News from the President

Happy Spring to all!

I have some good news to report. The Executive Board of the Mountain Plains Library Association voted to formally support the goals of the <u>Association of College and Research Libraries' Diversity Alliance</u>. As the largest division of the American Library Association (ALA), ACRL currently has more than 11,000 members.



MPLA's partnership with ACRL's Diversity Alliance will encourage academic institutions in our twelve member states (Arizona, Colorado, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Utah and Wyoming) to participate in establishing residency programs for professionally underrepresented racial and ethnic groups in the library profession. Right now, Utah University and UNLV are the only academics in our region participating in the Diversity Alliance.

Going forward, MPLA will pay one-half of an institution's \$500 first-year participation fee, and will pay the cost of membership in the Mountain Plains Library Association for the duration of the chosen candidate's residency at the institution.

This action by the MPLA Executive Board directly supports two of the Guiding Principles from MPLA's new Strategic Plan:

GUIDING PRINCIPLE ONE:

We will pursue outreach opportunities in the 12-state MPLA region and beyond that will foster better relationships, increase professional sharing, and include more diverse communities.

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
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GUIDING PRINCIPLE THREE:

We are dedicated to realizing the potential of our multi-state collaboration through leadership development, professional growth opportunities for members, and engagement with the larger library community.

Academic librarians play an important role in our MPLA membership, representing over 35% of our total membership. If you are an academic librarian, please publicize this partnership with ACRL to your institutional leadership.





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MPLA representation in the planning process is made smoother if there's a close connection between the VP/PE and the specific association; it's even stronger if the relevant state rep to MPLA can assist as well. Lucky we're librarians, no?

I now proudly hold the position of "past-past-president" and am glad to let others take the reins of my favorite library association. I know that we are in good hands, since the three years allow an individual a chance to phase into, and then back out of, the presidential role. Indeed, it was as I prepared to hand the gavel to my successor Eric Stroshane that I finally figured out what I had gained in my time as President: the chance to act as party-thrower, diplomat, valued colleague on the planning team, and friend to a host of librarians I never would have met, or liked as much, without that opportunity to share a project such as MPLA-as-guest-with-an-agenda.

Around the Region



Sedona Public Library Quilt Show

Recently, Sedona Public Library, in conjunction with the Quilter's Store Sedona, held its 22nd annual Quilt show in which fifty-nine handcrafted quilts represented a variety of quilting styles and techniques from talented quilters across Arizona. The show was originally initiated in 1995 by Marge Elson, founder of the Quilter's Store. Marge passed away in 2015, and her daughter, Cynthia Cunningham, now runs the store which has been a Sedona mainstay for over 25 years. The 2017 show featured two raffle quilts and the proceeds will benefit local community organizations.



Annual Chocolate Tasting Fundraiser



The Friends of the Copper Queen Library in Bisbee, Arizona held their 26th annual "Chocolate Tasting" fundraiser event. Bisbee commercial and home bakers donate thousands of pieces of chocolate delicacies for ticket holders to delightfully enjoy! Those in attendance also have a chance to participate in a Silent Auction and Raffle. All proceeds benefit the library and community through library material purchases as well as activity and event sponsorships. It looks like everyone had a great evening!

Coding for the Future

With employment opportunities for software, application and system developers expected to grow, dozens of Arizona libraries, including the Tempe Public Library, are beginning to turn themselves into technology havens where students can learn about coding through building websites, games, and apps. At the Tempe Public Library, Earl Aguilera, a doctoral student in the Learning, Literacies and Technology program at Arizona State University, helps facilitate Tempe's weekly meetings believes that coding and computer programming are important skills to learn. "What they're really doing is they're teaching kids persistence," Aguilera said. "They're teaching kids creative problem • solving."

Marathi Language Collection



The Tempe Public Library non-English book collections grew recently with the addition of materials written in Marathi, which is one of India's twenty-two official languages and dates back as

far as the 13th century. Bhagyashree Barlingay, president of Akshaybhasha (pictured), a non-profit that promotes literacy, preserves Marathi culture, and provides free anemia checks for women in India, donated one hundred fifty books from her personal collection. In addition, the group, as well as volunteers from the broader Indian community, offered assistance in cataloging the books for use. To commemorate the collection the Tempe Public Library staff held an inaugural event featuring traditional Marathi songs as well as skits, including a monologue from "My Fair Lady" in Marathi and English.



The Douglas County Libraries Adventure pass program expanded in 2017 to include Denver's Clyfford Still Museum. The program works to connect patrons with local cultural institutions as part of their mission to advocate for literacy and lifelong learning. Library patrons can reserve free passes for a specific day, up to thirty days in advance, just by using their library card. Other partners include Butterfly Pavilion, Denver Museum, Denver Firefighters Museum Miniatures, Dolls and Toys, Dinosaur Ridge, and History Colorado Center.

The Bud Werner Memorial Library is celebrating 50 years. As a way to commemorate, they held a festive afternoon of live music from the Yampa Valley Boys, a

Topeka and Shawnee County Public Libraries are bringing convenient access to early education resources through a brightly-colored, forty-foot-long bus that serves as a mobile classroom for children ages birth to five. The bus itself contains a variety of toys, games, and books to stimulate young minds. In addition, early childhood professionals oversee circle time, storytime, and unstructured play time designed to facilitate emotional and mental growth. Library staff will also provide parents and guardians with information about the skills and concepts children need leading into kindergarten. The Learn & Play Bus is available to anyone. By

delivering these services members of the community who need them, the Topeka and Shawnee County Libraries are ensuring the next generation will be well-equipped for the future.

The Montana Shared Catalog is a vital collaboration for libraries that operate on small budgets and/or lack space for large collections to share The Lincoln County commissioners resources. recognize this fact and recently authorized the donation of a county vehicle to the Lincoln County Public Libraries to help facilitate library operations of interlibrary loan. The vehicle will be used to transport items between libraries across northwest Montana including libraries in Libby, Troy, and Eureka. In January, their library alone transported approximately 4,760 items between these libraries and the delivery hub in Kalispell.

More than a hundred people gathered at Mount the Airy | Public Library where the library's Young Actor Workshop kids showcased the play, "Frozen Hearts." The



play consisted of a series of small plays tied together through a common character. ALA Library Technology Report Series

Social media optimization (SMO) is a programmatic strategy for building and engaging community. Recently, Montana State University (MSU) librarians Doralyn Rossmann and Scott W.H. Young published "Social Media Optimization: Principles for Building and Engaging Community." report highlights practical guidelines and examples for implementing a flexible and comprehensive community-building model structured around five interrelated principles: create shareable content,

celebration got underway with "The Iron Horse Stables: The History of the North Platte Railroad Roundhouse" during which rail fans and history buffs were treated to a program about early history of the Union Pacific Railroad. Presenter Kaycee Anderson examined the guick growth of North Platte in the 1800s, explaining how businesses like the Cold Water Trading Post set up shop, and also discussed many historical facts about the town of North Platte and the railroad. Due to its popularity, a second session was scheduled. Programs held in March included "Historic Homes of North Platte" and the Historic North Platte Photographic Exhibit.



Hastings Public Library Time Capsule

As the Hastings Public Library Time Capsule was revealed, two generations came together as memories were revealed for the first time in 55 years. The 1962 copper time capsule was found during deconstruction of the current library and included items like newspapers, blueprints of the current building, and old photos. Along with Kintop, Assistant Administrator Tammy Westergard and LSTA Coordinator Sulin Jones answered inquiries about municipal budgets, internships.

funding and state programs, online education, and accredited programs. "Bottom line, libraries equal education," said Westergard, who oversees library services and library development. "The pace of change is forcing everyone to stay current and to keep learning. The library is the last, best free place where we all can go to level up our skills, no matter our age. The library is the on ramp to education — formal and informal."



STEM to Read Trunks

In celebration of a successful winter reading program, the Grand Forks Public Library held a weekend of fun activities.






Binge Boxes

Ms. Haskins has a B.S. in K-12 Education from the University of Wyoming. When she and her husband

moved to Riverton in 1992, Haskins was unable to find a full-time position in teaching. She did some substitute teaching and coaching until she saw an opening at the main library in Lander. It seemed a natural fit for her. Not finding any teen programs in place when she started, Haskins began developing them at Lander and then continued when she moved to Riverton a year later.

Haskins has been an active member of the Wyoming Library Association since she started at Riverton. She did a few stints as the Children's Teen Section Chair, and then when WLA changed its organizational structure she became Chair of the Youth Services Interest Group. This gave her the opportunity to participate in the Collaborative Summer Library Program at the national level.

Regarding the direction Haskins would like to see for the library, she explained: "I love this whole new philosophy of the user experience. As public libraries diversify and become the social hub of the community, the user experience is at the top of re-envisioning what libraries should be focusing on and looking forward to."

Utah History Division releases 171,000 vintage images

The Utah Division of State History, in conjunction with Backstage Library Works, the University of Utah's Marriott Library and Southern Utah University, is proud to announce that after nearly 2 years of work, four decades' worth of The Salt Lake Tribune's photo archives have just been digitized and released to the public. The collection holds 171,000 images taken by Salt Lake Tribune photographers from the 1930s through the 1960s. Digital Librarian, Heidi Tak, states, "It's the largest [collection] we've ever digitized, and it brought our photo collection to over 250,000." The photos, available on the state history website at bit.ly/TribHistory, are searchable and free to the public as long as they're used non-commercially (fees are charged for high-resolution downloads). Tak hopes that interest in the collection can help enrich the collection — some of the context is missing, as the photos aren't attached to the stories they were shot for, and much of the caption information is also incomplete. 
