

Grocery Rewards—King Soopers/Kroger

There are no longer grocery gift cards linked to MPLA. Instead, you can link your loyalty card to our MPLA Community Awards Program account. To do so: Go to http://www.kingsoopers.com

Once logged into your King Soopers/Kroger account, search for Mountain Plains Library Association by name or our account: KK820. Then click Enroll. New users will need to create an account which requires some basic information, a valid email address and a loyalty card. If you previously purchased grocery cards they may still be used and reloaded but they will no longer provide rebates for MPLA.

Instead, there is a quarterly designated funding amount which is shared by all Community Rewards organizations. Amounts are determined by the percentage of purchases by each organization.

Poudre River Public Library District Takes On **Mobility Survey Challenge**

The Poudre River Public Library District, based in Fort Collins, worked with Colorado State University's Department of Occupational Therapy (OT) to assess whether three of the library locations met the

Community Health **Environment Checklist** for Mobility (CHEC-M) standards.

assessment process was done by OT professionals and students.

All locations are using

the assessment data to improve accessibility. An example being the Council Tree location which met expectation for 45 of the 46 CHEC-M items. The one item that needed addressing was to insure that areas that counters for walk-up use of library catalog

computers due to the height. The resulting recommendation was that the library may either find a way to make the height accessible to ADA standards or direct people to other nearby options.

There were also spaces that met standards yet could be improved. For example, this teen space meets guidelines, but the placement of the tables make for an overcrowded environment. The solution? They are looking at rearranging the space to allow for better mobility.

Unsurprisingly, some of the lessons learned were that (1) it's a good idea to continue to check for opportunities to improve the accessibility, (2) that improvements are not necessarily expensive or complex, and (3) partnering with a university department can be a route that supports student education as well as enhance the library experience for others.

20th anniversary of the Oral History

In Fall 2023, the UNLV University Libraries celebrated not only the 20th anniversary of the Oral History Research Center, but 20 years of the extraordinary work of Claytee White. Although White has been rather humble about this achievement, she has led 13

major projects and several smaller ones that have recorded the often unrecognized history of Las Vegas and Southern Nevada. No celebration could truly be enough to honor her work on behalf of the center, but nevertheless, we did so with an exhibition detailing the center's work, a documentary screening, an anniversary reception, and most importantly, a recording of White's very own oral history.

The exhibition curated by the faculty of UNLV Libraries provides the most thorough recap of the center's work over the years. Providing significant anecdotes from the oral histories recorded in each project as well as highlighting other materials within our Special Collections & Archives that relate to these projects, it reveals the story of Las Vegas and how it came to be. Most importantly, it reveals how the city continues to move forward in the wakes of both our triumphs and our tragedies. This exhibition currently lives on the first floor of Lied Library at UNLV, but some of it is also highlighted here

Early in the semester long celebration of the OHRC, we also hosted a documentary screening of *Storming Caesars Palace* at the library. Many of the women featured in the film had their oral histories recorded by White and White was featured in the film as an expert historian. As we reached the midpoint of the semester, we finished our celebration by allowing our storyteller to become the story.

At our 20th anniversary event, Stefani Evans, the Project Manager for the OHRC, sat down with Claytee and recorded her oral history in front of a live audience. This oral history will soon be added to our collection, which can be viewed at any time at special.library.unlv.edu.

20 years and more than 4,000 oral histories collected later, the work of the center continues under the extraordinary direction of Claytee White.


'Oh the places you'll go!' is a common cry to encourage people to take up reading — and this is especially true for children's literature.
