The AZ Memory Project Highlights the Harvey Girls of the Winslow Harvey Houses: Fred Harvey saw a need for better food and service along the rails and in 1876 pioneered a chain of restaurants and inns known as Harvey Houses from Chicago to San Francisco. Experience demonstrated that women made better servers, and the 'Harvey Girls' were borne. Newspaper ads read: "Wanted: Young women 18 to 30 years of age, of good moral character, attractive and intelligent, as waitresses in Harvey Eating Houses on the Santa Fe in the West."
