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
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



The opening reception will be held at the Cheyenne Frontier Days Old West Museum, where attendees can enjoy the exhibits while mingling with colleagues.




Trolley transportation between the Little America Resort and the Old West Museum will be provided.


Fast Facts About Cheyenne

Ginsberg is the author of 27 books, an award winning blogger, and TEDx speaker. You can watch his TEDx talk here, and find out more about him on his website.







Reaching out to Local Businesses at Durango Public Library

With National Library Card Month right around the corner in September, Durango Public Library's business services department is busy contacting local businesses for participation in our annual Library Card Discount Program.

For the past three years, Durango Public Library has partnered with local businesses to offer incentives to library patrons when they show their library card. The library does all of the coordination and basic advertising for the program, which has been highly successful.


The idea of using a library card as a discount card is not new. Our previous library director, Andy White, saw a similar program at another library,

and charged me with planning, organizing, and coordinating a program here in Durango. The goal of the program would be to promote the value of a library card while supporting the library's funding.



Our library is a department within the City of Durango, funded by a city and La Plata County joint sales tax fund. We saw this as a win-win program idea. Increasing sales at local businesses would increase sales tax revenue, which supports library funding. This program also encourages Durango residents to get library cards, and boosts our circulation statistics.

After some discussion, we felt September would be a great fit for both the library and our local businesses. September is typically a slow month for businesses, and of course it is also National Library Card Month. Once the dates were set, it was time to begin the planning process. As with any new program, the initial planning was time consuming, but well worth it. I started by researching other libraries around the country that offered library card discount programs. I found that the Poudre River Public Library District in Fort Collins had a program called "Flash Your Card," and contacted them for more information.





Around the Region



Phoenix Public Library and the Museum of Northern Arizona (Flagstaff) were named as finalists for the 2015 National Medal for Museum and Library Service, awarded annually to museums and libraries for exceptional



service to their communities. The Museum of Northern Arizona was awarded the National Medal in late April.



The American Library Association and the Will and Ann Eisner Family Foundation awarded the Will Eisner Graphic Novel Growth Grant to the Yuma High School Library, Yuma, AZ, at the ALA Annual Conference in San

Francisco in June. Graphic novels compose just 2.7 percent of the YHS Library collection, but they account for 31.8 percent of its circulation. The YHS project, "Improving Literacy and Enriching Lives," will expand its graphic novel collection to better serve the school's diverse student body, which includes students from low-income households and students who are English language learners.

The Arizona State Library hosted a Library Leadership Institute at the Historic COD Ranch from April 26-30. Maureen Sullivan facilitated the Institute with four mentors and 19 librarians from around Arizona.

Three of the Library Leadership Institute mentors were MPLA Leadership Institute alums: Mary Sanchez from the Pima County Public Library, Dan Stanton from the ASU Libraries, and Dale Savage from the Arizona State Library.



The 2015 Library Institute, Small Libraries, Big Impact, was held June 1-5 on the campus of Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff. The Library Development Division of the Arizona State Library hosted 26 small and rural library staff members from 13 of Arizona's 15 counties for

five days of training focusing on community engagement, advocacy, collections, ethics & privacy, online searching, and the statewide database package.

COLORADO

The Colorado College Tutt Library in Colorado Springs is

undertaking a \$45 million expansion and renovation project, with designs being finalized. The project aims to make the library more accommodating to the college's academic block scheduling.

In June, the Cherry Creek Valley Rotary Club of Parker presented Douglas County Libraries with a \$10,000 gift for the naming of the Fusion media lab in the new library location under construction in Parker.



In September the Denver Public Library will offer "Photo Mashup Madness with IdeaLAB and History Colorado." Participants will choose a historic downtown Denver photo from the library's archives, and then hit the

streets, taking cameras outside to photograph the same spots. The last stop will be the library's IdeaLAB, to combine the historic and current photos in Photoshop.

Sandy Irwin has accepted the position of Director at Durango Public Library. She previously spent five years as the library's Assistant Director.







The Kansas Library Association and the Missouri Library Association will hold their first ever joint annual conference, *Libraries Without Borders*, in Kansas City, MO, September 30—October 2. Details can be found here.

The Northeast Kansas Library System (NEKLS) welcomed a number of new staff members over the summer. Michael McDonald is the new Library Development Consultant, Anna Foote accepted a position in Children's Services and Continuing Education Support, and Dorinda Benton is the new Business Manager. NEKLS members will have a chance to meet the new staff at the Annual Meeting on August 13 in Topeka.



The open house gave students, staff, and faculty a chance to see examples of the various techniques and materials used to care for the Library's collections.



Cindy Christin, and other staff from Bozeman Public Library, are working with local school libraries to give students expanded access to books over the summer. With support from the kidsLINK Afterschool Program, funded by United Way, the school libraries are opening for short periods on 2-3 days over the summer.

Lewis & Clark Library has received a National Endowment for the Arts Big Read Grant, for the ninth time, an honor only two other libraries



have matched. Lewis & Clark Library received a \$16,200 grant to host The Big Read Under The Big Sky, in October. The Big Read book selection is *True Grit*, by Charles Portis.

NEBRASKA



MPLA member Tina Walker, Area Director of the Learning Resource Center at Mid-Plains Community College, was named the 2014-2015 winner of the award for MPCC Professional Achievement in Student Support. She earned this award by being an outstanding student advocate, and by constantly seeking means to improve student learning and retention. Tina is co-chair of MPLA's Communication Committee.



The South Sioux City, NE, Library held a Wine Making class in July. Participants learned the skills and materials needed to be a beginning wine maker.

Sky Seery was promoted to North Platte Learning Resource Center Supervisor from Library Technician II, in May. Sky is a member of MPLA, NLA, and a member/ secretary for the Central Plains Library System (CPLS).









Carson City Library will become the first public library in the nation to offer advanced manufacturing training and certification to library patrons.

The library will partner with Western Nevada College and the Manufacturing Skills Institute to provide formal in-library training and access to technology that will lead to a Manufacturing Technician 1 (MT1) certification, a national and industry-wide recognized credential. The Nevada State Library and Archives awarded the Library Services and Technology Act grant to Carson City Library in April with the goal of filling a workforce training need for area manufacturers.

This fall the Nevada State Library, Archives and Public Records (NSLAPR) will offer a leadership institute focused on community engagement and leading positive change in libraries. With



the theme *Becoming a Catalyst for Change*, the Institute will feature keynote speakers Rivkah Sass, 2006 Library Journal Librarian of the Year, and Felton Thomas, President-Elect of the Public Library Association.



The Las Vegas-Clark County Library District offered a free, 3-week class in Guitar Basics 101 in July. Local guitar instructor Matt Hennager taught students how to read music, and what type of guitar to choose. He

introduced guitar chords and other key components. By the end of the course, students were able to play a full song on the guitar.

The theme is Create, Connect, Transform. Program submissions will be accepted here through August 24, and conference registration will open soon. Look for details here.




NEW MEXICO, continued...

The 2015 New Mexico State Legislature passed two major items relating to libraries. During the regular session a measure was passed to allocate funds for the State Library to do a needs assessments of New Mexico libraries. During the June special legislative session, the Capital Outlay package was passed which included 49 library projects around the state.



Donna Burkholder retired from the Access Services Department of New Mexico State University Library on June 30, after 15 years of service. She looks forward to spending more time with her husband, her three children, and their families.

At least two libraries in New Mexico have reported nests with young birds. UNM Valencia Campus Library has shared pictures of a pair of owls and three owlets. Placitas Community Library keeps water in a small stone basin east of the library to attract birds. The library is also registered as an official nesting site with the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. This year there are two nesting boxes where a pair of Great Western Bluebirds are raising their young.



In April, the Albuquerque/Bernalillo County Public Library opened its first new branch library in 17 years. The new Central & Unser—Patrick J. Baca Library features two reading rooms (one specifically for young adults), a 150 seat community room, a children's activity room, and a collection of 55,000 items.



Colin O'Hanlon is the new librarian at the White Sands Missile Range Post Library. He's from Pittsburgh, PA, and served in the Army from 2004-2013. He earned

his MLIS at the University of Pittsburgh in 2014.

NORTH DAKOTA



On June 12, the North Dakota State Library and the North Dakota Heritage Center were filled with children gathered together to celebrate reading. The Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library and the Morton Mandan Public Library worked with the North Dakota State Library to coordinate this exciting event, which is held to encourage kids to participate in the summer reading program at their local libraries.

State Librarian Mary Soucie has been is visiting libraries throughout the state as part of her Librarian for a Day initiative. In May, she visited the Minot Public Library. While in Minot, she assisted with an after school program, met with area library directors, and presented a customer service workshop for library staff.

The Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library hosted North Dakota's First Lady Betsy Dalrymple, who spoke about her book Building a House, Making a Home: A History of the North Dakota Governor's Residence.



The South Dakota Public Library Annual Survey statistics compilation for 2014 reveals that overall library circulation in SD is down 3.9 percent from the previous year, and individual visits are down 2.7 percent. This is due, in large part, to the increased availability of e-books, e-magazines and other downloadables. Electronic circulation has grown substantially in the state.



Libraries have always amazed me with their willingness to share ideas. Not only did they answer all of my questions, they shared copies of their marketing materials and brochures. This was a great help, and I have to thank Poudre River Libraries for their assistance with this program. Of course a project of this size cannot be completed alone, so I was able to pull together a great team of three coworkers to assist in contacting, tracking and delivering materials to the businesses.

To build our business mailing list, we purchased the Chamber of Commerce membership list, and removed businesses we felt were not a good fit for the program. Our director wrote an invitation letter to the businesses, explaining the program and how to participate. The letter was sent out the old fashioned way, by snail mail.

We sent out around 300 letters, and hoped for the best. My goal was to have 50 businesses sign up the first year, and in the end we were able to get 52 businesses.

Our marketing strategy included creating a logo to help brand the program. This logo was included on all marketing materials, and printed on plastic decals that businesses could place on their doors or windows. We also created a display in the library, a section on our website, a brochure, and posters that included the business names, logos, incentives, and contact information. Most of our materials were designed and printed in-house, so the cost of the program was minimal.



The response from our local business community was amazing. Almost everyone who signed up for the program was excited about the experience, and returned the following year. Now, in the third year of the



program, many businesses cannot wait to participate. As I attend local business meetings and talk about our program, many are ready to get involved and are anxious to sign up.

Each year, as we start to plan, I look back on the previous years and evaluate the program, looking for changes that would help make the program an even bigger success for the businesses and the library. For 2016, I plan on starting to send invitations to previous participants in early spring. These folks are already familiar with the program, and it will give them the opportunity of getting an early confirmation. It will also give us a jump start on planning the ads and brochure design.

What advice would I give on starting this program at your library? Begin by attending local business meetings and chamber events. This gives the businesses an opportunity to get to know you, and the library services available to them. Get on their agenda, and announce upcoming library programs. Many of them may be parents or book lovers, so sharing non-business related library programs will get them involved in your library. Many business owners love to crunch numbers, so share library statistics with them! How many card holders do you have? How many folks attend library programming? How many children and teens are involved with your summer reading program? Share those numbers!

I believe this is one reason our program has been so successful.

If you are interested in starting a similar program at your library, please feel free to contact me.






