Small Libraries Receive grants

The Arizona Library Association received a grant of \$1,242,300 in June, to support summer reading programs at 10 small and rural libraries. The grant was part of the AZ On Track Summer Camp



Program, administered by the Arizona Governor's Office. This was the first grant cycle to include public libraries, and the first time AzLA has facilitated subgrants of this kind. Read more in the White Mountain Independent.

Cox PIMA COUNTY PUBLIC LIBRARY

partnership offers free hotspots The Pima County Public Library, based in Tucson, has partnered with Cox Communications to install 70 free wifi access points in rural and urban areas across the county. Fifty additional access points are set for installation by the end of the summer, the \$720,448 cost to the library system will be reimbursed through the federal Emergency Connectivity Fund. ASU Library Data Science Conference The Arizona State University Library hosted a unique data science conference June. in welcoming more than 50 virtual attendees from a



wide range of academic institutions. Participants came together to consider a central question: What does a library perspective mean to data science?

Data science uses techniques including data analytics, machine learning, network analysis, visual storytelling, and text and data mining, which can add value in fields from engineering and math to social sciences and the arts. 



Johnson County Library welcomes new county librarian

Male and female county librarians in suits stand side by side Tricia Suellentrop (left) has been announced as the Johnson County Library's new county librarian. She succeeds Sean Casserley (right), who served in the role for the past decade.

Suellentrop succeeds Sean Casserley who announced his retirement earlier this year after a decade at the helm of one of Kansas' largest public library systems.

Suellentrop brings a wealth of experience to the position, having served as the deputy county librarian since 2008. As deputy





When she assumes the role of county librarian, Suellentrop is interested in maintaining the Library's reputation as a top service in Johnson County. In the 2022 Community Survey, in which Johnson County residents were asked to rate their satisfaction with County services, 88% of respondents said they were "very satisfied" or "satisfied" with Library services, putting it at number two among all County departments and agencies.

Suellentrop attributes that success to diverse, knowledgeable employees and a supportive internal culture, which is described by staff as creative, positive and welcoming.

As for Casserley, during his tenure at Johnson County Library, Casserley oversaw the creation of and significant progress on the Comprehensive Library Master Plan, a framework established in 2015 to guide the organization's sustainable growth of services, operations and facilities over a 20-year period.

"Johnson County is an exceptional community of readers and learners who value knowledge," said Casserley. "It has been a privilege to serve in this position over the last decade, and to work alongside such gifted, dedicated Library staff and volunteers."

Upon his retirement Casserley plans to stay in the Kansas City area. He looks forward to spending more time with his wife, Susie, traveling, and making progress on his reading list.





Olathe Public Library Hosts Community Craft Swap

The Olathe Public Library hosted a craft swap at its Indian Creek branch in March. The event, titled Swap Your Stuff: Craft Edition, was held on a Saturday and brought in over 200 attendees. Craft items in good condition could be dropped off at the library during open hours the week prior to the event. Anyone who donated supplies was given a ticket for entrance to an early bird "shopping" time. After the early bird hour, items were available for anyone to take at no cost. Any items left over were used for library programming or donated to ScrapsKC. There are plans to repeat this event in December for Swap Your Stuff: Holiday Décor. Montana Librarian Recognized Nationally

A Billings middle school librarian is one of 50 exceptional teachers honored at Disney World. Riverside Middle School librarian Karry Woodard was chosen by Disney for teaching she did in fall 2021."This was an interesting year where we were coming back with masks still," Woodard said. "And we were having students who were really struggling connecting with each other and with staff, so I thought, there has to be a lesson we can do that will foster community."

Woodard decided to put a tipi in the library and do several lessons with it. The first lesson was taught by a couple of Riverside Middle School students: "They heard a video that was given by two of our students here at Riverside, two of our American Indian students, who explained all of the etiquette that American Indians follow as they are entering a tipi, while they are inside a tipi and as they are exiting the tipi."

Woodard said students learned about differences between tipis today versus the tipis of the past. Finally, students created honor rocks to place around the tipi. Students painted the name of someone they honored on their rocks. Woodard said the activities created a lot of good discussion and connection.

Funds help refresh Ronan Middle School library

The Ronan Middle School Library was awarded a \$5,000 grant from the Laura Bush Foundation for America's Libraries. "It was pretty exciting," said RMS librarian Amy Miller.

The library grant was awarded to 300 schools throughout the country with the goal of encouraging all students to develop a love of reading and learning. According to the Laura Bush Foundation website, since its inception in 2002, it has awarded more than \$19.5 million to over 3,300 schools throughout the U.S.

Miller learned about the application period for the grant through a librarian Facebook group she belongs to and decided to take a chance and apply. While she's done a lot of work keeping the middle school library up-to-date through the years, she said there are certain sections that need more work than others. When the letter came through that they had won, it opened up the possibility for a lot of improvement.

The nonfiction section, Miller said, is the primary focus for the grant funds. Apparently much of the out-of-date book weeding has impacted that section, with many volumes about science, engineering, natural sciences, and other STEM-related topics, no longer accurate.

Another difficulty the library has faced is their lack of books about modern technology. Miller said they have several books about vehicles, but lack information about things like drones, clean energy and computer science.

"This grant money will go a long way towards helping us refresh that section and bring in newer books that are appealing to the kids to get them excited about STEM-related topics, but also to cover STEM from diverse perspectives," Miller explained.

Some of the funds have also been earmarked to put together a good collection of culture and language resources for all of Montana's federally recognized tribes, Miller said. While the school's budget does have some funds allocated specifically for Native American education, Miller said there are a lot of quality tribal publications they could use that are a little more costly. These funds will help her purchase those resources.

Overall, Miller said there is always some section in the library in need of help. "The budget is never quite enough do to everything you could do in the library. There's always going The grant funds will help librarian Amy Miller, get neglected while

you focus on developing something else," Miller explained. While this infusion of grant funds will be a great help, the library is also always open to accepting donations of books from the community.



Childhood STEM in the Library Workshop by Tammi Thiem

The Three Rivers Library System hosted a workshop about STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) for children and how librarians can add this concept to their libraries. The workshop presenters were Dr. Jane Strawhecker and Dr. Paula Thompson from the University of Nebraska in Kearney. The workshop was held at the Central Community College in Columbus.

The workshop was a great success! Nearly 30 attendees were able to experiment with hands-on games, kits, and supplies so they could really explore how things worked. They created bridges strong enough for 21 elephants to walk across. There were a variety of kits to try out. At the end of the workshop, each library received a Code and Go Robot Mouse Activity Set and the choice of one of the other kits.



Funds from the American Rescue Plan Act were used to provide this educational opportunity. This project is supported in part by the Institute of Museum and Library Services under the provisions of the Library Services and Technology Act as administered by the Nebraska Library Commission.

Holdrege Area Public Library Hosts Pollinator Program

Holdrege Area Public Library partnered with Nebraska Public Media, Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, Nebraska Statewide Arboretum and the University of NebraskaLincoln Bee Lab for programming inspired by My Garden of a Thousand Bees, the 40th season-premiere episode of Nature on PBS to Celebrate Nebraska Pollinators. Guest Speaker Betty Sayers of Holdrege, beekeeper and owner of Buzz Savories, talked about the importance of pollinators, beekeeping and what she creates with the honey. Wildflower seed packets and resource guides were handed out as well.









Capital Improvements in Lyon County

The Lyon County [Nevada] Board of County Commissioners approved a capital improvement request for the Silver-Stage Branch Library in Silver Springs to replace the existing concrete entry pad with a wrap-around walkway, a large patio area in front of the building, and two handicapped parking spaces. The work was completed in the middle of April. This new entry way has provided a much needed facelift for the 34 year old library in rural northern Nevada. Patrons of all ages have expressed appreciation for the improvements and have commented on the new, more welcoming façade. Moreover, the new patio provides additional space for programs and gatherings. Several Summer Reading programs have utilized this outside area for STEM activities, and a new program, outdoor movie nights, is coming soon.

When possible, the UL would like to partner with other higher education institutions and the State of New Mexico to identify resources and support for faculty initiatives in this area.

Children's Department Remodel

People may see a renovation in the Minot Public Library that will fulfill a need in the community as soon as next summer. A portion of the Children's Library in the Minot Public Library is set to be remodeled after more than two decades.

The proposed changes include a soundproof room with glass windows, a place for parents to sit, and a climbing tree. Janet Anderson, the library director, says the goal is to provide families with a safe space to go. "Families today need a place where they can come to that is quiet, and safe, and also some options that are free," said Anderson. "We know that the pressure to come in and buy something can sometimes keep people from going to certain locations where they might otherwise enjoy."

The Minot Public Library Board has requested the city council approve their architect firm for the remodel.



Bismarck Human Relations Committee Annual Humanitarian Award

The City of Bismarck's Human Relations Committee awarded the "2021 Humanitarian Award" to the Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library. The Humanitarian Award recognizes an individual, organization, or non-profit entity that has demonstrated leadership in the area of human rights. The Bismarck Human Relations Committee recognized the Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library and Library Administrators Christine Kujawa and Elizabeth Jacobs at the June 14, 2022, Board of City Commissioners meeting.

The Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library nomination is for its many services and welcoming atmosphere available to our community and residents. The Library provides equal service and a safe gathering space for the citizens of Bismarck/Burleigh County regardless of social standing, race, color, sex, age, marital status, sexual orientation, gender identity, national origin, or mental or physical disability. Additionally, the Library Board of Trustees recently approved a new section in the Library's Public Service Policy titled Youth Anti-Bullying Prevention. This policy "aims to protect the dignity and safety of youth served by the Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library. Bullying, harassment, and intimidation in all youth-serving Library services, activities, programs, and facilities are prohibited." Kevin Tengesdal, a Bismarck resident, nominated the Library.

The mission of the Bismarck Human Relations Committee is to protect and promote the personal dignity of all Bismarck citizens and eliminate any discriminatory barriers that prevent them from reaching their full human potential.

Grand Forks Public Returns to Pre-2020 Programming Numbers & Traffic

A busy library is a happy library. Grand Forks Public Library is thrilled to report an uptick in program attendance and foot traffic this summer. In June, the library offered nearly 100 programs for kids, teens, and adults to enjoy during the 2022 Summer Reading Program. In addition, the library presented 10 individual camps and clubs that required pre-registration (and filled up quickly!). The momentum continues in July, with over 80 programs planned, concluding with the Summer Reading Grand Finale on August 4. As a result, weekly door counts from May to June saw a 64% increase. Daily, an average of almost 600 patrons—young and young-at-heart—visit the playground for curious minds.



OLA President speaks to school administrators about importance of school library policy

OLA President Cherity Pennington was recently invited to speak to a statewide group of school administrators about the importance of school library policy.

The Cooperative Council for Oklahoma School Administration asked Pennington to speak about nationwide trends in book challenges during its summer learning conference in Oklahoma City. She also gave advice on responding to library challenges and reviewing selection and reconsideration policies.

"The last year has been difficult for our libraries as we face challenges to information access," Pennington said. "However, these challenges have given libraries more opportunities to form partnerships with other organizations as well as added visibility of the important role that libraries serve."



Pennington said she took the opportunity to advocate for hiring more school librarians and explained how Oklahoma supports a grow-your-own school librarian model, an opportunity that many school administrators said was unknown to them.

"Every university in Oklahoma with a school librarian master's degree program is available online," Pennington said. "With Oklahoma's State Department of Education offering up to three-year waivers to school districts that hire teachers working toward a master's degree to become a librarian, we have an opportunity to provide more Oklahoma students access to a certified school librarian."

Now more than ever, a school librarian is an essential teacher in our schools, Pennington said. She asked administrators to reach out to OLA if they need assistance in hiring school librarians or in reviewing library policy.

New South Dakota State Librarian


George Seamon has accepted the position as South Dakota's new State Librarian.

George's first day as South Dakota's new State Librarian was Monday, July 25th.




Interim Director @ Karl Mundt Library
