### 1) What sparked the idea for a Library Leadership Podcast?

Library Leadership Podcast was born from an observation that whenever I was attending conferences, visiting other libraries, or following online discussions, some of the most inspiring ideas and insights came from conversations with those making innovative contributions in the field. Conference sessions offer great opportunities for learning, but sometimes, for me, the 'conversations in the hallway' were what stuck in my mind upon returning home. Library Leadership Podcast makes ideas and discussions with top library leaders accessible to everyone. The leaders I interview are generous with their ideas, methods, and innovative actions from which we can all learn as we look for solutions in our own libraries.

### 2) What do you hope comes from the sharing of these ideas?

Sharing these ideas provides valuable insights into the minds of leaders who have made impressive impacts. Our profession changes and challenges us on a daily basis. Tuning in to conversations with top leaders as we navigate the fast-paced information world gives us a competitive advantage. The communities we serve benefit from engaged minds, those who are willing to be a part of continuous improvement. On Library Leadership Podcast, you will hear from people like Jim Neal, current ALA President, as he shares his vision for ways in which libraries can gain support through demonstrating the positive difference they make in the communities they serve and documenting their impact, and Geetha Murali, new CEO of Room to Read, an organization that has had developed 20,000 libraries around the world, positively affecting the lives of over 11.6 million children. Or, you can find inspiration from Jami Munk Carter, a public library director who describes herself as an "accidental librarian" and makes positive impacts everyday by listening to people, including one young girl who, thanks to Jami, has set new life-goals that include being the first girl in her family to graduate from high school without being a mom.

### 3) Did Leadership Institute help you in stepping out in this endeavor and if so, in what ways?

The "Armchair Traveler Passport" offered participants the opportunity to raise a glass of wine with their neighbors and friends. On Saturday, January 27, over 50 people crowded into the Alberton Community Center and tasted wine paired with different nuts, cheese and various other hors d'oeuvres.

Librarian Connie Acker said putting the event together was a lot of fun and they received great support from local wineries, Hidden Legend in Victor; Montana Winery and 10 Spoon in Missoula. They donated, or



gave steep discounts, for the purchase of the wine served that evening. They also donated items for a silent auction held in the library which is located in the Community Center building. Overall the event made \$1,900, according to Acker, with \$785 from the silent auction, ticket sales and miscellaneous donations.

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### Stan Bunman Bird and Wildlife

At Hooper Public Library, bird-watchers and layman alike got a chance to take in "Fenceline Photos," an exhibit showcasing 36 bird and wildlife photos taken by birdwatcher and photographer Stanley Buman of Carroll, Iowa. "They're beautiful," Cherie Anderson, library director, said of the photos. "They look so nice in here." Visitors to the exhibit saw photos of birds including the piping plover, bufflehead (duck), dowitcher, dickcissel and sedge wren along with more familiar species of hawks, owls, sparrows, swallows and geese. Most photos were taken in Iowa, but a few are from pastures farther west including Winnetoon in Nebraska and the ocean coasts.

### "Will Eisner: A Retrospective"

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Love Library is holding an exhibition featuring the work of comic-book artist Will Eisner. Eisner, who was born in 1917 and died 13 years ago, was a pioneer in the comic-book industry. He also taught at New York's School of Visual Arts for 20 years. He created characters such as Blackhawk and Sheena, Queen of the Jungle. He also produced a newspaper series, The Spirit. As part of the exhibition, Denis Kitchen, a cartoonist and author, gave a lecture on Eisner. Richard Graham, an associate professor and digital media librarian, will talk about comics and graphic novels at 5:30 p.m. April 6.









### **Carson City Refreshes Library**

The 20 year old carpeting desperately needed to be replaced. That's what started the Carson City Library's quest to refresh its facility. Financial support from Carson City (Nevada) paid for painting the exterior and interior of the building as well as redoing the floors. In conjunction with the Carson City Public Works department, the decision was made to have a finished concrete floor instead of carpeting. The catch – 80,000 items and 20,000 linear feet of shelving had to be packed and stored.

Library staff was heavily involved with the entire process: analyzing patron traffic patterns and arrangements of collections; finding ways to better utilize natural lighting; planning and organizing the packing and storage of materials; physically packing and unpacking materials; disassembling and reassembling shelving; rearranging floor plans; providing pop-up services during part of the 8-week closure; updating their community with a weekly video on Facebook showing the progress made. In short, they made things happen, and did it without the benefit of a moving company.

A number of community partners and other city offices supported the project as well. The library received donations and very discounted pricing for materials needed for the packing and storing, including the storage containers that allowed everything to be kept onsite. City work crews moved boxes, shelving and furnishings into the containers and then back into the library.

The finished project provides a lighter and airier feel to the library and has been well received by the community. A patron commented, "I love the open feel - I didn't know you had all these windows." Collections are rearranged to better suit patron usage and accessibility. The Information Desk was reimagined with oversized Lego-style blocks, the new Makerspace was opened and a directional stripe was added to lead patrons to the corner elevator to take them to the @Two Digital Learning Center on the second floor. At the library's grand reopening, Mayor Robert Crowell remarked, "Carson City has every reason to be proud of what you've done here. We've got people here who understand what libraries can really be in the future and what it can be now. This library is just the epitome of what Carson City should be."





### Libraries as Launchpads, An Economic Initiative

The New Mexico State Library; Creative Startups, a growing international business accelerator; Fab Lab Hub, a technology product prototyping provider; and the newly-formed New Mexico State Library Foundation have joined together in an innovative partnership to utilize public libraries as economic development centers for entrepreneurial and business training. Libraries as Launchpads will fast-track potential entrepreneurs from idea and concept to action and business formation.





Focused on underserved and rural populations throughout New Mexico, the program will help budding entrepreneurs go from idea to action with their businesses. The program team is working with libraries to identify regional entrepreneurship educators, community partners, and maker spaces that can support the project. Creative Startups designed a 4 -week intensive pre-accelerator workshop to help budding entrepreneurs go from idea to action with their businesses. Founded in 2007, Creative Startups is based in the highly creative city of Santa Fe. Fab Lab Hub helps entrepreneurs design and test their product

concepts. Fab Lab Santa Fe is a part of the international digital FABrication LABoratory network based at MIT's Center for Bits and Atoms in Cambridge, Massachusetts. Ryanne Cooper, New Mexico Assistant State Librarian, explains, "Creating sustainable expertise and collection resources in libraries statewide to assist entrepreneurs will have direct positive economic results across New Mexico."

### San Juan College offers white noise machines, wifi hotspots

San Juan College Library circulates 6 white noise machines to help manage sound, noise, and disruption in the library. Since 2015 the College library has been circulating wifi hotspots to students who lack home internet. They circulate 22 hotspots with loan periods of one week. There's always a waiting list. They are also circulating seven tablets, because many of the students don't have computers at home-- to do their school work many had to use their phones with the hotspots.







### No More "Magic Aprons"

The Chester Fritz Library, at the University of North Dakota, recently published in *The Journal of Access Services*. Coordinator of Circulation Services Karlene Clark has been working the past several years to implement Learning Outcomes that would develop soft skills needed by student employees after graduation. The article discusses the path it took to develop the process and considerations for other libraries as they look to implement their own process.

Dean of Libraries Stephanie Walker assisted in writing the article. To further aid the consistency of training across all hours, she also created a new Night Building Supervisor position. This position started February 1st.

### The Fun of Motivation

Mary Francis, associate professor of library science and reference and instruction librarian at Dakota State University, has written a new book, *The Fun of Motivation*. The book is intended to help adult learners move past the edge or a threshold of experience, the point at which learning becomes uncomfortable because the material is difficult or beyond their understanding. Her book addresses concepts provided in the Association of College and Research Libraries' Framework for Information Literacy for Higher Education; also included are sample lesson plans which use humor, games, fun ideas for group work, and assessment tools. The book has been published by the American Library Association.


