South Dakota has already experienced an unpleasant reduction in budget that will, essentially, remove all staff, all databases, and all services – except those to the blind – from citizens of South Dakota. Other states are looking at other bits of legislation that might harm libraries in those states as well. One thing I'd like to focus on this year is advocacy for our member libraries. Letters and informational campaigns about the issues facing libraries in our 12 member states will be something that MPLA should be prepared to produce this year. The vast majority of the populace is happy with their library and is very much interested in keeping it around, with all of its services intact, but if they don't know about the threats, they can't tell their local legislators how they feel. One thing we might be

able to do as an organization is make sure the local libraries are aware and have the tools they need to educate their patrons.


NEBRASKA

NEW MEXICO

Libraries are in the Legislature

House Bill 123 (HB123) is a 2025 bill in the New Mexico Legislature that aims to prevent the banning of public library materials:

The bill mandates that public libraries must adopt a policy aligned with the American Library Association Bill of Rights to receive state funds. It prohibits the removal or banning of materials based on ideology or the author's race, nationality, gender identity, sexual orientation, or political or religious views. Virtual Reality in the Wyoming Community College Libraries

Wyoming Innovation Partnership (WIP) is collaborating with all postsecondary institutions in the state to expand their capacity to integrate VR technology into courses and programs, develop and create VR applications, and coordinate the deployment of these resources to maximize return on investment. MPLA members at Central Wyoming College Library are one of the eight community college libraries in the state to receive a package of VR headsets. The WIP will also include software to help train students on soft-skills and explore virtual worlds. Each library will house and provide opportunities for students,

faculty, and staff to learn through VR experiences.






