Grants

The Professional Development Committee supports avenues of continuing education and research experiences for individuals employed in the library or related professions in the Mountain Plains region.

Individual Grants

Grants are awarded to support the following: Formal course work in library science or a related discipline and/or directly related to an individual's library position. Attendance as a participant or a presenter at a library or scholarly workshop, seminar, or conference. Visits to another library to receive or provide significant advanced training in library services or procedures. Library related research projects.

State Association Conference Grants

Grants are awarded to encourage opportunities for continuing education for the MPLA membership through pre or post conferences at the annual meetings of state associations in the region. If a state does not offer pre/post conference programs, that state can be awarded a grant for a presentation of comparable significance during the conference.


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

The journal conforms to the Open Access model, where content is made available free of charge to readers upon publication. PQ publishes on a quarterly schedule. While submissions on topics of interest to librarianship in the Pacific Northwest region of the US and Canada are welcome anytime, issues are often organized around themes like leadership or the annual PNLA conference. Grocery Rewards—King Soopers/Kroger

There are no longer grocery gift cards linked to MPLA. Instead, you can link your loyalty card to our MPLA Community Awards Program account. To do so: Go to http://www.kingsoopers.com

Once logged into your King Soopers/Kroger account, search for Mountain Plains Library Association by name or our account: KK820. Then click Enroll. New users will need to create an account which requires some basic information, a valid email address and a loyalty card. If you previously purchased grocery cards they may still be used and reloaded but they will no longer provide rebates for MPLA.

Instead, there is a quarterly designated funding amount which is shared by all Community Rewards organizations. Amounts are determined by the percentage of purchases by each organization.

Summer Heat in Arizona

As Arizona's summer heat reaches its peak, many libraries across the state become cooling centers for those looking to cool off. Over fifty libraries are listed on the Arizona Department of Health Services statewide list of cooling centers, and many other libraries not included in the list also act as cooling centers and/or hydration stations throughout the state.

The City of Phoenix's Burton Barr Library, the City's largest, has become the first in the state to open a 24/7 cooling center, providing continuous relief from the heat, and ensuring that residents have a reliable place to cool down. In addition to Burton Barr, three other public library branches have extended their hours to accommodate those seeking respite.

IMLS Grant to Pima County Public Library

The Pima County Public Library system has become a crucial support network for those affected [by homelessness]. Emerson DeMeester-Lane, the Library Services Manager for the Pima County Library, acknowledged the increasing number of homeless individuals seeking assistance at the library. "We do see an increase in homeless folks that come to the library," he said. "But I also think that we have worked to try to connect them to resources more actively in the past five years."

To better address these evolving needs, the Pima County Board of Supervisors approved a \$58,000 grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Sciences on June 18th. The grant is focused on studying psychosocial needs within the library system.

Digital Memory Lab

Some of southeastern Colorado's history can be told through photos and videos of everyday life. Those are among the things the Pueblo City-County Library District wants to capture in its Shared Memories project.

Currently, the program has a Digital Memory Lab with various digitizing technologies at the Rawlings Library in Pueblo. The goal is to expand this project to reach rural and marginalized communities around southeast Colorado and help people collect and digitize their images, recordings and more.

"Our priority is preservation and raising of awareness the of their importance family, of their personal collections here in southeastern Colorado," said Aaron Ramirez, who leads the district's



local history and genealogy department.

A \$250,000 grant from the Mellon Foundation will fund six permanent and five mobile memory labs. They'll go to 16 counties in southern Colorado, stretching from San Luis Valley to the Eastern Plains, according to Ramirez.

The new regional memory labs will provide equipment and training at no cost to users for do-it-yourself digitization of all kinds of materials, including photographs, slides, documents, floppy disks, and outdated video and audio media like film movies, VHS tapes and cassettes. Recording equipment for oral histories will also be available.





Monarch Butterfly Houses

Topeka and Shawnee County Public Library hosted a workshop to build houses for the monarch butterflies flying around the Capital City. The library says the workshop was a fun way to tie local interests into learning over the summer.

"We just love kids to be curious, our teens, everyone," TSCPL Public Services Specialist Jackie Hurst explained. "Coming in and learning a little about the butterflies that are flying around, and the types of flowers they need, is something that they're interested in."

Butterfly houses look a lot like bird houses, except for the opening – narrow, vertical slits instead of a round hole. Butterflies are drawn to the slits because they mimic splits in tree bark, which is where they shelter from predators and bad weather.





Fixit Bike Repair Station

The Billings Public Library unveiled its new Fixit Bike Repair Station at a ribbon-cutting ceremony on June 4. Located outside the library and accessible 24/7, the Fixit Bike Repair Station provides the tools and resources for cyclists to perform basic repairs and maintenance whenever they need it. The Billings library is the first in Montana to offer this type of resource. The library also will begin providing bike locks available for check-out for visitors.

Funded by the Friends of the Library, the initiative aims to encourage more community members to bike to the library and promote healthier and more sustainable modes of transportation, according to a news release. The ribbon-cutting event also marked the kickoff of the 2024 BPL Bike Library season, which serves as a mobile extension of the library, bringing books, resources and educational activities to various neighborhoods.

Library Directors' Summit

Lake Tahoe was the setting for the 2024 Nevada Library Directors' Summit. The event was billed as Forward Together: Intentional Leadership for Strong Nevada Libraries, and brought together 40 attendees including library directors and assistant directors, a representative from the State Council on Libraries and Literacy, one State Library Volunteer, the Nevada IMLS Program Officer, and Library Planning and Development Staff from the Nevada State Library, Archives and Public Records. The level of directors' experience ranged from brand new to the position to many years in the job.

Between May 29 and May 31, attendees participated in 20+ hours of learning, leadership development, and networking. Content was planned by a dedicated committee of library directors and state library staff. Topics included literacy, leadership. strategic management, succession planning, policy development, public budgeting, networking, and collaborative planning. Angela Hursh, 2023 Library Journal Mover & Shaker, provided the keynote workshop focusing on how libraries can champion their patrons' right to read. Brad Johnson from the Nevada Leadership Program and Center for Economic Development at the University of Nevada, Reno provided a series of Leadership, Policy, and planning workshops. Local mystery writer Todd Borg hosted a casual campfire chat with s'mores.

The 2024 Nevada Library Director's Summit was funded by a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (ILMS) through the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA), administered by the Nevada State Library, Archives, and Public Records (NSLAPR).

"We have a beautiful green screen set up in one of our community rooms where kids can kind of set up their backdrop so it looks like they're in outer space and then add stickers, take photos, it's pretty interactive," said Shawna Marion from the Morton Mandan Public Library. "There's a place that kids can create solar systems, in our kid's area there's a Connect 4, there's lots of informational panels. It's pretty dynamic."

"The green screen is pretty cool," said Kayla Schmidt from the Morton Mandan Public Library. "There's little aliens and planets you can put on it and you can pick different exoplanets to be your backgrounds."

Little Free Libraries in Muskogee, OK

Building on the success of our Community Book Giveaways, our library group wanted to ensure students would have access to books 24/7. Little Free Libraries have given our community just that. The first box was purchased through a grant, sponsored by the Education Foundation of Muskogee, and installed at our magnet school. One of our librarians painted the exterior that depicts each librarian as their favorite book character.

Our goal is that these libraries become self-sustaining and continue to allow students to take and trade books any time of day or night. Since the first box was



installed in April 2024, we have placed two more boxes in our district. Our long-term goal is to have Little Free Library boxes at every school site in our district within the next two years, thus growing the love for reading by making books accessible to everyone.

Open Research Oklahoma Launches

Oklahoma State University has migrated its institutional repository to a new platform that will better serve the university and the state. The new site, Open Research Oklahoma, was developed with OSU's land grant mission in mind.

Open Research Oklahoma supports OSU's research, teaching and outreach by enhancing the visibility and impact of the university's scholarly output. It is freely available worldwide at Openresearch.okstate.edu. "As a land grant university, OSU recognizes and promotes the importance of open access to scholarly information," said Associate Dean of Library Operations, Juliana Nykolaiszyn. "Platforms like Open Research Oklahoma serve the public good by facilitating the broad dissemination of research findings and removing barriers to access."

The local seamstress uses the library's sewing machine to make costumes for the local dance group and dresses for the county pageant.

Through a second grant, the library built a STEAM Room to help kids (and some adults) learn through doing. The room is filled with fun stuff like art supplies and 3D printers. Since adding the STEAM Room the library has seen an increase in the number of teens and pre-teens using the library. The room is also in high demand for grandparents with visiting grandchildren. The library receives

comments and gratitude almost daily for the opportunities.
