
The focus of our meeting was the 2010 Leadership Institute. We had several decisions to make in regards to the Institute. Three important decisions discussed and passed by the board were:






Never Talk About Religion or Politics

Believing with you that religion is a matter which lies solely between man and his god, that he owes account to none other for his faith or his worship, that the legitimate powers of government reach actions only, and not opinions, I contemplate with sovereign reverence that act of the whole American people which declared that their legislature should make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, thus building a wall of separation between church and state. - Thomas Jefferson

There is no doubt that religion is a force that shapes who we are individually and collectively. We have a right to choose and practice our religion. Government is there to make and enforce rules, laws, and regulations, and to make sure that individuals and groups in the minority are protected. There has always been, and will continue to be tension in the way they coexist and the interpretation of the roles they should and shouldn't play in our lives as Americans. Jefferson's famous quote is an interpretation that places religion in the realm of individual rights

to be protected; but, recognizing the varieties of religious experience, not endorse any particular means of worship lest in infringe on the individual rights of others.

Because religion and government are such powerful forces for so many people in the United States, interpretation of rights and policies is a very delicate matter. How is religion taught in schools, how do schools address the rights of individuals of differing religions (or those with no religion)? And how have religion and the role of government shaped politics? What do we expect from our elected officials with regards to this balance? I've got my opinion, but since you should never talk about religion or politics, I'll just give you some resources...

ARIZONA

Arizona Library Association

Conference will be held in Glendale, December 7-9. This year's theme is "Libraries Lighting the Way."

Arizona State Library, Archives & Public Records is offering a Brain Boxes and Infant Brain Development program on October 9. Rachel Lam, Program Coordinator for Curriculum Development at New Directions Institute for Infant Brain Development, will present early brain development in the context of early literacy, based on the Brain Box learning system. Ms. Lam will then model Brain Time programming and give participants time to share ideas about circulating Brain Boxes and using them with families of children 0-5 in the library.

Arizona State University Libraries – Check out the cool "Library Minute" hosted by Anali Perry. Library Minute: Fun Things To Do At The Libraries will give you ideas on how to kick back with fun and relaxing things you can do at the libraries.



The University of Arizona presented the Robert Mapplethorpe: Portraits exhibit at the Center for Creative Photography. Robert Mapplethorpe (1946-1989) became known for his focus on several subjects, from portraits to still lifes, from classical sculptures to contemporary nudes, some of which made him at least temporarily notorious. His most lasting legacy,

however, is his portraiture, which reflects and embodies the New York cultural milieu of the late 1970s and the 1980s. This exhibition is organized by the Palm Springs Art Museum, Palm Springs, California, with the assistance of Guest Curator Gordon Baldwin and sponsored in part by the Helene & Lou Galen Exhibition Fund and the Faye & Herman Sarkowsky Exhibition Fund.

The Colorado Association of Libraries

(CAL) will hold its second Events & Service Auction to benefit scholarship funds through the Colorado Library Educational Foundation (CLEF). Unlike other auctions of actual items, an events & service auction offers events such as an authentic Chinese dinner cooked in your home or a guided wildflower hike, and on services such as personal shopping assistance or custom knitted clothing. The event & service providers will be generously donating their time and materials, with all the proceeds going directly to scholarships for CAL events. The auction will be held during the 2009 annual CAL conference.

In July the **CAL Leadership Institute** participants gathered for a full day session that included attending part of the CAL Board Retreat. Participants observed the CAL Board in action and spent the remainder of the day in a session on Ethics. In the coming months, the participants will be exploring their final learning topics; facilitation, project management, and future casting. The final session is in November at the CAL Conference.

The CASL (Colorado Association of School Libraries) Kick-off to the Colorado Technology in Education Conference (TIE: http://www.tiecolorado.org) was a huge success, with over 120 librarians and educators in attendance. Guest presenter, Dr. David Loertscher spoke about his book *The New Learning Commons Where Learners Win! Reinventing School*

KANSAS

COURIERS

Libraries across Kansas collaborated on the development of a new interlibrary courier delivery

which began service in July. The courier service replaces the use of the US Postal Service to exchange and loan books between more than 200 libraries. In

service, Kansas Library Express,

just one month, there were 32,000 items sent – an average of 215 per library, based

on reports from 150 libraries. Many smaller libraries have already sent as many items in a month as they sent in all of 2008. In Kansas, the average cost of delivery per item by courier for July was approximately \$1. Use of the postal system would cost approximately \$2 per item, representing a 50% savings.

The **State Library of Kansas** continues to be a hub for homework help through **HomeworkKansas**, the popular contract service for online homework assistance through Tutor.com. The service has been renewed by the Kansas legislature with funding from another state agency. In addition to providing help for all students—kindergarten through adult education and college students—the service has greatly expanded hours—8 a.m. to 11 p.m. every day. Subjects for assistance include math, science, English and social studies. Assistance in Spanish is offered in the subject areas of math, science and social studies. New to the service are college entrance practice tests like ACT and SAT, graduate school exams like GRE and LSAT, Advanced Placement, ASVAB and TOEFL,

and GED prep tests. HomeworkKansas will also offer assistance with job searches, sample resumes and cover letters, financial literacy and assistance with proofreading of papers.

Over 300 people attended ceremonies to mark the opening of the new **Bonner Springs City** Library on July 12. Features of the new library include 12 new computers and a Kansas Room for history and genealogy. Bonner Springs City Library's director is **Kimberly Martin Beets**, who was a 2004 alumna of the MPLA Leadership Institute.




The annual Readers' Advisory Conference hosted by **Topeka and Shawnee County Public Library** and co sponsored by **NEKLS** will be November 6. Opportunities are available for those who would like to share their enthusiasm for a genre, reading related technology, or readers' advisory topic. The **Johnson County Library**, with 13 public outlets and nearly 1.2 million items, started floating collections in September. After a successful summer pillot with audiovisual materials, managers decided to float all materials – with very few exceptions – to gain efficiencies and savings. This means that items will be shelved in the library facility where they are returned, rather than being couriered back to an owning facility.

One hundred and twenty-eight Kansas public library trustees have been certified to date, largely through the **Statewide Trustee Training** sessions available through the ELMeR video network. The

statewide video training will be offered again in October 2009 and October 2010. Both training seasons will cover five trustee core skills in two workshops and attendance at both will qualify a trustee for cer-

tification. Trustees are also qualified to enroll in courses on WebJunction Kansas. Access to these courses has been paid by the **State Library of Kansas** and is offered free of charge to Kansas library workers and trustees.



The authors of *Four Ordinary Women: A Gathering at the Cedar Roe Library* (Seven Locks Press, 2009) convened their writing group at the branch of the Johnson County Library to share reflections on their lives – culminating in this book. All four women had grown up using that library, still lived or worked nearby, and turned to it as a venue for their group meetings. A Meet-the-Authors event at the library honored the authors and introduced the book to their neighbors.

Sixty-five Kansas educators attended the 13th Annual *Kansas Summer Institute for School Librarians* in June at Emporia State University. Eighty educators, including reading specialists, classroom teachers and school librarians, spent two days covering strategies to benefit students through more individual attention,

better-designed lessons, access to information at the point of need, access to multiple resources, deeper investigation into concepts and topics, integrated learning, expanded opportunities for creativity, and acquiring reading skills for lifelong learning.

The National Association of Counties (NACo) has recognized the **Johnson County Library**'s *Leadership Development Program* with an Achievement Award, presented at the NACo national conference in July. This program is currently in its second two-year cycle and has graduated 40 staff members. The library also won six Awards of Excellence from the National Association of County Information Officers (NACIO) for various programs.

MONTANA

More libraries will be joining the **MontanaLibrary2Go** downloadable audiobook project in the coming months. Patrons from subscribing libraries can download audiobooks to their MP3 players or iPods, with costs shared among all participating libraries.

The **Montana State Library** again sponsored a Fall Workshop in Great Falls September 11 and 12.

The free workshop offered learning opportunities on many topics, including working with tribal nations, customer service, and conflict resolution.

Lewis and Clark Public Library hosted two Mark Twain programs as part of their Foundation's Stephen Ambrose Memorial Lecture. *Mark Twain in Montana*, chronicling Mark Twain's Montana experiences, and *The Banning of Huckleberry Finn* are both first-person presentations by Michael Delaney. The programs are part of the Humanities Montana Speakers Bureau, and are funded in part by a legislative grant from Montana's Cultural Trust and NEH's "We the People" program.

The **Hearst Free Library** in Anaconda hosts their 4th Reading the Greens golf scramble. This year



they obtained sponsorship from Debra Gorman-Badar of Anaconda Physical Therapy (cost of food and beverages); the Morris Family Fund of Anaconda Community Foundation (major prizes and prize money for winning teams).; and Covenant Aviation Security (all of the greens fees and goodie

bags containing tournament hats and a sleeve of personalized golf balls for every golfer).

Western States and Territories Preservation

Assistance Service (WESTPAS) is offering a free 2- part workshop "Protecting Library & Archives Collections: Disaster Preparedness, Response & Recovery" in Bozeman and Great Falls in September & October. The workshops are offered free in cooperation with the Montana Historical Society and supported by

the **Montana Historical Society** and supported by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

NEBRASKA

Central Community College is offering a new statewide online program for Nebraskans who want to work in libraries. Students in the new library and information services (LIS) program will develop practical skills in acquisition, processing and circulation of all types of information resources. The focus will be on library management in small rural libraries as well as assistance in large more urban resource centers. The LIS program replaces one that was

offered jointly by Nebraska's six community colleges, with each college offering one or two courses online. By completing additional requirements from Central Community College, students can earn an associate of arts degree designed to transfer to the University of Nebraska at Omaha, which offers three options for LIS transfer students.

The 100 Years of Fashions Event and an afternoon tea was held at the Lyons Public Library. Many ladies came in hats and several teens helped as servers for the event. It was sponsored by Friends of the Library as part of the town's 125th anniversary celebration.

The year 2009 marks 125 years for **Bruun Memorial Library** in Humboldt, and is celebrated with a variety of contests, guessing games and events. In May, the month the library originally opened, 29 quilts were on display, book-bling (a beaded book mark) was given away and several visual scavenger hunts were held.

The **Nebraska Library Association** Board of Directors approved the move of the association's print journal, the *NLAQ*, to become an electronic journal. Member surveys supported the move. The change should occur with the Spring 2010 issue.

The **Nebraska Leadership Institute** was held in July. Participants worked together to compile their 2009 vision statement:

- We, the Nebraska Library Leadership Institute class of 2009, work collaboratively to bridge the gap among all types of libraries to achieve the goal of enriching lives and the communities we serve. With one voice, we commit ourselves to the following actions to reach this vision:
- We develop libraries as community hubs, bringing together resources and facilities at a cost savings to our constituencies
- We recognize the need for sustainable, ecofriendly design as we grow to meet our consumer's needs
- We cultivate community partnerships to maximize the return on financial investments
- We enrich lives by providing recreational,

educational, and literacy services

- We celebrate the changing diversity in our communities with our staff, collections, and programs
- We foster lifelong learning, encouraging customers to transform information and ideas into usable knowledge
- We attract, train, and retain exceptional leaders
- We actively seek new ways to harness the Internet so that all citizens can find the information and entertainment they seek without going to library school
- Nebraska's libraries school, academic, public, and special serve as gateways to an ever-growing world of information. Through our service, we guide our citizens, students and leaders in their pursuit of knowledge, enjoyment and lifelong learning.

NEVADA

Henderson Libraries James I. Gibson Library

— named for the former resident and state senator who was instrumental in obtaining funding for the branch's current building next to Henderson City Hall — is expected to move next April from its current site to the new one. Ground breaking for the new library was held in July with Henderson dignitaries and officials turning the first shovels of dust and rocks to launch construction of the new downtown library branch. The new site will increase the branch's square footage by 5,000 to almost 20,000 square feet,

which will allow for a 25-station computer lab, class-rooms and increased parking. It will also offer a drive-through service for patrons to reserve materials online and collect them at a pick-up window. The new branch has a price tag of about \$2.6 million, which is roughly \$2 million less than what the district estimated a couple of years ago. Henderson Libraries Executive Director Tom Fay said the lower price tag was made possible by lower construction costs brought on by the recession — the same recession, he said, that has pushed library usage to unprecedented levels and necessitated a bigger facility.

The Las Vegas-Clark County Library District held a groundbreaking ceremony in June to mark the onset of the construction of the new Southwest Library and Service Center. It will be built on a 15-acre site containing a 27,096-square foot library, a 300-seat auditorium and additional shell space of 11,342-square feet for future growth. An 86,617-square-foot service center will house District administrative offices, support functions and centralized materials processing center. The library will open in March 2011.

Carson City Library

Foundation's Annual Oktoberfest was held September 19 and featured several changes to the annual fundraiser. It took place at the Carson City Library on the library's parking lot, the



library's front lawn and the library's Secret Garden. A major sponsor, the *Carson Nugget*, oversaw the sausage grilling. Friends provided the Carson City version of *die Budenstrasse*, the famous fairway at the Oktoberfest in Munich, Germany, by hosting their own *Buchenstrasse*, a pathway of hundreds of gently, used books.

North Las Vegas Library recently conducted a survey for citizen feedback. Results showed an increased interest in e-books. Most agreed with a twenty item check-out limit. Location was a major factor in not using the library, along with lack of materials, lack of interest, restrictive circulation policies, and fines.

The Downtown **Reno Library** is currently reorganizing the physical layout of their building by consolidating service desks and moving computers and furniture to better utilize staff.

Dianne Varnon, Associate Library Director of Operations and Services for **Washoe County Library** expressed her appreciation to **June Burton**, retiring Library Trustee and current Chair of the Library Board, adding that she has been a superb advocate of the library and instrumental in convincing the State Legislature to place the State Grant in Aid funds into the regular budget.

NEW MEXICO

Two New Mexico tribal libraries will receive Native American Library Services Enhancement grants from Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) this year. **Pueblo of Santa Clara** will have an award of \$150,000 and **Pueblo of Pojoaque** will get \$132,466 to carry out literacy-related programs in their communities.

Dainetta Kroeker is the new director at Tucumcari Public Library following Mary Ann Molinas' retirement. She was formerly the youth services librarian. Dainetta started as a temporary employee, then moved to Library Clerk Aid, to Children's Librarian, to Assistant Librarian, and now Library Director.

NORTH DAKOTA

The blue sky that hangs overhead now has clouds. These clouds will not produce rain, but awe and amazement in the eyes of young children when the new children's library opens at the **Bismarck Public Library**. The children's section is getting a makeover. The new children's library will feature carpeting that depicts blue meandering "river" and "green



grass" as well as artist Ric Spryncynatyk's famous blue sky and cloud ceiling paint job. In addition, the new children's library will have a story room and

crafts area, a tiered mini-amphitheatre, reading areas, as well as study rooms. The project is on schedule to meet its completion dates.

For many years the **North Dakota State Library** has supported the education of professional librarians in North Dakota. Until now, individuals who were interested in pursuing a career as a librarian only had a few chances throughout the year to apply for the State Library funded Master of Library and Information Science grant, but now all that has changed. The Master of Library and Information Science (MLIS) grant is now being offered on an ongoing basis, with applications being accepted at any time throughout the year. This change allows the State Library to be more accommodating to students who are overloaded with deadlines and workloads. The grant, which requires that recipients be North Dakota citizens and also be enrolled in an American Library Association accredited school, may be used to pay tuition, university fees, and textbooks required to complete the course of study. Grant recipients must work full-time in a North Dakota library for two years following the completion of their degree.

The **Bowman Public Library** received quite a shock recently. During one of this summer's severe rainstorms, the library took a direct hit from a lightning bolt which took out their internet connection.

With the help of Consolidated Telcom, their local telephone and networking cooperative, the Bowman Public Library got their service restored with only a few minor glitches.



The **Grand Forks Public Library** held a "Celebrate Librarians" event and invited the community to meet **Wendy Wendt**, the new library director, and **Aaron Stefanich**, their new children's librarian. It featured refreshments, door prizes and a slideshow

In June, the **Logan County** Commission approved a bid for a new bookmobile to serve LaMoure and Logan Counties. Matthews Specialty Vehicles of North Carolina will build the new bookmobile.

OKLAHOMA

The **Oklahoma Library Association** is sponsoring an October workshop in Oklahoma City on "Working Together Apart: Using New Technology to Improve Organizational Communication." Topics include hands-on presentations following communications methods: Blogs, Facebook, Twitter, RSS Feeds & Readers, Airset, and ThinkFree.

The **Oklahoma Department of Libraries** U.S. Government Information Office has launched a new monthly feature. *Oklahoma Data Lasso* is a file of recent federal information relevant to the Sooner State. The debut list includes access to information on H1N1 flu, health insurance for Oklahoma counties, the latest energy profile of the state, and an online tool for finding private schools.

Oral History for the 21st Century, a two day symposium is scheduled for November 12-13 in Oklahoma City. Donald Ritchie, Historian for the U.S. Senate, past president of the Oral History Association, and author of *Doing Oral History: A Practical Guide*, will be joined by oral historians in the state to share expert advice on conducting meaningful interviews and better managing oral history projects.

SOUTH DAKOTA

According to MPLA South Dakota Representative **Mike Mullin**, some 40+ library people have been attending summer school from home and work thanks to the South Dakota State Library. They have been doing a series of web 2.0 exercises and having a lot of fun. Check out their blogs and the exercises at http://sdlibrarychallenge.blogspot.com/.

Laura Olson is the new Executive Secretary/Treasurer of the South Dakota Library Association. She was previously a librarian at Mears Library, University of Sioux Falls. She replaces **Brenda Hemmelman** who served in the position for almost 10 years.

Michelle May, Oglala Lakota College Library Director, is a 2009 ALA Spectrum Scholarship recipient. Spectrum specifically addresses the underrepresentation of librarians of color within the current workforce. To this end, over 560 students from traditionally underrepresented groups have received scholarships, leadership training, professional networking and mentoring in order to build a diverse pool of talented and trained individuals reflective of the populations served by all libraries.

Award winning librarian, author and reviewer Nancy Pearl spoke at the Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library in September. She gave an evening presentation for the public and a daytime Readers' Advisory workshop for staff members of Wyoming libraries. The programs were sponsored by the Friends of the Library Board.

The **Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library** hosted an art exhibit in September, *Two Takes on Landscapes* by Alice Fuller and Dr. Charlie Walter.

The Natrona County Public Library is helping patrons with financial matters through the second portion of a "Smart Investing @ your library" series. The series is part of a two-year grant program received from the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA) with support from ALA. This October, NCPL will offer a series of investing workshops taught by local financial professionals covering topics such as investing for retirement, stocks, bonds and mutual funds. - * Quality of organization (15 points)
- * Quality of presentation, use of visuals, etc. (15 points)


