Let's really try to expand those membership numbers before the end of the calendar year! Thank you in advance for your help with this and all you do to make MPLA an excellent association.

Throughout her career Dorothy has held several offices in the South Dakota Library Association and the Mountain Plains Library Association including President, has been recognized by SDLA with the Librarian of the Year Award and the Distinguished Service Award, and has been recognized by the American Library Association with the Intellectual Freedom Award, and was named to the National Advocacy Honor Roll and the Freedom to Read 30th Anniversary Honor Roll.

Marilyn Hinshaw, long-time member and supporter of MPLA, MPLA President 1999-2000, and energy behind the MPLA Leadership Institute, is retiring December 31, 2008 from her position as Executive Director of the Eastern Oklahoma District Library System.

Marilyn started her career in the State Library of Kansas as public library consultant and became continuing education coordinator the following year. She then moved to El Paso, TX as branch coordinator, then established the Trans Pecos Library System and organized the regional effort to approve the Texas Library Systems law. Hired in 1978 as Head of Public Services for the Daniel Boone Regional Library, Columbia, Mo, she was promoted to Assistant Director after eighteen

months on the job. In 1982, Marilyn moved to the Eastern Oklahoma District Library as Executive Director.

Marilyn began working in the ALA Junior Members Round Table in 1973 and was elected its President in 1976-77. Following that term with election to ALA Council through 1981 she then had a term as chair of the ALA Awards Committee. Working in Oklahoma, she was Legislative Chair in 1984 and was selected OLA President for 1985-86. Following that office, she went back to ALA service, was elected President of PLA's Small and Medium Sized Library Section and two years later was president of the Metropolitan Library Section and then served the PLA Board as liaison to the Association of Library Trustees and Advocates. In 1999, she was elected President of MPLA, began the first long range planning work by the MPLA Board, and as past president, headed the Leadership Institute Committee.

If that wasn't enough, Marilyn served on ALA Council again from 2003-2006 and from 2004 on was concurrently appointed to the Budget Analysis and Review Committee and served as chair through the 2008 conference. Elected to ALA Council again in last Spring's elections, she is currently serving on Council a third time for the 2009-2011 term.

Newsletter Notes

Following President Rob Banks' request to members to update their directory profiles, almost half of members have chosen to view the *MPLA Newsletter* online-only, thus reducing printing and mailing costs for the association.



Some facts about the MPLA Newsletter:

- In May 1956, the association's journal, The Mountain-Plains Library *Quarterly*, Vol. 1, No. 1, was published
- In 1975, in order to reduce costs which were at least \$6,000 annually for the journal, the MPLA Board discontinued the *Quarterly* in favor of a bi-monthly *MPLA Newsletter*. It continues in this format today.
- 2008 Newsletter total printing and mailing cost will be just under \$7,000. Annual cost per recipient receiving by mail is about \$9.50.
- Advertising revenue for 2008 will be about \$770.
- The non-profit postal rate for bulk mailing is currently 42 cents each newsletter. Beginning in October the Post Office charges for address corrections. The current annual cost of MPLA's bulk-mailing permit is \$180. In order to keep a non-profit permit, an organization is required to do at least one mailing every 2 years of at least 200 pieces.
- The Editor's stipend is currently \$270/issue.
- The Executive Secretary is responsible for mailing lists, labeling, and preparing the bulk mailings.
- The Newsletter Editor's contract is separate from the Executive Secretary position, though Judy Zelenski holds both posts at this time.

MPLA's Communication Committee oversees newsletter policies. Contact current chair Mary Ann Thompson with policy suggestions (mthompso@fhsu.edu). News and photos for consideration are always welcome. Send to Judy Zelenski, Editor (judyz@operamail.com). Deadlines are January 1, March 1, May 1, July 1, September 1, and November 1.





Memo from Marilyn

October, 2008

Dear Friends and Colleagues

At the end of December I am retiring. It's been a good long while and a great time in history to take a rural public library district from a \$700k budget to \$4.5 million, from 10 branches to 15 and from sending home 300,000 items to 1,096,000 in FY 2008. Then there is the addition of computer connections with some 250,000 computer uses this year across our fifteen branches in this rural area. We have opened the electronic horizon to people who would never have a ghost of a chance to participate otherwise.

The greatest reward of all is how many people at any level of responsibility, and pay, in library systems where I have worked have become full participants in library learning – from state library certification as a library clerk to earning a master's in library education to the highest levels of association leadership. I thank them all for the joy of witnessing transformation and, on occasion, being included in discussion of a career choice.

Always I will thank my friends and colleagues in the associations that have been my succor and support — the Mountain Plains Library Association where devotion to working in rural areas of the mid-American landscape is tantamount to taking vows, with the result that it nurtures a well of outstanding library service; the American Library Association, especially for the jump start that was the Junior Members Round Table with a class of leaders who are still great friends; to the Oklahoma, Missouri, Texas and Kansas Library Associations. All of them gave me the arenas to practice politics of the best kind — the kind that improve libraries for generations to come.

I walked this road beginning at age 16 in a small library of 3 staff members, merging with classmates at Emporia State University's SLIM program, then joining hands through the years with great staff members and with colleagues who have gifted me with intellectual and professional survival. I have been sustained for the last 26 years by an ever renewed phalanx of terrific and dedicated Board of Trustee members who had faith in me and my plans to strengthen and diversify library service. Their policies staffed our branch libraries with people who respond to the reward of becoming fully engaged participants with frequently renewed skills by continuous training. Through that we brought about a thriving library environment, the best possible description of the Eastern Oklahoma District Library System and its community branch libraries.

Retirement by another name should be thanksgiving; for the memories of 38 years of great places to work with great companions and dear friends in the cause of America's libraries. We must keep libraries at the center of the life of the mind in all our communities, neighborhoods, schools, colleges and universities as we do daily battle to challenge the narrow minded demagogy that so easily multiplies around us. Our task is no simple one. It is to offer and defend freely available information for free choices that will keep the light of our democracy shining!

Around the Region

Arizona

The University of Arizona's School of Information Resources and Library **Science** received a three-year grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services that will allow for a hands-on approach to teaching and learning digital library technologies. The grant totals nearly \$540,000, with a matching award of about \$328,000. The project, "Improving Student Learning of Advanced Digital Technologies in an Online Laboratory: A Research Approach" is meant to bring to the classroom the type of learning that students would have had to seek out in internships. The school's partners are the UA Libraries, UA University Information and Technology Services, the Harvard University Herbaria and the Missouri Botanical Gardens. Each of the partner institutions will provide with information that will be recorded and catalogued, then developed into databases by students.

Arizona State Library and Pima County Public Library recently launched *Baker's Dozen: Learning 2.0 Arizona*, a statewide learning program designed to encourage library staff in Arizona to experiment and learn about new and emerging technologies and how information is used and created on the Internet today. Colorado

BCR's Collaborative Digitization Program,

the nationally recognized digitization collaborative, celebrates 10 years of access, training and service to the cultural heritage community. It originated as a state-based Colorado Digitization Project and in April 2007, the CDP merged into BCR.

The **Colorado Association of Libraries** (CAL) conference held its second annual job fair, coordinated by **Art Glover**, Associate Director of Human Services

for the Douglas County Libraries. There was no fee for participation.


Anne Marie Lyons joined BCR as Digital Initiatives Trainer, filling a newly created position in BCR Training & OCLC Services.

Before joining BCR, Lyons worked for National Public Radio and the National Security Archive, Washington, D.C. Her library experience includes work at the Van Deusen Post Library, the Picatinny Arsenal and Rutgers University, all in New Jersey.

The Library and Information Science Program at the University of Denver and its partners, the Westminster Law Library and the Sturm College of Law, will recruit and educate ten new law librarians with a grant of \$999,360 from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. The grant was one of 31 awards given to institutions nationwide as part of a \$20.3 million initiative of the Laura Bush 21st Century Librarian Program. Kansas

The Northeast Kansas Library System and the Topeka and Shawnee County Public Library held its third annual *Celebrate the Book! A Regional Readers' Advisory Conference* on November 7 at the Topeka and Shawnee County Public Library. The featured speaker was nationally recognized Reader's Advisory guru Michael Gannon, regular reviewer for *Booklist* and the author of *Blood, Bedlam, Bullets, and Badguys: A Reader's Guide to Adventure/Suspense Fiction.*

The **Johnson County Library** received a grant of \$38,922.94 from the Johnson County Heritage Trust Fund for its *Digital Cemetery Project*. Library staff will complete and format an inventory of Johnson County cemeteries, accessible on JoCoHistory.net, which will include names, dates, grave locations, and photographs of grave markers. Total project cost is \$61,860, with the remainder of the funding provided by the library.

Tom Taylor is the new South Central Kansas Library System Continuing Education Coordinator. He is responsible for planning and organizing the annual program of continuing education and training for SCKLS member libraries. Taylor has a Masters of Library and Information Science degree from the University of South Florida in Tampa. His undergraduate

degree in history is from Bethel College, North Newton, KS. His library experience includes work in two public libraries and one academic library and he served as the Supervisor of Public Relations, Special Services and Assistant Automation Consultant at the Newton, KS Public Library during 2001 to 2006. Taylor recently relocated to Wichita from Clearwater, Florida.



Dodge City Public Library Foundation recently held their second annual Wine & Cheese Fundraiser. Utah




