## President's Message

I'm fresh from the MPLA/OLA joint conference where we had great programs, interesting speakers, and a really fun social event. Oklahoma librarians know how to have a good time and how to create amazing new fashion trends. The MPLA Executive Board approved a new long range plan at its April 21 meeting. Among the goals set was our desire to "maintain a vibrant and ever growing membership base and strengthen support and collaboration at the state, regional and national levels." Like many organizations in these tough economic times and in an era of few people joining any type of organization, MPLA membership is slipping

slightly. The Executive Board would like to reverse that slippage and intends to do more with membership recruitment and retention.

Related to this topic was a program I attended at MPLA/OLA presented by Amalia Monroe, a University of Kansas librarian, entitled "Recruiting and Retaining Millennial Members in Library Associations." The report is the result of a survey targeting library school students and library workers born after 1978 (the "millennial" generation) completed by Team L of the 2009 ALA Emerging Leaders Program, regarding membership in professional organizations.

The top reasons millennials join, according to the survey, was for professional development and networking opportunities. The key to keeping young people, and likely all of us, in an organization was the demonstrated value of membership: Did we get enough from the organization to justify the cost of dues?

The value of an organization is based both on what you get from it, but also what you put into it. We'll explore what you can get from and give to MPLA next month. (Don't you love continuations?)

## MPLA 2010 Leadership Institute

Thirty participants and four mentors completed the MPLA 2010 Library Leadership Institute at the end of April in Estes Park Colorado. The Institute was facilitated by Maureen Sullivan, ACRL 2010 Academic/Research Librarian of the Year. Innovative Interfaces contributed \$2500 to the Institute and EBSCO contributed \$750. MPLA subsidized a major portion of the Institute from its budget.

The weather offered a little of everything for the participants coming from the 12 MPLA states: sun, rain, snow and wind. Elk grazed outside the lodge and a coyote passed by regularly. Signs warned of bears, but none were sighted.

Topics included Principles and Practices of Effective Leadership; Understanding your Work & Leadership Styles; Interpersonal Communication; Managing Differences; Risk Taking; Using Power & Influence; Leading Change; Creating a Culture of Commitment; Group Problem Solving and Decision Making; Project Planning & Management; Achieving Your Potential: Personal Planning.

Arizona

Arizona State Librarian **GladysAnn Wells** has been busy fielding media inquiries from around the

country about the discovery of the original O.K. Corral inquest. The Oct 26, 1881 incident has become internationally known. Lawman Wyatt Earp, along with

Doc Holliday and Virgil and Morgan Earp, confronted Ike and Billy Clanton and Frank and Tom McLaury. That shootout has been chronicled in books and movies and has become part of the legend of Tombstone, AZ. The coroner inquest documents had been stored away and forgotten for half a century until the two clerks were cleaning out a closet at the Cochise County Superior Court in Bisbee, Ariz. On Wednesday April 21, the yellowed and taped original hand-written minutes of that inquest made their way to the state Department of Library and Archives, where officials hope to properly preserve the papers for generations to come. Jamie A. Lee, University of Arizona SIRLS student, independent documentary filmmaker and Project Director of the Arizona LGBT Storytelling Project, has been nominated for a 2010 Governor's Arts Award in the Artist



category. Lee is among seventy-eight nominees in five categories and one of twenty in the Artist category who will be recognized at this year's 29th annual celebration. Lee was nominated for her work connecting her art of filmmaking to community activism.

University of Arizona SIRLS Professor **Cheryl Knott Malone** has received two grants in support of

new research on the print culture of the environmental movement. The LBJ Foundation awarded her a Moody Grant for travel to the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library in Austin. She also received a John F. Kennedy Library Foundation Research Grant for travel to the JFK Library



in Boston. Both libraries hold records related to the work of Stewart L. Udall, Secretary of the Interior under Presidents Kennedy and Johnson, who helped shape the print culture of the environmental movement with his book *The Quiet Crisis*.

Colorado

Colorado is a member of the <u>Collaborative</u> <u>Summer Library Program</u>, a (CSLP) grassroots consortium of states working together to provide highquality summer reading program materials for children at the lowest cost possible for their public libraries. CSLP began in 1987 when ten Minnesota regional library systems developed a summer library program for children, choosing a theme, creating artwork and selecting incentives that public libraries in the regions could purchase and use. CSLP continues to evolve, but its guiding principle remains the same, librarians sharing ideas, expertise and costs to produce a high-quality summer reading program for children.

The **Colorado Academic Library Consortium** presented the 2010 CALC Summit on May 20-21. The fourth Summit focused on ways that academic libraries can forge lasting, effective partnerships both within and outside their institutions.

The 41<sup>st</sup> annual **Colorado Interlibrary Loan Conference** was be held April 29-30, in Estes Park. With the MPLA Library Leadership Institute happening at the same time in Estes Park, several Institute participants were able to visit the reception.

A radio spot recently aired on local program on Colorado Public Radio highlighting libraries roles as job centers, with examples from throughout public libraries. Included was an interview with Mary Stansbury of the University of Denver Library and Megan Kinney from the Denver Public Library.

The Kansas Library Association annual conference was held April 7-9, 2010, at the Hyatt Regency/ Century II Convention Center in Wichita. The two new officers announced following elections were Second Vice President Mickey Coalwell, who will continue to serve concurrently as the Kansas representative to MPLA, and Cindi Hickey, Secretary.

Meals on Wheels (MOW) menus in March carried information on the reverse side – a **Johnson County Library** HomeConnect homebound service registration form, a listing of nutrition- and healthrelated books, and a reminder that these and other books could be delivered to MOW recipients at home. Cedar Roe Neighborhood Library Manager **Meredith Roberson** devised the bibliography and promotion.

Kansas has a new State Librarian, **Joanne (Jo) Budler**. For the past five years she served as the Ohio State Librarian. Previously, Budler was the deputy state librarian for the Library of Michigan and the director of Network Services and NEBASE, Nebraska's online computer library center network. She holds a master's degree in library science and a master's of fine arts in Writers' Workshop, both from the University of Iowa. Budler began her tenure as Kansas State Librarian on March 15, following confirmation by the Kansas Legislature.



With a giant balloon dragon wafting overhead – almost the length of the library – the Fourth Annual **Asian Heritage Festival** at Johnson County Library Blue Valley Neighborhood Library hosted 1,829 people in five hours. Branch Manager **Robert Barr** notes that participating groups donate "easily" \$7,000 in food, supplies, and talent for the event, while the library's budget for it is just \$1,000. In that spirit, the balloon dragon was created on-site and donated by a local company called Up, Up, and Away. Web Content Developer **Josh Neff**, Johnson County Library, has been named a **2010 "Mover & Shaker**" by *Library Journal*, along with **Steve Law**-

son, a librarian at Colorado College, Colorado Springs. They were recognized in the Change Agents category for starting the Library Society of the World (LSW), an online social network that acts as an alternative library association. Neff is



also a co-organizer of the now-annual Library Camp Kansas "unconference."

Digital screens went live on March 15 in all 13 locations of the **Johnson County Library**. Continuous slide shows feature library-wide promotional priorities, established monthly by a Promotions Committee. Images and messages are synchronized with the library's Web site, <u>www.jocolibrary.org</u>, for a unified message to the public. The 13 digital screens were funded by the Friends of the Johnson County Library.

Inspired by poetry and children's literature, the Third Annual **Poetry in Motion: Runway & Rhymes** showcased 27 young ladies modeling 32 looks from

seven teen designers and two local boutiques, alternating with five teen poets who presented their original works. Approximately 140 fans participated in the Saturday evening event at **Central Resource Johnson County Library**.



The Kansas Library Trustee Certification Program continued to flourish through the winter of 2009-2010. A large number of trustees completed their core skill credits and achieved certification. The use of board tutorials and viewings of the Wyoming Trustee Trouble videos have been very successful in many libraries, especially in Southeast Kansas, where the program has been added to the criteria for system funding. Kansas now has 327 certified trustees.

Montana

The Treasure State Award winner for 2010 is *Two Bobbies: A True Story of Hurricane Katrina, Friendship, and Survival* by Kirby Larson and Mary Nethery. The Treasure State Award went to a picture book and is voted on by students in grades K-3. Established in 1990 by two Montana librarians, the award is intended to give younger readers a chance to participate in a forum similar to PNLA's Young Reader's Choice Award.

The **University of Montana's Mansfield Library** was the site of a Flashmob dance party during finals week. See MPLA member Megan Dazey's account on 7.

The Lewis & Clark Library in Helena celebrated the completed expansion of their Lincoln Branch with a ribbon cutting ceremony May 7. The expansion was necessary due to a lack of space for increased usage of the branch. "Attendance to programs at the Lincoln Branch has increased dramatically in recent years and the original facility was no longer large enough to accommodate everyone wishing to attend programs at the library," explained Lewis & Clark Library Director Judy Hart.

The **Montana Library Association** announced the 2010 award recipients at the recent conference in Bozeman. MPLA member **Alice Meister**, director of **Bozeman Public Library**, received the Sheila Cates Librarian of the Year, recognizing her tireless ambition in building the new LEED-certified library facility. MPLA member **Jane Howell**, director of **MSU-Billings Library** was honored with a lifetime membership to MLA, recognizing her energy and drive in inspiring people in many areas of Montana libraries. **Chrystie Smith**, Belgrade Library trustee, received the Trustee of the Year award for her dedicated service. **Eileen Johnson**, Lockwood Schools Administrator, received the School Administrator of the Year for her ongoing efforts to provide support to three campus libraries. Finally, two Special Friend to Libraries Awards were given. **Doug Kramer** was recognized for his continuous support to the Three Forks Community Library, and **Dot Gallagher** for her contributions to the Stillwater County Library.

As part of National Library Week, Montana held a "Treasure Hunt for the Treasure State" scavenger hunt, using the online databases available through the state library. Questions were available on library websites as well as the state library page. Answers

were submitted electronically, with four contest



categories based on age groups. Two iPods were given to winners in each of the middle school, high school and adult categories, and two pizza parties went to winning elementary classrooms.

Headwaters Library Association, a group of libraries and librarians in 3 southwestern Montana counties, will be learning about "Tech Gadgets in Libraries" at their meeting this month. Gadgets include the Wii, Skype and netbooks, flip cameras, geocaching and GPS. Librarians have the chance to play with new toys and visit with old friends at these fun and entertaining meetings.

# Nebraska

After 14 months of renovation, the Library/ Archives Reference Room at the Nebraska State Historical Society reopened on March 9 in Lincoln. Although the research room is slightly smaller, bathrooms are now closer. A new genealogist leaflet is available at <u>www.nebraskahistory.org/lib-arch/flyer.</u> <u>pdf</u>. A limited number of the collection's original records are available at <u>www.nebraskahistory.org/over-</u> <u>site/research.htm</u>. **Frosty (DeForest) Nesmith** retired from the **Union College Library** in Lincoln on November 30, 2009 after 41 years and 5 months of service. He also reached his goal of running a marathon in every state. His 50<sup>th</sup> 26.2 mile run was in Anchorage, Alaska last August. Frosty and his wife Dorothy are now in South Korea teaching English for a six-month stint.



The long-awaited expansion of the Lied Scottsbluff Public Library is underway. The groundbreaking ceremony on February 23 was celebrated by city leaders, library staff, library trustees, Friends of the Library, Foundation members, and other supporters. Ann Stephens, Library Director at Keene Memorial Library in Fremont, retired on April 16. After 19 years, Ann leaves with strong support for the Library Board and the Friends of the Library. Planning for a major

construction project is also well underway. As Ann said, "Everybody thinks a library is just about books, but it's not really, it's about people



and getting people connected with what they need. I love that part of it." She looks forward to spending more time with her husband and mother.

Omaha.net (<u>http://omaha.net</u>), a new online magazine, has taken a great interest in the **Omaha Public Library.** Select Public Library under Living in Omaha (left hand column) on the home page to find video interviews with **Gary Wasdin**, OPL's new library director. Select the Benson Branch and W. Clarke Swanson Branch links to find video interviews with library managers **Theresa Jehlik** and **Manya Shorr.** MPLA member Theresa Jehlik is Nebraska's representative to MPLA.

On March 1, MPLA member **Robin Bernstein** was promoted from Library Director to Senior Director of Library Services at **Bellevue University**. She now oversees the Learning Assessment Center as well as the library.

Since the 1950s, the Western Writers of America has given the Spur Award in western writing. A Spur Award winner and two finalists are named in each category. *Mundy's Law* by Nebraska author Mike McCord was selected as a Finalist for Best Western Audio Book for 2010.

Nebraska's Women's Volleyball Team. His presentation focused on collaborative leadership, creative problem solving, and leading with both sides of the brain. The topics are also the major themes in his recently released book, *Talent and the Secret Life of Teams*.



Nevada

The Nevada State Library and Archives recently presented a workshop on *What's It Worth to You? How to Do a Return on Investment Study for Your Library*, with Keith Curry Lance, independent consultant from Colorado.

Washoe County Library System added Mango Languages online language-learning system to its available free resources. Mango Languages currently offers 12 language courses — Brazilian Portuguese, Spanish, Japanese, French, German, Italian, Greek, Russian, Mandarin Chinese, ESL for Polish speakers, ESL for Spanish speakers, and ESL for Brazilian Portuguese speakers.

# New Mexico

The legislature approved and the governor signed Senate Bill 1 which would provide \$7,000,000 for libraries, but the voters still have to approve the GO Bonds in November 2010. In 2006 they approved with 57% YES, but in 2008 the margin dropped to 52%. The campaign for the Go Bond for Libraries was launched at the NMLA meeting. The Outstanding School Library Award was given to Camino Real Middle School in Las Cruces where Ruth Wallis is the teacher librarian.
Carol Sarath, Library Media Coordinator in the Gallup McKinley School District received the Community Achievement Award for outstanding library service or achievement at the local level. Carol, a former NMLA Board Member, served as co-chair of the NM Task Force for School Libraries for over six years and is an active member of the Library GO Bond

Steering Committee.

• **Betty Long** received the Honorary Life Membership Award for her long-term leadership and service to NMLA.

• Joni Marie Gutierrez, House Representative for District 33, Las Cruces/Dona Ana County received the Legislator of the Year Award which is given to a New Mexico state legislator who has demonstrated leadership in the advancement of libraries throughout the state. Representative Gutierrez is an on-going supporter of Library GO bond funding, and a co-sponsor of funding request for capital outlay for the **Thomas Branigan Public Library** in Las Cruces and microfilming projects of Durango and Zacatecas historical records at **NMSU Library Archives**.

• Mike Andrews received the New Mexico Library Amigo Award for his commitment to the Roswell Friends of the Library.

• Jancie Kowemy received the New Mexico Library Leadership Award for being the organizational force behind the native American Library Special Interest Group (NALSIG) and her service as an advocate and leader for the advancement of tribal libraries in New Mexico.



NMLA Award Winners

Hobbs Public Library, Moriarty Community Library, Ruidoso Public Library, and the Town of Bernalillo Martha Liebert Public Library have been selected as winners of the \$5000 grant from ALA for "The American Dream Starts @ Your Library" literacy initiative. The grant funds will be used by the libraries to build innovative literacy services for adult English language learners living and working in their communities. The libraries will expand their print and digital literacy collections, offer classes and conversation clubs, develop mobile tech labs and reach out to immigrant organizations. The initiative is funded by the Dollar General Literacy Foundation. Library Directors are MPLA member **Tammy Brawn** (Hobbs), **Tina Ortega** (Moriarty), **Beverly McFarland** (Ruidoso), and **Elizabeth Aguilar** (Bernalillo).

University of New Mexico Zimmerman Library has an exhibit in the Herzstein Latin American Reading Room on the second floor of the library through June 30, 2010. SACRED STEPS: THE ROAD TO SANTLAGO DE COMPOSTELA is a traveling exhibit from the Xacobeo Foundation in Galicia. Spain. The exhibit is sponsored by The Institute for Medieval Studies and the University Libraries and includes photographs and paintings that celebrate the experience of modern North American sojourners on the historic path to Santiago de Compostela. Working with the Crownpoint Historical and Cultural Heritage Council and High-



lands University to provide our community with this noteworthy exhibit has been a most rewarding experience and reflects what partnerships are all about." "100 Years of Navajo History Celebrating Crownpoint" is sponsored by New Mexico Highlands University, New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs, and the Crownpoint Historical and Cultural Heritage Council, in conjunction with the Octavia Fellin Public Library. Navajo Technical College students made an authentic loom in support of this exhibit.

The Aztec Public Library's Digital Arts Program is providing Vista Nueva High School students with

opportunities to learn digital arts in this rapidly growing field. The library's Digital Arts Program was implemented last year by Director

**Leanne Hathcock.** Part of her vision for this program is to pro-



vide opportunities for everyone in the community to have equal and

inexpensive access to state-of-the-art and industrystandard digital art software and computer equipment. While other public schools in the area have digital arts programs, the Vista Nueva High School cannot afford its own program. Vista Nueva students are presently learning skills in 3-D modeling and animation, and film editing. These fields are directly linked to the State of New Mexico Media Industry Strategy Project, or MISP, to bring a sustainable industry cluster to the state. The Library's Digital Arts Program is open to everyone. Members have access to about \$10,000 worth of software and equipment for film editing, 3D modeling and animation, digital sound editing and composing, web-page design, and much more. at the school. As the lights dimmed and the emcee announced each student as they approached the podium, the students at Hankinson Elementary celebrated their accomplishments by receiving an Oscar trophy with their name on it.

The dream of a new, larger library is quickly becoming a reality in **Carrington**. Work is scheduled to finish up by the end of April. Librarian **Lenore Franchuk** said the drywall is up and the windows are cut out for the office and computer lab. Painting by volunteers and new flooring is next on the agenda. The new computer lab was made possible by a grant from the **North Dakota State Library** which will help the Carrington City library purchase up to ten new computers. The new lab will offer patrons a quieter place to use the computers than the old library had to offer.

Horizon Middle School in Bismarck has created a laptop café in their library. Library staff and students volunteers have created space for 31 computers, a laptop cart of 16 refurbished computers and 18 oak barstools.

# Oklahoma

**Basha Hartley,** MPLA Oklahoma's representative writes: "The state of Oklahoma is experiencing the double whammy of economic downturn coupled with income tax cuts. Our state budget projected shortfall is 1.2 billion, which puts us this year as the state with the highest shortfall, percentage-wise. Although our state has traditionally seen higher revenues from natural gas and petroleum, these revenues cannot offset the loss of income from the erosion of tax revenues. **The Oklahoma Department of Li**-

**braries** has valiantly struggled to survive to current fiscal crisis. Over the last decade, the Oklahoma Department of Libraries has not been able to fill positions because of budget constraints and continues to cut wherever possible. However, if the Department of Libraries is cut any further, there is a good possibil-



ity they can no longer meet the requirements for federal matching grants that benefit libraries all over the state. In addition, there are several bills pending that allow school districts to be exempt from certain state standards. Most of these bills remove the school library mandates so that schools would not be required to have certified school librarians, library staffing based on school enrollment, nor a library budget for materials. In addition, schools would not be required to meet class size or buy textbooks. Several Mountain Plains Library Association member states have been struggling with similar issues and have seen drastic cuts to library services. Perhaps MPLA is more important than ever as we all compare notes on ways to bring needed library services to our customers in this fiscal climate."

Five libraries participating in the **Oklahoma Department of Libraries** Model Library Websites Program have launched new websites recently. Unveiling a new online presence are: **Anadarko Community Library, Miami Public Library, Newkirk Public Library, Vinita Public Library** and **Beaver County Pioneer Library**.

The Oklahoma Oral History Research Program at the **Oklahoma State University Library** remembers the life and work of Wilma Mankiller, first woman Chief of the Cherokee Nation. Thanks to Special Collections and University Archives at the OSU Library the 1989 lecture Mankiller delivered as part of the Angie Debo Native American Lecture Series held on the campus of Oklahoma State University was uncovered. The <u>lecture transcript</u> and <u>audio</u> is available online.

# South Dakota

The 13,450 votes cast by student readers in the 2010 **South Dakota Prairie Bud** and **Prairie Pasque Book Award Contest** topped the 2009 total by nearly 2000 votes. Eighty-four voting surveys were submitted this year, also an increase over 2009. 8962 Prairie Bud votes were cast by students in grades K-2; 4488 students in grades 3-5

voted for their favorite Prairie Pasque title. Sponsored by the **South Dakota Library** 



#### Association, the contest features

two lists of 15 nominated titles: the Prairie Bud list is intended for students in grades K-2; Prairie Pasque is for students in 3-5 grades. To qualify to vote, students are to read

at least five books from the list of 15 nominees for their grade level and then vote for their favorite. The



book receiving the most votes on each list receives the award. This year *The Fabulous Bouncing Chowder*, written and illustrated by Peter Brown is the winner of the 2010 Prairie Bud Award. *How to Steal a Dog*, by Barbara O'Connor received the most votes to win the Prairie Pasque Award for 2010. The *Invention of Hugo Cabret* by Brian Selznick was a close second or the Prairie Pasque Award, just four votes behind the winner. The **South Dakota Teen Choice Book Awards** is sponsored the South Dakota Library Association, the



contest features two lists of fifteen nominated titles for middle school and high school grades To qualify to vote, students read books from the list and give it a star rating of 1 to 4, 4 being best. The book receiving the most stars on each list receives the award. This year's winner

in the middle school category is *Blue Lipstick: Concrete Poems* by John Grandits and in the high school category is *Thirteen Reason Why* by Jay Asher.

The **Hot Springs Public Library** is offering French lessons. They have a native speaker who recently retired to the community who offered to teach the class. They have a strong class going with little effort on the staff's part.

South Dakota State Library staff are wrapping up their most recent "challenge." Though librarians know that subscription electronic resources provide valuable information to library patrons and staff, they often lack confidence in using and promoting them with their patrons. Shrinking training and travel budgets and limited staff time make electronic resources training difficult to accomplish. The South Dakota State Library Challenge: Electronic Resources Edition allowed librarians throughout the state to participate in training when it was convenient for them without requiring travel or registration fees. Based on the 23 Things model and created on a shoestring, this challenge utilized vendor training materials as well as materials already created by the South Dakota State Library staff. The Challenge introduced library staff to one subscription electronic resource each week, increasing their knowledge, inviting their exploration, and improving their confidence. Originally launched on February 1, 2010, the 10 week challenge will be offered to South Dakota librarians and educators again this summer.

The **Rapid City Public Library** began to initiate Drop-In Programs at their Downtown location. For their Drop-In Programs they invite outside organizations to man a small booth in their lobby to talk to patrons about the organization's specific missions/ goals and objectives. It has provided a fun and interactive way of encouraging community partners to engage and converse with their patrons. They have had several programs to date including author Dr. Kevin Weiland to discuss his new book "The Dakota Diet" and bring in some samples, Black Hills Parrot Welfare Center, the Museum of Geology and a weaving demonstration by local weaver Rita Nauman. Rapid City Public Library also uses the opportunity to increase their customer service by having one of their "Mobile Reference Roamers" set up a small station daily in the lobby to help promote the library services that they feel strongly about. Overall, the reaction has been extremely positive and the library has been able to bring many of their online resources onto the front stage.

Don't tell **JoAnn Gemar**, the Director of the **Scotland Community Library** that your library is too small to offer story time on a regular basis. She serves a community of 900 and has a story time for pre-school children every Friday morning. She invites a guest reader from the community each week and has found the program to be a great success with from 18-24 children and 4-5 adults attending each week.



The **Grant County Library** moved to the Auto-Graphics Agent Verso platform. Grant County Library was established in 1979 and since 1989 has used the Winnebago Spectrum system. The library serves the community of Milbank and the surrounding Grant County. The **Watertown Regional Library** is gearing up for a busy summer. Planning for summer reading is back in full swing now that their children's librarian is back to work after triple bypass surgery. New programs are being planned for the adults in the county. A lot of planning is going into the programs that will be associated with the hosting of the John Adams Unbound Exhibit that will arrive in late August. John Adams Unbound has been organized by

the Boston Public Library and the American Library Association Public Programs Office. It has been made possible by a major grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities: great ideas brought to life.

# Utah

The award party recognized all the LEGO display contestants with awards given in categories both silly and serious. LEGO creations were on display at the library through mid-May.

**Troy Rumpf,** Manager, Community & Media Relations, left her position with the Laramie County Library to become Communications Director for CLIMB Wyoming.

Poet and author B.J. Buckley presented several workshops at the **Sheridan County Story Library** during National Library Week.

The Wyoming Press Association and Wyoming Coalition for Open Government offered a free, public workshop at the Teton County Li**brary** to explain how state laws guarantee public oversight of state government. Wyoming Press Association Director Jim Angell delved into the Wyoming Open Meetings and Public Documents acts. The event was sponsored by the Wyoming Humanities Council, Teton County Library Foundation, Jackson Hole News & Guide, JH Weekly, Wyoming Press Association and Wyoming Coalition for Open Government. Angell's Jackson visit was one of five stops in a week-long tour to mark "Sunshine Week," an annual event promoted by open government advocates across the country.

The Natrona County Public Library was first opened May 20, 1910. As of May 1 many patrons, public officials, local and national authors have already joined in the celebration of the library's first century of service. NCPL sponsored a "Read 100" program beginning in March, which encouraged patrons of all ages to read either 100 books or 100 chapters, alone or in a group. Several schools and individual classrooms participated in the program, as did families, workplace groups and many individuals. Prizes included a centennial-edition library card earned by each participant, and a grand-prize basket filled with 100 items, keeping with the centennial theme. In preparation for the centennial, library staff spent several months contacting favorite authors, soliciting their comments about the value of libraries. The result is a "100 Authors" display, showcasing authors who responded



with "Happy Anniversary" wishes, stories of remembered visits to hometown libraries, and signed photos. Centennial events during the month of May kicked off with a children's birthday party featuring special guests Clifford and Hank-the-Cowdog.



Several authors visited the library, including local favorites Craig Johnson, C.J. Box, popular children's author John Erickson, and Walter Jones, author of a history book about the Natrona County Public Library. The final event on May 20 featured an Edible Book fest, singing by the Yellowstone Harmony Chorus, a Cake-Cutting Ceremony, and Walter Jones as keynote speaker. The **Campbell County Public Library System** is selling a cookbook called *Novel Cuisine*. Area residents, a few local celebrities, and authors and speakers who have visited Campbell County libraries contributed to the collection of recipes. The book is now on sale at libraries in Gillette and Wright for \$15. Proceeds will benefit The Library Foundation's Wyoming Public Library Endowment Challenge.

The Laramie County Library System is sponsoring People's Law School in May. Co-sponsored by the Wyoming Trial Lawyers Association and led by Dean Lori Brand, the six sessions over three weeks provide participants with real-life in-

sight into the legal system, with judges and lawyers presenting topics for discussion with plenty of time for questions from participants. Law school in just three weeks!
