraska Library Commission** sponsored a statewide Open Source ILS Symposium at the College of St. Mary in Omaha in May. Robert Molyneux of Equinox Software began the day by giving an overview of open source ILS applications. Representatives from Liblime and Equinox gave presentations as did staff from libraries using or in the process of implementing open source ILS applications.


After 38 years of library service, with 20 of them at the Boulder City Library, MPLA member **Duncan McCoy** retired. The staff at the


The Washoe County Library System Board of Trustees approved a reduction of library hours which took effect July 1. The adjustment is the result of cost-cutting measures taken by Washoe County to meet a shortfall in the 2008-09 budget. The new schedule reflects a decrease of 39.5 hours per week including 23 hours lost through the May 16 closure of Mendive Community Library. The Library System currently has 29 vacant positions that are frozen indefinitely. More vacancies are expected during the coming year.

NEW MEXICO

MPLA member **Susan Pinkerton** of Las Cruces was awarded the New Mexico Library Leadership Award. As the director of the library science program at NMSU-Doña Ana Community College, she developed an online curriculum leading to an associate of applied science degree and a certificate of completion in library science skills.

On May 6, First Lady of New Mexico Mrs. Barbara Richardson read *Diary of a Spider* by Doreen Cronin to a group of students at Santa Fe's Southside Library. Harry Bliss illustrated the book and also created all the artwork for this year's summer reading program. His artwork is on post-

ers, bookmarks, t-shirts, reading logs, and much more at libraries across the state this summer. The annual statewide summer reading program is sponsored by the New Mexico State Library.



NORTH DAKOTA

The Grand Forks Public Library staff and board are saddened by the death of Library Director **Dennis Page**. He died June 30.

From June 1-August 15, 2008, the **North Dakota State Library** will be offering a grant that is available to North Dakota citizens who are pursuing a Master's of Library Science degree from American Library Association accredited programs. Recipients are eligible for up to \$7,000, which can be used to pay for tuition, fees, and

textbooks. The grant is available for graduate work that takes place during the time period of July 1, 2007 – June 30, 2010. In an effort to encourage library professionals to live and work in North Dakota, the grant is being offered only to North Dakota residents. The grant also requires that any recipient must be employed in a North Dakota library within nine months of receiving a degree and must work for 24 months in a full time position in a North Dakota library after receiving a degree.

The **Kindred Community Library** celebrated the dedication of their recent remodeling proj-

ect and new flagpole. The dedication was the culmination of a remodeling project that started in February. Money was raised by fundraising and donations as well as having two major donors, the Edwin and Helen Overboe Foundation and a gift from Jean Hertsgaard in memory of Jean Darring. Three walls were removed and a door was covered. In addition, the library added lighting and new carpet.


There are no paid librarians at the Kindred Public Library which is staffed by volunteers.

UTAH

Representatives from Utah libraries joined Governor Jon M. Huntsman and First Lady Mary Kaye Huntsman for a ceremonial signing of Concurrent Resolution making a week every April as "Love Your Library" week. Mrs. Huntsman spoke on behalf of libraries.

The Cedar City Public Library and its director, Steve Decker, were featured in an article in the June 11 Cedar City Review. The library was awarded a "Picturing America Award" from the a National Endowment for the Humanities. The grant will bring 40 large reproductions of American art to the library in August.

The new **Utah Valley State College Digital Learning Center** opened July 1 when UVSC became Utah Valley University. The library was one of eight items required by the Board of Regents as necessary to support the newly-named university. With 190,000 square feet, the 48-million dollar library will host an information commons, four seminar rooms, four classrooms, an accessibil-

ity services lab, a deaf studies lab, three computer labs, a media production lab, the writing center, 33 group study rooms, an art gallery, a 150-person auditorium, and enough space to more than double its current holdings of 215,000 volumes.

The Utah Humanities Book Festival will take place October 25 at the **Salt Lake City Main Library**. **Hikmet Loe**, a former Utah Library Association President is organizing the festival.

The **Draper Branch of the Salt Lake County Library System** has received several awards in recognition of its environmentally friendly fea-

tures such as xeriscaping and using recycled materials. The awards include a *Leadership* in *Energy and Environmental Design* energy efficiency certification by the U. S. Green Building Council and an



Excellence in Sustainable Design Merit Award from the Utah Chapter of the American Institutes.

A new **Church History Library** of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, is currently under construction in Salt Laker City, with completion planned for the summer of 2009. The historical materials are currently housed in the east wing of the LDS Church Office Building. The new 230,000-square-foot library will have two types of archival storage rooms. The 10 main storage rooms will be kept at 55 degrees Fahrenheit with 35 percent relative humidity. There will also be two special rooms that will be kept at minus four degrees Fahrenheit for color motion picture films, photographs, and records of special significance to the LDS Church. Some of the items will be available in an open stacks reading room, while others will be located in archival storage rooms and delivered to patrons for use in a secure

reading room. In addition to more convenient hours, the building will use current technology, such as wireless connections, to enhance the experience of all customers, including those in remote locations. The current library serves about 13,000 people a year, with the staff preparing for increased public interest after the new building opens in 2009. The Church History Library will also meet high environmental standards. It will be certified as a "green" building through the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) rating system, which is the nationally accepted standard for the design, construction, and operation of environmentally-friendly buildings. The **Laramie County Library System** in Cheyenne was named **2008 Library of the Year**

dinary. LCLS's success is due in part to a recent and carefully planned vision that grew out of its relationship with patrons. After years of operating in a cramped and "dingy" environment, the library received 55 percent of the resident's votes for a proposition that added a one penny per dollar sales tax to the state's five percent for the sole purpose of building a new main library. The new library's design embraces the capital city's urban and civic character, as well as the wide open spaces of surrounding landscape. It also achieved a Silver certification as a LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design). MPLA member Lucie Osborn, Laramie County Librarian, received the award and \$10,000 cash prize during the annual American Library Association conference in Anaheim, CA. Teton County Library and Mexican theater Director Raúl Juárez offered a Spanish-language introduction to theatrical improvisation with an evening workshop series in June and July. The improv workshop, or Taller de improvisación teatral, was presented in Spanish.

Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library
Story Branch held a Book Discussion and Open
House with local author Sam Morton on his
book *Where the Rivers Run North*. Morton has
worked as a horse trainer in Northern Wyoming
and South Florida for over thirty years.

Starting in August, the Tongue River Branch of the Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library will host "Living Between Fences," a reading and discussion series in the Wyoming Humanities Council's Reading Wyoming program. Participants will read and discuss award winning titles House of Sand and Fog by Andre Dubus, Snow Falling on Cedars by David Guterson, Tortilla Curtain by T.C. Boyle, and The Work of Wolves by Kent Meyer. The discussion series is part of the "Between Fences" Smithsonian traveling exhibit that was on display at the Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library in spring 2008.

The **Teton County Library** offered a program in June on *Chado* - **The Japanese "Way of Tea"** with a tea tasting and lecture by University of Wyoming Professor and certified *Chado* practitioner Janice Harris.


