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

Greetings, friends! Much has happened since I last wrote to you here, but I wanted to present just two highlights for you.

First, to update you on MPLA's strategic planning process: our ad hoc committee has made great headway through the vision and leadership of chair Mickey Coalwell. Those who have been following the saga closely will remember that we received excellent and compelling proposals from JM Strategies and Sage Project Consultants, in response to our initial RFP.

After much thoughtful and heartfelt discussion, the board decided we needed a new and non-traditional process (and also a cheaper one). We now have a contract in place with Sage to create a set of value-based strategic priorities for MPLA. In order to get there, we're conducting a series of focus groups via Zoom videoconference.

These will reach the key demographic areas we identified, ensuring the process is informed by emerging leaders in the profession, association veterans, representatives from all 12 member states, and by non-members. The first focus group is set to take place during our 2016 Leadership Institute, and we're busy crafting the questions with Sage now. I have great expectations for the process we're employing and earnestly believe it will help guide our organization into the future while cleaving tenaciously to the values that shaped our growth over the past 68 years.

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


PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE, continued...

Awards Committee Seeks Nominees

Do you know a deserving individual in the library field who should be recognized for their accomplishments? If so, please nominate them for an MPLA Award! The following awards will be given at the 2016 MPLA Joint Conference with the Colorado Association of Libraries in Loveland, CO, October 20-22, 2016. The MPLA Awards Committee is seeking nominees in all categories:

Carl Gaumer Library Champion Award: To be given to the individual, organization or company whose positive support of the Mountain Plains Library Association is demonstrated by repeated conscientious endeavors towards libraries, library staff, trustees and professional activities.

MPLA Distinguished Service Award: To be given to an MPLA member who has made notable contributions to the library profession, or has furthered significant development of libraries in the Mountain Plains region, or has performed exemplary service for an extended period of time. In the case of retired individuals, the nominee may be a past member of MPLA.

MPLA Literary Contribution Award: To be given to an author whose published writings have successfully furthered an understanding and appreciation of the Mountain Plains region. The author need not reside in the region, and the selection may be based on either a single work or a body of works. Published works will be evaluated on the basis of literary worth, readability, and evidence of responsible research.

MPLA Beginning Professional Award: To recognize an MPLA member who, as a librarian/media specialist within the first five years after receiving a library/media masters degree, has made a positive impact on the quality and role of library service. Factors such as innovative programming and planning, use of resources, and special projects will be considered.

MPLA Innovator Award: To recognize an up-and-coming individual(s) or group(s) in the MPLA region for a creative, inventive, trail-blazing project that has significance to the library community.

MPLA Unsung Hero Award: To be given to any library individual(s) or group(s) in the MPLA region who have worked on a special project that has some significance to a community but which has not been eligible for a library award, or which has for other reasons specified by the nominator not been recognized to the degree that it merits, by any library organization.

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The Awards Nomination Form is available on the MPLA website.

Nominations are due by August 15, 2016.

Around the Region



Prescott Public Library has been a free public library for well over 100 years. Now, in response to an ongoing budget crisis, city officials have proposed new fees for basic library services including checking out books and entering the library building itself.

Along with other city departments, the library weathered a significant round of budget cuts which took effect in January, cutting staff and hours of service. The proposed fees, outlined in a letter from City Manager Craig McConnell in March, are intended to make the library a revenue center. According to the <u>Prescott eNews</u>, the City Manager asked the Arizona State Librarian and Yavapai County Free Library District Director to review the fees and indicate which, if any, would endanger the library's access to state and county resources reserved for "free public libraries."

Responses from State Librarian Holly Henley and YCFLD Director Barbara Kile indicated that charging fees for "core" library services would jeopardize state and county financial support for the library. Their replies were reported in an April 26 article in the <u>Prescott Daily Courier</u>.

ARIZONA, continued...

A new Writer In Residence program, offered through the Arizona State Library, Archives, and Public Records, is bringing published authors to selected libraries around the state for three month residencies. The first round of the program has placed authors in libraries in Glendale, Avondale, Mesa, and Tucson. According to Arizona Public Radio station KJZZ, future rounds will be determined by the availability of federal funding.

UNC's James A. Michener Library Hosts Native Voices Exhibit


This spring, the University of Northern Colorado's James A. Michener Library hosted *Native Voices: Native Peoples' Concepts of Health and Illness*, a traveling exhibition created by the U.S. National Library of Medicine. On display from March 31— May 11, the exhibit prompted innovative programming in the region.

A group made up of students, staff, and faculty collaborated in the planning of an opening event on April 1. Catered by acclaimed New Mexico chef

Freddie Bitsoie, the opening celebrated indigenous cuisine. Additional campus

programming included a screening of *For the Generations: Native Story* & *Performance*, a documentary exploring the role of the arts and movement in contemporary native identity, health and fitness; the screening was followed by a Q & A session facilitated by Denver artist and educator Rose Red Elk. Red Elk, an accomplished musician and artist, shared stories from her own life, and sang an original song while playing the guitar. A Read-In of Native Literature was held during the month as well.





Collaborating with the University Libraries on programming to support the exhibit, High Plains Library District (HPLD) planned a workshop on herbal remedies to be held at Centennial Park Library. HPLD's Carbon Valley Regional Library hosted a presentation by Erin Smith, herbalist and ethnobotanist, on historical and modern uses of Colorado plants that have been used as food and medicine. This library location boasts a native plant garden through which the group walked with Smith to "meet some plants."

The *Native Voices* exhibit is slated to visit all 12 states in the MPLA region between now and summer 2020. Bestselling author Jennifer Weiner spoke at Durango Public Library's annual Literary Festival in April. Weiner's extremely funny address, which touched on topics ranging from feminism to how to get a tranquilized bear into the bed of a pickup truck, drew a record crowd.

The University of Northern Colorado, Greeley, has undertaken a digitization project to make more than 100 years of student newspapers available to students and researchers. Roughly 67,000 pages have been scanned and digitized since spring 2015. The newspapers will be made available through <u>Digital UNC</u>.



Denver Public Library's Central Library Vida Ellison Gallery is hosting a <u>Celebrating Colorado Women</u> exhibit, through June 30. The exhibit features all 152 inductees to the Colorado Women's Hall of Fame since its founding in 1985.



More than 8,000 library professionals attended the <u>Public Library Association conference</u> in Denver, April 5-9. The conference theme was *Be Extraordinary*, and the program included an opening session with Anderson Cooper, and a closing session with Tig Notaro.

The Kansas Library Association and public library supporters throughout the state came together in March to oppose Kansas House Bill 2719, which jeopardized funding for library districts. Thanks to their unified and vocal advocacy, all mention of libraries has been removed from the bill.

That is a substantial victory, but it does not mean smooth sailing for Kansas libraries. According to the <u>Topeka Capital-Journal</u>, state aid to public libraries has dropped by an inflation-adjusted 60 percent between fiscal years 2008 and 2014. The decline has had particular impact on small and rural libraries.


KANSAS STATE

Billings Public Library




The University of Montana's Montana Museum of Art and Culture hosted the national touring exhibition, *First Folio! The Book that Gave Us Shakespeare*, May 9-31. The exhibition was open to the public.

Billings Public Library, pictured above, was one of seven libraries around the country to receive a 2016 AIA/ALA Library Building Award. The awards recognize excellence in the design of modern libraries, and their ability to serve evolving social and civic needs.

Designed by Will Bruder Architects with O2 Architects, Billings Public Library is the only public library available to the state's largest metropolitan community. The 66,000-square-foot building is LEED Platinum Certified and anchors the north end of downtown Billings.

Bozeman Public Library hosted the Humanities Montana Speakers Bureau program "WordSongs: Bringing Poetry to Life," with poet Dave Caserio and musician Parker Brown, on April 25.

In April, the Las Vegas-Clark County Library District teamed up with DISCOVERY Children's Museum to present a library card sign-up campaign called "Love





Coloring is all the rage in North Dakota libraries this spring, with coloring clubs meeting at libraries around Wahpeton and Breckenridge,




as well as public libraries in West Fargo and Minot.

Stories will be changed on a regular basis so that the story walk can attract return visits from children and families. 


Club will match Patterson's donation with "bonus points" that can be used to acquire books and other materials for the library.

Oklahoma Libraries

Between 2009 and 2016, the Oklahoma Department of Libraries budget appropriation from the state fell by more than 33%, according to the <u>Wagoner Tribune</u> and other sources.

That daunting statistic is offset to some degree by a recent quarterly poll by SoonerPoll. The poll results, released in May and reported by Tulsa's <u>KOTV 6</u>, indicate that an overwhelming majority of likely voters in the state, 89.5%, believe library services are important and should be funded. Further poll results indicated strong support for libraries among every age group, and across the political spectrum, including Republicans, Democrats, and independent voters.






award, named for a former professor of education and library science at UW, was established in 1993 to recognize individuals who have made significant contributions to the UW Libraries.
