

### Montana Library Association Statement

In response to State Library Commission Decision to Withdraw from American Library Association

The Executive Board of the Montana Library Association deeply regrets the decision by the Montana State Library Commission to withdraw from the American Library Association. The Library Commission's stated objective is to provide excellent library resources and services by encouraging collaboration and cooperation between libraries and institutional partners. The decision made today runs counter to this mission, and undermines the shared goals of Montana libraries.

An American Library Association membership offers useful resources, development and funding opportunities, and professional networks that serve our state, our libraries, and, most importantly, our library users. By isolating State Library professionals from their peers and fellow leaders, the Commission has effectively eliminated critical training and tools for not only State Library staff, but for local library boards and trustees.

It is our earnest hope that the Montana State Library Commission will reconsider its decision and choose not to sever ties with the American Library Association. We urge them to look beyond short-term partisanship and view this situation through the lens of what serves the public good and long-term interests of all Montanans.

The Montana Library Association remains firmly in support of the aims and goals of the State Library as an institution. The Montana Library Association will continue to be a resource and professional network for Montana's library communities. The Montana Library Association persists in fostering literacy, providing access to information, and promoting lifelong learning. We uphold these principles regardless of the decisions made by the State Library Commission because we believe that they are fundamentally American and fundamentally Montanan.

The Montana Library Association invites the public, library workers, and stakeholders to share their views on this matter and to continue to support their local libraries as pillars of education, inclusivity, and community building.



#### **Return of the AZ Library Leadership Institute**

The Arizona State Library hosted the 2023 Library Leadership Institute from April 23-26 at the Ak-Chin Resort in Maricopa, Arizona. Facilitated by Maureen Sullivan, this professional development experience taught participants the essential elements of good leadership and

provided an opportunity to engage in deep conversations about leadership, complete personal assessments, and develop a personal plan for leadership development.



The participants all rated the Institute as Excellent and noted the value of the concepts they learned to developing their leadership potential. "I really appreciated the discussion of creating boundaries for myself with staff while also maintaining trust, respect, and transparency," said one such participant.

The Arizona State Library Leadership Institute is supported with federal LSTA funds provided by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS).

#### **AZ YA Library Summit**

Through the collaboration between the Arizona State Library, Archives and Public Records and the Arizona Library Association, the 2023 AZ YA Summit connected and enlightened library staff in public libraries, schools, and other community partners on best practices for meaningfully engaging teens. The YA Summit takes place every other year, rotating with a similar event for Children's services staff.

Over 100 participants from a variety of libraries gathered for this two-day event, with keynotes Julia E. Torres: Nurturing Readers in Turbulent Times: Creating and Sustaining Inclusive Library Spaces, Brian Young, Author: Educational Journey: Diverse Stories from Authentic Voices and Naomi Bishop: Arizona Dreams: Culture and Community.



Participants surveyed commented on the importance of learning from the keynote speakers and networking with colleagues around the state who serve the same age group. "Attending the YA Summit gave me more in-depth insights into topics that I didn't realize were issues. This was a real eye-opener. Race issues, disability issues, and mental health. Although I was aware of the hardships individuals face, it opened my eyes to issues that are involved in these topics that I was not aware of."

This event was supported in part by the Arizona State Library, Archives and Public Records, a division of the Secretary of State, with federal funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services.



#### **Shakespearean Science exhibit**

In May, students from the Radical Science Writing 3030 classes installed their final projects on the 3rd floor corridor on the west side of Norlin Library at University of Colorado in Boulder, CO. The final assignment requires five-person teams to design and present their research as a series of posters about the sciences at the

time of Shakespeare. The series was initially developed with support from the Libraries Rare and Distinctive Collections in 2016.

"The Shakespearean Science assignment, perhaps more than any other I give my science writers, demands an awareness of the rhetorical situation," said Writing & Rhetoric Program (WRTG) instructor Danny Long. "Once the posters are hung up on the wall, people will be zipping by them in a hurry. My students must capture their attention and hold it."

One example from this year's project is titled "Vignette of Color" Presenting four primary ingredients prominent in a painting by Giovanni Battista Salvi, the posters inform the reader about where painting materials were sourced and how they were mixed to create pigments used in paintings in the 15th century.

"We had to think about our audience and how to make it visually appealing, both of which are not things you typically do for research papers," said Shreya Sharma, a graduating senior studying biochemistry. WRTG 3030 is a science writing class designed for engineering majors. The final assignment introduces an additional element.

"In the past working on research papers, I often would just follow the formula of finding sources with useful quotes and adding them to my paper as I went," Jack McKinstry, a junior studying computer science related. "The difference with the creative freedom allowed with this assignment not only made it more fun to complete, but also forced me to actually understand the topic from the research we conducted."





#### Travel Activity Kits

The Newton Public Library in Newton, KS added travel activity kits in 2023. These kits include car-friendly activities, Brain Quest cards, and games like Scrabble and Battleship that are perfect vacation diversions.



#### **MIT Spokes Science & Math Workshop**

Students from MIT are biking across the United States to offer science and engineering workshops, including a workshop at Newton Public Library Youths ages 10-18 were invited to participate in this free, one-day camp experience.

Workshop session topics included: 3D Printing, Building Bridges, Under Pressure, Diffusion Through Membranes, Acids and Bases with Cabbage, Generating Power Through Biking, Magic of Making Electricity



The Keene Memorial Library in Fremont, NE, has been operating out of the Fremont City

Auditorium for more than six months now. Our library building has been under construction since September 2022. We feel blessed to have this temporary space so we can still offer thousands of books for people to check out. The biggest negative of our temporary location is the lack of space for programs. This has required us to be creative and reach out to partners in our area.



Over the winter months, we had monthly passive programs in the temporary library. These passive programs have been a hit. We have done simple picture scavenger hunts along with complicated scavenger hunts that required kids to decode messages and find hidden evidence. We considered doing an egg scavenger hunt in the temporary library, but we really wanted to do something different in April.



After reaching out to some of our community partners, the Fremont Mall agreed to be our location for an Eggstravaganza! This event would not have been a success with the partnership with the Fremont Mall. They supplied an Easter Bunny, a beautiful backdrop for families to take photos with the Easter Bunny, fun glasses to give away to all the kiddos, and eggs filled with candy. The library started the event off with storytime with the Easter Bunny. Then the kids got lined up based on their age ranges to go on an egg hunt. As many of you know, trying to estimate how many people will attend special programs is almost impossible.



We had the Eggstravaganza during our normal Friday storytime where we, on average, get 15-20 people to attend. So we were trying to plan for about 100 people for this event since it was a 'no school' day. No amount of preparation could have equipped us for the crowd of almost 300 people attending! We look forward to doing this event again next year... with the edits that we have noted! We had a little over 800 eggs this year at our event, but next year we plan to have at least 1,500 eggs! We live and we learn.

The Seward Memorial Library first opened its doors on September 2, 2003. This year, we are celebrating our 20th anniversary! Over the past few months, we have been busy remodeling our library so that we may begin our next 20 years with increased capacity and better service for our patrons. end of the remodel. The new configuration of the library added 219 square feet for patron spaces by adding fiction shelving, a new room for the Book Nook, one new meeting room, two new study rooms, and an area for our Library of Things. #### **Legal Kiosk Project**

The State of Nevada announced the launch of the Legal Kiosk Project at 22 libraries across Nevada with the intent of making information more available to older Nevadans, underserved communities, and all those with questions.

Nevada's Legal Kiosk Project grew out of an effort

by the state's five leading legal aid providers, including Nevada Legal Services (NLS), to address the digital divide exposed by COVID-19 pandemic, which disproportionately affected communities, especially seniors, that lack the means to use technology to access the legal system. As underserved communities often seek legal information at their local libraries, placing the free Legal Kiosks in libraries throughout the state provides a needed resource for library staff and the people they serve. NLS took the lead in obtaining grant funding for and developing the Project. The Legal Kiosks are designed to be a user-friendly portal for Nevadans to learn about civil legal issues, find court information and forms, access legal aid providers, and locate community resources.



Eight librarians have graduated from the Public Library Training Institute, which took place earlier this month at Northern State University in Aberdeen. The institute, sponsored by the South

Dakota State Library, is a four-year program of education for librarian practitioners, support staff, and trustees of small to medium-sized public libraries who do not have library degrees.

"This year, students learned about creating early literacy kits. These kits can be checked out by patrons or used as education stations around the library for independent and interactive play," said Kathleen Slocum, Continuing Education Coordinator for the South Dakota State Library. "They're excited to take their learning back to their communities."

Students attend in-person classes for one week in June and take additional classes online between summers. Participants earn a minimum of 120 contact hours over a four-year period and two college credits each year from a South Dakota public university. Librarians who attend all four years receive a Certificate of Public Library Management and are recognized as certified library practitioners.


