Grants

The Professional Development Committee supports avenues of continuing education and research experiences for individuals employed in the library or related professions in the Mountain Plains region.

Individual Grants

Grants are awarded to support the following: Formal course work in library science or a related discipline and/or directly related to an individual's library position. Attendance as a participant or a presenter at a library or scholarly workshop, seminar, or conference. Visits to another library to receive or provide significant advanced training in library services or procedures. Library related research projects.

State Association Conference Grants

Grants are awarded to encourage opportunities for continuing education for the MPLA membership through pre or post conferences at the annual meetings of state associations in the region. If a state does not offer pre/post conference programs, that state can be awarded a grant for a presentation of comparable significance during the conference.



Grocery Rewards—King Soopers/Kroger

There are no longer grocery gift cards linked to MPLA. Instead, you can link your loyalty card to our MPLA Community Awards Program account. To do so: Go to http://www.kingsoopers.com

Once logged into your King Soopers/Kroger account, search for Mountain Plains Library Association by name or our account: KK820. Then click Enroll. New users will need to create an account which requires some basic information, a valid email address and a loyalty card. If you previously purchased grocery cards they may still be used and reloaded but they will no longer provide rebates for MPLA.

Instead, there is a quarterly designated funding amount which is shared by all Community Rewards organizations. Amounts are determined by the percentage of purchases by each organization.

2024 **National** Medal for Museum and **Library Service**

The Copper Queen Library in Bisbee, Arizona is among the finalists for the 2024 National Medal for Museum and Library Service. "The 30 National Medal finalists from across the United States



showcase the tremendous abilities of libraries and museums to serve as trusted, dynamic public spaces that meet the needs of their communities," said IMLS Acting Director Cyndee Landrum. "The Institute of Museum and Library Services is honored to recognize these outstanding institutions. congratulate them on their collective effort to respond to community needs, preserve diverse history and culture, and create a sense of belonging for all Americans." The Copper Queen Library is no stranger to national awards, having been named the Library Journal Best Small Library in America in 2019.

State of the Art Facility Coming

The Prescott Campus Library of Yavapai College is excited to be moving into a newly renovated Center for Learning and Innovation,



to open in 2026. The state-of-the-art facility will feature immersive learning experiences, providing students access to media production rooms dedicated to film and podcasting. Faculty members will utilize dedicated spaces and advanced develop virtual technology to reality classroom activities and explore the latest educational technologies. The space will also feature a variety of study environments, including quiet rooms and collaborative spaces designed for group projects. The Prescott Campus Library will continue to offer instruction, research assistance, and technology for students throughout the project. Access to the closed physical collection will remain available through the Yavapai Library Network, by placing a hold through the catalog.

National Grant for Small and Rural Libraries

Eaton Public Library has been selected as one of 310 libraries to participate in the Libraries Transforming Communities: Accessible Small and Rural Communities EATON PUBLIC LIBRARY initiative, an American Library



Association (ALA) grant program that provides community engagement and accessibility resources to small and rural libraries to help them better serve people with disabilities.

The competitive award comes with a \$10,000 grant that will help Eaton Public Library provide directional and descriptive signage for patrons with vision problems, including low vision and blindness.

"We are so proud to be chosen for this amazing opportunity," said Library Director Greene. "This grant will allow our library to get to know our residents with disabilities better. It will help us improve our services to ensure this population feels welcome and comfortable in our space.

As part of the grant, Eaton Public Library staff will take an online course in how to lead conversations, a skill vital to library work today. Staff will then host a conversation with residents about library wayfinding and use the grant funds to purchase and install ADA compliant signage throughout the library.

Many members of the Eaton community suffer from vision problems, with at least half of library patrons experiencing some form of reduced vision. The library found in a recent ADA audit that current signage is either incomplete, poorly lit, placed incorrectly, or missing altogether.

UNC Selects New Dean of University Libraries

The University of Northern Colorado (UNC) announced that Sheila Yeh, Ph.D., has been selected as the next dean of University Libraries.

Yeh comes to UNC from the University of St. Thomas, in St. Paul, Minnesota, where she served as the associate vice provost for University Libraries and Strategic Program Development



since 2021. She brings over 35 years of experience in academic and public libraries and library consortia.

Aligned with UNC's commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion, Yeh's personal goals are focused on "reinvigorating academic libraries" service models to support students with diverse backgrounds." During her time at St. Thomas, she worked with campus units to promote student diversity and inclusion services in the libraries with the goals of increasing student retention and creating a sense of belonging.

Among Yeh's other key accomplishments are implementing organizational improvements to modernize library services and meet engagement needs for faculty and students, while working collaboratively with campus partners to promote scholarly communication, faculty profile and research and data management support.

"I am honored and excited to be joining the UNC community," said Yeh. "The dedication to education excellence for diverse populations aligns with my beliefs and values. I look forward to contributing to the success of the Rowing, Not Drifting 2030 strategic plan with the talented and committed library faculty and staff."

Yeh officially starts her position at UNC on July 1. She succeeds Jayne Blodgett who has been serving as interim dean since August 2022, after former dean of University Libraries Jennifer Nutefall left the university.

FHSU begins a nearly \$28 million Forsyth Library renovation

This summer, construction will begin on a \$27.7M renovation project at Fort Hays State University's Forsyth Library in Hays, Kansas. The phased construction will renovate the 105,404 square foot building and will be completed in 2026.

A groundbreaking event was held in April with U.S. Senator Jerry Moran, FHSU President Dr. Tisa Mason, Dean of Library Services Ginger Williams, and FHSU Foundation President and CEO Jason Williby. At the event, they each shared remarks about how these updates will uphold the university's commitment to keeping the library a central academic and cultural hub.



Most of the project is funded by a \$19M federal NIST grant. The remaining funding will come from a combination of private gifts, Educational Building Funds, and State General Funds for Deferred Maintenance. Transforming Communities: Accessible Small and Rural Communities, an American Library Association (ALA) initiative that provides community engagement and accessibility resources to small and rural libraries to help them better serve people with disabilities.

The competitive award comes with a \$10,000 grant which will be matched by SCKLS to allow six member libraries to create accessible computer stations for public use.

Library Internship Grants

Welcome Back Bookmobile Services

The Washoe County Library System (WCLS) has served local residents since 1904 when the first Carnegie Free Public Library opened in Downtown

Reno. Not long after that, our dedicated staff extended library service in creative ways, such as launching a recurring radio program in the 1930s and '40s, offering library services directly to patients in the local Washoe General and Saint Mary's hospitals, and using their personal vehicles to drive hundreds of miles to deliver reading materials to ranching families in the northern border area of Washoe County known as Vya, Nevada.



In 1947, Extension Librarian Darrel Cain and a colleague drove to Treasure Island, California, to pick up their newly purchased surplus Army ambulance, which was retrofitted to hold books. Mr. Cain delivered books to the eight book stations, many schools, and community agencies in the area. The bookmobile featured robust tires fit for Army service, which were needed for driving hundreds of miles on dirt roads to places like Vya, Gerlach, and Empire.

WCLS maintained regular bookmobile services to not only Washoe County, but also to residents of nearby rural areas such as Lyon, Storey, and Douglas Counties. By the 1980s, it had multiple bookmobiles—some delivering physical materials, and others specializing in providing mobile story times and other activities. In 2001, the 35 foot long Mobile Library 1 (ML1) bookmobile was launched. The large vehicle offered full library service to residents and continued to make regular biweekly stops at various locations until its retirement in 2010 following the Great Recession.

In 2021, Washoe County residents participated in community forums to help guide the creation of the library's 2022-2025 Strategic Plan. From these discussions, we could not ignore the impassioned requests from residents to once again have bookmobile services in Washoe County.

Through the hard work of library staff and financial support from a grant by the Institute of Museum and Library Services, administered by the Nevada State Library and Archives, we are excited to announce the new Library on the Go Bookmobile! We invite you to visit our Library on the Go webpage, washoelibrary.org/bookmobile, for more information on bookmobile services, routes, special appearances, and to request more information.

June Primary includes 5-mill levy question for Mayville Public Library

Residents in Mayville, ND will head to the polls in June to consider a 5-mill property tax increase that would bolster the finances of the Mayville Public Library.

Supporters are hopeful the tax increase will allow the library to recruit and retain a new librarian following the death of longtime library director Margaret Rice in January.

Rice's passing forced the library's board of directors to temporarily close the doors to the historic library until a group of volunteers pitched in to reopen the facility in March.

"We need a little more money to be able to afford a librarian, although whether that's a full- or a part-time librarian, we still don't know yet," Dennis Peterson, said the library board's president.





New Eastern Oklahoma Library System (EOLS) Executive Director

Kathy Seibold comes on as the EOLS Executive Director during a transformative time, "Libraries in brick and mortar have started to become more like community centers," she said. "They provide a lot programming around and support the other agencies that are in the community, work in partnership not only with non-profits but other entities, cities, schools."



"The challenge is to figure out how much service we need in a community because we centralize here," she said. "You need to know the patrons at your local library, we have this collective group of patrons, but we also have to look at each branch and location from their viewpoint."

Seibold said libraries remain important because they are information connectors, especially for people who don't have other avenues for getting reliable information.
