Reaching Out: Rural, Realistic & Relevant PD for School Librarians - Joan Upell and Julie Erickson

Join us for an overview of the IMLS Reaching Out School Librarian Professional Development Grant and it's how-to guidebook. 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"Abraham Lincoln: A New Birth of Freedom"

Thanks to the miracle of technology, the Williston Community Library, in Williston, ND, opened a window to the past to share the story of President, Abraham Lincoln. On February 12th, the public took part in an interactive Zoom session with the 16th President, hearing a first-hand account from Abraham Lincoln himself of the history of the United States of America during his time, from his childhood on the frontier to his political rise and eventual presidency, including the Civil War and the country's "new birth of freedom".

Lincoln was portrayed by Kevin Wood, a professional Lincoln presenter who bears a striking resemblance to the former president. Mr. Wood has been portraying Lincoln for 20 years, doing so professionally since 2015. Wood has made over 1,200 appearances in 27 states and Washington, D.C., as well as Canada and Spain.

As Lincoln, Wood quotes from the President's best-known speeches and writings, remaining in-character as Lincoln as he shares the story of how he rose from a humble background to the highest office in the land through self-study, hard work, ambition, and a strong moral character. The program ran about 60 minutes, followed by about 30 minutes of time of Q&A and informal interaction.



Grocery Rewards—King Soopers/Kroger

Once logged into your King Soopers/Kroger account, search for Mountain Plains Library Association by name or our account: KK820. Then click Enroll. New users will need to create an account which requires some basic information, a valid email address and a loyalty card. If you previously purchased grocery cards they may still be used and reloaded but they will no longer provide rebates for MPLA.

Instead, there is a quarterly designated funding amount which is shared by all Community Rewards organizations. Amounts are determined by the percentage of purchases by each organization.

Professional Development Grants

Grants are awarded to support the following:

- Formal course work leading to an advanced degree in library science or a related discipline.
- Formal course work not leading to an advanced degree but directly related to an individual's library position.
- Attendance as a participant or a presenter at a library or scholarly workshop, seminar, or conference, including the MPLA annual conference.
- Visits to another library to receive or provide significant advanced training in library services or procedures.
- Library related research projects.

Value of Grants

Annual budget equals the funding for grants approved but not yet awarded from the previous year plus the funding awarded for grants in the coming year. Funding for grants that have been approved but are not awarded is returned to the MPLA general fund.

MPLA sponsors the two categories of grants:

Mini-grant

Funding for projects requiring minimal financial support. (Maximum amount: \$150)

Regular grant

Funding for projects requiring substantial financial support, and for occasional funding of professional development opportunities requiring travel outside the United States. (Maximum amount: \$600)

Grant Funding

- Reimbursement of actual expenses incurred during a project.
- Transportation reimbursement for the lowest possible fare or for personal vehicles, mileage for the shortest route at the amount per mile allowed for deduction for federal income tax deductions.
- Grant funding for course work limited to tuition, fees and books.
- Funding approved but not needed to reimburse expenses is returned to the MPLA general fund.
- Expenses in excess of the grant funding approved are not reimbursed.

CARES Act Calling

The Arizona State

Library, Archives, and Public Records has awarded CARES Act Calling grants to 18 libraries and library systems across Arizona, enabling them to implement Dial -a-Story, Calendar Events, and/or Resource Hotline services from LibraryCall, through September, 2021.

The State Library has also awarded a range of more traditional grants of CARES Act funds, but grants of materials or services, rather than money, offer a streamlined process that makes them especially accessible for small and rural libraries. Read more here.

Read Wider


The Pitkin County Library, in Aspen, Colorado, recently launched the Read Wider program, aiming to build empathy through curated books, movies and music that might help local readers walk some miles in other peoples' shoes.

Building from the "own voices" movement, the monthly program will focus on stories told about the experiences of diverse communities by their members. February's Read Wider is inspired by Black History Month. The library recently released voluminous resource lists online for reading, listening and viewing as well as interactive tools and virtual discussions on Zoom.

The library has Read Wider programs planned through November, which will honor Native American Heritage Month. In between, the series will highlight women's history, Arab Americans, Jewish Americans, Asian American and Pacific Islanders, LGBTQ stories, immigrants and refugees, Hispanic heritage and people with disabilities.

Each month's Read Wider program will include virtual presentations by authors and book club-style discussions with library staff and local readers. The first was a free online talk on wrongful convictions with the exonerated prisoner Ndume Olatushani and Anne-Marie Moyes, director of the Korey Wise Innocence Project at the University of Colorado-Boulder School of Law.

Read Wider is part of a growing ecosystem of Aspenarea initiatives using books to broaden perspectives, an education movement that's gained steam here since the Roaring Fork Valley's Black Lives Matter demonstrations of summer 2020.






Polar Express StoryWalk in Livingston

As 2020 waned with Covid-19 restrictions dimming the holiday season, Livingston-Park County Public Library partnered with the Livingston Recreation Department to spread some cheer to families through a Polar Express StoryWalk. The Livingston Business Improvement District provided the funds to bring this classic story to life in sixteen downtown business windows.

Librarians distributed coupons for hot cocoa or an ice cream scoop to 700 children in the community via school backpacks which included a downloadable file from the web. Each story board included a QR Code that could be scanned linking participants to a GoogleMap of route as well as access to the coupon for goodies. The final story page included a stop at the Murray Hotel for a photo in front of their Christmas tree and the first gift of Christmas (a bell) for each child.





Judging from the social media stats it was very well received by the community. Families were assured of a safe and socially distanced activity with the dual goal of bringing foot traffic and business to the downtown over the holiday season.

We were so encouraged by the response that we will be teaming up with the Recreation Department each quarter in 2021, providing mobile StoryWalks to Park County, using our Bookmobile to bring it to far-flung locations.

Self-checkout is now easier than ever. Mansfield, Missoula College Payne Family and Law Libraries welcomed back Spring semester students on January 11th with meeScan, a new self-checkout service. Users are able to check out items where they find them and use the scanner at the checkout desk to deactivate items. Curbside pickup and campus delivery of physical materials is available by the Mansfield Library.

Mansfield Library and Missoula College Payne Family Library are offering modified Course Reserves during the 2021 Spring semester. All physical materials placed on Reserve will be allowed to leave the library, have a minimum check out period of 24 hours and will be guarantined upon return to the library.

They pulled out every "chick" in the book for chicken-themed events provided by the Pittsburg Public Library, including chicken crafts, jokes, trivia, giveaways, and much more. Chickenstock concludes with a virtual visit from KJ Dell'Antonia, author of The Chicken Sisters. The Zoom event was held on Sunday, February 21.







People News

After 23 years as the Director of the University of Nebraska Omaha's Library Science Education programs, Dr. Becky Pasco retired on December 18, 2020. She is off to new adventures!

At UNO, Dr. Pasco is affectionately and accurately referred to as "The Library Goddess". For those who have had the opportunity to know and work with her, even this grand term falls short. As head of UNO's Library Science programs, she was a visionary leader, an inspirational teacher and a powerhouse executor of major initiatives. She was also a shining example of "boots on the



ground", driving hundreds of thousands of miles across our state to meet, encourage, and support Nebraska librarians. Her work has ensured accessible, quality library science education for the betterment of libraries across our profession.



Mary Gubbels, Public Services Librarian at Sump Memorial Library in Papillon, NE retired in December after 20 years of dedicated service to the library. Mary made countless contributions to the library as a whole over the course of her tenure. From designing adult programming to creating a more user-friendly space for library goers

to making sure that patrons are served and satisfied with their experience overall at the library, she did it all. Congratulations Mary!

Ponca Carnegie Library's Pandemic Project Article by Patti Goodier

Ever wonder what to do with all those old books that are still in decent shape, but in which the information is outdated? How about the books that have been in circulation for decades though they haven't been checked out in years? Maybe you have a lot of patrons calling about donating their twenty-year-old encyclopedias. This is where we found ourselves in the summer of 2020. After completing an extensive weeding of our collection and receiving several large donations of outdated books, we were at a loss as to what to do with them all. After donating what we could to local shelters, nursing homes, and clinics we were left with quite a few large textbooks, nonfiction hardcovers and, of course, the encyclopedias. Since we did not want to just throw them in the trash, Director Melissa Kebaili set out to find a way to make use of them. We opted to try to make something functional, practical, and that met a need for the library.

Melissa settled on making book stools as they are functional and provide extra seating, which is something the library needs. We decided to use encyclopedias for our first attempt because they are all the same basic size with a few differences in thickness. This made assembly a bit easier. Tammi Thiem, Director of the Three Rivers Library System, brought us several sets of encyclopedias from surrounding libraries.

Each stool is constructed out of 4 three-inch swivel casters (two with locks) secured to the base with screws, 1 piece of quarter-inch plywood topped with foam padding and covered with vinyl fabric for the cushion. We used a construction adhesive to secure all the books, the plywood base and cushion together. We chose vinyl fabric because it is easy to wipe down with disinfectant and will hold up to regular use for several years. We made two stools with a seat height for children and another two with a seat height for youth-adults.





Henderson Library District, located near Las Vegas

Henderson Libraries continues to serve our community in creative ways. In addition to our curbside services and digital resources, the team at Henderson Libraries has developed an array of interesting and engaging programs to meet community needs during these difficult times. A few recent examples include our Drive-In Storytime where community members enjoy storytime inside their cars. The storytime is broadcast through their radio and all stories selected are available on hoopla for families to read along in their cars. Another timely service that our team is offering is Online Interview Coaching (https://hendersonlibraries.com/v/assets/382). This service allows community members to book time with a library team member – during their time, they practice logging in to an online platform and receive coaching feedback on the virtual interview process. Finally, we're so glad to be able to

offer paired Chromebooks with WiFi Hotspots for our patrons to check out so they can utilize library technology to access the internet from the safety of their home. This service was made possible with CARES Act funds, provided by the Institute of Museum and Library Services through the Library Services and Technology Act, administered by the Nevada State Library, Archives and Public Records.

North Las Vegas Library District

The North Las Vegas Library District has been working hard to support efforts to vaccinate our residents against COVID-19, with a focus on our at-risk populations. Along with supporting the City of North Las Vegas, NV to distribute CARES dollars to local businesses and residents, we have assigned 8 full time staff members to operate a vaccine call center for our residents. Through this process staff members are responsible for answering general questions related to the vaccine, registering residents for vaccine appointments, and calling residents in specific zip codes with large at-risk populations. Even with our libraries still closed to the public due to COVID restrictions, we are finding ways to use our unique skill set to help our residents and businesses.

Carson City Library

The Carson City Library is currently offering an average of 16 virtual programs, with a total of 120 participants per month. Virtual programs are offered through Zoom and include storytimes for Pre-K ages, STEAM activities for elementary ages, coding and leadership programs for middle and high school students, as well as art classes, a book club, and computer courses for adults.

Our newest program is an LSTA grant funded project focused on connecting middle school students with bionics and providing tools to explore STEAM careers. The first multi-day Think Bionics Camp launched in February 2021 with 3 additional camps planned through August 2021. This includes one camp being hosted in partnership with the Boys & Girls Club of Western Nevada. During the camp, students create three different builds, learning how a fish swims, how an elephant uses its trunk, and how a chameleon uses its tongue to grab items.







Healing Library Box

In November, Thomas Branigan Memorial Library, in Las Cruces, New Mexico, partnered with The Healing Library to bring materials designed to assist families dealing with a trauma navigate and personalize their journey toward healing. The boxes include books, conversation starters, activities, and community engagement ideas geared toward helping families deal with a range of difficult situations. The new box that will be available for check out is Death of a Loved One. Other Healing Library Boxes available in the collection include Death of a Pet, Divorce & Separation, Alzheimer's & Your Family, and COVID-19.

Library card patrons can check out The Healing Library boxes for three weeks. The boxes may also be placed on hold, just like books and DVDs, using a library card. Healing Library boxes include a checklist to assist patrons in r eturning all the box's elements and a pricelist for replacing these elements if lost or damaged.



The Healing Library is a project that started in the Fall of 2016 as a conversation between Kirsten Cappy of Curious City, a company which creates promotional experiences and materials for children's books, and Megan Emery, then a student at Syracuse University earning her MLIS.

The Healing Library project became a series of kits designed to make a family's journey of healing following a trauma easier to navigate and personalize.

Ordinary People, Extraordinary Lives.

The Minot Public Library celebrated Black History Month with a new series called "Ordinary People, Extraordinary Lives." The library asked local black business owners, professionals, artists and other community influencers to choose an influential African American and share a little about what this person did and why he/she influenced them. In addition to sharing the stories of these important people, we hope to highlight the amazing people within our community and all of the great things they are doing. Minot Public Library plans to extend this new program series beyond Black History Month and hopes to showcase other populations such as indigenous people, LGBTQIA, and Latinx.

Extra Layer of Protection


The Williston Community Library recently garnered attention for their new piece of equipment, the Electrostatic Sprayer. The sprayer is adding an extra layer of protection, and convenience, for library patrons and staff. The bright green blaster sprays a solution called VitalOxide, which is an EPA registered disinfectant cleaner, mold killer and odor eliminator. The disinfection eliminates a wide range of germs and viruses, including COVID-19. The library recently acquired the sprayer, which is similar to ones already being used in other facilities such as Williston Public Works and the Convention and Visitors Bureau.





Lego Mini Kits in Bismarck, ND

The Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library is reaching outside its walls to offer opportunities for engagement and creativity by providing LEGO bricks to youth, especially those who might not be able to get them otherwise. Providing sets of bricks for children will allow them to use their imaginations and enjoy storytelling play. The sets have over 100 pieces, in random shapes, sizes, and colors for kids to do with whatever they would like. Big changes are coming to the Morton Mandan Public Library!



In October of 2020, we broke ground on an incredible new expansion/ renovation project, which will include a floor-to-ceiling facelift for our existing building, and an expansion featuring an attached garage for our bookmobile, a large meeting room/presentation space, and public restrooms that will be accessible from the outside for events in the park next to us, even if the library is closed. Our staff area will also be moved into the expansion, which will give our Easy, Junior, and Young Adult collections more breathing room. Completion of this exciting project is scheduled for fall of 2021.

We have also been excited to start a new "Let's Create" program this year, which has become far more popular than we anticipated, much to our delight! This program started as a children's take and make program, and included a monthly kit full of art supplies and activity ideas/instructions given for free to any family who signed up to receive one, as well as a slew of virtual programming including pre recorded storytimes, LEGO challenges, STEAM challenges, family activities, and much more. This program quickly became so popular that it became the "flagship" of our multigenerational "Let's Create" program, which includes take and make projects tailored to teens and adults, and several "whole family" projects designed to engage and interest every level of development and get families creating something together.

"At first it just felt like everything was just stripped away. It was like, 'No, we can't do any fun activities. We're just in, out, we have to just let a few in the library at a time," explained Robyn Rhoton, a teacher librarian at the school. "My goal with this library is just to make a place where students come and feel comfortable. We want it to be the heart of the school."

"Me and my friends usually hang out here, too, just because I know it's friendly and fun," said a student, Valeska Bushman. "Sometimes, they'll (librarians) do things like scavenger hunts where you go and decode like books stuff and find out what books, and it's really fun, and they just make it really enjoyable."

Between monthly, weekly, and daily activities, students are invited into the media center to participate in activities that are changing the way they see and use the library. Changing the perception of what a library is for is making a world of difference at their school among students and teachers. With educators having a lot on their plate juggling both in-person and online teaching, the library is serving as a resource for them as well.
