






Scarlett St. Clair

MPLA Dan Chaney Unsung Hero Award

To be given to an MPLA member who has consistently worked behind the scenes to create, administer, or support a library-related organization or project and who has not previously been recognized to the degree their work merits.

MPLA Beginning Professional Award

To recognize an MPLA member who, as a librarian/media specialist within the first five years after being awarded a library/media degree, has made a positive impact on the quality and role of library service. Factors such as innovative programming and planning, use of resources, and special projects will be considered.

MPLA Innovator Award

To recognize an up-and-coming individual(s) or group(s) in the MPLA region for a creative, inventive, trail-blazing project that has significance to the library community.

MPLA Distinguished Service Award

To be given to an MPLA member who has made notable contributions to the library profession, furthered significant development of libraries in the Mountain Plains region, or performed exemplary service for an extended period of time. If the individual is retired, the nominee may be a past member of MPLA.

Carl Gaumer Library Champion Award

To be given to the individual, organization or company whose positive support of the Mountain Plains Library Association is demonstrated by repeated conscientious endeavors towards libraries, library staff, trustees and professional activities.

Carl Gaumer, Gaumer Reference Services, was a popular library book vendor and a major supporter of MPLA in the 1970's. Based in Denver, Gaumer Reference Services served a number of western states. Carl traveled throughout the MPLA region and often exhibited at Library Association conferences. Among MPLA members, he was most famous for sponsoring a train from Denver to Reno for a joint conference with the Nevada Library Association in 1978, providing a band and refreshments for the 106 librarians who took the train. The award, originally named the Carl Gaumer Exhibitors Award, was later expanded and renamed to include any person or group who significantly supports and champions libraries.

MPLA Literary Contribution Award

To be given to an author whose published writings have successfully furthered an understanding and appreciation of the Mountain Plains region. The author need not reside in the region. The nomination may be based on either a single work or a body of works. Published works will be evaluated on the basis of literary worth, readability, and evidence of responsible research.

MPLA Access to Information Statement

The Mountain Plains Library Association (MPLA) represents librarians, library paraprofessionals and friends of libraries in our 12-state region. As a professional organization:

MPLA stands in support of the freedom to read, free speech, and unfettered access to information as inalienable rights protected by the First Amendment; and


MPLA supports librarians' expertise in their selection of reading materials and provision of information resources to their patrons and communities. Professionally trained librarians use their expertise to purchase resources and books to develop collections appropriate for the communities they serve, while also allowing for the opportunity to learn about other populations or ideas that may be different from their own; and

Librarians around the world have studied S.R. Ranganathan's five laws of library science, and MPLA would call out two of them:

- Law 3 states "Every book its reader" MPLA interprets this to mean that all books have a place in the library, even if only a small demographic might choose to read them; and
- Law 5 states "A library is a growing organism" MPLA supports everyone's right to books and information; libraries should be a safe place where people can learn and grow; and a library should be a dynamic institution that is never static in its outlook







PNLA Quarterly includes a combination of peer-reviewed and editor-reviewed articles focusing on issues of interest to libraries in the Pacific Northwest. Who better to provide this content than the practitioners, students, and educators who live in or are affiliated with the region? This regional focus and mix of content offer diverse but balanced information relevant to public, academic, and special libraries.

The journal is available as one large PDF or individual article PDFs, which, along with keywords for each article, improves the discovery rate of PQ content and give our authors more exposure on the Web, while improving indexing by vendors such as EBSCO. The journal conforms to the Open Access model, where content is made available free of charge to readers upon publication. Thanks to the sponsorship of PNLA, no costs are charged to content creators.

PQ publishes on a quarterly schedule. While submissions on topics of interest to librarianship in the Pacific Northwest region of the US and Canada are welcome anytime, issues are often organized around themes like leadership or the annual PNLA conference. 2022 KU Libraries grant Shulenburger Award for Innovation & advocacy in scholarly communication

KU Libraries have granted the 2022 David Shulenburger Award for Innovation & Advocacy in Scholarly Communication to two recipients at the University of Kansas: Shannon O'Lear, director of the Environmental Studies Program, and Corey Rayburn Yung, School of Law research professor.

O'Lear was chosen as a recipient for her dedication to the open dissemination of scholarly work to open access (OA) journals and sites and her work in educating students on open publication. Yung is recognized for his publication of two OER law textbooks that have helped reduce costs for students in a particularly expensive field of study.

Express Lockers in Billings

Billings Heights residents will soon have much greater access to the Billings Public Library. A new express locker will be put outside the SCL Health Heights Clinic, allowing library users to reserve materials online and pick them up 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Users will also be able to return items to the locker. It's the second in the state, after the first was put right outside the downtown library in January.

"It's helped close to 4,000 people," Billings Library Foundation Director Leslie Modrow said. "The most important thing a library does is provide access to information," she said, "and being able to provide access further beyond these walls makes our community even stronger."

IMLS Grant on Artificial Intelligence

Sara Mannheimer, associate professor with the Montana State University Library received a \$250,000, three-year grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. Montana State University, along with James Madison University and Iowa State University (ISU), will



develop resources that support the ethical use of artificial intelligence (AI) in libraries and archives. The project will produce deliverables that support responsible operationalization of AI in libraries and archives, including an environmental scan of Al projects in libraries; library and archives communityspecific case studies; an ethically-relevant harms analysis tool; and a handbook to guide users through project deliverables. Strategic partnerships with influential library and archives organizations will support broad dissemination of deliverables and encourage community participation throughout the project timeline. Responsible Al deliverables will help practitioners consider ethical implications as they embark on Al projects that support increased impact and new uses of library resources.

Centennial celebration bring new name and energy to Elko County Library

In preparing for its 100 year anniversary Kassie Antonucci, director of the Elko County Library took a hard look at her community; while they were preparing to celebrate their rich history, it was just as important to look to the next 100 years. It was time to take the research from the 2018 Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation study on library support to heart. It indicated that voters across America supported less funding for libraries every year—because libraries were thought of as just a place to get free books or for kids to do homework.

Antonucci, the library board, and staff recognized that being a good literacy-focused library wasn't good enough. Through surveys they confirmed that patrons overwhelmingly wanted the library to be a welcoming place that could help people connect socially and professionally. They wanted help developing workforce skills. And because many of the library's rural communities had limited internet service, reliable WiFi was critical. The library team also began focusing on new programming and services that could bring lapsed patrons back.

In August, the library team invited the community to celebrate with a roll out of a bold new name. Mybrary. And the response was immediate. At the first launch event in Elko, nearly 20% of the entire community showed up and more than 50 new library cards were issued every hour, It was the most attended event in the library's 100 year history.

"This new name is only the beginning", explained Mybrary Director, Kassie Antonucci, "our goals are to continue changing from a traditional literary-focused library to a community destination that encourages discovery and opportunity and creates access and belonging."



The new name was only the beginning. With it came new programming,

Changes under the new name are exciting and system-wide. To encourage the technology. community to revisit, Mybrary has forgiven all past due fines and has moved to a

fine free system. Remodeling is under way in several library spaces to remove walls and create places for connection. All branches have new, automated self-check, new computers, faster Wifi, and 27 inch monitors. Updated tech in the MybraryMobile provides the only WiFi service to many remote communities. And for career support, the Mybrary team hosts a VR training program that allows patrons to earn credits toward a nursing degree, at no charge.

Community members weren't the only ones excited by the new prospects of Mybrary. Community leaders and staff were clearly enthused. State Assemblyman John Ellison, who was honored with the first Mybrary Card, was excited by the new name, and the new opportunities that come with it. patrons to attend virtual classes and "It's a new concept and a fresh breath of air," he explained, "I really think earn credit towards a nursing degree at it's going to take us into the next hundred years."

Library staff, who were excited but nervous about the changes breathed easier with the outpouring of positive energy from the community. "We've got all new kinds of stuff to put out," says clerk Char Gustafson. "We've gotten to revamp things, add programming, it's just exciting to participate in something big."

Big is what the shift from The Elko-Lander-Eureka Library System to Mybrary is all about. As it says in the first paragraph of Mybrary's new promise to the public, which is to be prominently displayed in all branches,

"Ask most people about a library and they'll describe a quiet building full of books. And while that may have been true in the past. After 100 years of service, that's not what we're all about today."








Webster Public Library: A Sign of Things to Come

Marriott Library oral histories provide unique perspectives on Navajo Code Talker experience

Nearly eight decades after the end of World War II, just three of the few hundred Navajo Marines who served as code talkers are still alive. As the living history these individuals embody slips away, a collection of code talker oral histories housed at the University of Utah's J. Willard Marriott Library is an invaluable tool in preserving their legacies.

The code talker collection in the library's special collections includes eight code talker oral histories recorded at a 1971 reunion in Arizona and 18 pictures of the code talkers taken during the war. In collaboration with the American West Center and with financial support from the Doris Duke Foundation, these histories were acquired by the U as part of larger efforts to preserve Native American language and stories.

Library use on Wyoming Libraries Snapshot Day

Wyoming libraries are busy, serving their communities day in and day out. Snapshot Day (https://wyomingsnapshot.weebly.com/) tally tells the story of how our libraries are used, both physically and electronically.

WYLD Libraries

On Snapshot Day, Tuesday, October 25, 2022, Wyoming's more than 100 WYLD libraries:

- Circulated 12,200 items, including 6,521 children's items
- Issued 81 new library cards
- Added 634 items to their catalogs
- Made 3,241,881 items available to Wyoming's residents in their collections
- Saw the library catalog (WYLDcat) used for 6,955 sessions and 16,936 searches by 6,535 users
 WYLD includes all Wyoming public and community college libraries as well as many school and special libraries.

Public Libraries

In public libraries, from <u>data collected annually</u> by the Wyoming State Library, we estimate that on an average day, there are:

- 6,982 visits to public libraries
- 1,218 people using a public library computer
- 996 reference questions answered in public libraries
- 695 children and teens who attended programs at their public libraries
- 39 meeting room uses
- 729 wireless internet sessions
- 7,860 retrievals of information from WYLD databases

GoWYLD.net

The <u>GoWYLD.net</u> electronic resources offer articles, e-books, e-audiobooks, scholarly sources, courses and tutorials, and much more. These are available to every Wyoming resident, 24 hours a day. On October 25, there were:

- 1,212 views of the GoWYLD.net home page views from 451 users
- 405 visits to the A to Z databases list and 707 views of the GoWYLD LibGuides 67 different guides were accessed
- 2,891 total digital checkouts by 2,034 unique users in OverDrive Wyoming Virtual Library 1,450 eaudiobooks, 1,310 e-books, and 131 e-magazines
- 854 sessions, 5,910 queries in Britannica
- 4 sessions and 8 unique report views in CQ Researcher
- 224 sessions and 2,039 pages viewed in CultureGrams
- 6,247 sessions, 10,437 searches, and 2,106 retrievals in the Gale Databases
- 22,639 searches across all Proquest Databases
- 127 visits from 85 unique visitors to Driving-tests.org
- 2 logins and 9 quizzes taken in Pronunciator
