Utah conference visit – The highlight of the time since the May Board meeting has been representing MPLA at the Utah Library Association conference in Provo, May 16th – 18th. I received a wonderful welcome, starting with being picked up at the Salt Lake City airport by Betty Dance. That afternoon I had the opportunity for a self-guided tour of the Brigham Young University library. Another pleasure came that evening as I explored a used book store across the street from the hotel. The conference meal and social functions were held at the Provo City Library, a beautiful blending of a historic old building with a large modern addition. The conference was a perfect time for further discussion of plans for the 2008 joint conference with ULA, which will be at the Salt Lake City Hilton, April 29th to May 2nd. Besides MPLA Vice President Rob Banks, several of the ULA conference committee leaders are MPLA members, and the resulting teamwork and shared vision is truly heartening.
