The MPLA Awards Committee is seeking nominees for the following awards:

Carl Gaumer Library Champion Award: To be given to the individual, organization or company whose positive support of the Mountain Plains Library Association is demonstrated by repeated conscientious endeavors towards libraries, library staff, trustees and professional activities.


MPLA Distinguished Service Award: To be given to an MPLA member who has made notable contributions to the library profession or has furthered significant development of libraries in the Mountain Plains region, or has performed exemplary service for an extended period of time. In the case of retired individuals, the nominee may be a past member of MPLA.

MPLA Literary Contribution Award: To be given to an author whose published writings have successfully furthered an understanding and appreciation of the Mountain Plains region. The author need not reside in the region, and the selection may be based on either a single work or a body of works. Published works will be evaluated on the basis of literary worth, readability, and evidence of responsible research.

MPLA Beginning Professional Award: To recognize an MPLA member who, as a librarian/media specialist within the first five years after receiving a library/media masters degree, has made a positive impact on the quality and role of library service. Factors such as innovative programming and planning, use of resources, and special projects will be considered.

MPLA Unsung Hero Award: To be given to any library individual(s) or group(s) in the MPLA region who have worked on a special project that has some significance to a community but which has not been eligible for a library award, or which has for other reasons specified by the nominator not been recognized to the degree that it merits, by any library organization.

IMLS Awards More Than \$1.4 Million to Support Native American Libraries

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) has awarded \$1,495,000 to 218 Indian tribes and Alaska Native villages and corporations as part of the Native American Library Services Basic Grant program. With this funding, the libraries will be able to strengthen their core services for the benefit of the tribal communities and villages they serve. After consultation with tribal librarians, the basic grant award was increased from the \$5,000 level in previous years to \$6,000 this year. Thirty-one applicants were awarded \$6,000 basic grants, totaling \$186,000. Another 187 tribes received basic grants with a supplemental \$1000 education/assessment option totaling \$1,309,000.

Awardees may use their funds to support existing library operations; maintain core library services; and, with the Education/Assessment Option, provide their library staff with continuing education courses, training workshops, or the opportunity to present at conferences. These recipients may also hire a consultant for an on-site professional library assessment.

"Through this grant program, Native American and Alaska Native libraries are making great strides in providing access to information and education resources that are critical to success in the 21st century," said Marsha L. Semmel, IMLS acting director. "The 2010 awardees will carry on the tradition of providing innovative and meaningful programs that involve the entire community."

Federally recognized Indian tribes, Alaska Native villages, regional corporations, and village corporations are eligible to apply for the Institute's Native American Library Services grant programs. In addition to the Basic grant, the Institute also administers the Native American Library Services Enhancement competitive grant program. Enhancement grant recipients may receive up to \$150,000. The 2010 En-

hancement Grant awards will be announced in mid-September.

BCR Ends Operations *Transitions to LYRASIS*

In April, BCR and LYRASIS announced a collaborative agreement to transition BCR members to LYRASIS membership in the fall of 2010.

"The BCR Board recognized the current economic stresses that libraries and library organizations are facing, so we approached LYRASIS to discuss ways to limit costs without losing vital products and services. By joining forces with LYRASIS, we believe BCR members will not only continue to receive high levels of service, but will have even greater access to new training, consulting and networking options," said Greg Cotton, Chair of the BCR Board of Trustees.

The provisions of the agreement will enable BCR members to experience a seamless transition with immediate access to LYRASIS training classes and the ability to purchase electronic resources at discounted rates. Current BCR members will become members of LYRASIS effective October 1, 2010 with no LYRASIS dues for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2010/11. This membership will be effective through June 30, 2011.

"BCR is responding to the needs of its members to keep their overall costs level, "said Brenda Bailey-Hainer, BCR President and CEO. "This agreement is the result of two organizations working together to find a creative solution."

BCR has been providing services to libraries for 75 years. A FAQ about the BCR-LYRASIS relationship linked from www.bcr.org is to be updated with details.

Created in April 2009 by the merger of PALI-NET and SOLINET and joined shortly thereafter by NELINET, LYRASIS is the nation's largest regional membership organization serving libraries and information professionals.

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IMLS FY2008 Public Libraries Survey

Public library visits and circulations per capita increased almost 20 percent between FY1999 and FY2008, while the number of public librarians per 25,000 people has remained virtually the same during that same period, according to the FY2008 Public Libraries Survey.

The PLS report, which includes information on population of service areas, service outlets, library collections and services, library staff, and operating revenue and expenditures, also found that Americans made 1.5 billion visits to public libraries in FY2008, up from 1.43 billion total visits the previous year.

More than 9,200 libraries were surveyed in the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. The survey had a 98 percent response rate.

* Library visitation per capita has steadily increased over the past 10 years. In FY2008, the average individual in a library service area visited the library just over 5 times (5.1), compared to 4.3 visits per person in 1999, an increase of 19.7 percent.

* The availability of Internet terminals has nearly doubled over the past 10 years in response to patron demand; Internet PCs per 5,000 people rose from 1.9 in FY1999 to 3.7 in FY2008.

* Circulation per capita has also generally increased during the past 10 years, increasing by 19.7 percent since FY1999, when per person circulation stood at 6.5. The nation's libraries recorded 7.7 circulations per capita in FY2008, up from 7.4 the previous year.



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Around the Region

ARIZONA

The Wild West may be gone, but it will live on through the digitization of historic Arizona newspapers published between 1860 and 1922. The Arizona State Library, Archives and Public Records has received a \$314,790 federal grant to continue efforts to digitize and preserve historic newspapers. The funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities is especially critical because it will be applied toward digitization of newspapers that documented the four decades that immediately preceded Arizona Statehood in 1912, as well as the state's formative years that followed. The funding follows a 2008 grant of \$400,000, which the National Endowment for the Humanities provided the State Library for the same purpose of newspaper digitization. Publications already digitized, as well as those that will be in the months to come, can be viewed at the Chronicling America section of the Library of Congress' Website: http://chroniclingamerica. loc.gov/newspapers.

A Six-State Virtual Government Information Conference will be held August 11-13 and 16-17. Librarians from Arizona, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming will hear Gabriela Schneider, communications director for the Sunlight Foundation, a national organization that promotes transparency and accountability in government focused on digitization of government information. Sessions will include Census: Demographics & Business, Click Through Statistics, Moving to More Electronic – Deselecting and Transitioning, Making Documents Accessible, Marketing Our Collections & Services, Strategic Planning for the Depository Program, and much more. Each session attendee can earn Library Practitioner Certification competency: 1 hr. Services to the

Public - Reference and Information Services (maximum of 14 hours for attending all sessions). COLORADO

With the phasing out of the operations of **BCR** (Bibliographic Center for Research,) the **Colo**rado Library Consortium (CLiC) and the Colorado State Library have entered into several new cooperative initiatives to assure continuity of statewide services. Sparked by BCR's closure later this year and the transition to LYRASIS, the initiatives became cooperative opportunities. CLiC and the State Library, two key library service organizations, see this as a time to become more coordinated and interconnected, ultimately to provide even better services to Colorado libraries. In practice, CLiC will replace BCR's previous role by assisting the State Library in providing limited fiscal and human resources functions; and providing new physical space for servers running Plinkit, Ask-Colorado, SWIFT, the Colorado Historic Newspapers Collection, and other Colorado Virtual Library services. CLiC's role will be to provide organizational support for the services, which will continue to be managed and operated by State Library personnel. BCR has been providing services to libraries for 75 years and the staff is working to ensure that their members have uninterrupted service during a time of change.

The Woodruff Memorial Library in La Junta, Colorado, is making a big splash this year with hundreds of children signed up and attending the Summer Reading Program. Each year the staff decorates the library in fantastic style. This year boasts a real boat, fabric galore, tinted windows, stuffed animals everywhere, and a Tiki house to pick up prizes. Prizes include a Sony Reader, a jar full of coins, pool passes, and more. Kids are reading tons of books, which is exactly what the staff had in mind.



The Colorado Association of Libraries (CAL) Continuing Education Committee is presenting "Emotional Intelligence" at the Philip S. Miller Library in Castle Rock on July 28. CAL is also holding a competitive membership drive with prizes being awarded to the CAL members who influence the most new registrations in CAL membership.

Rangeview Library District's new flagship library, Anythink Wright Farms, opened to the public July 10. The theme for the event was "Freedom to Dream: Honoring Ideas Sparked in Libraries Since 1776." The grand opening celebration showcased the facility's spaces with a day of Anythink-style activities including demonstrations of trends popular during revolutionary times that are now making a comeback. Keith

Villa, master brewer with MillerCoors, presented the History of Beer with local home brewer Mike Meis. Local home brewing company Do Your Brew provided tastings of their special Anythink Summer Ale for those over 21. Judy Elliot, Education & Community Empowerment Coordinator with Denver Urban Gardens, provided a presentation on composting and other urban homesteading trends were on display.

The Marmot Library Network is offering a new oPac: Mary Katherine Katzer, MPLA Colorado representative, reports that "after three guys worked on it part time for 3 months, the Western Slope Libraries Catalog is now live. We started with open source VuFind, developed at Villanova University and first implemented in Colorado by Colorado State

University. In June, the team worked on fine-tuning relevance ranking,

evance ranking,

correcting links to electronic books, evaluating new catalog enrichment options, and developing an admin console to support a variety of configuration options for our multi-type consortium. During the rest of the

summer, Marmot will work with members to brand, configure, and launch library-specific flavors of the

catalog. Academics and schools should all be ready in time for fall term; publics will launch throughout the summer. Marmot is excited about taking advantage of the openness of open source to do cool things for library users that no sane vendor would want to do in a commercial product. DataCite and COKAMO: Interstate Library

Delivery Service were recently announced as winners of the 2010 Rethinking Resource Sharing Innovation Awards. COKAMO is an interstate library delivery service linking regional courier services in Colorado, Kansas and Missouri, which reduces the costs of inter-state borrowing while speeding up the delivery of materials to library patrons. DataCite is an international dataset registration initiative supporting researchers in locating, identifying, and citing research datasets, which includes members in North America and Europe. Each of the award winners will receive \$1,000. Funding for the 2010 Innovation Awards is provided by Relais International, OCLC, and the Danish Bibliographic Centre.

OverDrive's Digital Bookmobile national tour: Libraries in the MPLA region were visited this spring by a 75 foot long tractor-trailer rig outfitted with computers, samples of the various downloadable formats, and cool mobile devices, and it was accompanied by dedicated OverDrive staff who could (and did!) answer all manner of questions. The bookmobile stopped in Grand Junction, CO for two days in early May before spending three days at libraries on the Front Range. Later in May and early June, the bookmobile visited libraries in Oklahoma and

Two tribal college libraries in Montana have recently joined the **Montana Shared Catalog (**MSC) resource sharing system. Stone Child College Library (Box Elder, MT) and Fort Belknap College Library (Harlem, MT) migrated their bibliographic records from their aging Winnebago systems to MSC's Symphony integrated library system. MSC staff from Helena, consisting of Ken Adams, Mary Fouts and Bridgett Johnson, traveled to Harlem to provide

a three day training session for library staff from both colleges. The college library staffs have started entering their student and patron records into the MSC database and will begin using the system in July. The Montana Shared Catalog began in 2002 with 17 public libraries in western Montana joining forces to share costs and staff in procuring and managing a shared integrated library system. With the support of the Montana State Library, membership has grown to 130 libraries located throughout the state and now includes school, special, medical and academic libraries as well as the public libraries. Kansas state aid funding for public libraries will be down 10.32% from FY2010 to FY 2011.

The Northeast Kansas Library and South East Kansas Library Systems are arranging busing transportation to and from the Association of Rural and Small Libraries conference in Denver in October. The bus will stop at points along I-70 to pick up librarians from across the state.

The Johnson County Library is one of the most popular local businesses/organizations on Google – as measured by how many times people found the library's listing and clicked on it for more information between December 1, 2009, and February 28, 2010. As a "Favorite Place on Google," Johnson County Library is one of less than 250,000 businesses or organizations in the U.S. to receive this recognition – less than 1% of all U.S. businesses and organizations.

Library Caters to Skateboarders: In Gardner middle school kids coming into the Johnson County Library branch after school often use skateboards for transportation –causing hazard issues with skateboards being left anywhere and everywhere in the library. Instead of banning the skateboards, however,





Branch Manager Terry Velasquez "flipped" the situation, as it were, to accommodate the kids – thereby creating a niche clientele. Knowing that the skateboarders want to keep their boards with them, Velasquez decided to investigate alternatives. With help from her staff, she discovered and purchased a skateboard rack and installed it inside the building (see *photo)* because the boarders do want to keep an eye on their boards. Staff realized the importance of securing the boards to avoid theft, but boarders didn't carry locks because they don't have the opportunity to lock up their boards in most public places. Now, the Gardner Library provides the locks for checkout at the circulation desk. Having welcomed the skateboarders into the library, Velasquez and her staff are working to capture their interest. Assistant Branch Manager Kinsley Krupich is point person for skateboard-centered programming. With much concentration, some of these same teens – individually and in groups – submitted 14 entries for a "Skateboard Deck Design Contest" in April. Six winners were selected to come back in June to paint their designs onto real skateboard decks for display in the Teen

Lounge. Of the total 26 teens participating, eight received prizes donated by Skate One Corporation at the design submission event, and everyone received skate stickers. A display of skateboard books accompanied the program.

NEVADA

Boulder City Library is offering many special programs for their patrons during the summer months including a visit from the Southern Nevada Water Authority who will present programs about the Wetlands and Wash area.

Las Vegas Clark County Library District projected revenue shortfall of \$5 million dollars necessitated staff layoffs, cut backs of library services, a reduction in the library materials budget, and a reduction in hours of operation beginning June 26 at urban libraries. The District forecasts that its General Fund revenue for Fiscal Year 2010-2011 starting July 1, 2010 will be 7.7% lower than projected revenue for FY 2009-2010. This unprecedented decline in revenue has required the elimination of 93 staff positions—19 full time, 23 part time, 39 previously frozen positions and 12 positions vacated by staff who participated in the Voluntary Employee Separation Program.

Henderson Libraries, James I. Gibson Library is in the process of relocating! The City of Henderson purchased the old library building from the library district with funds from the sale used for the construction of the new building. With the economy in its fragile state, the cost of construction was dramatically less than it would normally be, creating the perfect opportunity for Henderson Libraries to move forward with its plans to construct a newer, larger Gibson building. Located at 100 W. Lake Mead Pkwy at the corner of Lake Mead and Water Street in the Target Shopping center the new location features a drive thru window for requested material, a computer lab for up to 25 users, a teen area and larger rooms for library programming. At 19,919 square feet, the



new building is 5,000 square feet larger than its older counterpart, and there is space on the site to add an additional 7,000 square feet in the future.







New James I Gibson Library

With Las Vegas leading the nation in home fore-closures and suffering a dismal economy that has seen record unemployment, all Nevada public libraries have been greatly impacted. Due to budget adjustments **Henderson Libraries** has offered qualifying staff a Voluntary Employee Separation Program and a hiring freeze is currently in place. Beginning June 28 Henderson Libraries will reduce library hours to Monday-Thursday 9:30 a.m. – 8:00 p.m., Friday and Saturday 9:30 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

At its May 19 meeting, the Washoe County Library System Board of Trustees approved changes to library hours and days of operation, effective July 12, 2010. The number of open hour's system wide remains nearly the same, but the hours have been realigned in response to comments and suggestions from 3,800 patron surveys. "The library system lost 55 positions in the last 2-1/2 years due to retirements and resignations, and if further budget cuts are required later this year, we will be looking at laying off staff, which may result in reducing our hours of operation." says Library Director Arnie Maurins. With ongoing budget cuts affecting Washoe County Library System, the number of magazines ordered will again be lower than in previous years. The public can help by "adopting" a periodical – paying for a one-year subscription. The donations will allow the library to purchase popular magazines that would otherwise be eliminated.

MEW MEXICO

Ben Wakashige, who has held various library positions in New Mexico, has accepted the position at Central New Mexico Community College of Administrative Director of Libraries and Educational Resources. He returns from Fort Lewis College in Durango, Colorado where he was Director of the John F. Reed Library He has been the Director of Miller Library, Western New Mexico State University in Silver City, Director of Libraries at Pacific University in Oregon, and was State Librarian from 1998-2003.

Stacy Zuzga is the new Adult Services Librarian at the Octavia Fellin Public Library in Gallup. She received her MLS from Wayne State University and most recently was with the Rochester Hills Library, Michigan.

Beginning in the summer of 2010, **Fast Forward New Mexico** (FFNM), a three-year, grant-funded program, entered into a partnership with 16 of New Mexico's public and tribal libraries to bring free In-



ternet training, information, and awareness to the state's residents. There is a documented

link between broadband deployment, jobs, and output growth. Many New Mexicans remain underserved or unserved in the areas of Internet access and proficiency. As a result, New Mexico ranks 46th in the nation for percentage of the population that uses the Internet, and 36th in availability of broadband telecommunications. New Mexico's lack of broadband access, affordable rates, and Internet skills is hindering opportunities.

MORTH DAKOTA

After eight years in the position, Doris A.

Ott has announced her intention to retire as North Dakota State Librarian with her last day being November 5, 2010. She came to the State Library in 1986 and has held various positions at the State Library and was named to her present assignment in 2002.



A native of Carson, North Dakota, she graduated from Dickinson State University, and earned her Master of Library Science degree from George Peabody College (now Vanderbilt University) in Nashville Tennessee. She started her professional librarian career as an Assistant Professor of Library Science at Dickinson State University, was the first librarian at

Magic City Campus in Minot, and held positions at a school library and a public library in Indiana prior to returning to North Dakota in 1986. Her plans for retirement include spending time with granddaughter Alexandra in Fargo, golfing with husband, Rich, and expanding her image and color consulting avocation.

The libraries at Washington and Louis L'Amour Elementary schools will receive free hardback editions of 17 classic books as part of *We the People*Bookshelf grant program provided by the National Endowment of the Humanities and the American Library Association. The *We the People* initiative supports projects that strengthen the teaching, study, and understanding of American culture and history. Selected libraries and schools, 4,000 in from all 50 states, will receive 17 books as well as bonus materials including a DVD Edition of "The Civil War" the award winning documentary. They also received posters, bookmarks, bookplates, and other promotional materials.

The **Minot Public Library** LEGO Club is going strong: Children and parents gather for monthly meetings of the LEGO Club. Children ages four

years of age to Grade 5 and parents interested in building attend. Each month children have the opportunity to create different structures and



vehicles with LEGOs. The LEGO club was started in January after enough LEGOs were secured by the library. All donated LEGOs were cleaned and sorted before the first meeting. Since that time many interested youngsters have attended the monthly meetings.

The digital age for North Dakota State Library Talking Books has begun, with a transition from four-track analog players to new digital players. The new digital player has many new features including drastically improved audio quality and audio-prompted buttons. Other features include a sleep button and longer battery life, with the ability to recharge in approximately 2 hours. One of the most

exciting features is increased cartridge capacity, which means that the large majority of books will fit on a single cartridge. National Library Service (NLS) required that veterans receive first priority in the distribution of the digital players. The second priority group was patrons who are over 100 years old. Having satisfied those priorities, the remaining patrons in good standing are receiving new digital players in the order in which they were added to the waiting list. Currently 256 digital players have been distributed and 4,725 digital talking books are available from the State Library Talking Book collection. In addition to the books available at the State Library, Talking Book staff and patrons can use the Internet to download digital books that aren't readily available at the North Dakota State Library.

Wilbur Stolt, Director of the University of North Dakota Libraries, has been elected to a three

year term as an OCLC Americas Regional Council (ARC) Delegate to the OCLC Global Council. He will represent the interests of OCLC



members in the Americas and, in particular, those in the Minitex region, to the OCLC global governance body that was formed a year ago.

MPLA member **Aubrey Madler** was recipient of the Freedom to Read Foundation's 2010 Gordon M. Conable Conference Scholarship to attend the 2010 ALA Annual Conference. She is an information specialist with the University of North Dakota's Center for Rural Health. She is an active member and maintains a blog for the North Dakota Library Association's Intellectual Freedom Committee..

The May 15, 2010, issue of *Library Journal* announced the 2009 Notable Government Documents selected by ALA GODORT's Notable Documents Panel. Once again, North Dakota state documents have been selected as national winners: Two of the three publications selected as Notable State Docu-

ments at the NDLA 2009 Fall Conference made the list.

- The 5-volume *Habitats of North Dakota*, by Gwyn S. Herman and Laverne A. Johnson, was issued by the North Dakota Center for Distance Education to promote teaching and learning about wildlife conservation and resource management.  portraits of the region's native peoples and
 those who dealt with and lived among them.
