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
MPLA Officers Elected for 2010-11 Term


MPLA Officers continued

ALA Notes

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REFORMA Invites Applications for Mora Award

REFORMA, the National Association to Promote Library and Information Services to Latinos and the Spanish Speaking, is now accepting applications for the 2010 Estela and Raúl Mora Award.

The Estela and Raúl Mora Award was established by author and poet Pat Mora and her siblings in honor of their parents and to promote El día de los niños/El día de los libros (Children's Day, Book Day), also known as Día. Culminating celebrations of this year-long initiative that links all children to books, languages, and cultures are traditionally held on or near April 30.

Libraries and schools that host Día programs during 2010 are encouraged to submit an application by August 15, 2010. The award will be presented at the American Library Association's 2011 Midwinter meeting to the most exemplary program celebrating El día de los niños/El día de los libros. The Mora Award consists of a \$1,000 stipend and a commemorative plaque.


In addition to Virtual Reference, conference tracks will include Meeting Our Users Where They Are and New Roles and Future Directions for Reference Librarians.





Dana Braccia, Arizona Representative and newly-elected Vice-President/President-Elect provides these profiles of two Arizona MPLA members, saying, "Along with having great weather and great libraries – we also have some amazing MPLA members."

David Gunckel – Director of the Sierra Vista Public Library

Q: Why did you join the library profession?

A: From a very early age I've always loved being in a public library. My dad served in the Navy and was at sea much of my childhood. My mom used to take my brother, sister,



and me to the public library where we'd spend hours all through the 1950's and 1960's. I loved knowing my mom would let me check out any book I wanted. I also remembered one public library that offered Viewmasters in the kids' area. That made me realize that public libraries can be fun places. As I got older

I began to understand the important role libraries have in relation to First Amendment issues and our right to information access. I began to see that joining the library profession was a way for me to contribute in a positive way.

A: I am proud of several accomplishments over my 28 year career as a librarian. Without a doubt the one at the top is the planning and construction of our public library building in Sierra Vista. We completed construction in 1999 and it remains an important focal point in our community.

Q: What is your most marked characteristic?

A: I think we all find that few people in the library profession match that old stereotyped view of a librarian. I certainly enjoy working in the library but I also enjoy working in the weight room, body building, riding my Harley-Davidson mo torcycle, and other activities that might surprise the average person.

Q: What would constitute a perfect Sunday after

A: Hiking in the Santa Catalina mountains north of Tucson.

Leslie Kent Kunkel - Academic Advising Coordinator - School of Information Resources & Library Science University of Arizona

Q: Why did you join the library profession?

A: I love books, reading, and discussing books and reading with others. I'm appalled at the low literacy levels of most Americans and want to help others to read, and enjoy



reading books. I'm also interested in improving American's access to information needed to sustain our democracy.

Q: What accomplishment are you most proud of?

A: Obtaining my MLS and completing my internship at the Bodleian Library at Oxford University. I organized the papers of the Primrose League (a social and political organization honoring Benjamin Disraeli) for the Department of Western Manuscripts. I'm also proud of the work I did as director of the Pacifica Graduate Institute Library and Joseph Campbell Archives.

Q: If you could have any job in a library, what would it be and why?

A: Director! I like to make a difference, to help strengthen and improve organizations, and to bring people together for a common purpose.

Q: What would constitute a perfect Sunday afternoon?

A: Hiking Sabino Canyon (in northeast Tucson) with a good book and good food.

Dr. P. Bryan Heidorn is the new Director of the University of Arizona School of Information Resources and Library Science. He has been a member of the faculty of the Graduate School of Library and Information Science at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and most recently served as a program manager of the Division of Biological Infra-



structure at the National Science Foundation. He holds a B.S. in Psychobiology, and M.S. in Information Science, and a Ph.D. in Information Science from the University of Pittsburgh.

COLORADO

The **Englewood Public Library** will celebrate its 11th Annual "Meet the Faces Behind the Books" Program for Colorado Authors on, April 11. The Library is hosting 59 Colorado authors and their latest books, which will be available for purchase and signing. Jazz guitarist, Paul Musso will entertain.

LILES Library Research Service

The **Library Research Service at the Colorado State Library** launched a new website February 19. It has updated navigation, graphics, and features. Along with this redesign, the blog is moving to http://www.lrs.org/news/ The new site took months of intense work with the entire LRS staff and Zeth Lietzau and Jamie Daisey.

The Marmot Library Network is moving towards a new oPac. According to Mary Katherine Katzer, MPLA Representative from Colorado, "VuFind was a very much a dark horse until a few stars aligned. When Jimmy Thomas, Executive Director, joined Marmot last October, it was not clear if an open source solution could be implemented, let alone enhanced. After a visit to Colorado State University to learn about the first implementation of VuFind with Millennium, Jimmy was encouraged that CSU could

help Marmot get started. Hiring a new web developer and identifying a contract developer to expand our capacity for a few months brought everything into place to take VuFind seriously. Apache Lucene, a high-performance, full-featured text search engine library written entirely in Java, is at the heart of VuFind and is no stranger to supporting public and school libraries as well as academics. Lucene powers Encore by Innovative Interfaces, LS2 PAC by The Library Corporation, and many other web apps. The remarkable thing about VuFind for Marmot is how well it meets overlapping and conflicting needs of 19 separate Marmot institutions in spite of its academic roots."

The Colorado Library Consortium (CLIC) offers links for continuing education opportunities, online tutorials, resource sharing, cooperative purchasing, and the greater library community on its website. http://www.clicweb.org/. The spring workshop held in Grand Junction March 1 and 2 was well attended with sessions on best books of 2009, hot teen reads, collection development for the 21st century elementary school, serving the Spanish speaking patron, customer service, economic gardening, introduction to HTML, advocacy, diversity, social networking, google analytics, staff training, and many more. Many of the sessions will be included in the spring workshops in Fort Collins on April 8, and in Pueblo on April 22–23.

Automation System Colorado Consortium (ASCC) released a new union catalog in December - AspenCat. The catalog contains the records from eight different ASCC libraries and utilizes LibLime Enterprise Koha system, an open source product. The system will continue to grow, with multiple libraries joining the catalog in 2010. ASCC is a consortium of over forty public, academic, school and special libraries scattered throughout Colorado. ASCC began in 2001 with an LSTA grant and a few libraries to share resources, save money, and learn from each other. More libraries were added each year and in May 2004, ASCC incorporated as a Colorado non-profit corporation. At present, ASCC supports two integrated library systems: AspenCat with eight pilot libraries and SirsiDynix with 34 libraries in a cooperative purchasing program running standalone Horizon systems. Poudre River Public Library District in Fort Collins is the 2010 winner of a \$3,000 Scholastic Library Publishing National Library Week Grant. The grant, sponsored by Scholastic Library Publishing and administered by the American Library Association's (ALA) Public Awareness Committee, is awarded annually for the best public awareness campaign in support of National Library Week. As the winner, the Poudre River Public Library District will connect "Communities thrive @ your library" with the concept of the library as the "original renewable resource." Events focused on related environmental themes will be spread throughout the month of April. The Library District will be partnering with the City of Fort Collins Natural Resource Department, Utilities Department and ClimateWise staff for some of the programming.

KANSAS

The Johnson County Library's "Why Moby-Dick is the Great American Novel" lecture featured Dr. Elizabeth Schultz, Professor Emeritus, University of Kansas. Dr. Schultz's lecture was highlighted with art work inspired by the classic. Following the presentation, the 43 attendees enjoyed clam chowder, and several learned how to participate in the ensuing online discussion. To date, 20 people are participating in the online discussion on http://readingmobydick.wordpress.com until March 31, 2010. This programming is a spin-off of the library's "Connect with a Classic" promotional campaign using four courier trucks quite literally as the vehicle. One of the courier truck graphics features "Captain Ahab's Fine Seafood," playing off Moby-Dick.

It was a night to remember for the 89 hopeful children and 110 beaming parents attending the reception for the 17th Annual Young Writers Contest, co-sponsored by the **Johnson County Library** and The Reading Reptile children's bookstore. Nine local, published author-illustrators judged the entries and honored 11 winners and runners-up with prizes consisting of original drawings by the judges, depicting a single scene from each winning story. **Dennis Ross,** Youth Services Supervisor at the Central Resource Library, coordinated the annual contest for children ages 5-12 and the reception. The Lewis & Clark Library in Helena once again offered their popular Teen Tech Tutor Class in March. The class is designed to give one-on-one assistance with a variety of technology related issues. Teen volunteers donate their computer skills and give one-on-one assistance with a variety of technology related issues and to help participants navigate the information highway. Topics vary, depending on participants. Teen Tech Tutors can assist with everything from showing how to post pictures to Facebook accounts to how to turn the off the ringer on a cell phone.

He also made suggestions about libraries' role in the Nebraska P-16 Initiative to improve school success rates. This initiative covers Nebraska students from preschool through college. One of P-16 Initiative's goals is to increase the number of students who attend 2-year and 4-year colleges.

Clark County Library District is holding their 3rd Annual *Viva la Vita Bella Italian Festival* at the Sahara West Library, March 27. The event celebrates the Italian culture with live entertainment, movies, children's activities, food and vendors. big screen experience. Adventure sports such as climbing, kayaking, alpine skiing in some of the most remote places in the world will be the highlight of the event.

Carson City Library has invited their community to participate in a citywide reading initiative to discuss the timely message found in each of three versions of Greg Mortenson's and David Oliver Relin's best-selling book, *Three cups of Tea: One Man's Mission to Promote Peace One School at a Time.* Each Tuesday beginning February 9 through April 15 the library hosts an event inspired by Greg Mortenson's philosophy of promoting peace through education.

The third annual *Read & Run for Your Health* 5K/1 Mile Walk hosted by **Henderson Libraries** was held February 27. The event is hosted annually in support of a healthy community. And while the event does not require its participants to run while reading, it does promote running to benefit reading. The family-oriented race was walker friendly and began and ended at the James I. Gibson Library, with the course looping through downtown Henderson and the Water Street District area. Proceeds from the event go toward purchasing health-related materials for checkout at all Henderson Libraries. 382 registered for the event and sponsors included the Water Street District, Clear, Sam's Club and Ethos Three Architecture.



Running for Reading

The Washoe County Library presented *Growing up Basque* with Sandra Ott of the University of Nevada, Reno Center for Basque Studies discussed Basque heritage in a program presented as part of *Northern Nevada Reads: The Immigrant Experience*. The communitywide reading event extends from January through March and encourages residents to read *The Basque Hotel* by Robert Laxalt and discuss family heritage.

At a recent meeting the **Washoe County Library** board discussed the library system's financial outlook with the latest projection of a \$25,000,000 shortfall and a materials budget for the current fiscal year at 50% less than two years ago.

NEW MEXICO

Donna Birchell, long time staff member at **Carlsbad Public Library**, has completed a book, *Carlsbad and Carlsbad Caverns*, to be the latest volume of the Images of America series. Donna worked closely with the Southeastern New Mexico Historical Society that has amassed over 15,000 vintage photographs.

The Santa Fe Public Library announces the launch of *One-Click Audio*, a collection of audiobooks that can be downloaded to library patrons' home computers, iPods, or MP3 players. Just like checking out a CD audiobook from the library, the downloads are free. The Library has over 2,000 titles available and the vendor adds new books to the site every month. Ten books may be downloaded at one time for a loan period of 21 days.

During National Library Week libraries in New Mexico will be taking a one day "snapshot" – collecting information to capture the impact that New Mexico libraries have on their communities on a typical day. Called "Library Snapshot Day," it is a joint project between the New Mexico State Library and the New Mexico Library Association. The project is national advocacy project that has taken place in New Jersey, Maine, Connecticut, Pennsylvania. Many other states are expected to participate during the entire month of April. The purpose is to encourage libraries to collect basic data such as how many people use the library on a given day.

The 2010 **North Dakota State Library** Spring Workshops will be held in Fargo on April 12 and 13, and in Bismarck on April 15 and 16. The locations for Fargo will be the Best Western Doublewood Hotel and the Fargo Public Library. Topics for this year's workshops include: developing a Friends of the Library group, utilizing social media tools, and summer reading programs. Round table discussions on various library related topics will again

be a part of the workshops. Technology workshops will feature representatives from EBSCO, Gale, and the State Library who will demonstrate and explain some of the new Online Library Resources.

Michele Reid, MPLA member and Dean of Libraries at North Dakota State University in Fargo, has been named a 2010 UCLA Senior Fellow. She is one of fifteen top academic library leaders chosen to take part in the residential program, to be held August 9-27 at the Uni-

versity of California Los Angeles campus. The Senior Fellows program, established in 1982 with support from the Council on Library Resources and UCLA, provides opportunities for senior library leaders to collaborate on joint research and publication in the areas of academic administra-



tion, professional development and technology.

The **North Dakota Library Coordinating Council** announced the recipients of latest round of grants:

- Five public libraries will be establishing training labs in their libraries. The Bowman Regional Public Library, Carrington Public Library, Grand Forks Public Library, Velva School and Public Library, and the Leach (Wahpeton) Public Library will coordinate and provide training on a regular basis and by special request.
- The Enderlin Municipal Library received an innovative grant in partnership with their County Nursing Organization to provide training to the public on health related Online Library Resources.
- The Griggs County Public Library and Sitting Bull College Library each received a grant to add their collections to the statewide online library catalog through WorldCat, which will result in access to an additional 50,000 North Dakota items. The North Dakota State Library and the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council awarded the grants with funding provided through Library Vision 2010 (LV2010) and the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA).


WYOMING
