Salina Public Library Simplifies & Unifies for Summer

After decades of running a traditional Summer Reading program, Salina Public Library staff decided to take a fresh look what they were offering and what community needs they could fill. The result was a united effort to prioritize reading and learning.

It started with a bit of research. Melanie Hedgespeth, Head of Technology, was researching summer-learning loss — or the summer slide — and hearing news about cuts to education budgets. Being a busy mom herself, she knew that families would need resources and support to help keep their children's learning goals on track.

The result was Summer Learning, a program that offers a variety of ways for students in kindergarten through eighth grade to work on their reading and math skills over the summer. The initiative was first launched the summer of 2016.

"We wanted to create a program that had a variety of options for families," Hedgespeth said. "So if you can't make it to the library, you can log in to MobyMax from home. If you're coming by the library to check out books or attend programs, you can pick up worksheet packets. If your child is more focused in a classroom setting, we have Summer Learning classes."

During 2017, 2,752 learning packets were picked up and attendance for summer technology and learning classes was 1,499. This year, 1,331 summer learning packets were handed out during the first two weeks of summer.

"We're continuing to see the program grow," Hedgespeth said. "We now have teachers asking us for packets, so they can share them with their students."

After the success of the first year of Summer Learning, the library sought ways to put more emphasis on the value of reading during the summer break and simplify its Summer Reading program. It dropped summer themes, weekly games, logins and passwords, and plastic prizes. Instead, it set a community-wide reading goal that allowed adults and children to come together to demonstrate the value of reading.

The first year, the community logged 20,599 books. This year's goal is 25,000. Community members of all ages can read, or listen to, the books of their choosing. Each book they log enters them into a weekly drawing.

"I'm really excited that we have refocused our energy on reading," Lisa Newman, Head of Youth Services, said. "If you take a look at what we are doing, the whole library is working together to create Summer at the Library. We have a tagline of Read. Learn. Explore. 'Read' is for our reading goal, 'learn' is about the programs and classes patrons can attend and 'explore' ties into collaborations in the community to create meaningful learning experiences outside the library."

With Summer Learning, Summer Reading and a slate of programs that focus on interactive learning experiences -- whether the topic is early literacy or coding -- Salina Public Library is taking a whole-library approach to summer.

Jordan Little's poster titled "Peer Education Teaching Methods and Effective Learning in the SDSU Anatomy Program" earned him the award for Outstanding Use of Library Resources in Humanities and Social Sciences.

URSCAD occurs each spring and celebrates undergraduate research at SDSU. Up to 100 students from all disciplines are selected to participate. The program includes a poster show, featured performances and awards.

"The award winning students made excellent use of library resources in their research. They also clearly indicated their sources with citations on the poster," said Mary Caspers-Graper, Head of Technical Services. Some of the library resources used by the students included databases, manufacturer specifications and the online catalog to find books.

The Great American Read

@ The Mesa County Public Libraries in Colorado

Let the great debate begin! There can only be one winner. How do you choose the one book to rule them all? The Mesa County Public Libraries is sponsoring events this summer that invite participation, discussion and advocacy for readers' favorite novels alongside the PBS project, The Great American Read. "It's about talking about books and what they mean," said Shana Wade, the library's associate director. "It just creates a conversation about something we can connect with." The list of 100 books is diverse and includes fictional novels from international authors, lighter reads and heavier classics, children's books and some books that have been banned in the past.

The library will hold two book discussion groups, and will also have events at which readers can record short video testimonials to advocate for their favorite book, which will be shared on social media. Participants can explain why the book they've selected is their favorite and what memories they had of reading it the first time. The library is also sponsoring a local literary experts panel discussion. The campaign includes the installation of four Little Free Libraries in Colorado. One of those in Grand Junction will be at Las Colonias Park next to the Western Colorado Botanical Gardens. It should be completed soon and will contain copies of books from the list.

The PBS project finale will be in October, when the winning book will be selected. Viewers can see a list of the books and vote online at <u>pbs.org/greatamericanread</u>. Results are scheduled to be announced on Oct. 23 during "The Great American Read's" final episode.

Other MPLA Libraries chosen are: Sedona Public Library, AZ; Missoula Public Library, MT; Griggs County Public Library, ND; Rio Rancho Public Libraries, NM; Brookings Public Library, SD; Orem Library, UT; Albany County Public Library, WY

Mesa County Public Libraries Plug Ahead

Most people head to the library to power their minds, not their cars. But a collaboration between Atlasta Solar, Mesa County Public Libraries, and Electrify America is bringing the first publicly available electric car charging station to Mesa County.

Locating the charging station at the main library was a bit of a fluke, yet totally consistent with the library system's growing reputation as a cutting-edge organization. Name another municipal library in America that has a charging station, a digital multimedia recording studio and has created an mobile app that catalogs Colorado wildlife!

The library only had to provide space near an existing transformer for the charging station. Atlasta is providing the labor and some materials and other costs are provided through Electrify America, which is doling out part of a \$2 billion settlement from Volkswagen to boost the number of charging stations across the country.

So, while the charging station doesn't add to the library's educational mission, it reflects the organization's desire to serve the community and add to the quality of life in Mesa County.

In 1967, Wichita junior and senior high school students were recruited to form a brigade that passed books hand to hand from the former Carnegie library children's department to the children's room in the new Central Library. The event proved so popular that Wichita's library wants to recreate the experience as part of the opening of the Advanced Learning Library.

"As our staff members have shared information about the Advanced Learning Library with the community over the course of the past two years, almost every presentation has included a question or comment about the 1967 Book Brigade," said Cynthia Berner, Director of Libraries. "Creating this special memory for a new generation of Wichitans has been something we have looked forward to for a very long time."



To cover the distance from the Central Library, 223 South Main, to the Advanced Learning Library, 711 West 2nd Street, officials put a call out for at least 500 volunteers and had more than 1400 volunteers cart the last 100 items to the Advanced Learning Library. As the last item passed along the brigade, participants were encouraged to go to the Advanced Learning Library for a brief ribbon cutting ceremony held on the west plaza of the new building.

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Rio Rancho Librarians Connect at Local Hospitals by Deanne Deakle

In Rio Rancho, the local medical centers are treated to visits from a couple of experienced and knowledgeable librarians on a regular basis. Dawn Hite and Kathy Campbell showcase the resources of the Rio Rancho Public Library to the staff and visitors at the two Rio Rancho hospitals. They go once a month, from 11:30-1:00, during the cafeteria's busiest time. Their major goal is to let the public know about the resources and services the library has to offer, in particular the eProducts that people can utilize from home. Within their portable trolley they carry their RRPL tablecloth, a laptop to issue library cards, program



calendars for adults and children, paperback books to give away, and SWAG such as water bottles, pens, and bookmarks. They keep their outreach supplies stocked and can be ready to go at the drop of a hat. Once at the site they can set up their table within minutes.

Dawn and Kathy regularly hear such positive comments as, "I have a library card with you guys and I use it all the time," "I love the programs at the library," and "You guys do such a good job." Occasionally they also get suggestions as to how the library could be improved, and those comments are valuable too. Recently a Farmington resident stopped by to chat and to pick up a free paperback. She shared that her mother had been brought in by helicopter and she didn't know how long she might be there. In the course of the conversation Dawn was able to sign her up for a Rio Rancho library card and show her how to download books using OverDrive's Libby. She was very grateful that she would now be able to download and read books while her mother was in the hospital.

NEH grant supports Santa Fe Opera at Public Libraries

Things will get rowdy this summer at public libraries across the state, with Libraries Rock!, this year's summer reading theme that will get kids into the rhythm of reading when school is out. As part of summer reading, the New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs (DCA) is pleased to announce The Power of Story in Communities, a summer reading project that will bring high-caliber explorations into our culture, through stories, books, and sharing at libraries. The project, a partnership between DCA, the New Mexico State Library, the Santa Fe Opera, and the Embudo Valley Library, will be carried out over the



next three years with support from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Kicking off this summer, there will be events at three pilot sites: The Public Library Albuquerque and Bernalillo County Library, the Silver City Public Library, and the Embudo Valley Library in Dixon. At the library events, teens will interact with Santa Fe Opera educators, who will transform the library into a playground to unlock each participant's cultural experience, merging individual stories into one community story through the Hero's Journey. Participants will interact, developing characters, costumes, story elements, and a plot, culminating in a final performance finale at each 90-minute event. Inspired by the theme of this year's summer reading program, Libraries Rock!, vocal artists will also join the workshop, resulting in a musical, artistic infusion into the performance. The events will invite exploration, ignite creativity, and encourage all to think critically. Through the interactive storytelling process, teens and kids will reason and ask questions with the goal of bringing participants to new insights into their community, their culture, and the world around them.

Digital Library of South Dakota

The Digital Library of South Dakota has partnered with the Digital Public Library of America to bring more than 50,000 items held by South Dakota universities to national audiences. As a result, specialized collections, including the papers of political leaders Tom Daschle, Karl Mundt, and George McGovern and oral histories of National Guard soldiers dating back to the 1800s, will be more accessible to the general public.

A collaboration of the libraries at the six South Dakota Board of Regents' universities and other partner institutions in the state, the Digital Library of South Dakota provides digital access to unique resources on regional history and the lives and experiences of generations of South Dakotans. Utah Digital Newspapers Addition

The University of Utah's J. Willard Marriott Library is celebrating a new addition to Utah Digital Newspapers — the complete run of Hill Air Force Base's Hilltop Times. Hill Air Force Base, which was founded shortly before the U.S. entry into World War II, went on to serve a critical maintenance and supply role during the war. The bombers that defeated the Axis powers in World War II — the B-29, B-25, B-24 and B-17 — were repaired, modified or maintained in some way at Hill Air Force Base.

More than 61,000 pages of the Hill Air Force Base newspapers, covering the period 1943 to 2006, have been digitized and are now available to the public. The first issue of the official base newspaper was published on Jan. 1, 1943. "Every page of every issue is available in the base's archive, which also houses some 50,000 original photographs covering the building of the base and the history of aviation in Utah," Tina Kirkham, digital library project manager, said in a statement.
