- No suggestions just comments that it was somewhat difficult to address people's comments prior to the institute because of my existing workload. - The focus groups were an opportunity for some great information exchange with our sponsors. It was nice to see a glimpse of what a library vendor is working on. The reception with the MPLA Board was a great opportunity to meet more library leaders I hope to work with.
- The focus group actually led to some good discussions that gave me ideas and new resources to explore.

The reception was nice - I liked being able to put some faces to names and hearing how I could be more involved. But maybe a little long.

- To have the MPLA Institute I understand we need the money so that was fine. I never mind learning either and I did gain from their presentation.
 As I mentioned earlier, I was so mentally tired from all the learning and emotions of the Institute that I really didn't engage much with the MPLA people. I was just too tired. Of note, the positive energy at the Institute I felt was really strong. I felt that everyone was valued and although all different we all were accepted and appreciated. Maureen set the tone early of a positive, accepting environment. Also, Judy's preparations were amazing! She did an excellent job with responding to any needs and foresaw what was needed well in advance. It was well thought-out and carried out. I guess the size of the room was somewhat small after four intense days--that would be my only improvement.
- i thought these were both great activities. it seemed that this maybe contributed to an extra day or 1/2 to the program. i didn't mind that at all, but some people may have thought the end of the week dragged b/c of it.
- I don't think the III focus group necessarily added to the experience, but I was more than happy to do it and liked the idea that they were listening to our opinions and experiences.
- I did not enjoy the focus groups, but did not mind participating because they donated money to the Institute. The focus groups, in my opinion, did not add anything to my experience. The reception with the MPLA Board was a great way to meet everyone and see how everyone is involved with MPLA. I wish we could have had a dinner with the Board but without all the YMCA kids.
- I did enjoy the Focus Group, but it was not needed. The Reception was important gave me a stronger tie to MPLA.

- I liked the Innovative group because (a) it wasn't very long; and (b) I learned a lot about what tech services other libraries are using.
- The focus group was interesting to me because we use III products. Suggestions for Improvement

- High quality was the phrase I used most in describing the Institute to others. The facilitator, the mentors, the place, the curriculum, and the participants were all beyond my expectations. Thank you for a wonderful and valuable experience!
- Overall great. I appreciated the time that was allowed to process and think about what was presented.
- Space out the work sessions to give participants some free time.
- I think that I missed having the usual exercise. The fear of bears and mountain lions kept me from moving around the premises as much as I needed. By Thursday I really felt sluggish. In retrospect, I would have walked more and joined in with others as they walked. I learned by Tuesday that three meals a day of the food was too much so I ate breakfast and dinner and felt better. I think the only thing to improve is one day shorter, I could have done more on my own for exercise.
- Allow one to choose whether to share accommodations or not to better cater to introverts which many in this profession are. And price rooms accordingly (double v.s. single occupancy)
- I really don't have any other than those I have already mentioned. Attending the Leadership Institute was one of the best experiences I have ever had, professionally or personally.
- It was great meeting the MPLA board, but the introductions went very long. Give them time limits?
- I found the MPLA Board distracting and a bit silly. I wanted information about the profession not "cute" stories. The MPLA wasted funds by traveling so far to play board games and socialize.
- I would just make the MPLA Board reception a quick 5-10 minute introduction and then give people a chance to mingle over appetizers or wine. Doesn't need to be long maybe 1/2 hour.
- No one represented the U of A library school and yet they were a sponsor? Skits were a bit too goofy.
- After Maureen left, it was a little unclear who was in charge. For example, after we delivered our skits, the last one was very exciting, but no one facilitate any type of wrap-up or closing. It was a bit of a let down.

I knew some stuff that others didn't which made me feel like I was competent and that not everyone else knows it all except me. Also, with the handouts and notes and personal associations I feel like I have concrete tools to turn to when I have questions or even just to read over and over as I continue my career in librarianship. I have a great deal of admiration for Maureen Sullivan and I look to her as a role model in the profession and to some degree as a personal hero. It was good to get away from my home state and the known faces and players and work with unknown people. The fresh associations was really nice. I got a lot of internal support from the mentor's own stories. I didn't think I would care but when they all spoke of their experiences and backgrounds and how they approach their work, along with the struggles within the work I was drawn in and gained strength from them--I hadn't expected that.
- It gave me the confidence to identify my strengths and help that to shape future conversations i have with employers and colleagues
- I am so thankful I had the opportunity to attend. I have had one of the most eye-opening, selfconfirming, inspiring experiences of my life. I kid you not, the curriculum, the people, the fun, everything--I am on a new path.
- It meant bravely stepping out of my comfort zone to make new connections and challenge myself to be more than I thought I could be.

- It was the best professional development experience I've ever had! I feel like I now have 29 leadership brothers/sisters to call on -- not too mention the mentors!
- For me, it meant learning I have great leadership skills and believing in myself. It changed the way I see myself, especially professionally. I didn't give myself enough credit for the gifts and skills I have to offer. I gained more confidence at the Leadership Institute than I had in my entire library career previously. In my personal life, being at the Institute has taught me the importance of making time for myself and time for reflecting on everything. My life has changed and will continue to change because of my experience at the Leadership Institute.
