

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

A monetary prize will be awarded to the winning paper presentation. Remember an important MPLA membership perk: the

professional development grants program, which are intended to improve library services in the region by supporting continuing education and research experiences for members. Grants are available for formal course work leading to an advanced degree in library science or a related discipline, and for course work directly related to an individual's library position, attendance at a library or scholarly workshop, seminar, or conference including the MPLA annual conference, visits to another library to receive or provide significant advanced training in library services or procedures, or library related research projects.

With all those possibilities, one would think that all the funds available would be awarded every year. However, there were two deadlines that went by with no applications. So if there is a conference, class, workshop, or seminar that has caught your eye and you can convince your supervisor/board/dean to let you travel, think seriously about submitting a grant application. The deadlines are February, April, June, August, October, and December. Check the MPLA website for more information.

I mentioned in the last newsletter that I would be attending the Arizona Library Association conference in November. The weather was wonderful. (Remember I'm from South Dakota) I got to spend quality time with incoming MPLA president Dana Braccia and Leadership Institute chair Dan Stanton and be on a panel promoting the MPLA experience. While attending an early morning Service Awards Breakfast, I was very impressed with the support shown Darlene Westcott, winner of the Outstanding Youth Services Award. There were three tables of supporters from her community who made the more than two hour trip to be there by 7:30 a.m. That reaffirmed the love that our communities have for libraries and librarians. We just need to continue to tap into that feeling to keep us motivated.





Another title for this could be, "What Happens When You Turn 60 and Don't Come To Work at the Regular Time."


My 60th birthday was the same day that the library board had their regular evening meeting scheduled. That

a porcelain throne, because I had 'gone to pot.' I loved it - it's wonderful to be appreciated (or teased?).





Colorado Library wins National Medal for Museum and Library Services

First Lady Michelle Obama presented the 2010 National Medal for Museum and Library Service to Colorado's **Rangeview Library District and Anythink Libraries** along with five museums and four other librar-

ies at a White House ceremony. The National Medal is the highest honor the nation confers on institutions for their outstanding contribution to America's communities. awards are made annually by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) to museums and libraries that have demonstrated a long-term commitment to public service through innovative programs and community partnerships. Each of the ten directors accepted the award along with a community member who had been personally affected by the museum or library. The winners will also receive a \$10,000 award to continue the good work they are doing in their communities, and a visit from StoryCorps.

In 2009, the Rangeview Library District underwent a major overhaul. The traditional structure of the library no longer worked for its busy, growing Adams County, Colorado, community. After years of staff watching patrons struggle to use the library, the Dewey Decimal System was eliminated.

The library took a risk and re-engineered library services. Now organized by words (like cooking, home, and travel) instead of numbers, the library is witnessing amazing results from the new "WordThink" system, which is user-friendly and well-loved by the community.

According to the library, "since the "Anythink" state of mind took over at the library, program attendance has more than doubled and circulation of materials has tripled. The Rangeview Library District's work is a testament to letting go of conventions, listening to community members, and allowing ideas to flourish, with an ongoing commitment to allowing imagination, optimism, and creativity guide its work."



In response to the challenges of an uncertain economy, the **Arizona State Library** has introduced *Tools for Tough Times* which offers helpful links and contact information to assist residents with a range of issues. Employment, financial planning, health, and parenting questions are just a few of the areas covered. Dr. Donald Dickinson, founding Director of the University of Arizona Graduate Library School, received the Lawrence Clark Powell Lifetime Achievement Award at the tenth annual Powell Memorial Lecture December 2, 2010 MPLA member and Pima County Public Library Director Nancy Ledeboer hosted the event.

Julie Huelsbeck begins a term as Arizona's Representative to MPLA. She has a Bachelors degree in Spanish and Library Science from the University of Wisconsin—Oshkosh and a Masters of Library Science from the University of Wisconsin—Milwaukee. A native of Wisconsin, Julie has been in the Southwest for nearly 30 years, 19 of them with Mohave County Library. She has held a number of positions with the District, starting as Branch Manager of the Bullhead City Library. For the last three years she has been the Assistant Library Director. When not at work, Julie enjoys traveling, scrapbooking, paper crafting and counted cross stitch.



COLORADO

Brenda Bailey-Hainer, formerly president and CEO at BCR in Colorado, was recently named Executive Director of the American Theological Library Association (ATLA).



The **Colorado Library Courier** has expanded its statewide courier service. Starting in January 2011, Blue Sky Express will link Colorado's courier to most Kansas libraries. Blue Sky Express will run 5 days a week at no additional cost to participating libraries except for extra high volume charges.

The Marmot Library Network signed an agreement with the Colorado Alliance of Research Libraries and Innovative Interfaces that allows Marmot to join the Prospector regional union catalog and interlibrary loan system (http://www.coalliance.org/prospector). The current Alliance catalog includes approximately 27 million items (10 million titles), which supports interlibrary lending among 26 public, academic, and special libraries located in the metropolitan "Front Range" of Colorado and Wyoming. Marmot will add records of approximately 3 million items (1.2 million titles) held by 15 public and academic libraries mainly on the rural "Western Slope" of Colorado. The project is substantially funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) through a Library Services & Technology Act (LSTA) allocation to the Colorado Department of Education (CDE) and the Colorado State Library (CSL).

The 2010-2011 CAL Leadership Institute (CAL-LI) began in early October. Seventeen participants gathered for their first workshop on October 6 at the Carbon Valley Library. During the half-day session, they engaged in self-awareness and assessment activities using the Strengths Finder 2.0 model.

With the availability of over 15,000 free public domain titles in epub format through Project Guten-

berg and available from OverDrive, the **Colorado Library Consortium** (CLiC) led a project to clean up the MARC records of the most popular titles, called eDiscover the Classics. The top 500 or so downloads were identified and those marc records were cleaned up and enhanced by catalogers at Douglas County Library and the University of Denver, and were then made available to Colorado libraries.

(This is rare because two of them live in Utah and the other two live in Minnesota and it's not often that they are all together.) Times they are a changin', is the theme of the 2011 **Colorado ILL Conference** April 28- 29, 2011 in Fort Collins, Colorado. The town of **Vail Public Library**, in collaboration with Art in Public Places, provided a celebration of storytelling, games, hot cocoa and polar bear snow sculptures by local artist, Karl Krueger, on February 16 at the Gore Creek Promenade at the fire pit in Vail Village.



The life-sized snow sculptures are entitled Arctic.

Jay Trask and Kay Lowell received \$3,500 from the National Endowment for the Humanities to help fund the "Archival Environmental Monitoring for the James A. Michener Library" project, University of Northern Colorado. The grant will help fund the environmental monitoring of rare books and special collections. The project includes the use of humidity and temperature monitors in storage areas to gauge conditions within the library.



When the Leawood Pioneer Neighborhood Library of the Johnson County Library was expanded by 70%, the old building was remodeled as well, utilizing sustainable features and materials. Twelve months following its reopening in October 2009, the facility is costing 25% less in utilities to operate while serving three times the number of patrons.

Rob Banks, MPLA member and Deputy Director of Operations Topeka & Shawnee County Public Library, was recently elected as chair of the Topeka Landmarks Commission. Rob is also a past-president of MPLA. Johnson County Library staff sported heart-shaped "tattoos" to express their love for the new, interactive Web catalog, launched on December 1. Dubbed "Bib-



liocommons" (after its vendor), the new catalog replaces the previous iBistro online catalog. It is a cata-



log interface supplied by Bibliocommons, a hosted service that overlays the library's integrated library system (ILS), which is SirsiDynix's Symphony. Patrons wanted a "Web experience" in their library catalog, to feel like a user experience in an online bookstore. New features: Users can create and explore recommendations, reviews, and ratings, build

their own personalized reading lists, and have lists of "new books" acquired by the library.

Fourteen Kansas area public libraries recently began using a new Polaris automation system as part of the **South Central Kansas Automation Network** (SCKAN). The SCKAN database currently encompasses nearly 255,000 items from the collections of participating public libraries. SCKAN is administered by the South Central Kansas Library System (SCKLS) in South Hutchinson. According to MPLA member **Larry Papenfuss**, SCKLS Director of Information Technology, "The SCKAN Consortium has provided participating member libraries and their users' access to one of the premier library automation systems in the country. SCKAN offers an automation system to participating member libraries that normally could not afford such highend features. SCKAN allows users more control over their accounts so they can place their own reserves, renew items and view their current checkouts from home or anywhere they have access to a computer and the Internet. SCKAN member libraries are a consortium and are better able to negotiate affordable pricing and discounts. By working together as a group, SCKAN member libraries have enhanced user access to their local library collections and increased the sharing of library materials in our region." Participating SCKAN member public libraries include Arkansas City, Augusta, Burrton, Cheney, Clearwater, Colwich, El Dorado, Haven, Moundridge, Mulvane, Rose Hill, Sterling, Towanda and Whitewater. SCK-AN is funded in part by grants from the federal Library Service and Technology Act (LSTA), SCKLS and participating libraries. SCKLS provides grants, continuing education, consulting and cost-effective support services to 149 member libraries in twelve 12 counties.

MPLA member **Rita Sevart** reports that "the Wichita Area Technical College Library participated in the "Snapshot: A Day in the Life of a Library"



sponsored by the State Library of Kansas. We sent in statistics for patron count, reference questions, and presentations. It just happened that I had two classes com-





The Johnson County Library has launched a new version of The Digital Cemetery, a Web project that provides burial information from local Johnson County cemeteries. The creator of the site, Linda Lewis, Overland Park, KS, has developed it into a popular and well-regarded tool for local historians and genealogists since it went online in 2005 on her private domain. The Library applied for and received grant funding from the Johnson County Heritage Trust Fund to complete the transcriptions and move the site into its technical environment. The work has been completed and The Digital Cemetery is now available at http://cemetery.jocohistory.org. The site allows users to locate graves of loved ones or ancestors by searching through the surname or cemetery indexes which can be searched or browsed alphabetically. Each individual record includes information gleaned from the headstone and photographs of the stone itself. Lewis and a group of volunteers assembled the information by visiting each cemetery in person and manually transcribing the data. As a result, The Digital Cemetery is more complete, detailed and accurate than national websites that provide grave data for Johnson County.

Montana

The **Butte-Silver Bow Public Library** suffered a flooding disaster when a fire suppression water main burst late in November, resulting in damage to the first and second floors and the closure of the library. Free damaged books were offered for the

taking outside the building while staff began the cleanup process. LYRASIS sent hygrometers so staff could moni-




image of librarianship. He said "This may do it!".





Poet: Levi **Romero.** Author of *A Poetry of Remembrance: New* and Rejected Works, In the Gathering of Silence, and other publications, Romero is from the Embudo Valley, a bilingual poet whose language is immersed in the regional 'manito dialect of northern New Mexico.. Joe Sabatini, Co-chair of the New Mexico Library Association's Legislative Committee, provided this update on the successful statewide library bond issues in the 2010 New Mexico General Election. "State General Obligation Bond B, providing \$7 million for public, academic, public school and tribal libraries, passed by an unofficial margin of 23,640 votes. Bond B showed the third-highest level of support among the four state bond issues; the \$5 million public school facilities bond (C) received a 60.7% favorable margin, followed by the \$7 million senior citizen facilities bond (A) with 53.8%, with library bond (B) at 52.3%. Bond D, providing \$155 million for higher education facilities, lost by 2,471 votes, with 49.8% of the yes vote. Meanwhile in Bernalillo County, library bonds providing \$1.5 million to the Albuquerque Bernalillo County Library System passed by a 70.1% margin. In Sandoval County, voters passed a \$3,250,000 bond question to purchase library books,

databases, media, other materials and technology upgrades for the fourteen public libraries in the county.

A LSTA grant of \$11,205 has been awarded to **Corrales Community Library, Placitas Public Library and Jemez Springs Public Library** for their project *"Sandoval County Digital Library Consortium."* The libraries will be working with OverDrive to bring e-audio and e-books to their collective patron base. All three libraries currently have heavy circulation of audio books. The effort will expand the collections without taking up shelf space and will provide convenient access to homebound and rural patrons who find it difficult to visit the library. The Village of Corrales will serve as the fiscal agent for the project.

Farmington Public Library held a Winter Solstice Celebration with a slide talk on recent fieldwork and discoveries regarding solstice markers at Salmon Ruins, presented by Larry Baker, its Executive Director. Shortly before noon, the Ashay Drummers drew observers to the Library's rotunda, for the moment when the sun hangs at the southernmost point of its annual voyage and then turns northward. Sunlight from the rotunda's upper windows entered over the engraved marking on the sandstone floor at noon.

Beth Crist, Library Development Bureau Director at the New Mexico State Library, recently resigned from her position to relocate to Denver, CO where she will assume duties as a Branch Manager for the Denver Public Library System.

North Dakota's 62nd Legislative Session began January 3. Governor Dalrymple presented his budget in December, including full funding for the State Library's current services and an additional \$200,000 for State Aid to Public Libraries. Hulen Bivins was appointed the State Librarian of North Dakota. Bivins previously served as the Assistant Director of the Alabama Public Library Service, where he coordinated the Field Services staff, in-agency library programs, services to the Blind and Physically Handicapped, and the certification program for the payment of state funds to libraries in accordance with state regulations.

The Williston Community Library has acquired a new bookmobile. The WCL bookmobile travels to Ray, Wildrose, Grenora, Alamo, daycares, senior centers, and rural schools throughout Williams County. The \$175,000 purchase was funded by the Williams County Commission, the Williston Community Library Foundation, and numerous generous donations. Their previous bookmobile was in service since 1983.

The **Bowman County High School**'s new library was dedicated to honor Patricia Morland Dyk. The 7,200 square-foot library is part of a \$1.8 million construction project. Dyk served on the Bowman County Board of Education for 12 years and succumbed to cancer in the March of 2008. Dyk was instrumental in making the library possible. Fargo Public Library has joined ND Library2Go, a group of North Dakota libraries that share digital content purchased through OverDrive. The other participating libraries are: Dickinson Public Library, Grand Forks Public Library, James River Valley Library System (Jamestown), McLean-Mercer Regional Library, Minot Public Library, West Fargo Public Library, and Williston Community Library.

Helen Kistler, librarian of the Watts Free Library in Leonard, turned 82 and continues to love her work. She has managed the library as a volunteer since 1971, and has worked hard to keep her small town's cozy library open.

Ashley Turner was hired to be the new head librarian of the **Edna Ralston Library** in Larimore, succeeding Tracy Hemmington.

The **Grand Forks Public Library** received a \$45,000 grant from the John S. and James L. Knight Fund to support the Speak Up For Your Library project. The project is an effort to gather public input about their proposed new library, including forums, Web questionnaires and telephone surveys.

The **Stanley Public Library** received a grant from the North Dakota State Library and the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council to have their holdings added to WorldCat.

The **Sherwood Public Library** received a \$5,000 grant from the North Dakota Community Foundation to be used for library equipment.

Food for Fines events were recently held at both the **Bismarck and Fargo Public Libraries**. The food drives rewarded patrons who donated unexpired non-perishable canned goods with the forgiveness of library fines. Donated items were given to local food banks for distribution.

Dakota Discussions held its first event in Bottineau with a community reading of Aagot Raaen's Grass of the Earth, a biography of a Norwegian family that settled in eastern North Dakota in the late 1800s. Dr. Barbara HandyMarchello, professor emeritus of history and women studies from the University of North Dakota, led a discussion of the book.

Libraries in Stanton, Hazen, and Beulah hosted Write-ins this past November for National Novel Writing Month (NaNoWriMo).

With snow piling up outside, members of the University of North Dakota men's hockey team, with the help of UND's Dr. Laura Munksi, kicked off the winter reading program at the Grand Forks Public Library. It is the first year that the Grand Forks library is participating in the winter reading program in partnership with University of North Dakota.

"Talk" programs have included using Marilynne Robinson's "Housekeeping" as a springboard to examine ideas about mental health, discussing concepts of politics and personal security in light of Philip Roth's "The Plot Against America," and tying Michael Chabon's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel "The Amazing Adventures of Kavalier and Clay" into a look at the pervasiveness and transformation of pop culture. In addition the American Indian Resource Center of the Tulsa City-County Library will be honored with the Humanities in Education Award for achievements in language preservation through development of its Native Language Supplemental Packet

South Dakota

According to MPLA Representative Mike Mullin, **Paula DeMars**, the newly elected President of SDLA, had a dramatic turn in health issues that she has been dealing with since last spring. As a result, she resigned from office in December. **Annie Brunskill**, the Vice-President/President Elect will fill the position of President.

The City of Vermillion has been awarded \$200,000 from the Community Development Block Grant program by Gov. Mike Rounds to expand the **Vermillion Public Library**. "The Vermillion library has increased its community programs and services and outgrown its current space," the Governor said. "These funds will enable the library to meet the demands of patrons and will make it more accessible. I'm pleased to allocate funds for the project."The project includes a 6,500 square-foot addition. The basement on the north side of the library will be enlarged, and the children's area also will be expanded. The library was constructed in 1977 and is currently 11,000 square-feet. The **South Dakota State Library** announced that it has coordinated an agreement with OverDrive to create an affordable self-funded consortium of South


Dakota public libraries to provide participating public library patrons the ability to download audiobooks. An unadvertised advantage of the agreement is that the consortium may purchase titles in all formats offered



by OverDrive. This will allow participating libraries to provide downloadable ebooks, movies and music if the consortium purchases those formats.

All South Dakota students in grades K-5 who've read or had read to them at least five of the titles on the list appropriate for their grade level are eligible to vote. Voting (online only) concludes March 31; winning titles will be announced during National Library Week in April.

The **Brookings Public Library** announces a new series of programs called A Life Explored (ALE) which examines in depth the life of one individual. The 2011 ALE individual will be novelist, nurse, abolitionist and suffragette Louisa Mae Alcott. Among the programs about her life to be presented from January to April are a tea with a panel presentation, two book discussions, a film biography, and a re-enacted



historic performance.

The Utah Library Association Conference Committee is finalizing the schedule of programs for the ULA 2011 Conference. It will be held May 11-13, 2011 in Layton. Luncheon speakers include "Gene Ambaum" and Bill Barnes, the authors of the Unshelved e-comic strip and Scott Douglas, co-author of the book *Quiet Please*, *Dispatches from a Public Librarian*.

The **Orem Public Library** is one of 30 libraries to receive Louisa May Alcott grants for \$2,500 to support five programs based on Louisa May Alcott. The awards are granted by ALA and the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The *Daily Herald* published an article about Nancy Christiansen, the librarian at Aspen Elementary School in Orem, Utah on December 9. The article title was: Nancy Christiansen makes school library warm and welcoming. Nancy described how she deals with students, including learning all of their names, trading book recommendations and allowing students to open "Christmas presents" consisting of wrapped books purchased by the school budget for the library collection. The school principal, Brad Davies, spoke about visitors to the library praising it to him. Principal Davies mentioned that Nancy is involved with the Kids Cause program, which helps low-income children obtain glasses, shoes, coats and medical care.

WYOMING

The **Teton County Library** began a Great Decisions Foreign Policy Discussion Series in January. Participants watch a short video before each discussion to get up to speed on the evening's topic so no preparation is necessary, and drop-ins are welcome. The Foreign Policy Association also provides links to blogs and a PBS television program produced with the discussions. Learn more at <u>www.fpa.org</u>. The **Sheridan County Fulmer Library** hosts a workshop for those considering self publishing a book. Local author, Cynthia Vannoy-Rhoades has published eight books; four of those were self-published. She will share information about costs, options for various printers, problems with traditional publishing, and reasons why a person might want to consider self-publication.

Wyoming's 23 county libraries raised a cumulative \$2.3 million in order to meet the incentive of the **Public Library Endowment Challenge.** Upon reaching this goal, each public library received \$100,000 for their foundation In 2008 the Wyoming State Legislature continued its commitment to Wyoming's libraries with the Public Library Endowment Challenge Program. The bill provides an endowment of \$9.1 million to the foundations of the state's public libraries. An additional \$3 million was appropriated by the legislature in 2010.

The **Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library** began a "lunch and learn" series designed for those

who have little background in money management and will include sessions on The Basics of Money Management; Credit and Debt Management; Home Ownership, Securing a Loan, Refinancing; and Financial Se-

MacArthur Foundation funds 'Reference Extract' to draw on librarians' expertise and add credibility to Web search experience

The John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation has awarded \$350,000 to fund researchers and developers from OCLC, the information schools of Syracuse University and the University of Washington and Zepheira LLC to continue work creating a more credible Web search experience based on the unique expertise, services and input from librarians worldwide.

The goal of the Reference Extract project is to make it easy to find credible information in the digital age. Researchers and developers are expected to have initial practical analysis and models of this "credibility engine" to share with the community in early 2011. Details of the work can be found through the Reference Extract home page at <u>http://www.referencextract.org/</u>.

Reference Extract is designed to capture Web site URLs and references that librarians and other experts use in answering questions. This information, including data used to determine the most credible resources, is harvested, processed and then made available through a variety of Web environments. For example, Reference Extract will use a Web-based architecture that allows information to be embedded



into existing and new Web sites and applications

The Reference Extract system links the questions of users to Web sites referenced by librarians and other experts as well as to the resources used to answer the questions. This approach varies from traditional

> Web search engines that represent only a single type of relationship—a Web page that points to another Web page. Reference Extract adds another relationship—linking to resources that librarians and experts point to and use.

"The best search engines are great for basic search, but sometimes the Web site results lack credibility in terms of trust, accuracy and reliability. So, who can help? Librarians," said Dr. Mike Eisen-

berg, Dean Emeritus and Professor at the Information School of the University of Washington and a lead on the project. "If a librarian recommends a Web site, you can be pretty sure that it's credible. Reference Extract will take hundreds of thousands of librarian recommendations and use them to help indicate to end users which site is credible. We're extremely fortunate to have the MacArthur Foundation's support bringing together the right team to start to actively develop and showcase this work."

ALA Initiative "Our Authors, Our Advocates"

Treasures will be available across multiple mobile platforms including iPhone, An-

droid and iPad. Some of the "treasures" include the first edition of Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, the world's oldest bible Codex Sinaiticus, Nelson's Battle Plan, written before his victory at Trafalgar, Galileo's letters and Leonardo Da Vinci's notebooks.

Expert commentary is provided on many of the items and users can watch, for example, videos of explorer Ben Fogle talking about Scott's Diary and Linguist David Crystal discussing the 1,000 year old poem Beowulf.

Literary highlights include Charles Dickens's handwritten draft of Nicholas Nickleby and Jane Austen's teenage writings, while key historical documents include 2000-year-old Oracle Bones from China and an original Magna Carta of 1215. The section devoted to music includes manuscript scores from some of the best-known classical composers, such as Handel, Purcell, Mozart and Schubert, alongside hand-written lyrics by The Beatles.

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
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
