

Awards Committee Seeks Nominees

MPLA Dan Chaney Unsung Hero Award: To be given to an MPLA member who has consistently worked behind the scenes to create, administer, or support a library-related organization or project and who has not previously been recognized to the degree their work merits.



At his death at age 52, Dan Chaney was Associate Professor and Social Sciences Librarian at Oklahoma State University in Stillwater. He had been an MPLA member for over 20 years. He served as MPLA Webmaster, unofficial photographer and social media contact, and received the Carl Gaumer Library Champion Award in 2009 for his service to MPLA. Witty, profane, probingly intelligent, creative, irascible, and deeply caring, Dan was beloved by his students and his colleagues.

In 2017, MPLA's Unsung Hero Award was renamed the MPLA Dan Chaney Unsung Hero Award, and a \$100 stipend was added in Dan's honor.

MPLA Beginning Professional Award: To recognize an MPLA member who, as a librarian/media specialist within the first five years after being awarded a library/media degree, has made a positive impact on the quality and role of library service. Factors such as innovative programming and planning, use of resources, and special projects will be considered.

MPLA Innovator Award: To recognize an up-and-coming individual(s) or group(s) in the MPLA region for a creative, inventive, trail-blazing project that has significance to the library community.

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MPLA Distinguished Service Award: To be given to an MPLA member who has made notable contributions to the library profession, furthered significant development of libraries in the Mountain Plains region, or performed exemplary service for an extended period of time. Carl Gaumer Library Champion Award: To be given to the individual, organization or company whose positive support of the Mountain Plains Library Association is demonstrated by repeated conscientious endeavors towards libraries, library staff, trustees and professional activities.

MPLA Literary Contribution Award: To be given to an author whose published writings have successfully furthered an understanding and appreciation of the Mountain Plains region. CLiC Supports Great Libraries for Everyone – Including Those Who Are Incarcerated

The Colorado Library Consortium (CLiC), in addition to hosting the State's courier service and collective purchasing of databases, also provides services such as talent development and a shared online catalog known as AspenCat.

AspenCat, a Koha-based catalog, has served as the online catalog for a mix of 132 Colorado libraries which includes academic, public, and school libraries. As of April 11, 2022, AspenCat added 22 Colorado Department of Corrections (CDOC) libraries – a project that has been years in the making and brings the total number of AspenCat libraries to 154.

Services for the CDOC libraries are separated from the rest of the catalog for security reasons. However, the correctional institutions will be getting their first ever Integrated Library System designed specifically for their requirements.



It took the passion and support of too many people to name individually to make the project a success. However, a few names need to be shared and those are: Erin Boyington, project lead; Renee Barnes, supervisor of Institutional Library Development; Molly Bassford who provided input as a library staff member and now as part of the ILD group; and Katy Schorling for her input as library staff from the Colorado State Penitentiary. These people along with the CLiC team, State Library staff, CDOC staff, and the residents of the facilities that will benefit from expanded services worked together to build something new and exciting which will hopefully share benefits with a unique group of library patrons.

Colorado Libraries Welcome Back Nicolle Davies as State Librarian ...AND... Colorado Libraries Say Farewell to Debbi MacLeod



About eleven months ago, Nicolle Davies left her role as Colorado's State Librarian to (non-library) pursue new opportunities. This April she found her way back to the Library from State her departure-turned-sabbatical. "Not long after I left, I realized that libraries are my passion," said Nicolle when sharing her decision with the Colorado Association of Libraries Board.

While we are thrilled to have Nicolle back, former Interim State Librarian, Debbi MacLeod, has even more reason to celebrate as Nicolle's arrival means that Debbi can now retire, which has been her plan for a while. Initially, Debbi served as interim State Librarian, even as she continued her work as Director of the Colorado Talking Book Library and the Colorado State Publications library. In January she was able to transition to focusing on just the Interim State Librarian position as she hired her replacement for the two libraries. And now, she can focus on non-work-related pursuits.

Summit County Libraries Open the Doors to the Next Chapter

On Saturday, March 26th, the Main Library in Frisco, Colorado opened its doors after being closed for the last seven months for an extensive remodeling project.

After a ribbon-cutting ceremony with the County Commissioners, visitors were able to explore the new spaces while enjoying a scavenger hunt, live music, storytimes, and more.

The refreshed library reflects requests from the public for updating the 25-year old facility by providing more quiet study areas, meeting rooms and comfortable seating, and adding exciting colors. The new look and new feel are expected to be a hit with new and returning patrons.

"Never underestimate the power of a planted seed."

The Erie City Public Library has been fortunate to qualify for grants to improve their programs. We received a grant from Neosho County to buy a greenhouse and start a seed library in November 2020. We used those seeds to plant tomatoes in the greenhouse so our community could grow food in their own gardens. We shared 500+ tomato plants and seeds for these gardens.

This past summer, our local Walmart of Chanute donated \$5000 worth of seeds to the library. Baker Creek of Mansfield, Missouri donated 1000 packages of seeds to our program. Erie is a very small town and 2000 + packages of seeds would never be used. The Erie City Public Library offered boxes of seeds to the small libraries in Southeast Kansas. Thirteen of those libraries asked for the seeds, so they were boxed up and sent by library courier to the requesting libraries. We also shared seeds with a startup seed library in Nebraska, a library in Gadsden, Alabama and with BSBC Pathways programs in Labette and Montgomery County, Kansas, to re-start the Community Garden in Parsons. We still have about 6 plastic tubs of seeds to give to our community for gardens here.



As we gave these seeds to local libraries who were new to the Seed Library concept, Southeast Kansas Library System started a Zoom interest group which meets monthly to share ideas and plans for the Seed Libraries they are starting. We meet with Sharon Moreland and Amy Eiben from SEKLS and share our success stories as well as our programs.

Andrea Sobba from the Garnett Library is using seed to make seed bombs in a program for children. They plan to start the seed library this season and share with their community. The Bronson Public Library's Director, Diana Huff, has set up a series of programs, starting with "Growing and Cooking With Herbs" and "How Seeds Germinate and Grow." They plan to plant sunflowers at their library.

Berta Willis from the Pleasanton Public Library has produced a display with books and seeds and has gotten copies of *Our Family Gardening Journal from the extension Service to share with future gardeners*. Regina Casner, Mound City Library, displayed the Seed Library along with Gardening books from the

library. The Iola Public Library has plans to plant flowers beside their new pavilion.

The Thayer Friday Reading Club Library has begun plants in the lobby of their new location and have acquired mineral tubs to plant their container garden with vegetable seeds. They have an active gardening group and they are thrilled with the seeds.

Of course, The Erie City Public Library is expanding their programs to include gardening and planting salad greens and herbs to use in our Summer Cooking for Kids Program. All of these were made possible from the seed library packets. We will be giving away 500 + tomato plants this next week to our community. These will go into family gardens in our community.

The amazing thing about all of this is – We started with \$50 in seeds and the program has grown to include more than 13 libraries offering seeds and programs to benefit Southeast Kansas. "**Keep planting seeds, you never know what may take root.**"

Kearney Library celebrates 10-year anniversary of building project

In April, Library staff celebrated the 10-year mark since its big addition and renovation. They organized a scavenger hunt, offered prize drawings and set up a photo display of the library's history - a fun project for Reference Librarian Sarah Haack.

"Looking at it now and seeing how much more space we have, it's kind of like, how did we function in that tiny space before?" Haack said.

Physical books remain popular, but the library has added other offerings as the world has moved online. "Our digital collection, which you don't see when you come into the library, has gotten even more popular with COVID," Haack said. "We have a makerspace with creative equipment for people and a community space for people to use. So we'll be around for a long time and it's nice to continue to grow."

The renovation added public meeting rooms, which are drawing more people than ever. The library set a record with 99 groups hosting meetings last month. Staff expects to be busy over the coming months, with the summer reading program starting June 1st.





Library Renovations at Washoe County Library System

Washoe County Library System is excited to announce the recent completion of two library renovation projects! The Northwest Reno Library reopened in March, and the Sparks Library reopened in April. Both branches were closed for several months to undergo upgrades to their interior spaces. These renovations are part of Washoe County Library System's 2022-2025 Strategic Plan, which includes a goal to provide welcoming spaces through renovations and improvements to furniture, fixtures, and equipment.



The Northwest Reno Library, located at 2325 Robb Dr. in Reno, was formerly a manufacturing plant. It was converted into a library and opened to the public in June of 1999. After two decades of service, the building's interior was ready for a refresh. The branch has been rejuvenated with fresh paint and new flooring and furniture. Its Young People's Library has been updated with



new children's materials, vibrant paint, and an improved floor plan.


The library's art gallery, which regularly hosts exhibits by international, local, and regional artists, has been rejuvenated by new flooring and turned into a beautiful exhibit space.

The Sparks Library has been in operation since 1931, moving from 814 Victorian Ave. to its current location at 1125 12th St. in 1964. This pillar of the Sparks community now boasts multiple improvements throughout the

building. The story time and STEAM areas in the Young People's Library have been expanded, and the children's collection has been refreshed with popular new bestsellers. In addition, a clearly defined Teen Zone and young adult collection have been created for the benefit of teenaged patrons at the branch. New lounge seating and laptop tables provide convenient access for research and study while access to electricity for device charging has also greatly increased.



Funding for these renovation projects was provided by Washoe County in partnership with the Tacchino Trust. These improvements are part of an

Muskogee Public Library Awarded Grant to Develop Digital Preservation Program

Muskogee OK – Muskogee Public Library was recently awarded \$10,000 of grant funding by the American Rescue Plan (ARP), with support from the American Library Association (ALA) and the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), to develop a "Memory Lab," a digital preservation program to allow the public to convert old family tapes, photos, and documents to digital files for the purpose of preserving important family memories or documents. With these funds, the library will obtain digitization equipment for all formats, including video, audio, photographs, documents, and slides, to be installed in a public computing space within the library's Genealogy & Local History area.

"The goal of this program is to provide free public access to digital transfer equipment for personal use and to secure long-term preservation of community photographs, primary source documents, and media for the Grant Foreman collection in our Genealogy and History department," said Christina Linz, Assistant Director at Eastern Oklahoma Library System.

Staff will assist patrons in preserving their personal media, offer support and instruction in equipment use, and offer programs to promote and encourage the use of the Memory Lab. The library also plans to use this digitization project as a tool to evaluate the potentiality of curating a digital local history collection available for future generations and will promote and encourage the use of the Memory Lab by providing programming opportunities for the public and offer events such as "How to Preserve Your Home Movies", Home Movie Day screenings, and creating Personalized Digital Scrapbooks.




The event was a collaboration with USU's Inclusion Center and Latinx Cultural Center, USU Special Collections & Archives.



Wyoming State Library hosts Historic Carnegie Library Exhibit

A special exhibit now at the Wyoming State Library, "Cowboy Carnegies: Wyoming's Historic Libraries," explores the history, architecture, significance, and preservation of these buildings. Wyoming's Carnegie libraries were located in Albany, Big Horn, Converse, Fremont, Hot Springs, Johnson, Laramie, Natrona, Niobrara, Park, Platte, Sheridan, Sweetwater (Green River and Rock Springs), Uinta, and Weston counties. Some still serve as libraries, or as part of newer, expanded library buildings. Some were repurposed as museums or for local government. Others were demolished and exist only as fond memories for those who once walked through their doors.

This traveling exhibit was created by the Alliance for Historic Wyoming (AHW) with funding from Wyoming Humanities. Linda Waggener, now deceased, contributed greatly to "Cowboy Carnegies" by sharing her extensive research on Wyoming's Carnegie Libraries with the AHW. Waggener's research materials are now held at the University of Wyoming's American Heritage Center.





Lesley Receives Intellectual Freedom Award

Terri Lesley, Executive Library Director of the Campbell County Public Library System, is the recipient of the 2022 John Phillip Immroth Memorial Award honoring contributions to intellectual freedom and demonstrations of personal courage in defense of freedom of expression.
