MPLA Dan Chaney Unsung Hero Award: To be given to an MPLA member who has consistently worked behind the scenes to create, administer, or support a library-related organization or project and who has not previously been recognized to the degree their work merits.

At his death at age 52, Dan Chaney was Associate Professor and Social Sciences Librarian at Oklahoma State University in Stillwater. He had been an MPLA member for over 20 years. He served as MPLA Webmaster, unofficial photographer and social media contact, and received the Carl Gaumer Library Champion Award in 2009 for his service to MPLA. Witty, profane, probingly intelligent, creative, irascible, and deeply caring, Dan was beloved by his students and his colleagues.

In 2017, MPLA's Unsung Hero Award was renamed the MPLA Dan Chaney Unsung Hero Award, and a \$100 stipend was added in Dan's honor.






Deputy Secretary Delello received the **Carl Gaumer Library Champion Award** for his innovative accomplishments and staunch library advocacy while serving as Interim State Librarian during 2014 -2015 and his continued work with libraries state-wide as the Deputy Cabinet Secretary.

"I am so deeply honored to be receiving this award," Delello said. "Libraries are more than just book repositories. They serve as quasi social service agencies assisting patrons with e-government service, digital literacy, and resume development just to name a few." "I have rarely encountered public servants as dedicated to their communities as public and tribal librarians. I humbly dedicate this award to Wanda Walters and Kristina "Krissie" Carter, staff at the Clovis Library, Clovis, NM, who lost

their lives while serving patrons in a tragic shooting this past August." --- Michael Delello



The MPLA Literary Contribution Award is given to an author whose published writings have successfully furthered an understanding and appreciation of the Mountain Plains region. David Quammen is the author of more than fifteen books, both fiction and nonfiction. He was nominated for his most recent book, Yellowstone: A Journey Through America's Wild Heart.

"I'm gratified, honored, and grateful to receive this award from the MPLA. Your recognition of Yellowstone: A Journey through America's Wild Heart goes far toward confirming the belief that impelled me in writing it: That we who love books, who create books (and in this I include photographers as well as writers, such as the great ones from National Geographic

Magazine whose images share space with my text in Yellowstone), who curate and care for books and help get them into the hands of others—we're not solitary individuals, working alone. We're allies." -- David Quammen

The MPLA Distinguished Service Award is to be given to an MPLA member who has made notable contributions to the library profession, furthered significant development of libraries in the Mountain Plains region, or performed exemplary service for an extended period of time.

This year, because two candidates were both so outstanding and had contributed so widely and with such service over many years, the Awards Committee and the MPLA Board decided to award two Distinguished Service awards. Sharon Osenga and Mike Mullin.

Sharon Osenga, retired Central Plains (Hastings, Nebraska) Library System Director, who was nominated for the award by the late Dan Chaney in 2016, as well as by Judy Zelenski and Mickey Coalwell.

Mike Mullin, retired Watertown (S.D.) Regional Library Director, who guided the library through its first automation system years ago and through a major reconstruction and remodel in 2007.

"To my MPLA Friends and Colleagues: Thank you. I feel doubly honored, since you have chosen for the first time I can remember in 27 years to recognize two people, myself and my friend Sharon. I am sorry that I cannot be there with you. This is the second time in all the years I have been a member that I have not been at the MPLA joint conference. Hopefully next year. My First MPLA Conference

As the new Montana delegate for MPLA, the NLA/MPLA 2017 conference was my first experience with an MPLA conference. I've spent the months since being elected silently attending our board meetings online, with no idea what I was supposed to be doing. 



Artist's Corner

The Cottonwood Public Library holds a monthly informal live-art demonstration called Artist's Corner. Its purpose is to inspire patrons to create their own art while also promoting and supporting the wealth of talented local artists in the Verde Valley area. In October, artist Sunshower Rose demonstrated a technique she calls "Collaborative Art WORKS!", which is a completely digital method that involves combining one piece of art with another to create a third, completely new piece of art. Ms. Rose has been a professional artist for 40 years and has resided in Sedona since 1987. Safford City-Graham County Public Library held a Meet and Greet event for the jewel of Gila Valley, Discovery Park. Paul Anger, the director of the Eastern Arizona College Discovery Park Campus, talked about the full-access tours available at the Mt. Graham International Observatory, The SkySpotter program, and the ARGOS laser project. Those who attended the event also viewed activities of the Eastern Arizona Science Initiative, which has been providing science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) learning opportunities for area students for 10 years. They also

learned about the new Rural Activation Innovation Network (RAIN) Project, which will bring STEM to all Gila Valley communities over the next five years.

PVPL's Everyone Improv

In October, the Prescott Valley Public Library started an ongoing improv program called PVPL's Everyone Improv, open to anyone in the community. Improv theater/comedy is the art of creating characters, stories, and scenes out of thin air by drawing on a set of skills that anyone can learn. Good improv is all about living in the moment, accepting what's given, and supporting your team. The library partnered with Bliss Streetman, an experienced improvisation actor, who taught the attendees the ins-and-outs of improvisation by utilizing games, practice, silliness, acceptance, and bravery. Most of the attendees did not have previous theater experience and let staff members know that they joined the program to step out of their comfort zone.


Seek and You Will Find

The Hays Public Library is doing more than ever to put books directly in the hands of young adults. Librarians are visiting middle school classrooms to do book talks and bringing the YA collection to them. This provides teens with the opportunity to check out the books on the spot! In the first day of this new venture, over 100 books were checked out to 6th graders. In a collaborative effort, public library books are also available for checkout at displays in the high school. Librarians hope to put similar displays in the local middle school soon.





Snapshots: Towns and Urban Sights of Montana



Towns and Urban Sights of Montana. was on display in The Carle Gallery located in the Butte-Silver Bow Public Library in historic

uptown Butte, Montana. The exhibit featured local artists as they explored the less than rural parts of Montana. In a variety of mediums, these artists brought alive the everyday street scene, the forgotten house, and the mundane of our everyday landscape. The Carle Gallery was established by the library as a tribute to artist John Carle, whose murals and paintings depict Butte, its historic buildings, and inhabitants. The gallery seeks to continue to honor and support local artists by providing an opportunity for them to present their work professionally and to begin a dialogue with the community about their art, as well as hosting exhibits by artists from outside of Butte.

Understanding Confederate Monuments

The Billings Public Library recently held a panel discussion Confederate Monuments: From the National to the Local, during which four local history professors talked about the historical context and meaning of America's monuments to Confederacy. The panel included Montana State University Billings history professors Emily Arendt and Joseph Bryan, and Rocky Mountain College history professors Tim Lehman and Jenifer Parks. The discussion revolved around the purpose of monuments, the significance of their location, and the intentions behind the monuments. A historian's task is to equip the populus with the correct kind of information to allow them to make informed decisions about the fate of the monuments themselves.





A Volunteer's Heart and Soul

Friends of the Columbus Public Library's Melodee Pedersen recently received the Meritorious Service Award from the Nebraska Library Association. Pedersen helped found the Friends of the Columbus Public Library and focused most of her attention on the annual book sales. With her guidance, the average yearly proceeds grew from about \$2,500 to about \$6,500. "All of the books in the sale are donated to us," Pedersen said. "I don't know what the volume of donations were before I got here, but lately there have been lots of donations. We even had to open up a second room to store all the books. So Now there are two sales per year. Nominator Jeanette Jackson, a member of the Friends of the Columbus Library commented, "Melodee has just put so much time, energy, heart and soul into this library.. She has had such a positive impact and has been so supportive of the boards and foundations she's participated in." Pedersen calls the library a hidden treasure, a place where she's willing to help wherever she's needed. "There is a wide gamut of what the library has to offer," she said. "What drives me to do this is how great the organization is and how it benefits all the citizens of Columbus. I personally believe the library can really impact people from all walks of life."



Dive into the Treasure Trove



The Lexington Public Library is getting the jump on *Give Big Lexington*, which is a one–day online giving event hosted by the Lexington Community Foundation, making it easier for organizations and non–profits to fundraise and donors a way to give to a variety of organizations. "The Treasure Trove" is an event where the library sells gently used, donated items. Edna Schultz, a member of the Friends of the Library, indicated that they wanted to raise money for new meeting room tables, since the old ones are at least twelve years old and have seen a lot of use. The Treasure Trove of donated items includes cook books. In the last six years, Give Big Lexington has distributed \$2.6 million to over 100 organizations. The NMLF gives grants to libraries to build and maintain their collections. update information access technology, and enhance library programs.


Writer Ian Doescher discussed his Shakespearean retelling of George Lucas' epic Star Wars.


