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


LEGAL REFERENCE WEBINAR

Data Librarians not only teach informatics classes within the OI&LS program but also work closely with UNM researchers on creating data management plans and then archiving the data. NMLF supports libraries in New Mexico by allocating funds to libraries of all types and to nonprofit organizations that directly benefit libraries. NMLF is the beneficiary of a very generous donation

from the Alliance for Information Science and Technology Innovation (AISTI). The \$139,000.00 donation is the largest in the Foundation's history and represents a significant gift to New Mexico libraries. Past projects have supported ideas such as book fairs, summer reading activities, and bilingual projects and this gift may be used to support innovative services in the areas of science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).

"The Metadata Manual: A Practical Workbook" written by Rebecca Lubas and Amy Jackson from University of New Mexico and Ingrid Schneider from New Mexico State University was published in June by Chandos Publishing. The Manual provides basic instruction in the creation of metadata, the descriptive information that makes digital objects searchable. The manual also provides specific information on four common metadata schemes and is intended for cultural heritage professionals who lack the resources needed to obtain

Ann and Dale Marks gave a generous and impressive donation of land worth over \$900,000 to be sold to support the building of a new library in Jamestown.

The Aneta Public Library received a bequest from the estate of Alice Retzlaff Carlson in the amount of \$50,000.

First Community Credit Union recently made a donation of \$3000 to the James River Valley Library System to go towards the construction of a new library.

The Leach Public Library's Summer Reading Program came to a close after a wildly successful year with 182 participating children.

The Harvey Public Library scheduled

several Reading to Dogs events as part of their Summer Reading Program.

Jill Bjerke was recently hired as the director of the Carnegie Regional Library in Grafton. Melissa Lloyd is the new Youth Services Coordinator for the Valley City-Barnes County Public Library. She's responsible for both the children's library and their new teen area.

The Dickinson Area Public Library is looking for a new director. Current director Renee Paasch will be retiring at the end of the year.

The Praxis Strategy Group, on behalf of the Grand Forks Public Library, recently conducted an online survey to help inform recommendations regarding the library's future. More than 700 people responded. 85% of respondents strongly agreed that the library was a worthwhile community investment. Poll responses indicated that money would be better spent on a new facility rather than remodeling the existing library building. In addition to online surveys, meetings are being held to gather public input.

The Lidgerwood Library hosted a pajama party to end the summer reading program. The children laced earthworm pictures, had a snack, and listened to 3 stories -"How Do Dinosaurs Say Good Night?", "The Very Hungry Caterpillar", and "Good Night Moon." Reading certificates were handed out and the winners of the Dig Into Reading program were announced. OKLAHOMA

The Oklahoma Library Association's Information Technology Roundtable's mini-conference, iCON 2013, was very successful this year with 77 attendees. Keynote speaker George Needham, Vice President, Global and Regional Councils, OCLC, kicked off the conference, which was held at Rose State College in Midwest City, OKC.

Oklahoma University Libraries launched a new information discovery system that streamlines online resource access. OU, in collaboration with Oklahoma State University, is providing SHAREOK (shareok.org), a joint institutional repository. Plans have been approved for a Collaborative Learning Center, also known as the Collaboratorium, and construction will soon begin.

OLA president Lynda Reynolds announced that the 2014 Oklahoma Library Association's Annual Conference will be held March 31-April 2, at the Southern Hills Marriott in Tulsa.



AROUND THE REGION An Oklahoma website that improves citizen access to state government information has been named a 2012 Notable Document by the American Library Association's Government Documents Round Table. Documents.ok.gov, was created in response to 2011 Oklahoma state legislation, the Transparency, Accountability and Innovation in Oklahoma State Government 2.0 Act. The Oklahoma Department of Libraries (ODL) collaborated with the Office of Management and Enterprise Services (OMES) to launch the service in 2012. The website improves citizen access to thousands of state publications and documents and is part of ODL's larger digital collection, digitalprairie.ok.gov.

The Southeastern Public Library System of Oklahoma was one of 77 non-profit institutions nation-wide to receive an NEA Bia Read grant for 2013-2014. SEPLSO, a 7 county 15 library system, will focus on the novel True Grit, by Charles Portis. Activities in all 15 branches will take place starting October 5 through November 16, 2013. "All of our libraries are excited to be part of the celebration of Charles Portis's classic tale," said Wayne Hanway, Executive Director of the Southeastern Public Library System. "Not only is it a great story, the action takes place right here in southeast Oklahoma. This is an important book about a colorful time in our local history and we are looking forward to involving our communities in learning more about the book and the history within it."



SOUTH DAKOTA



Prairie West Branch Library, the latest branch of Siouxland Libraries, opened to rave reviews August 6th. Construction of the \$4.3 million dollar project began in spring 2012. The 15,719 sg. ft. facility is located west of I-29 in Sioux Falls near an elementary and middle school and city park. The open design allows for plenty of natural light with floor to ceiling windows looking out on the nearby park. Other natural prairie features inside and out welcome visitors to an invitina and active environment. Flexible public meeting space and study rooms complement identifiable children, teen and adult spaces along with a variety of fun and inviting seating options. Prairie West features sleek new radio frequency identification (RFID) self-check out stations and automated materials handling system (AMH) for returnina The architectural materials. design met stringent sustainability and LEED auality features. Prairie West will be a stop on the SDLA/ MPLA/NDLA conference bus tour.

The South Dakota State Library hit the road with Digital Documents and Electronic Resources training programs in September. The State Library is making it easier than ever to find state government publications online. You can search for a state government report via the statewide library catalog just like you would search for a book or video! The State Library brings magazine and newspaper articles, practice tests and job seeking information, genealogy programs, encyclopedias and more to your fingertips with its online resources.

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


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

The American Library Association (ALA) Public Programs Office, in collaboration with the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture (NMAAHC) and National Museum of American History (NMAH), invites applications from public, academic and special libraries, small museums, and historical societies for the traveling exhibition Changing America: The Emancipation Proclamation, 1863 and the March on Washington, 1963.

The traveling exhibition is made possible by the National Endowment for the Humanities: Exploring the human endeavor (NEH). Online applications must be submitted to ALA by October 21, 2013. The application form and the guidelines for completing the application may be found at www.programminglibrarian.org/changingamerica.

Changing America will help public audiences understand and discuss the relationship between two great peoples' movements that resulted in the Emancipation Proclamation, and the March on Washington in 1963. One hundred years separate the Emancipation Proclamation and the March on Washington, yet these two events are profoundly linked together in a larger story of liberty and the American experience. Both events were the results of people demanding justice. Both grew out of decades of bold actions, resistance, organization, and vision. In both we take inspiration from those who marched toward freedom.

Fifty sites will be selected to present the traveling version of the exhibition in their communities for a period of six weeks. Sites selected for the tour will be required to sponsor an opening event, and at least two public humanifies programs for adult audiences, presented by qualified humanities scholars and related to exhibition themes. The exhibition requires approximately 1,200-1,400 square feet for optimal display. All sites selected for the project will receive a grant of \$1,700 from the ALA, with funding provided by the NEH, for expenses related to public programs. A planning webinar/workshop and online program resources will be available for all selected sites. The tour and programs will begin in January 2014 and continue through December 2017.
