Oklahoma Libraries: Where it's @: Oklahoma Library Association Annual Conference, April 17 – 19, 2002, Adams Mark Hotel, Tulsa, Oklahoma. Oklahoma Library Association is preparing for the best ever state conference this April. Our keynote speaker, Cecile Richards will discuss "Before the Crisis; Building Grass Roots Support for your library". Other highlights include FOLIO (Friends of Libraries in Oklahoma) speaker Charles Banks Wilson, ALA President John W. Berry, author William Bernhardt, and Gene McFall's Witty World of Will Rogers. Pre-conferences will be presented on media training, reorganizing libraries and how to handle pests and mold in your library.

Sequoyah Book Awards announced. Once again, Oklahoma kids have picked great winners! <u>Dork in Disguise</u> by Carol Gorman has won the popular Sequoyah Children's Book Award. Ms. Gorman will be giving a presentation at the OLA conference on April 17. The Sequoyah Young Adult Award was won by Laurie Halse Anderson for her book <u>Speak</u>.

February 12, 2002 - Oklahoma Library Association Legislative Day. Over 180 librarians, friends of libraries and trustees from across the state braved an ice storm and the worst year in recent memory for state funds and state budgets to talk to their legislators at the Oklahoma State Capitol. Nothing daunts our library supporters. Discussion with our elected officials was candid and concerned. They appreciated our understanding that this year is not the best for our library goals and dreams to be realized, but reassured us that they would do what they could and that our issues would be in mind when our state finances improve.

<u>Let's Talk About It, Oklahoma</u> is alive and well! Oklahoma Library Association is one of the very few state associations that sponsor a thriving reading and book discussion series. The program began in 1985 with 6 libraries presenting discussion programs. In 2001, *Let's Talk About It* programs were held in 46 libraries! Thanks to this OLA project, all over Oklahoma, humanities scholars are talking about books and authors, historical contexts and literary trends with homemakers, bankers, coaches, salespeople, teachers, retirees and farmers.

LTAI Oklahoma offers more than 33 reading and discussion themes, each of which includes multiple copies of books that may be borrowed by participants as well as informative brochures, posters and other publicity materials. Scholars provide in-depth discussion of the topics and literature. Any library in Oklahoma is eligible to sponsor a LTAI series.

The funding for this project is provided by both the Oklahoma Humanities Council and the National Endowment for the Humanities. Jennifer Kidney heads up our LTAI project. Her leadership and hard work have been a great benefit to OLA, our libraries and our customers. Jennifer is very excited about her work. She says the program is particularly popular in small, rural communities. Townspeople in Hobart, Cheyenne and other small communities tell her that they look forward every year to the LTAI programs. In Hollis, Oklahoma, population 2,584, LTAI programs draw 30 participants!

Let's Talk About It, Oklahoma's new project has been *Oklahoma Connections*, a humanities-based reading and discussion project that takes adult literacy students beyond the rudiments of learning to read to discoveries about cultural ideas, historical settings and people, distant places, commonplace concepts, human insights and much more. Our new adult readers have warmly welcomed the Connections series where their new skills in reading are put to use. Students read the books on their own, or with their tutors, or have the books read to them before each program. If they complete the series, they keep the books; for some, these will be their first books in a personal library. This has been a very successful project, and rewarding to literacy coordinators, tutors and students across the state.
