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

Dear colleagues,

We all know good professional development opportunities are hard to find. You read the session summary, you check out the presenter, you arrange for time to attend, you pay your registration fee, and you hope for the best. More often than not, the session ends up being not quite what you imagined, the presenter was having an off day, the attendees are so-so and you'd rather have had lunch alone. You get back to the office with a couple of handouts and ease back into the old routine. Not much has changed, but at least you got away from the office for awhile.

I want to make sure you are aware of an excellent professional development opportunity that was created just for you! The MPLA Leadership Institute was initiated in 2002 as a way of "growing" leaders for both MPLA and our member states. MPLA desired to help shape the future of libraries, and to fulfill its mission of "providing educational training and growth opportunities for all persons engaged in library activities in the region to enhance their skills and professionalism." MPLA recognized the need to ensure that libraries in its member states were able to remain "competitive" with more populous areas of the country.

To date there have been seven MPLA Leadership Institutes, each with its distinct personality, thanks to the incredible mix of participants and mentors. It's very likely that you know one or more of these folks, or at least know of them through their work or participation in MPLA or State Association activities. It's also very likely that if you were to ask them about their experience with the Leadership Institute, they would tell you it was one of the top (if not the top) professional development experiences they have had. I'll admit to being biased (having attended in 2002), but I don't believe I'm exaggerating.

But It's a Dry Heat...



But It's a Dry Heat...is a series of occasional articles written by an MPLA member living in the Arizona desert. The desert is beautiful and full of life, if you know where to look. It's also hot, and that makes people cranky. What makes them even crankier is when others say, 'but it's a dry heat'. True. But over 110° is just friggin' hot, okay?

You know what else makes me cranky? There is no 'D' for 'Desert' in MPLA. I mean, really! We've already been passed over in <u>America the Beautiful</u>, while **Mountains** show off their 'purple majesties' and **Plains** are 'fruited' (and 'enameled', in a later verse). I'm not sure what that means, but at least it's a mention. And the 'amber waves of grain'? **Plains** again! I'm feeling a little Rodney Dangerfield here...

Just What is MPLA?

MPLA was founded in Estes Park, Colorado, in August of 1948, as a regional library association, already positioning itself between the national *American Library Association* and the local state associations. Like another (more famous) group of Founders, there were heated discussions about individual and state's rights and allegiances, and voices of reason for the common good as documented in *MPLA – The History* by Blaine H. Hall:

Mr. Esterquest...suggested the group was perhaps "giving too much thought to state lines and state associations and should concentrate any emphasis on organizing a regional association on the basis of common problems facing librarians."

Gordon Bennett prophetically observed that "state associations must get behind the regional association if it is to succeed."

Over the years, MPLA continued to define itself as a geographic and professional association, work that continues to this day. The original seven states – Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, and Kansas are states clearly defined by their Mountains and/or Plains, as are three of the more recent additions – Montana (it speaks *mountain*), Nevada (as in *Sierra* ...), and Oklahoma (where the wind comes sweeping down the *Plain*). But Arizona and New Mexico as Mountain Plains? That's a stretch worthy of the Western Jackalope. But I digress...

Sixty-three years along, MPLA is still providing opportunities for individual members of our <u>state associations</u> to address the common problems facing libraries (and the good people who work in them) in the MPLA Region. We meet annually in <u>joint conferences with member states</u> on a rotational basis, and are governed by an <u>elected board of representatives from each member state</u>. In addition to its board and its officers, MPLA activities, including the prestigious <u>Leadership Institute</u>, are carried out by a number of <u>committees</u> and an executive secretary.

And sixty-three years along, MPLA is still refining its purpose and identity as a *regional* library association – how do we support libraries and library colleagues in ways the state and national associations don't (or can't), without taking away from what these valuable resources are and do? And while we can argue the value of membership, the reality is that there is a cost to membership, made more apparent by these difficult financial times.


But MPLA does membership a little differently, the cost is determined by your annual salary and your first year is half-price! Retirees, students, and trustees are eligible for reduced cost memberships, *and* we give away several free memberships at each state's annual conference. Why? We feel that if you experience MPLA, you will want to stay and get involved.

MPLA is not the obvious library association to join. It's definitely a choice, often made after experiencing a conference or networking with an existing member. When I'm proselytizing, I use the 3 Bears analogy:

If Goldilocks worked in a library and went out in search of networking, continuing education, and professional development opportunities, instead of a chair, porridge, and a bed belonging to the 3 Bears, she (or he) might find 3 levels of library associations. The state association is local and accessible, providing a way to jump right in and participate, but limited to the state association and locations. The national association is loaded with resources and specialization, but can be overwhelming and distant. The regional association has a dedicated membership that provides varied perspectives, experience, and opportunities on a personal level. This Goldilocks belongs to all three and gets a lot out of each. But, MPLA is what I do for *me*; it's...just...right.

And yes, we do have bears in Arizona. Now if we can just get that 'D' into MPLA...

JaNae Kinikin, Vice-President/President-Elect. JaNae doesn't have a cell phone and has never text messaged.





Harry Courtright, Director of the Maricopa County Library District (MCLD) in Arizona, is retiring effective August 5. Courtright, 74, who has led the district since 1999, is best known for introducing a cataloging taxonomy at the district's Perry Branch in 2007 that does not rely on the Dewey Decimal Classification. Instead, Courtright decided to use BI-SAC subject headings from the Book Industry Study Group, which he felt would facilitate browsing, a part of his customer-centric approach to librarianship that emphasized customer service over tradition.

The seventh annual **Kingman Area Books Are Magic Fest!** (KABAM) took place May 14.
KABAM promotes the joy of reading and literacy by bringing local and nationally renowned authors, poets and artists to the greater Kingman area. Throughout the week leading up to the festival on Saturday authors visited schools and libraries, conducted book discussions, and attended book signings. Poets and locals alike participated in a "KABAM Poetry Slam".

The week's events culminated with the Saturday festival in a Kingman park. The day was full of entertainment, local businesses and artists exhibiting, children's events, and poets and authors performing. Featured authors included Diana Gabaldon, Roni Capin Rivera Ashford, and Carolyn O'Bagy Davis. George earned his B.A. at Kent State University in History and his MSLS from Clarion University of Pennsylvania. George has been with NWKLS since January of 2008 serving as Assistant Director and the System Consultant. During his tenure, George developed and implemented the auto-

mation plan of the System, which brought about the automation of 13 member public libraries and the system center. In addition, George serves on state wide committees, including the Regional Library Systems Consultants group, Regional Library Systems Administrators group, and Kansas Children and Youth Consultants group and development of the statewide New Directors training.

The Overland Park Community Garden – the city's first – is opening on the lawn adjacent to the **Oak Park Neighborhood Library** in Overland Park. The community garden is a collaborative partnership

of the Overland Park Community Garden, **Johnson County Library**, and the Overland Park Parks & Recreation Department. Any resident of Johnson County is eligible to participate. Participants sign an agreement to abide by the OPCG's rules – including using organic, sustainable growing methods – and pay a rental fee for the season. A total 64 plots comprise the garden.

Hall, who has substantial experience in the comic industry, illustrated the guide, while Upson provided the library tutorials. They both contributed to the story. The guide was created over a five month period and released online in late March. Since the release, the guide has been downloaded over 1.3 million times. Print copies have been produced and released to the McPherson College community. The comic has been featured in Library Journal (http://bit.ly/huPXMB) and on Lizz Zitron's blog *The Outreach Librarian* (http://bit.ly/ <u>h5x7Z2</u>). Upson and Hall have also had a short article accepted for publication in an upcoming issue

Montana

Norma Glock, Montana's MPLA Representative, reports: The Montana Library's annual board retreat leadership meeting was held the end of June. Most of the three days were spent consulting with Ned Cooney of Ascent Strategic Development from Big Fork, Montana. Ned has worked with other libraries in Montana and is familiar with problems all libraries face. The fourteen members began by doing a SWOT analysis of our association. Our brainstorming filled several pages of our perceived Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats. After reviewing the mission statement, a focus question was formulated asking how can the Montana Library Association position itself to advocate for the profession so that librarians and librarians become indispensable in a challenging economic and political climate. The three-year strategic vision developed made us aware of what we wanted to accomplish and what things might get in the way of our desired direction. Ned did an excellent job of consensus building by leading us through small/whole group discussions that led a final action plan for the next year. Three "buckets" were identified as possible goals that were "big enough to matter but small enough to accomplish." The first goal, "Focus and Follow Through" dealt with organizational problems of getting the handbook up-to-date detailing what was expected of each board member and communicating this to the general membership. The second goal, "Create and Earn a Positive Identity" was intended to start us on the road to branding our organization so people inside and outside our association would know what we were all about. The third item, "Engage, Involve, and Unify Membership" discussed practical ways to do this with definite goals of what we wanted to accomplish by the time our annual conference rolled around next April. The final outcomes sounded simple enough but the many discussions that took place brought the board to better understanding of our association. The Strategic Plan will be visited each year to see how we are progressing toward our final goals. All board members felt it was a positive retreat and gave us an optimistic look to the future.



Funding matters throughout the state: Libri Foundation grants were awarded to the Finley City Library and the New Rockford Public Library. The Libiri grants were awarded for the purchase of children's books. The Griggs County Library received funding from the P.E.O. Sisterhood to help cover the costs of automation. The Stanton Public Library has added a second public computer through a grant from the North Dakota State Library. The proposed 1% sales tax increase to fund a new building for the Grand Forks Public Library was voted down on May 3.

Oklahoma

The Friends of the Mustang Public Library raised \$30,000 to help buy a LED sign for the Town Center Complex. A local family foundation that asked to remain anonymous donated the last \$10,000 the group needed to meet its goal. The sign is a joint project with the city of Mustang, which also will pay about \$30,000. A 10-foot-by-4-foot double-faced electronic sign will alert passers-by to events sponsored by the Mustang Parks and Recreation Department, the Mustang Senior Center and the Mustang Public Library. The sign will be in front of the Town Center Complex. A variety of donors contributed to the fundraising campaign, including First National Bank and Trust, which donated \$10,000.

LaWalta "Wally" Turner was recently honored for her service to public libraries upon completion of her six-year term on Oklahoma Department of Libraries Board.

The Oklahoma Department of Libraries is sponsoring Mission Critical Response and Recovery: Protecting Your Agency's Essential Functions Before, During, and After an Emergency, two days of training on Essential Records—July 20 and Emergency Planning and Response—July 21.

South Dakota

The flood that swept through Rapid City the night of June 9, 1972 left behind a path of destruction and changed the landscape of Rapid City forever. In commemoration of the 39th anniversary of the flood, the **Rapid City Public Library** hosted two events on June 9. The public was able to view the Library's collection of flood information and online resources, talk to staff about the Oral Histories Project, look at enlarged before and after photos of areas impacted by the flood, check out the new Google Memory Map and add their own memories to the map. The Oral Histories Project is an effort to record



the memories and events of the night of the 1972 Flood, through the eyes and minds of those that experienced it first-hand, with recorded interviews and statements. Around 90 people attended. A panel discussion was held with Ronald W. and Lavonne Masters authors of Some through the flood: A Story of one Family's Loss, Survival and Recovery from the 1972 Rapid City Flood; Margaret Kavorik, a retired nurse who helped the DCI and managed incoming phone calls, DelRita Schouten who lost her home and everything inside it to the flood, and Charles Childs, a County Probation Officer who was involved in the rescue efforts and put in charge of the Missing Person/Body Identification process. 50 people attended the discussion and the question and answer session afterwards. The work of the Oral Histories Project is featured on the library's website. The website also includes the Dewall Collection, a large collection of digitally preserved transcripts and audio news broadcasts of the events of the night. The Library also hosts a Flood wiki that allows individuals to provide their

own stories and pictures by writing memories down in the wiki. The wiki also





features more than 100 pictures comparing the aftermath of the flood to the landscape 20 years later, comments from former mayor Don Barnett, and other reports from KOTA broadcasting. For the month of June the library had 3268 visits to the website and wiki pages.

The Friends of the Library for **Hot Springs Public Library** constructed a 30'x50' building. The new "Book Barn" will be home to the on-going book sales and also used for storage by the Library and the Friends.



The Watertown Regional Library, the Watertown Community Foundation, the Codington County Heritage Museum, the Boys & Girls Club, along with volunteers, sponsored a week-long History Camp for young historians in the community.

Dawn Johnson of the **Hot Springs Public Library** has attended & completed classes in Aberdeen, SD to attain her Certificate in Public Library Management

MPLA member **Marguerite Cullum**, director at the Custer County Library, retired June 24 with 30 years in the South Dakota Retirement System. Marguerite began working at the Custer School Library

in early 1980 as a library aide and continued to work there for over 8 years. With a few assorted jobs in between, she then went on to work for the Custer county Library



as its director in 1989 and continued for 22 years. She says she has loved seeing the library grow as well as the patrons who have come through the doors for story hour and are now returning as adults. Her accomplishments include expanding and automating

the Custer Library, adding a branch library on the eastern-side of the county in Hermosa, and most recently creating a foundation for the library. In August Marguerite will go on to yet another library in Custer County, joining the team at the Crazy Horse Memorial Library.

Doris Ann Mertz is the new Director of the Custer County Library. She and her family recently

moved to Custer from the mountains of Northern Arizona. She was most recently employed as the library manager at Williams Elementary/Middle School and was active in various community service organizations in Williams.



Missouri River flooding left many displaced in South Dakota and other MPLA states. The South Dakota State Library and Rawlins Municipal Library in Pierre are high and dry, but many staff members in both Pierre and Ft. Pierre along with thousands of others have been displaced due to the flooding of the Missouri River. Super human efforts in both communities resulted in over a million sandbags being filled and placed, a series of levees built, and assistance provided to people needing to move completely out of their homes in a short period of time. The National Guard was called in along with additional law enforcement to provide traffic control as the levees were being built. As of June 20, the Oahe Dam at Pierre was releasing water at a rate of 160,000 cubic feet per second, which may continue to increase and remain high through mid-August. Utah

As the **Utah** Shakespeare Festival celebrates its 50th season this year, the **Southern Utah University Gerald R. Sherratt Library** is hosting one of the first folios of William Shakespeare.

The Salt Lake City Main Library presented Nano Days, a free event to introduce children to nanotechnology, the interdisciplinary field that explores ways to harness particles at the molecular level. Advances could lead to technologies to produce clean energy, treat diseases and many other economic drivers. Five scientists associated with the University of Utah's Nano Institute are participants. Demonstrations include memory wire, sand that can't get wet, and lasers that control nanoparticles, which are as small as a nanometer, or one-billionth of a meter. The Utah Museum of Natural History and the Leonardo are co-sponsoring the event.

From the Salt Lake Tribune: Parents of autistic

children in Utah have a new refuge in a one-of-akind story time at the **Kearns Library**. Children's story hours are a regular feature for most libraries, but Special Needs Sensory Story Time at Kearns Library is the first in Utah created specifically for autistic children. The Kearns Library began the program it quietly built a following in the community. The Special Needs Sensory Story Time was created to give autistic children and their parents a place to go without worry. "Parents have trouble bringing their kids some places because they act out," said Carrie Rogers-Whitehead, a librarian at the Kearns Library and the creator of Special Needs Sensory Story Time. "They're afraid to bring their kids to library programs," she added. "Their kids might scream or run around. Then the moms will have to leave, and they're embarrassed." The program was designed after a similar one Rogers found in North Carolina. Special Needs Sensory Story Time engages as many senses as Rogers can incorporate. With every story, she uses music, pictures and items like beanbags and ribbons for the kids to touch. Engaging multiple senses is important, she said, because some autistic kids don't learn just by hearing. Rogers even incorporated two visuals to each story, the illustrations with her books and a board where she can act out parts of the story. "I think it's an emphasis on the visual and the tactile," Rogers said. "In a regular story time, I would just read the story and that would be it."



Wyoming

A unique art exhibit featuring photographs taken by people who were once blind but can now see because of a corneal transplant will be at **Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library** from June 30 through July 28. The exhibit is presented by the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Bank and is slated to tour Wyoming through the summer of 2011.

The **Teton County Library** invites parents and child care providers to learn how to get kids, ages birth-5, ready to succeed in school during two free June workshops, which will be presented in English and Spanish. Participants registered for the workshop will receive free copies of the books "Every Child Ready to Read" and "Every Child Ready for Math" by the Lee Pesky Learning Center and provided by the John P. Ellogen Foundation. The workshops are being presented as part of Systems of Education (SOE), a collaboration coordinated by the library and involving local schools and non-profits who share a common vision for the academic success of students in Teton County.

Several new faces have appeared at the library circulation desk of the **Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library.** Adam Benson has added to his library responsibilities. On mornings, he works as the Foundation Assistant and on afternoons, he's at the circulation desk. Anna Veinbergs is returning to the library after a year working in the Washington DC area. Anna formerly worked at the Information Services desk at Fulmer Library. New to the library are **Crystal Valentine** and **Elisa Robbins**.

In May the **Teton County Library** and the Latino community celebrated "carnaval" with traditional dance from the Mexican state of Tlaxcala. Thirty dancers and musicians performed traditional dance, born out of 17th Century Mexico when wealthy European landowners refused to allow the native Mexican Indians access to their social parties and dances. Following the traditional style of performing in several locations in their neighborhoods, the group also performed at other venues throughout Jackson.

Severe Flooding Impacts Minot Public Library North Dakota

The Minot Public Library closed Tuesday, June 21 and will be closed for at least two to three weeks because of the historic flood we are having in Minot.

The Corps of Engineers diked in all infrastructure which includes the Library and the City hall complex across the street from us. The dike on the west side of the library is about 15 - 16 foot high and the dike to the north and east will be about 5 to 8 feet high.

As a precaution and all contents were moved from the lower level and the first floor to the second floor and the west mezzanine as a fall back if the dike should fail. The bad news is that the library basement began taking on a lot of water early June 27. Luckily we had the National Guard monitoring and removing water from a leak. While they were there water began coming up the elevator shaft very rapidly. The water pressure from the river force the water in.

The Guard Sergeant gave me a call immediately about 1:00 AM and I called Dan J, assistant public works director, to meet at the public library with guard officers. Dan coordinated bring in large pumps to pump water from the elevator shaft. The National Guard Guys set up the large pumps and we were pumping in 1 1/2 hours. The basement got about 2 to 3 inches of water but after the pumps went into action the water began to go down. The pumps are keeping the water down and the guard is monitoring the pumps 24/7.

It could have been worse if we had not removed all of the contents to the 2nd floor. The water will be high for a week to two weeks. Besides the National Guard we had staff and volunteers who wet vacuumed the water which was leaking into the exit door on the lower level.

The Souris River flood waters begin to surround the Minot Public Library and in Minot, North Dakota, USA 23 June, 2011.

We have been very focused on recovery although many of the areas of the city are still flooded. The dike at the Library and our proactive stance in monitoring the basement saved the library from having substantial damage. Not that we did not have damage in the basement. Had we not monitored the basement it would have filled with water and potentially have threatened the first floor level of the library.

We began seeking bids for immediate cleanup and accepted a bid from SERVPRO to remove flood damaged sheet rock, insulation and carpet and disinfect the basement. They began their work on Friday, July 9th and as of Monday July 11 will have all of the physical damage removed. The basement will be disinfected later this week.

Severe Flooding Minot continued:

SERVPRO was very complimentary of actions taken by staff, volunteers, City Staff and the National Guard to save the basement from inundation. They indicated that our building was one of the few that kept water at check and humidity below saturation levels. We had around the clock removal of water and an enclosed system of circulation air in the basement. Mechanical air circulation in that portion of the building was completely locked down so air from the basement would not penetrate the rest of the building and the air duct work. We were able to maintain temperatures in the basement between 67 and 70 degrees for two weeks which kept mold to a minimum. Water is still up on the sides of the dikes while damaged material is being removed.

Prior to the flooding we already had an initial contact with SERVPRO. During the week flooding began National SERVPRO crews inspected the basement as well as two other companies that gave us a bids the following week. The Minot Public Library was one of the first buildings in the community to begin removal of damage.

We hope to have the library opened by this weekend to bring some more normalcy back to the community. Staff and volunteers have been moving books back to the first floor children's library since Thursday, July 7 with the approval of the Emergency Operation Council.


I served on the Emergency Operations Council as an assistant public information officer until the library started taking on water in the basement on June 23. I am still attending morning meetings with the EOC and have been able to communicate with City Staff, Corps of Engineers and National Guard to get assistance during this long flood event. Having direct communications at the EOC to me has been very beneficial for the library and keeping informed.
