Dan was our MPLA Webmaster, and an Associate Professor and Social Sciences Librarian at Oklahoma


State University in Stillwater. He was also a treasured friend and someone who, in 20 years of MPLA membership, touched the lives of so many MPLA members.



Around the Region

Arizona State University (ASU) delivers digital libraries to Tonga



Lorrie McAllister, Assistant University Librarian at ASU Libraries, partnered with Laura Hosman. assistant professor at ASU, and her students to prepare and deliver twenty-five portable, solar-powered, WiFi-ready library devices called digital SolarSPELL - the Solar Powered Educational Learning Library. These devices are helping to expand access to education and technology in remote places, such as Tonga, where electricity and the internet are unavailable. In preparation, ASU Libraries hosted a SolarSPELL Hackthon to improve the digital library experience.

Pop-Culture: LIBCON West

Glendale Public Library held its first annual library pop-culture convention, LIBCON West, which was inspired by comic-cons that make appearances at libraries across the nation. The free

event featured panels, vendors and artists, and a DJ and dance just for teens ages 12 to 18. Library Assistant Ray Ceo Jr said that it was "a great way for our teens to celebrate their inner geek in a fun, safe place." LIBCON West was supported by the Arizona State Library, Archives & Public Records, a division of the office of Secretary of State, with federal funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services as well as additional sponsorship from Rayners and Zinio.



COLORADO

I Love My Librarian

Tabatha "Tabby" Farney the Director of Web Services and Emerging Technologies at the University of Colorado Springs, Colorado was recognized and celebrated for her ability to engage with students and show them how to navigate both the physical library as well as the online resources. Her efforts have helped turned the library into a welcoming place where students feel comfortable asking for help and collaborating with each other and with staff and faculty. Students now view the library as a valuable partner in their academic success. Way to go, Tabby!



Keeper of Government History

The U.S. Government Publishing Office recently designated the University of Colorado Boulder's Norlin Library as the nation's first Preservation Steward library for government documents. The library's collection stretches from the late 1800s to the present and includes military testimony from the Sand Creek Massacre to the 9/11 Commission hearings. Kate Tallman, CU University Libraries assistant professor and acting head of Norlin's Government Information Library says many of the documents contain beautiful Illustrations, particularly older reports like an 1893 ethnographic report. There are also interesting descriptions and correspondence, including a letter from President Theodore Roosevelt concerning food safety.

The collection is free and open to the public.

Leading 2017 with Change!



Pine & Plains Libraries of Elbert County leaders are working to attract new and benefit existing residents of the region as library users. First, they are implementing a new late-fee policy initiative of waiving daily overdue fines, which after the seven month test period could become permanent. Director Tim Miller said this initiative took root in response to a user survey and feedback from the Colorado State Library. They are also working on

fresh programming including a new group called "Writers of the Plains" at the Simla Branch, which came to fruition after a special event launching the Self-E service, which provides a potential national platform for up-and-coming writers. Lastly, the branch leadership has added more STEM-based programming and hopes to have a robot competition between the branches later in 2017.

KSKANSAS

Weekly Genealogist Spotlight

The Rossville Community Library recently received national recognition from the New England Historic Genealogical Society. The Society was established in 1845, and is the nation's leading comprehensive resource for family history research and the largest Society of its kind in the world. Rossville partnered in a joint project with other Northeast Kansas libraries and the Northeast Kansas Library System, to create a special website that allows libraries to digitize their local, historical collections. Through this collaboration they were able to develop Rossville Kansas Genealogy, a site completely dedicated to obituaries; birth, wedding, engagement announcements; and family tree information. Other resources available include an obituaries directory and cemetery burial lists/indexes.

Read produced the tribute with another former Salina Kansas Public Library staff member, Paul Hawkins, who is the now



the Director of the South Central Kansas Library System, South Hutchinson. The 35 minute video can be viewed free of charge.

All Under One Roof Campaign Success

Missoula Public Library is a step closer in their efforts to build an expanded facility to continue meeting the critical needs of the community after a \$30 million bond was approved. The "All Under One Roof" project began in



2010 and through careful and thoughtful research lead to a capital campaign that has so far raised \$3 million in charitable gifts. An expanded, up-to-date Missoula Public Library will triple the capacity for computers and Wi-Fi, expand digital collections, and provide access to video production, 3D printing and more – all critical tools for our community's future, according to supporters. <u>University of Nebraska—Lincoln's Don L. Love</u> <u>Memorial Library Celebrates 75 years</u>

Lincoln historian Jim McKee spoke to an audience of about forty librarians, students, faculty, and community members to celebrate 75 years and its benefactor, Don L. Love. Originally, UNL Library was a faculty focused center, but with time and a philanthropic donation by Don L. Love the library has become a student resource. Community Engagement Librarian Joanie Barnes said, "The library has adapted to advancements in technology and the changing needs of students, and seeing it grow as an institution has been a privilege... [and that] the juxtaposition of the brand new Adele Hall Learning Commons makes the celebration of the 75-year-old historv librarv's even more poignant. We've got a 75-year-old anniversary, and we have a one-year anniversary. It's like we're looking back at a legacy and looking forward to a future."

"Thinking Money" - Educational Exhibit

Lincoln City Libraries held a series of programs to benefit young adults as well as their parents in achieving financial success. Topics ranged from budgeting to identify theft. Teens practiced their skills through hands-on activities as they strived to see who could stretch their budget furthest and achieve the perfect meal. The program was developed by the ALA Public Programs Office in collaboration with the FINRA Investor Education



Renovation 10 years in the Making Set to Begin...

The Broken Bow City Library received the green light from city officials to begin their \$2 million renovation and expansion project. The plans include adding 4,000 square feet and redesigning the layout to better serve the community through technology and program space. Broken Bow City put up the initial \$500,000 but the rest of the funding (\$1.7 million) has come entirely from a fundraising campaign that began in 2014. Chairman for the donor's committee, Bill Steffens, said "We saw what [Broken Bow Library] did for them in school and beyond, and having witnessed that myself, I'm just anxious to bring that same advantage to other young people in the community." "It's so important, we feel, that young people have a place to get excited about reading and learning, said Steffens. Construction is set to begin in March and engineers say the project should take about a year to



An Artist's Take: Historic Nevada

Dayton Valley Branch Library became the home to a display of artwork by a pen and ink artist, Bill Migan. Migan and his wife Judy moved to Nevada in 1998 and eventually settled in the Dayton area. Over the years, the pair traveled over 75,000 miles of Nevada visiting ghost towns, mining camps, and other historical places, which are Migan's favorite subject material. For each sale of artwork, the Friends of the Library group received a 25% donation.

It was concluded with speaker, Eugene Earsom, retired Secondary Education Social Studies teacher and 2010 inductee of the University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma Alumni Hall of Fame engaging in a

healthy discussion of the Bill of Rights continued value in today's society.

"Infamy: December 7, 1941"

In November and December, the Provo City Library commemorated the 75th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor with a special photographic memorial collected by the National World War II Museum in New Orleans. Special presentation of collected stories and experiences from soldiers at Pearl Harbor was held on December 7th, 2016.

Utah American Graduate Champion



April Townsend, Director of Finance and Operations at the Salt Lake County Library, was recognized as one of Utah's 2016 American Graduate Champions for mentorship efforts. Townsend knows from firsthand experience that having a mentor can help women grow and thrive even through challenging times. She has since paid mentorship forward by founding The Women's Leadership Forum where more than 250 women in Salt Lake County have gained opportunities to grow and learn from influential leaders. Townsend says, "Mentoring is a philosophy—how you help others along the way." The Utah Education Network's message is that there are many pathways to success—and they

want to help learners of all ages find their right-fit education. It is part of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting's national project, American Graduate, which partners public television and radio stations with at-risk schools to improve high school graduation rates.

Roots of Knowledge

As part of a 75th anniversary celebration at Utah Valley University, the library was renamed after philanthropist Ira A. Fulton and his late wife, Mary Lou. The announcement was made during the University's culminating 75th anniversary event in November — the unveiling of the "Roots of Knowledge" stained glass windows at the facility. The Fulton Library is now home to the bold and large-scale public art project that showcases the ancient storytelling art form of stained glass. The Marc C. & Deborah Bingham Roots of Knowledge Gallery is a panorama of history and human drama composed of 80 individual panes totaling 10 feet in height and 200 feet in length. The intricate details represent years of research about the events and people that shaped humankind from the days of wooly mammoths and cavemen to the iPhone. This world-class work of art was created by Tom Holdman and Cameron Oscarson.





Water/Ways @ Laramie County Library

The Smithsonian's Water/Ways exhibition is currently being hosted by the Laramie County Library. Through the complementary programs such as *Water History* from the Wyoming State Engineer's Office, and *Water Treatment: Photographic Interpretations* from South High School photography students.



Water is an essential component of life on our planet environmentally, culturally, and historically. Water/Ways is part of the Museum on Main Street, a collaboration between the Smithsonian Institute and Wyoming Humanities, and was adapted from an exhibition organized by the American Museum of Natural History in New York.

According to Laramie County Library, the Smithsonian's Water/Ways exhibit is being hosted in five other Wyoming venues, including the Sheridan College Library in late February.


