Appreciation. It is a topic I have been reading about lately and one that is critical in the workplace. According to an article by Paul A. Cooperstein (http://businessmomentum.org/research/article_appreciation.html) people leave jobs not because of unsatisfactory compensation, but because of lack of appreciation. Co-authors Gary Chapman and Paul White in their book The Five Languages of Appreciation in the Workplace describe the different languages of appreciation that people speak in the work environment. Some people appreciate words either spoken or written. Others respond to time spent with their supervisor or co-workers. Still other people appreciate gifts. Finally, some view acts of service or offerings of help as appreciation.

Coincidentally, I just recently received an email from CRM Learning entitled 'Tis the Season for Appreciation. This article argues that although people need appreciation all through the

year, it seems that during the holidays people may be just a little more accepting and appreciative. This article, argues for day to day appreciation, which, the authors say, results in greater cooperation and collaboration among co-workers. Sue Knesel, Youth Services Librarian, Campbell County Public Library, Gillette, WY. \$600 grant to attend the PLA Conference, March 14, Philadelphia and the workshop "Special Needs, Talented Children: Outreach Services to Families with Special Needs"

In her final report Sue said: I learned how just through small adjustments we can have better inclusion during storytime....
My objective for attending was more than met. I wanted to better understand the range of problems parents encounter with the usual library routine. I learned about over stimulation, large crowds, fast pace programs, music too loud, no schedule the child can follow to anticipate what will happen next. These are just a few of the regular and acceptable programming activities that can cause inappropriate behavior in public by an Autistic child. I acquired the tools to train staff, and understand how to be less intimidating to parents just venturing out with special needs children....PLA always offers wonderful training opportunities and without the grant I couldn't have absorbed the expenses so that one of my staff members was able to experience PLA for the first time. It was great to see how excited and how much information she absorbed and came back to work with great ideas to help us do a better job at our library. She and I are excited to pass on what we learned to the rest of the staff.

Nita Gill, Adult Services Librarian, Brookings Public Library, SD. \$150 grant to attend PLA conference 2012, March 14-17, Philadelphia.

Nita says One of my main objectives in going to PLA was to bring back ideas, techniques, and programs to use at my library. I do think the educational programs successfully contributed to my reaching this objective. I went to a wide range of programs. Three of those programs were on collection development, two on trends in genre fiction and one romance panel. I took away the most from these programs trends in genres I don't personally read – like horror and gentle fiction... Another objective was to network. That objective was definitely met. I met librarians from all over the United States and swapped stories, ideas, and business cards. I will also include visiting the vendor exhibits as networking. There were some booths I specifically set out to stop at and talk to their representative to learn more about their product.... I would definitely recommend MPLA members attend PLA. Just the experience of gathering with hundreds of librarians makes it worth the trip.

Shereen Rasor, School Library Media Specialist, Mustang Creek Elementary School, Yukon, OK. \$150 grant to attend the Oklahoma Library Association annual conference, March 29, Norman, OK.

Shereen says I attended all of the Sessions offered on the Sequoyah Children's Choice award. I was very encouraged and learned many new ideas to implement and promote Sequoyah in my school. I also got posters and bookmarks from vendors to promote Sequoyah. The three Sessions presented by each Sequoyah committee gave me a wealth of information about the books on the upcoming year's masterlist. The session on promoting Sequoyah at all levels provided me with a wealth of resources available on the Sequoyah website.... I appreciate the opportunity to attend this conference and meet with fellow librarians in order to strengthen the Sequoyah program in my school district. The district does not fund OLA conference expenses and it helps to have support as a new librarian in getting involved in such events.

Rita Sevart, Director, Wichita Area Technical College Library. \$150 grant to attend the NMLA/NEMA/MPLA Joint conference as Co-coordinator of the MPLA Professional Forum. October, 2012 La Vista, NE.

Rita said As co-coordinator, we developed the guidelines for the papers; solicited for presenters; requested the room and equipment; picked judges; evaluated the presentations; set up the room and let the presenters and judges do their work...It was a good team that worked together to make the forum come alive, and I think we are ready to try it again. The presentations were amazing; the judges were enthusiastic; and there were about twelve attendees for an early morning session—very good. I would highly recommend this to the presenters (good experience, even if they don't win); to judges (way to mini-mentor); to audience (what a way to get so much information on a variety of subjects in such a short amount of time) and possible coordinators (great rewards for everyone with a short-time investment of marketing, planning, and follow-through).

Jon Fackrell, Student, Emporia State University. \$150 grant to attend ALA Annual Conference, June, 2012, Anaheim, CA. Jon says To get the most out of the conference, I attended as many sessions as I could every day that I was in Anaheim...I found myself in one of the afternoon pre-conference sessions on Leadership & Management. It was an excellent course where the two instructors talked about many of the struggles you have as a director and specifically about how to interact with and manage people....another session that I found fascinating was one where the speaker talked about managing IT projects in the library....I was very excited to learn more about LITA and attended several of their programs to learn about technology, web design practices, and IT project implementation in libraries....Without hesitation, I would recommend attending an ALA Annual Conference to any MPLA member. It is an excellent opportunity for librarians to learn what other libraries are doing and innovative ways they have found to add value to the services they provide. It is also a great opportunity to see what library vendors have to offer and rethink your library space, technology, and inventory.

Utah Library Association \$500 Preconference grant for "Vital Conversations for Individuals." Dorothy Horan reported that evaluations indicated participants were happy with the presentation. Most of them rated the program at a 5 out of 5. Comments from participant evaluation forms noted satisfaction with:

North Dakota Library Association. \$500 Pre-conference Grant for "Turning the Page 1.0 Kick-Off Event." Rita Ennen reported The North Dakota Library Association hosted a pre-conference kick-off event for the last Turning the Page 2.0 training to be offered... The kick-off event was an introduction to the course that explained the process and goals. There were opportunities to discuss previous successes and failures in advocacy efforts. Participants were encouraged to come with an advocacy goal for their library. During the pre-conference, participants had writing goals that were specific and actionable. The facilitators for the Kick-off event were Judy Drescher, former director of Libraries for Memphis, Tennessee and Past President of the Public Library Association, and Steve Yacovelli, owner and principal of TopDog Learning Group, Orlando, Florida.

Nebraska Library Association \$500 Preconference Grant for "Run, Run to Reading Aloud!" Brenda Ealey reported that Read Aloud Nebraska, Nebraska Regional Library Systems and Nebraska Library Association School Children & Young Peoples Section sponsored the preconference, on October 17th in LaVista, for the MPLA/NLA/NSLA conference. It featured children's book authors – Jim Aylesworth & Lisa Campbell Ernst. It also included a session on the One Book One School program, and a panel of notable Nebraska children's authors. One of the goals was to respond to interest expressed in having authors at conference, and the numbers attending seem to reflect the appreciation for this type of program. There was lots of enthusiasm for the opportunity to hear Lisa Campbell Ernst and Jim Aylesworth – since both are nationally recognized and have made significant contributions to children's literature on an award winning basis. The Nebraska author panel also added interest, with an opportunity to showcase regional talent – also award winners, with Julia Cook, Preston McDaniels and James Solheim present. All authors at the event shared personal stories involving their work and the importance of reading – as well as the critical roles librarians play in that effort. It was a great motivator for attendees and encouraged continued efforts in work with youth in the areas of reading, as well as the important factor of reading aloud. Attendees also had the opportunity to receive information on setting up a One Book, One School program in their community with minimal cost and the incentive of involving multiple organizations. There was time for discussion and questions, demonstrating a level of interest in replicating in additional communities.





Retiring MPLA Member Basha Hartley Reflects on her Career

I have been with Pioneer Library System for 26 years! I have been Norman Public Library Children's Department Manager for 21 years. During this time, I have enjoyed lots of hard work and lots of fun. I have been honored to work with the best Children's Staff in the universe. For most if not all of these 21 years, the Norman Public Library Children's Department has accounted for one third to one half of the program attendance for the entire nine branch library system. We have been busy with happy families and amazing children! We have presented thousands of



storytimes in English, Spanish and French! We are now presenting storytimes to the children of the children we presented storytime to 20 years ago! I have brought exhibits to the library of model trains (I never met a train I didn't like), imaginative art creations, stamps, flowers (who knew there were that many kinds of irises), pigeons (every library needs birds flying around, just adds to the ambiance), gigantic live insects (even homeless people want to pet the giant millipedes), cows (the secret is to put the cow in the doorway, pet the front end inside and the back end hangs outdoors to provide compost) and assorted porcupines (beware, giant porcupines eat shoes), snakes (big snakes are easier to hold for the kids to pet, I once lost a small snake in my dress, which gave me some discomfort, and gave the snake abject terror), and other exotic animals. We have presented plays, music programs,

magic programs, drama classes, cooking classes, exercise classes, folk dancing and crafts of every description, glitter everywhere. I have marched in parades and given programs and plays in schools. I have given presentations to civic groups, scientists, parents, children and librarians. I have worn pirate costumes, lion costumes, bear costumes, and a Jessica costume with a giant head and a malfunctioning fan (dancing in a Jessica costume in 103 degree heat is a great way to pass out). We have welcomed families from countries around the

globe who have shared their beautiful children, their culture, their food, and their wisdom. My friends have included librarians, authors, magicians, cowboys, folk singers, clowns and zoo keepers. And wonderful parents and children!

I was active in the Oklahoma Library Association (I think I held every position except President) and attended every conference for those 26 years. I have been to several ALA conferences. I discovered Mountain Plains Library Association in 1991 at the Phoenix conference. During all these 21 years, I have been honored to belong to this organization. I have been to most of the conferences, I have served as state representative, committee chair and secretary. I have learned so much from my friends at MPLA. They have given me courage and resolve when I was discouraged, celebrated with me when I was excited and always kept me passionate about librarianship. The core of librarianship is our customers and how we make a difference in all these lives in our community, our college, our school. I think that it is that passion that kept me active. These MPLA folks really care about making the world a better place, one customer at a time. My friends have included all those wonderful and heroic librarians and their rubber duckies.

I have been active in the community. I have been a member in every coalition for young children in our town; if there was a group trying to improve the lives of our children, I was there. I served on the Red Ribbon Week Coalition for several years. I served on the Children's Rights Commission for the City of Norman for 11 years and am currently on the Social and Voluntary Responsibilities Commission for the City. I was honored to be a member of the Group Study Exchange for the Norman Rotary Club and to visit Finland for 5 weeks as a team member and several years later, for another 5 weeks as a Team Leader. I have been a member of the Norman Rotary Club for 17 years and was Norman Rotary Club President two years ago. I have been active in the Norman Downtowners Association and the Chamber of Commerce. My friends have included day care providers, social workers, police officers, business owners, bankers, scientists and retired folks.

And now it is time to rest and recharge those batteries! I plan to nap for several months and then travel. I plan to hang out in Sweden to be Grandma to my "barnbarns". They will try to teach me Swedish and I will try to get them to speak English. Hopefully we will meet somewhere in the middle. I want to visit my family and friends all over the country. I want to go back to the Arctic Circle in the summer to camp and hike. Cruises sound really good too. I am going out to lunch with all those folks I promised to go to lunch with and never did. I want to teach Sunday School again since I will not be working weekends. I plan to continue teaching water aerobics classes at the YMCA and hopefully teach arthritis classes too. I want to perfect new recipes to inflict on my patient husband and spend barefoot days in the garden mucking about. Many years ago, when I spent the summer as camp cook for an archaeological dig, my husband said I named every turtle who wandered by. He is encouraging me to name the current turtle crop. As you can see, there is lots of important stuff in the plans.

A New Look for the Main Library in Kalispell

In October 2012, the Main Library in Kalispell reopened with a new look, focusing on comfortable and welcoming public spaces, efficient checkout and holds pickup, and continued excellent customer service. Features include a redesigned main floor with easy self-check stations, expanded seating areas with plenty of natural light, smaller service desks, lower shelves for easy browsing and more displays.

In the children's area, colorfully painted walls provide a cheerful backdrop for early learning computers for young children, low child-friendly shelves, the storytime area, and experience zones and toys designed to encourage early literacy.

With library use up 40 percent in the past five years, and no increase in staff, the Flathead County Library System has made an effort to improve efficiency in areas such as checkout and materials processing, and allow staff more time for in-depth work with customers. This year all staff received additional training in helping customers by answering in-depth questions, recommending books and movies, and assisting with the latest technology. In addition, early literacy programs and materials for young children continue to be essential services.

Despite the focus on self-checkout, library staff hours have not been cut. For customers who want to grab their holds or quickly check out a few books, the process is much faster with self-checkout. At the same time, staff are able to spend more time helping customers find the books and movies they want and answering account questions. Most customers are enthusiastic about the changes, especially the added comfortable seating, self-checkout and newly painted spaces.

January 30 is the **Nebraska Library Association** advocacy day in Lincoln. Librarians are encouraged to come to the capitol to speak with their state representative about state support of libraries and the special budget initiative to fund ebook access across the state.

Friends of the **Columbus Public Library** presented a program by former CIA agent Mike Floyd on January 13. Floyd is a co-author of the book, *Spy the Lie: former CLA agents teach you how to detect deception*. Floyd said "My formative years were spent at the Columbus Public Library either attending 'Story Hour' or checking out children's books. I cannot imagine what my life would have been but for the availability of the library and its dedicated staff."

Nevada

The **Elko-Lander-Eureka Library System** is sponsoring a Lego Creations contest in January with entries in five categories: a family or team category,

and four individual age-based categories. Patrons will vote for the winners who will be announced on February 1.

A ballot initiative to fund a new **Carson City** Knowledge and Discovery Center by increasing sales tax by a quarter of a cent was turned down by voters. The final tally showed that 68% voted no. If the project had been approved, the land would have been donated but the donation has been withdrawn.

January at the **Washoe County Library** is a time for a major Friends of the Library book sale, providing essential support for library programming.

The library is also conducting a series of "eBooks @ your Library" sessions, hoping to reach new users of smartphones, tablets, and readers.



The statewide theme for **Nevada Reading Week**, the annual celebration of reading in school and public libraries, is Read It! Dream It! Do It!. March is Nevada Reading Month, although many schools celebrate the week at different times to accommodate special events and test schedules.

The Nevada Reading Week Conference for librarians and teachers is scheduled for February 22 – 23, and will feature children's authors Candace Fleming, Eric Rohmann, and Judy Freeman as keynote speakers. Registration will be available on the website at www.nevadareadingweek.com.

The **Carson City Library**'s upcoming programs include free business and marketing classes at the BRIC (Business Resource Innovation Center), tax preparer information sessions, Love on a Leash Therapy Dog reading program, and an Explore the World series, which focuses on a different part of the world each month.

A Las Vegas-Clark County Library District current Facebook contest features a prize of a framed animation cel from the *Chuck Jones Experience* at Circus Circus. Chuck Jones was the creator of Bugs

Bunny, Daffy Duck, the Tasmanian Devil, Yosemite Sam, and other characters. The library system offers a wide range of activities ranging from yoga classes to Extreme Knitting.



A recent article in the Reno newspaper cited MPLA member **Arnie Maurins**, Director of the **Washoe County Library**, as saying that he believes that library operations in Washoe County have somewhat stabilized, and that volunteer services may help to restore some library hours that were cut. Because of severe 44% budget cuts, over 100 of 225 staff positions and one-third of library hours have been cut during the last four years.





Oklahoma



The collection, funded through a grant from the Institute of Turkish Studies, includes more than 75 volumes and includes novels and poetry by distinguished authors, history and geography, art and architecture, cookbooks, travel books and volumes for children. A panel of Turkish natives and area teachers who traveled to Turkey in 2012 discussed the importance of selected authors and groups of works. The discussion shed light on the distinctive nature of Turkey, a country which historically and currently plays a pivotal role in world affairs. The evening also featured displays of the books and Turkish artifacts. Refreshments inspired by Turkish cuisine rounded out the evening. H. M. Briggs Library, the South Dakota World Affairs Council, the World Affairs Councils of America, and the Turkish Cultural Foundation co-sponsored the event. The **South Dakota State Library** is undergoing a strategic planning process. MPLA member **Mary Bushing** has been hired as facilitator. An advisory group has been formed and the first in-person meeting will be in February. A new strategic plan should be approved by the end of 2013.

South Dakota has a **Little Free Library** in Sisseton. It's basically a glorified box sitting in a couple's front yard with books in it. People can take a book out, put another one in and continue the cycle of book sharing. Little Free Library is a non-profit organization that started a few years ago in Wisconsin and has spread to countries around the world. The Sisseton location is the first to be registered in South Dakota.

In Rapid City, the new County/City Public Library East held a grand opening on November 30. The library brings together **Western Dakota Tech Rapid City**, and **Pennington County** libraries.

The **Vermillion Public Library** construction and renovation continues. The newly constructed 6500 square foot addition is complete, and renovation of the original 11,000 square foot library has begun. The project is scheduled to be complete in April 2013.

The **Hanson Area Community Library** in Alexandria is nearing completion. The library is a shared venture by the city, school, and surrounding area.

Patrons of 62 public libraries in South Dakota now have access to downloadable ebooks and audiobooks through **SD Titles to Go**, a program coordinated by the **South Dakota State Library** to allow public libraries to purchase titles from Overdrive.

Utah State Librarian and MPLA member **Donna Jones Morris**, reported to the Utah Library Association Board that \$565,007 in Community Library Enhancement Funds was distributed to 56 public libraries. The majority of the funds were spent on collection development and public access technology projects.

Utah has four *Library Journal Star Librar-ies*: Salt Lake City Public Library (\$10–29.9 million); Grand County Library (\$400K –999.9K); Mt Pleasant Public Library (\$100K–199.9K); and Lewiston Public Library (\$10K-49.9K).

The Special Libraries section of the **Utah Library Association** took a field trip to the **Utah State Library** in November. They toured the services for the Blind and Disabled, Library Resources, and Library Development. They were able to view the largest collection of Braille in the world and a Mobile Library.

The **Utah State Library** announced ten new strategic partners who helped sponsor and present at library events throughout 2012; some of these events included Utah Education Association, Utah Library Association, Senior Expo, Disney Days, KSL Family Book Festival, Festival Latino Americano, and the Native American Summit.

Colleen Eggett, Utah State Library, announced "Turning the Page, Utah 2.0": a series of one-hour, online education programs for library staff and trustees. The sessions include Public Perceptions, Telling your Story, You as Leader, Building relationships, The "Big Ask, and "So What's Next?"

The **Pleasant Grove Library** director, **April Harrison**, recently learned she will be adding a new hat to her library wardrobe. April will also be the Director of Arts and Culture, overseeing the Arts Commission, the City Orchestra, Concerts in the Park, the Utah Children's Choir of Pleasant Grove, and the city's Historic Preservation Commission. In an article in Provo's Daily Herald, April said she is excited to be the liaison to these groups and looks forward to working with an outstanding group of volunteers.



Wyoming

According to an article in the Casper Star-Tribune, homeowners across Wyoming are opening their own libraries - filling nightstands, antique ice-boxes and homebuilt boxes with books. The Little Free Libraries offer 24-7 access to books for residents with limited access to traditional public libraries. They are also become gathering places. The idea for Lit-

tle Free Libraries came from Wisconsin, where they originated in 2009 and were publicized on National Public Radio.

The Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library will host two adult reading and discussion series beginning in January. The first series is *The West and the Wild: Preserve and Plunder – Waiting for Thunder.* This monthly Sunday afternoon series is moderated by Rebecca Leibinger, Sheridan College faculty member, and includes four nonfiction books and several videos. The first book in the series, *What You See in Clear Water* by Geoffrey O'Gara, deals with water, or the lack of it, in Wyoming on the Wind River Reservation. Participants may check out a copy of this title at the Fulmer Library Circulation Desk. The second series is on *Characters Who Live on ... After You've Finished the Final Page.* The first book in the series is *The Great Gatsby* by F. Scott Fitzgerald.

Cindy Moore has been selected Director of the Albany County Public Library in Laramie. She begins in February. She was with the Sweetwater Library when she attended the 2010 Leadership Institute. Her most recent position was branch manager of the Park County Library System Powell Library, Wyoming. She replaces Susan Simpson who retired.

The **Teton County Library** invites participants to bring a shrunken sweater to a January program on DIY Craft Night: Repurposing Wool. Materials to refashion it are provided.

The Natrona County Public Library is an active partner in several community initiatives related to the health and wellbeing of local citizens. As a result of one such partnership, the library will host a free, fourpart screening of HBO's "The Weight of the Nation," aimed at initiating community discussion on the topic of obesity. Partner organizations with the library include the Casper Recreation Center, University of Wyoming Extension, Prevention Management Organization, Wyoming Business Coalition on Health, Wyoming Medical Center, Natrona County Public Library, Wyoming Health Fairs and the Casper-Natrona County Health Department.

The **Teton County Library** closed for two weeks for the finishing touches to its addition and renovation. When it opens in January it will have a larger auditorium; a cozier reading room; a new computer lab; a public art installation and a permanent nook for the ever-popular booksale organized by the Teton County Library Friends. The library's volunteer group, the Friends, will begin accepting book donations at the library when the library reopens. On that day, the Friends will also open the Friends Book Nook, a combination book sale and coffee cart. The booksale raises money for the library and recycles favorite reads in the community. A combination of public and private funding made the addition and renovation possible. Voters approved the Specific Purpose Excise Tax beginning in 2008 and the Teton County Library Foundation raised money to make it possible to include a fireplace and locally-made, craftsman-style furniture in the reading room.

The Wyoming State Library and Collaborative Summer Library Program have announced the 2013 Wyoming Teen Video Challenge. Teens (age 13-18) can create a 30-90 second video promoting the summer reading theme "Beneath the Surface" and win \$275 for themselves and \$125 for their public library.
